RUMORED VISIT OF BRITISH PRINCES TO RUPERT

S.S. CITY OF SEATTLE SAFE: CALLIES WIN SERIES: GROUNDHOG RAILWAY: THEATRE PARTY

CANADA COUNTS ON RUPERT AS AN IMPORTANT OUTLET FOR WHEAT IN THE NEAR FUTURE

As usual at this time of year, there is some anxiety as to how the different railway companies are prepared to remove the crop. The general opinion is that there will be another blockade this fall and winter. The railways have been exceptionally busy constructing and improving branches and main lines, but it is felt that the large amount of construction work done will not prevent congestion, without the facilities for carrying the grain east from the lake terminals being correspondingly improved. The amount of work being carried on by the railways now will become more noticeable when the Grand Trunk Pacific and the Canadian Northern are transcontinental railways. Then Canada will have three all year around outlets to the Atlantic seaboard instead of one, as at the present.

The tenders for the government elevator at Fort William were in hand at the first of the month, and at this writing are being considered by the board of grain commissioners. It is not expected that the big house, which will have a capacity of 250,000 bushels, will be completed in time to be of much

service in handling this year's crop.

It is understood that in order to facilitate the shipment of the crop this fall as much as possible the Dominion government will, as an early date, apply to the United States Interstate Commerce Commission for the rate on grain to Duluth which was in effect last spring, it being the same as that from Winnipeg to Fort William.

It is stated that there is accommodation at Duluth for between 35,000,000 and 37,000,000 bushels, and that there will be no trouble in taking care of as much Canadian grain as was handled last spring at that port.

As a step toward opening all available channels for the moving of the grain this fall, it is announced that an order in council has been made requiring the Grand Trunk Pacific, within 30 days from August 1st, to lease the stretch of the transcontinental from Lake Superior Junction to Transcona, a short distance east of Winnipeg. As the Grand Trunk Pacific line from Port Arthur to Lake Superior is already in operation, this would mean a line from Transcona to Thunder Bay, in full operation, under the control of the Railway Commission.—Canadian Finance.

Official Figures.

Official figures on the fiscal year of C. P. R. ended June 30th are now out, showing gross earnings of \$123,319,541, and net of \$43,298,243. These compare as follows with last year:

Earnings, 1912, \$123,319,541; 1911, \$104,167,808; increase, \$19,553,321.

Expenses, 1912, \$80,021,298; 1911, \$67,467,977; increase, \$12,553,321.

Net profits, 1912, \$43,298,242; 1911, \$36,699,830; increase, \$6,598,412.

Heaviest Receipts.

The heaviest monthly gross receipts were for April, May and June, when they exceeded \$11,300,000, the only other month approaching these figures being October, 1911, when they ran as high as \$11,200,000.

The smallest monthly gross was \$7,328,781, in January. In four months of the fiscal year the net earnings exceeded \$4,000,000. These were August, October and December, 1911, and April this year.

The gains in gross over the preceding year, \$373,382, in September to \$2,629,325, in April, and gains in net went from \$5,818 in September to \$1,239,150 in February.

BRITISH PRINCES SAID TO BE COMING TO PRINCE RUPERT

(Special to Daily News.)

London, Aug. 16.—A rumor persistent and coming from reliable sources is to the effect that the Prince of Wales and Prince Albert will visit Canada next year, remaining for a month. A visit is to be made to all western and coast cities by the princes, who will return home via the United States, spending a few days in New York.

HARVEST EXCURSIONS WESTWARDS

Ottawa, Aug. 16.—The department of agriculture has received word from Winnipeg that the weather conditions for the last ten days has been ideal for the crops and under present conditions cutting will be general in a few days. Between 40,000 and 50,000 men are required for the harvest, and excursion trains of harvest hands have already commenced to move westward from the eastern provinces.

VISIT OF A LETHBRIDGE PASTOR HERE

GROUNDING ON GRAVEL; GOES SOUTH

The steamer City of Seattle arrived in port this morning at 9 o'clock looking none the worse for the fact of her being stranded on a sand bar for several hours off Ketchikan yesterday on her southbound trip. It appears that at the point at which she went aground, about half a mile from Ketchikan, it is a soft gravelly beach and therefore beyond the delay caused by having to lighten her of a considerable portion of the cases of canned salmon she had aboard no damage was done. She left after a short wait here for the south.

Great Day for Victoria.

Victoria, Aug. 16.—The Duke of Connaught has consented to lay the cornerstone of the new \$2,000,000 addition to the parliament buildings during his visit to the coast.

LONDON AND CANADIAN SECURITIES

As far as Canadian securities are concerned, London still remains unresponsive. On his return from England last week, Sir William Mackenzie said that the present state of the London market was due to a two-fold cause. In the first place, that market was congested with Canadian securities; in the second place, Canadian securities did not yield the income return which British investors were now demanding. Sir William denied that he had gone to London to secure more capital for his various projects. "We had all the money we needed for all our undertakings. We forestalled this market." Sir William would say nothing concerning the reported hitch in his purchase of the Dominion Power and Transmission Company, of Hamilton.

DR. CADE AND ALD. GEO. KERR TO OPEN NEW BOWLING ALLEY ON THIRD AVENUE TONIGHT

The Empress bowling alleys in the basement of the new building next to the Empress Hotel will be opened to the enthusiasts of the great game tonight at 7:30. Dr. Cade and Alderman George Kerr will preside and open the alleys formally.

They have been designed and constructed by H. N. Arnold of Vancouver. They are twentieth century continuous alleys built with exceptional care and are believed to be the best on the Pacific coast. H. E. Ross, proprietor of the alleys, who started the first bowling league in Prince Rupert, will be assisted by Mr. H. H. Lockhart, who will have superintendence of the alleys, and whose renown as a bowler is recognized all along the coast.

Everything has been done to make the place a pleasure to patrons, the best make of balls on the market being used. The alleys are registered with the Canadian Bowling Association and the American Bowling Congress, and any scores made will be recognized by these associations.

H. H. Lockhart will organize several leagues this winter, including House League, Commercial League, Telegraph League, handicap tournament, rag tournament and knockout tournaments at later dates. He will also get

a team together to represent Prince Rupert at the Western Bowling Congress to be held in Vancouver in the spring which should make a good showing as the alleys here are identical with the tournament alleys.

The lighting system, which has been given special attention, is now in perfect condition, there being twenty 40-kilowatt tungsten lights with a thirty degree halfion shade on each of the alleys and two eighties on the runways.

SURE SIGN OF THE PORT'S GROWTH.
The western correspondent of a well known Canadian business paper has coined the new phrase that the Pacific coast of Canada is liable to be "drowned in port." This in reference to the great emphasis now laid upon likely harbors on the coast. In view of the trend of the world's commerce the possible ports of Canada, especially on the Pacific, grow more and more interesting to capital. Prince Rupert with its long start in the race for renown as a Pacific coast seaport maintains the lead amongst the new ports. While other possible ports are still advertising the beginnings of their wharf building, Prince Rupert has reached the stage when steamship traffic at her wharves has grown so busy as even to occasion the jostling of vessels to the accompaniment of the deep sea oath and the cling-clang of the engine room bells so dear to a certain poet. News of harbor and waterfront incident is news of Prince Rupert's prosperity as a seaport.

MORE POWER FOR PRINCE RUPERT.
There is a proposition before the city at present regarding the supply of power to consumers within the city limits by an outside corporation. The proposition has attractive points, the principle of Prince Rupert's preservation of the public franchises as jealously as possible being the main obstacle it has to overcome. Prince Rupert today has a power plant serving quite a few consumers, and serving them satisfactorily, but from an incident of a day or so ago The Daily News understands that the city power plant has all the demands on its power producing efficiency that it can stand. Because one of the big grading contractors was using a heavy load of power intermittently, users of less power were inconvenienced a little. It was only a trifling matter, put right by an alteration in operating hours, but straws show the way the wind is blowing and the question naturally arises, "Can Prince Rupert supply from the city's own

plant power enough to satisfy demands of industry as new enterprises establish here in the months between today and the time the long delayed Woodworth hydro electric scheme is completed?" If not, then the proposition before the city becomes still more important with the immediate industrial welfare of the city in view.

GENERAL BOOTH.
There is hardly a better known name in the world than that of General Booth, the great executive head of the world's most wide scattered army. Everybody knows at once who is meant by "the General," so much of a household word has the Salvation Army term become. Almost totally unknown at the outset of his career, General Booth is today so much a world recognized personality that every flash of news concerning him most certainly circles the whole globe, and penetrates to some of the farthest corners of the earth. Wherever a Salvation Army outpost is stationed there are anxious thoughts and prayers for the General. During a long life wonderfully preserved he has been a veritable Napoleon of salvation, and a greater than any Napoleon.

LONDON MONEY AND MUNICIPALS.
Toronto's decision to borrow temporarily in London, instead of issuing a long term loan, affords one more indication of the "surplus of good things" that is just now burdening the over seas market. As Sir Edmund Osler remarked recently on his return from London, Canadian municipal issues will require to sell at still lower prices before British investors will again find them attractive. There is nothing to be gained by blinking at the facts. London underwriters are still heavily laden with unabsorbed municipal issues of low yield—not Canadian alone but said—and are taking on new issues, if at all, only on the unusual commission of 1½ per cent, or even more, Canadian finance.

BY CLOSE MARGIN ON POINTS PRINCE RUPERT CLUB BEAT WANDERERS CLUB PLAYERS

Wednesday evening an interesting English billiard match was played between teams representing the Prince Rupert and Wanderers clubs. The tournament consisted of eight games played between members of the respective clubs. Although the Wanderers club won five events out of the eight, they lost the tournament by a narrow margin of points on the basis of the total points scored in the aggregate by each club. The games were played out in the course of the evening at both clubs, thus facilitating the match being brought off without any delay. PLAN TO ORGANIZE LABOR OF IRON AND STEEL INDUSTRY

AMERICAN FEDERATION READY TO START CAMPAIGN TO BRING THE BIG OPEN SHOPS INTO THE UNION.

Washington, Aug. 14.—Plans to organize labor of iron and steel industry of United States are about to be launched by the American Federation of Labor. The campaign to bring the great "open shops" in the country into the union is about to begin with the holding of organization meetings simultaneously in every city and town having an iron or steel plant. A circular announcing the movement, issued at federation headquarters indicates that the movement will take consideration of the large foreign element in the industry. It says in part: "You could render much assistance in this matter started in your interest, if, when writing to your friends and relatives across the water, you advise them it would be to their advantage if they did not come to America for a year or two."

MONTREAL'S TRAFFIC PROBLEM

The Montreal tramways are pressing the city for more lines to handle the increased traffic. The city has had an expert report, but has not yet moved to give the company the new routes asked for.

Street paving operation are in progress in twenty-five street sections of Montreal, an indication of the character of the public works now carried out.

The Canadian Autibus Company will give the city of Montreal 100 shares per mile of circuit, or \$600,000 worth of stock altogether, for permission to run on the city streets. The company proposes to use fourteen routes, totalling sixty-two miles.

MIKADO WAS DEAD DAYS BEFORE ANNOUNCEMENT

Vancouver, Aug. 15.—That the Emperor of Japan died on July 13 and not on July 30 as was announced, is the word brought from the Orient by persons who had been closely in touch with court circles. Not only is there a custom in Japan to delay announcement of the demise of royalty but even under modern ideas there was some fear on the part of the ministers that any sudden announcement of the death of the emperor would throw the whole country in a state of panic.

BACHELOR'S APARTMENTS IN VANCOUVER

It is proposed to erect in Vancouver for bachelors a six storey, reinforced concrete, fireproof structure of the most modern design and equipment, containing bedrooms with a private bathroom attached to each, together with a hot and cold water basin, in addition there will be four shower baths on every floor. Downstairs accommodations will be provided for a grill room, billiard room, reading, smoking and lounging rooms, cigar and new stand and barber shop.

All rooms will be equipped with disappearing beds, which, if desired, when not in use, can be rolled out of sight into a self-airing enclosure, thus leaving the entire space as a sitting room. These features, in addition to the style in which the rooms will be furnished, will leave nothing more to be desired in the way of comfort, convenience and artistic effect.

ALLAN S.S. CORSICAN LIMPS ACROSS OCEAN

Montreal, Aug. 16.—It is learned that the steamer Corsican is more seriously damaged than was at first announced. She will require a new stem. The vessel has again started on her voyage across the Atlantic, making 50 miles in five and a half hours. The Lake Champlain will keep in touch with her during the voyage.

RAILWAY TO GROUNDHOG MOUNTAIN

A route map of a railway extending from Ground Hog Basin coal fields, at the headwaters of the Skeena river to tidewater on Portland Canal, has been filed with the Minister of Railways at Ottawa. The charter is owned by interests identified with the B. C. Anthracite Syndicate, which has acquired 47 claims in the district. The company was voted \$6,400 per mile at the last session. Mr. Leon Benoit, of Winnipeg, is a director of this company, says Canadian Finance.

According to him coal seams varying from three to twenty ft. in thickness have been opened up on the company's claims. The coal is said to be pure anthracite.

Sir Donald Mann has acquired options on coal lands in the same basin, and has filed a route map at Victoria for a railway from these fields to Stewart on the Portland Canal.

A COSTLY SUNDAY VISITOR

Even an insurance agent sometimes forgets to take a necessary dose of his own medicine. The Insurance Press tells of a Brooklyn insurance man who owns a two family house in that burg and who lately found himself a defendant in a \$20,000 damage suit because his tenant had a wife met with an accident on the Sunday visitor and the latter's insurance man's premises. The cover over a grating in his yard slipped when the wife of the tenant's visitor stepped on it, and she was thrown into the cellar, sustaining injuries which she values at \$15,000. The husband is likewise suing the owner of the place for \$5,000 for loss of the wife's services. After the accident happened the owner first consulted a lawyer for his defense and then promptly brought a public liability policy which cost him only \$4. He says that he would willingly compromise the case by paying \$300, but fears he will not get the chance to settle so easily. The need for such a policy is not realized by the average property owner till he has a loss.

WAR AND FINANCE IN ENGLAND

Discussion concerning the possibility of an Anglo-German war has somewhat overshadowed the British financial markets of late. Also social unrest in the old country continues unabated. The continued sagging of consols is now attracting attention from all quarters of the world, though Sir Felix Shuster, the eminent London banker, came out last week with an open prediction that consols would ultimately recover much of their great loss.

MODEL CITY BY MONTREAL CAPITALISTS

A group of Montreal capitalists have secured about 1,000 acres of land fronting on Lake Deschenes, eight miles west of the city on the Ottawa River and near the new government rifle ranges. It is proposed to develop it on town planning principles as a model, high class residential site. R. 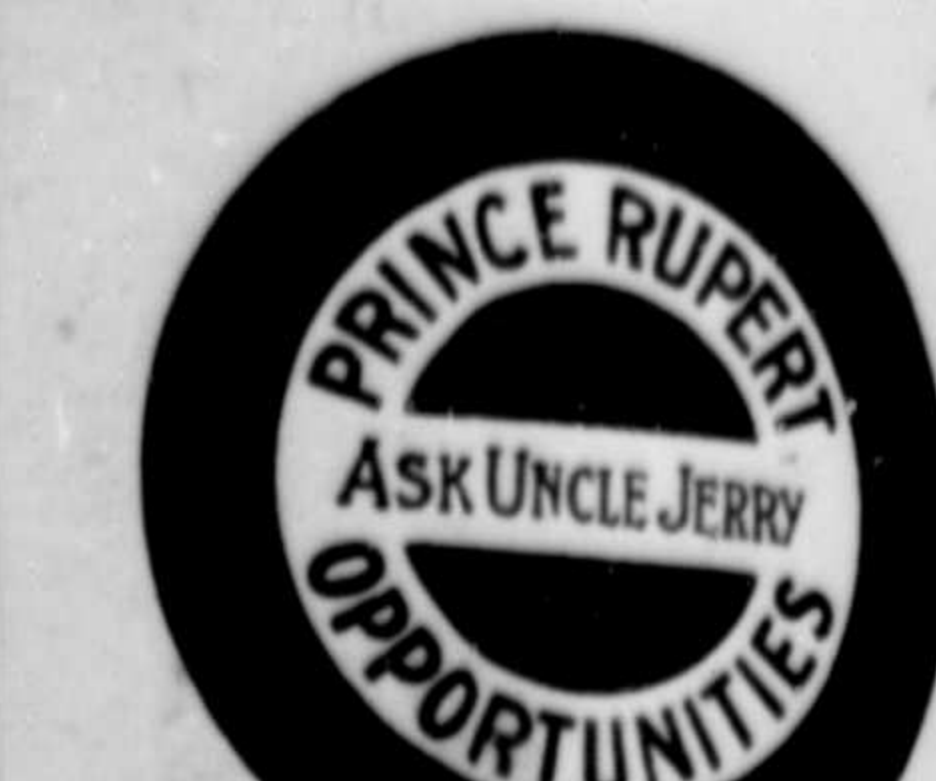
