## PROVINCIAL BUILDINGS ARE PLANNED: MERCANTILE MARINE STRIKE: CANAL RATE WAR

### DETERMINED RATE WAR IS BEING PREDICTED BETWEEN PANAMA AND SUEZ CANALS

(Special to Daily News.)

Washington, Aug. 24.—A rate war which might involve all maritime nations of the world and which would revolve about the Suez and Panama canals was predicted yesterday by officials who have watched the development of the world interest in the Panama canal bill now awaiting the approval of the President.

According to a report which reached the State department the directorate of the Suez Canal decided to reduce the rates through that canal. In official circles this notice is regarded as first retaliation steps against the free tolls provision for American ships through the Panama Canal.

Announcement of the proposed reductions through the Suez Canal appeared in inconspicuous notices in American newspapers. The notice was to the effect that after the first year the transit dues in the Suez Canal would be reduced fifty centimes, bringing the toll for loaded ships down to 6.25 francs. This is the precise equivalent to the \$1.25 maximum tolls which the Panama Canal act prescribed for vessels passing through that waterway.

### WILL CALL A STRIKE THAT WILL STARVE GREAT BRITAIN SAY THE MARINE OFFICERS

London, Aug. 24.—Culminating the strike series which has all but crippled the British carrying business during the past two years, a movement long threatened by officers of the mercantile marine began today when the newly formed union of ship masters and mates tried to prevent the C. P. R. liner Mount Royal from sailing.

That vessel's chief officer had been dismissed and the union demanded his reinstatement. Substitutes were obtained by the company and the vessel left port.

The officers are well organized and violently discontented. They propose to put forward before the end of the year what they consider their legitimate demands. Failure to meet these on the part of the ship owners will be met with a strike "which may starve the nation."

The cause of the strike is the dismissal of Chief Officer Keelt of the Canadian Pacific Line, owing to his refusal to perform dockers' duties during the recent dockers' strike.

### PERFECT UNDERSTANDING BETWEEN THE G. T. P. COMPANY AND THE GOVERNMENT

(Special to Daily News.)

Ottawa, Aug. 23.—"So far as we are officially aware there is neither is, nor has been, any friction between the government and the Grand Trunk Pacific, any controversy which has occurred concerning the taking over of the Transcona-Superior Junction section by the company has been absolutely confined to the newspapers, for neither from the company nor from the commission have we yet had any notification of the company's alleged objection to take over the line."

Such was the statement made by Hon. Dr. Reid, acting minister of railways, to the Free Press correspondent the other afternoon when his attention was called to a recent statement made by E. J. Chamberlain in Montreal.

Not Forced to Take Section.  
"It is now some time since the order in council announcing the completion of the section and notifying the company that it was ready to be taken over, was issued and if the company had any strong objections to taking over I am quite confident that representatives would have been up here to voice their objections long ago. But I am quite sure that there is no friction. Why should there be? We are not forcing the G. T. P. to take over the section until it is ready to do so. We recognize that by the act the company 'may' but is not 'forced' to take over any one section of the Winnipeg-Moncton division until the entire division is completed."

### SIR GEO. DOUGHTY TO BUILD SUMMER HOME

There arrived on the Prince Rupert this morning Sir George Doughty, the president of the B. C. Fisheries Co., with headquarters at Skidegate, Queen Charlotte Islands, accompanied by his wife, Lady Doughty, and his son, Mr. Wilfrid Doughty. Sir George, who is pleased to remark on the great changes and improvements that have taken place in the appearance of the city since his last visit, had a short conference with General Superintendent W. C. Mehan at the G. T. P. offices upon leaving the boat.

Several gentlemen connected with the promotion of the Port Edward townsite met Sir George with a view to arranging for a trip this afternoon as far as the latter place. Sir George and party, who are registered at the G. T. P. Inn, will remain in the city until tomorrow, leaving on the Prince John tomorrow night for Skidegate and Alford Bay, where the most extensive of the company's operations are being carried out. Amongst these are the erection of a summer residence for Sir George in a most charming and picturesque location overlooking the water.

Sir George, who will make a trip up to the end of steel upon his return to the city, has not definitely decided how long his visit to Northern British Columbia will extend, but the fact of his having a residence built for himself at the headquarters of the company at Alford Bay shows that his present intentions are to spend a considerable portion of the summer months of each year right on the ground where his big enterprises are being carried on.

### PROVINCIAL BUILDINGS ARE BEING PLANNED NOW FOR RUPERT: CONTRACTS SOON

(Special to Daily News.)

Victoria, Aug. 24.—Plans are now being prepared in the Department of Public Works for the new Provincial buildings to be erected at Prince Rupert. These buildings will be of handsome architectural design and sufficiently commodious to meet the needs of that growing city for at least a quarter of a century to come. The government expects to be in a position to advertise for tenders within a few weeks. It is understood also that the Dominion government will rush the work on the federal structure which is contemplated there, while at the same time the Grand Trunk Pacific will proceed with the erection of its terminals and of the hotel for which plans have been prepared by Mr. F. M. Rat-tenbury. Next year, therefore, will see the expenditure in Prince Rupert of at least two million dollars on these works.

### S. S. SOPHIA NEARLY WRECKS THE WHARF

It looked as if there would be something doing in the smash-up this noon for a short while when around the Rupert Marine Works through the vagaries of the Princess Sophia whilst endeavoring to effect a landing at the G. T. P. wharf. Consternation reigned supreme amongst the crews of the McCulloch, the

Dominion government fisheries inspection boat Falcon and A. W. Agnew's Lakanian, which was loaded down with supplies for the camps at the Port Edward townsite. Partly owing to wind and tide, it is to be presumed, the stern of the Sophia swung in and crushed the McCulloch to the extent of smashing the guard rail, damaging it considerably. The Rupert Marine wharf was shoved over about three feet. It was considered by those around on the wharf at the time that the Falcon had a narrow squeak from being stove in altogether. Black looks and cuss words were the order of the day down on the wharf.

Captain Cook, the commander, says the vessel was going dead slow and when ice was sighted the engines were immediately put full astern, but before the ship lost her weight she touched the berg. ### THE OLD TIMERS' BANQUET.

Tonight sees the assembly of the old timers of Prince Rupert prior to 1909. No one who entered the city later than the last day of 1908 is entitled to rank with the little group of pioneers who formed the advance guard of the rising community of Prince Rupert. In the rallying of the old timers thus together may be seen a new stage in the city's development. The time has come when the influx of new citizens, and the multiplying of new interests, social, political, business and industrial, have almost overshadowed the sturdy sprig that represents the very first sign of Prince Rupert's growth. It is necessary today to clear away from around our old timers the clustered later growths of the community's life and to let the true pioneers of Prince Rupert appear distinct and clear before the numbers who are indebted to their early strivings for the comforts and conveniences of the city as it is today. Tonight's gathering will awake memories which strong men treasure, trifling incidents of humor and adventure which live in the hearts of all such hale and hearty old stagers as our young pioneer "old timers" of today will be when the Prince Rupert they knew as a camp in the bush is a tall city of granite and marble faced, steel framed sky scrapers, and great ships proudly swing at anchor in the shadow of Mount Morse.

### THE PROVINCIAL BUILDINGS.

From Victoria comes the news that the plans for a pile of palatial Provincial government buildings are preparing fast and that the work of erecting the buildings will very soon be started. This is news of value to Prince Rupert, both from the point of view of the citizen whose interests range across continents to the centres where moneyed men do congregate looking for likely investments for their capital. The announcement that substantial Provincial government buildings are planned and soon to go up means correspondingly substantial confidence in Prince Rupert, for no matter what color may be a man's politics he must repose reasonable financial confidence in the government in power. No government has ever had better opportunities for granting substantial benefit through a community upon its whole province and further upon the whole dominion than the McBride

government has in regard to Prince Rupert. Upon the manner in which Premier McBride makes good his promises to Prince Rupert depends not only his reputation as a Provincial administrator, but much of his keenly desired reputation as an administrator of more ambitious scope. The protector of "His" cannot afford to neglect the present port, and coming naval base, of Prince Rupert.

### LONDON PRESS AND BOOTH.

The London morning papers pay eloquent tributes of sympathy to the late Salvation Army leader. They regard him as the greatest apostle and evangelist of the age, and compare him with John Wesley and Martin Luther. The Times in an editorial says: "The death of General Booth closes a strong character, the most remarkable our age has seen, and it will set the world meditating on that fervent and forceful character, the keen though, as some would say, narrow intelligence which raised him from a position of friendless obscurity to be the head of an organization yielding obedience scarcely less complete than the Roman Catholic Church yields to the pontiff."

### PANAMA PERIL.

The London Morning Post says: "The opening of the Panama Canal will signalize a formidable attack by the United States on the supremacy of the British mercantile marine and the endowment of American trade in British markets with an immense advantage. The prosperity that is due to our control of the sea carrying trade will be challenged under the conditions by a strong and enterprising nation inexorably determined to recover the carrying industry it lost in the war of 1812." The Post then asks: "In view of this situation, what provision is being made by the admiralty for stationing an adequate cruiser squadron in the West Indies?" and concludes by declaring that the supremacy of the merchant service must be maintained and that British vessels must be well found, British manned and armed against the commerce destroying time of war.

### King Shoots Well.

London, Aug. 23.—King George shot 142 brace of grouse yesterday on Lord Sefton's Lancashire moors, the shooting party comprising seven guns.

## RISE OF THE NEW TOWN OF PORT GRANBY IS RAPID; LOCAL MAN GETS NEW CONTRACT

"There is good activity on Granby Bay," said C. W. Calhoun, who is in the city for a few days, after spending a couple of weeks in the mining district on Observatory Inlet. "This week the Granby Company let the grading contract for four miles of railway from their mines to the smelter site. The contractor is R. A. McMordie, who is building their wharf. The Granby people have also surveyed a road from the smelter to the Bonanza claims, which they have under bond. This line runs through the new townsite of Granby Bay, which is just being put on the market. We are going to have a town there," added Mr. Calhoun,

who left last night to pick up the lots for an hotel he proposes to erect there immediately. The Granby Company now have between 400 and 500 men working on clearing and construction and on development work. The trestle for the big six foot pipe line for the hydro electric power is being built, but the dam has not yet been started. It is now claimed that the Trail smelter people also contemplate building at Granby Bay. Last week five experts, representing this company, were there looking over the property they hold adjoining the Granby property. Among them were Messrs. Davison, Butler and Andy Larson.

## OLD HAZELTON IS RENEWED AS BOAT CLUB

The Prince Rupert Rowing Club, whose fine new quarters on the old hulk Hazelton, moored near the Government wharf, are just now completed, have all arrangements made for the comfort and accommodation of its members and their friends. The large open space available for the sheltering of boats and canoes and the floats that have been built, extending the full length of the club house, are a great advance upon anything heretofore attempted in the way of arrangements for the comfort and accommodation of the number of people who delight in spending all the time they can possibly spare upon the waters of our magnificent harbor.

## NEW MAN SUPERINTENDS NEW WING

At a special meeting of the Hospital Board, held the other afternoon in the city hall to receive a report from the building committee as to the progress of the work, it was decided to appoint a new inspector for the work, as Mr. W. F. Barker, who has been acting in that capacity, is at present out of the city. Mr. J. W. Potter's name was mentioned in connection with the appointment. The fact came out that the contract had not been signed yet, and it was decided to have this done immediately. The building committee were empowered to act in regard to obtaining a suitable stone to be placed by the Duke of Connaught and the inscription to be engraved upon it.

## NEW PAPER FOR GRANBY NEW TOWN

G. R. T. Sawle, for long a pioneer newspaper manager of Prince Rupert and owner of newspapers in other western points is leaving after a short stay in the city for Port Granby, where he is to lay the business foundations of another new paper and secure the location for his plant. Port Granby is rapidly coming to the front as a town of population, and its need for publicity will be well met by Mr. Sawle's enterprise.

## FINES IN THE GAMING CASES YESTERDAY

After a somewhat lengthy hearing in the police court yesterday morning before Magistrate Carss, the charge of running a common gaming house and of being frequenters of the same was brought home to the several men implicated in the matter. The keeper of the house was fined \$75 and \$2 costs and four others, charged with gambling, contributed \$10 and \$2 costs each.

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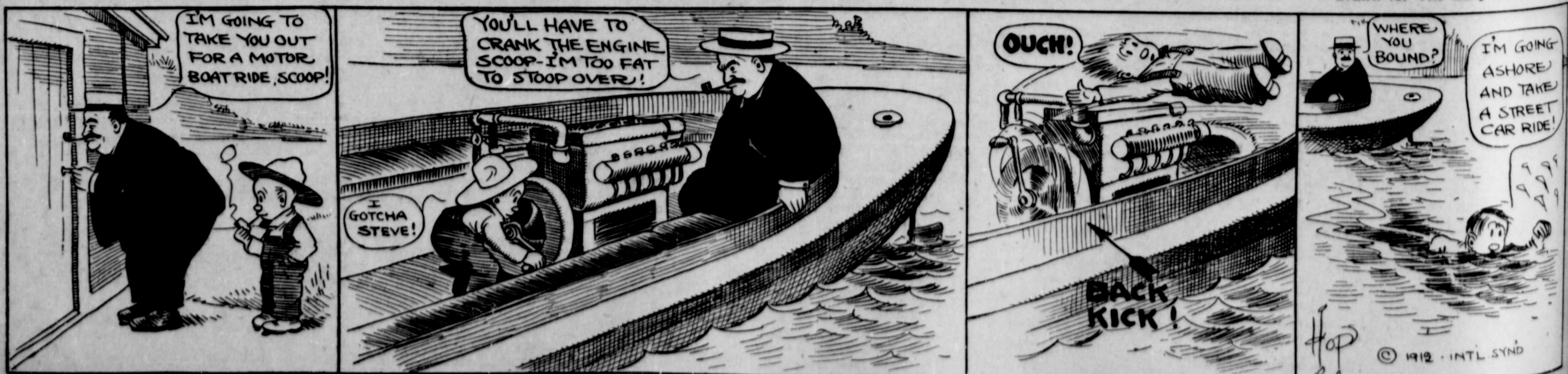

## HORSELESS RIG CHASES ITS DRIVER

An accident which fortunately was more amusing than damaging to human kind at least occurred on Summit avenue where a rig belonging to the Union Transfer Company was delivering a heavy load of gasoline. On the steep and narrow path which leadeth to the Acropolis Hill reservoir one of the horses stumbled and went clear over the plankway. The other was cut loose by the teamster and his mate, who then passed around behind the rig. Gravitation suddenly started the rig rolling backward down hill and it actually chased its own driver for quite a distance until it fell over sideways. Nobody was hurt and the horses were uninjured, but the rig was damaged a little.

## DEATH OF A FAMOUS OLD JUDGE

London, Aug. 23.—The death of Sir Alfred Wills, formerly a justice of the King's bench division, occurred the other day. He was a high court judge for twenty-one years. He always regarded it as one of the misfortunes of his position that it should have been left to him to sentence Oscar Wilde, but he did not shrink from imposing the penalty, which he regarded he deserved. To his lot, too, it fell to sentence Arthur Lynch to death on a charge of high treason. Mr. Lynch is now a Nationalist member of Parliament, eventually having received a free pardon.

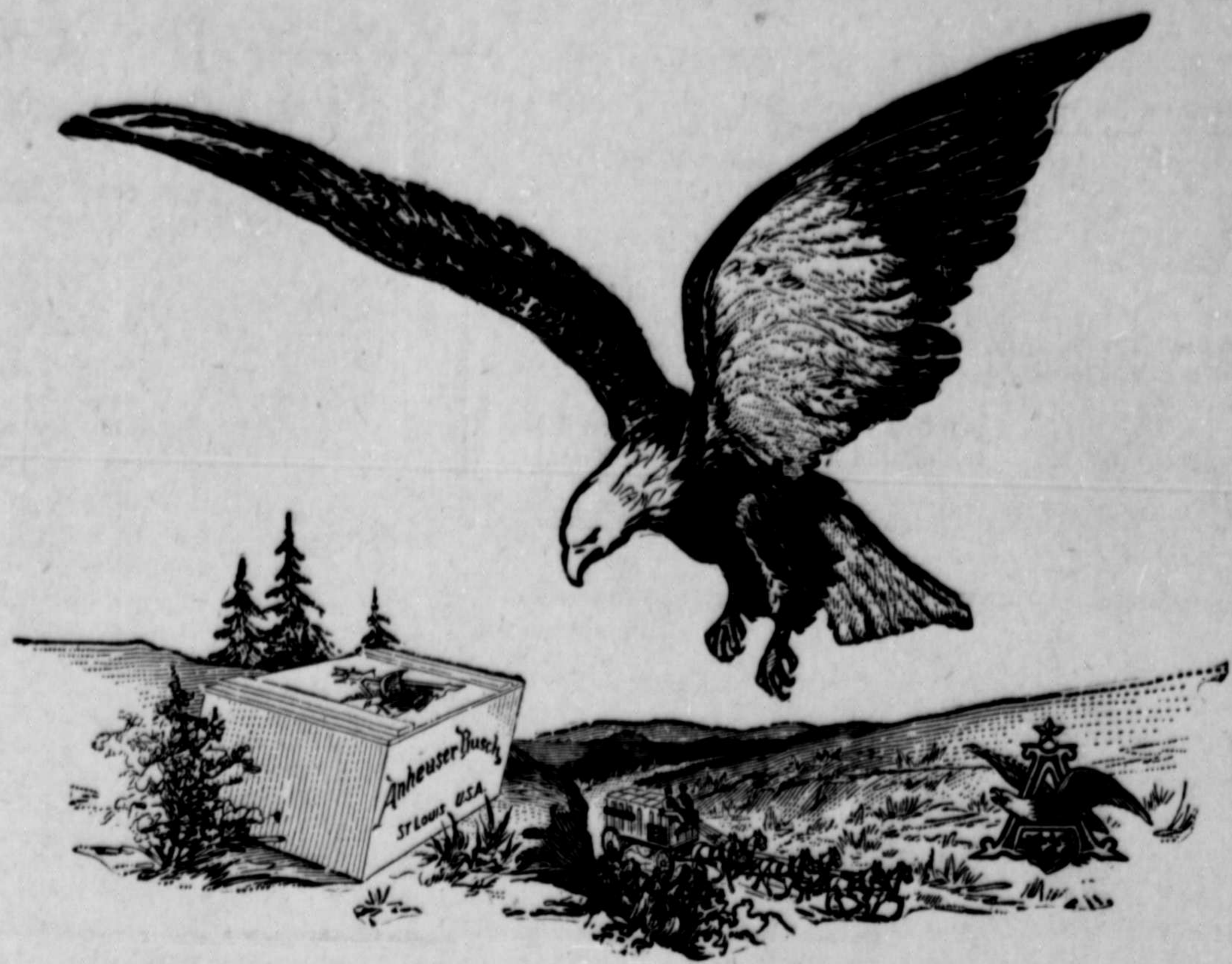
Further than that, the only proposal as to changes in the ministry concerns the front bench in the House of Lords, which, it is said, must be strengthened for the coming debates on home rule, Welsh disestablishment and the franchise bill. This is the government's weak spot, and it is possible that Augustine Birrell will be asked to accept a peerage and a secretaryship of state in exchange for the chief secretaryship of Ireland, while it is also probable that Harold Tennant, under secretary of state for war, will go to the upper house retaining his post.

Two other junior members of the government may expect promotion soon. C. F. G. Masterman, financial secretary to the treasury, has shown himself worthy of high rank by his capable conduct of the routine work of the insurance act, while Thomas J. MacNamara, parliamentary secretary to the admiralty, has proved a thoroughly efficient lieutenant to Winston Churchill. The promotion of either would afford an opening for the advancement of Neil Primrose. Other than these it is not likely that there will be any current changes.

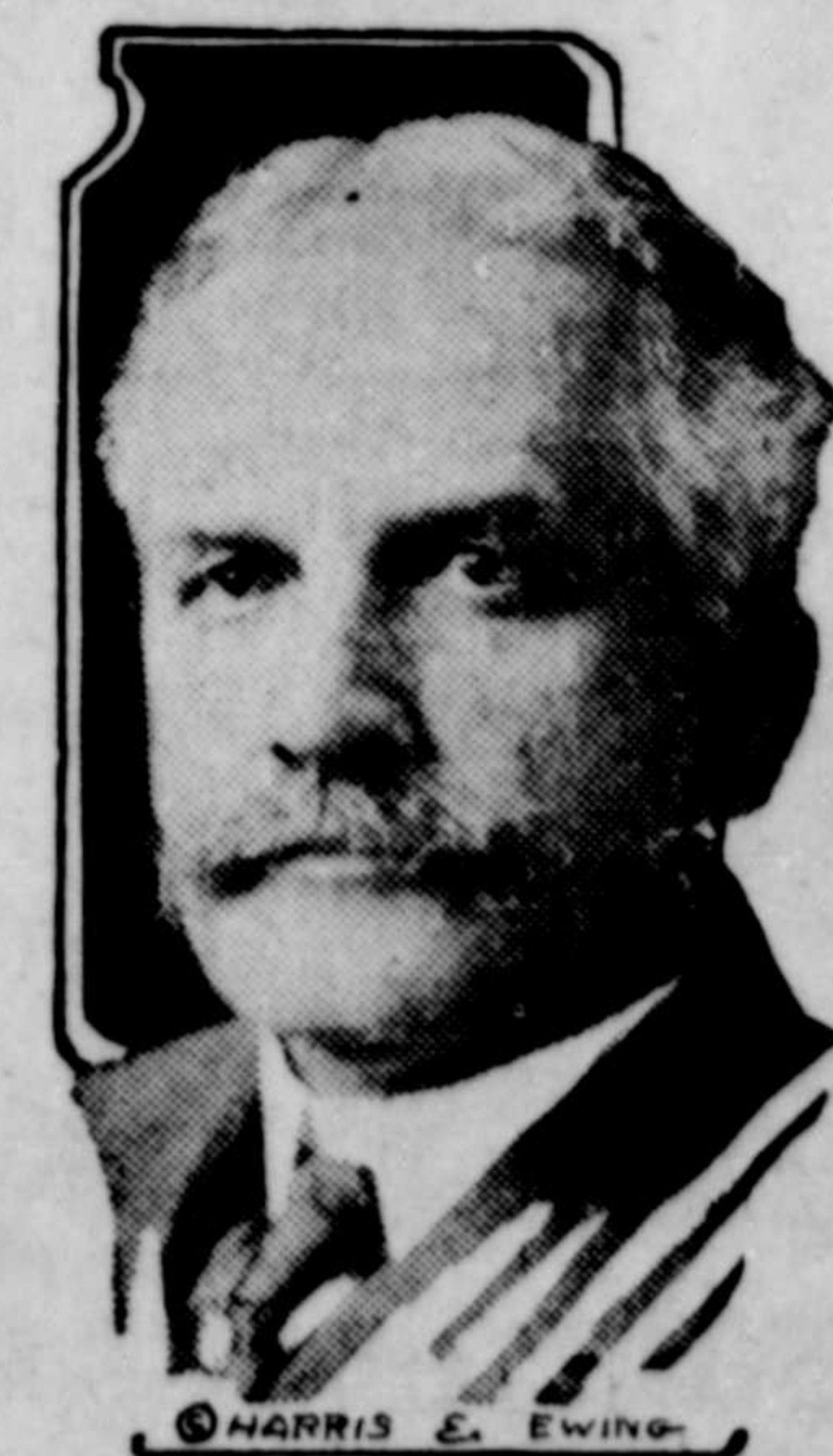

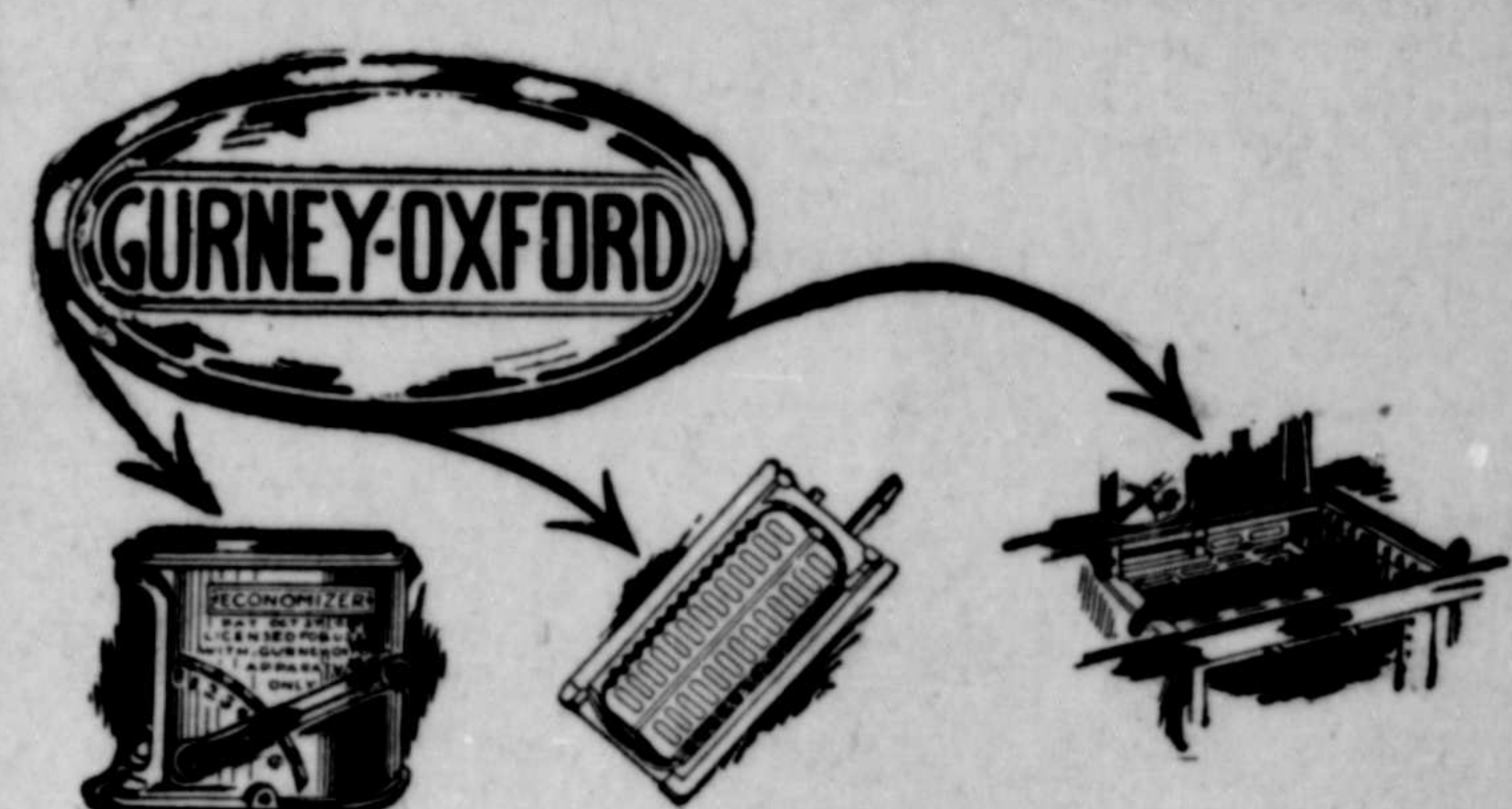

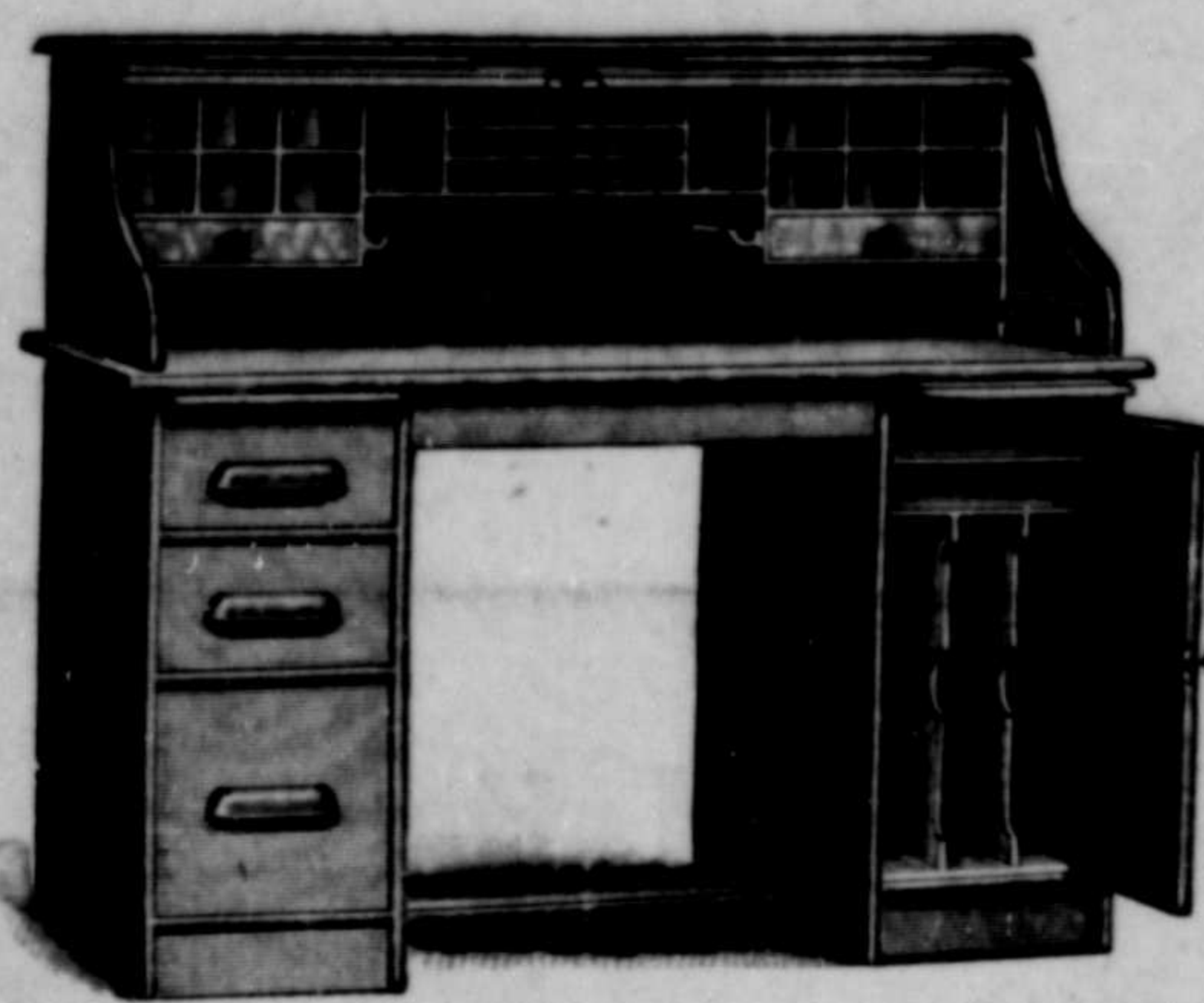
