

## BUILDINGS FOR DRY DOCK TO START AT ONCE

### GREAT BRITAIN PLANS FOR THE MOST POWERFUL BATTLESHIP EVER CONSTRUCTED

#### WORK ON DRY DOCK SHOPS TO COMMENCE IMMEDIATELY

"Work on the construction of the foundations of the dry dock will commence within three weeks," was the statement made by Mr. James Bruce, manager of the Independent Asphalt Co., who arrived this morning on the Prince George from Vancouver. "Fifty men will be employed at first, but this force will be increased as the work progresses, as it is the intention of the company to rush the work to completion."

"Local labor will be employed throughout the work, and not one workman will be brought in from the outside unless we are unable to secure the necessary men in Prince Rupert," continued Mr. Bruce. "All materials which can be secured here will be used, and in every way we will work for the interests of the city."

"Mr. J. R. Sterrit, president of the company, will arrive some time next week, bringing with him the concrete mixers and machinery necessary for the construction of the concrete foundations."

"Six months will be taken in completing the work, which will have to be carried on between tides and in spite of weather conditions."

"The foundations for the power house will be the first laid, and those of the machine and blacksmith shops, foundry and big smokestack will follow."

#### CEMENT IMPORTS INCREASE

Ottawa, Sept. 17.—Importations of cement to Canada continue to increase at a rapid rate as a result of the temporary restoration in duty of one-half. During August the importations totalled 659,417 hundred weight, valued at \$250,735. In August, 1911, the imports were only 254,433 hundred weight, valued at \$108,243.

The reduction will continue in force until October 31st. Figures have already been issued showing large increase in imports during June and July.

The government in the course of the next few weeks will consider the question of maintaining in force the reduction in duties, by way of a rebate established in June, and in doing so will consider whether or not the cement manufacturers are entitled to as much protection as Hon. T. W. White has shown they had been receiving up to June, owing to the operation of the tariff and railway rates.

#### NAAS RIVER NAVIGATION TO BE GREATLY IMPROVED

Dominion Government Engineer Hull, accompanied by his assistant, Mr. Zangra, and W. A. Pettigrew of the Provincial government land office, returned to the city yesterday after a trip up the Naas River as far as the canyon. The party left last Wednesday for the purpose of making preliminary examinations in regard to the work to be immediately started in the canyon of blasting out several big rocks, at present an obstacle to navigation. They report having had a very successful though somewhat adventurous trip. They left here on the Dominion government launch Evelyn, going some distance up the Naas in her, when they transferred to a smaller

power boat belonging to Indians of that district. Lining the boat up the canyon was a risky proposition, but successfully accomplished. The removal of the rocks will make navigation up the Naas safe and easy for large river boats.

#### LORD CECIL'S NEW BILL TO AID BRITISH WORKMEN

London, Sept. 17.—Lord Hugh Cecil has drafted a new bill to amend the Trades Union Disputes Act.

The proposed measure restores the liability of trades unions in connection with portions of the act under their cognizance and exempts provident funds from liability.

Lord Cecil's scheme also provides regulations in regard to peaceful picketing and allows limited immunity to persons inducing others to break contracts.

Sir H. Firth, in his presidential address at the Chambers of Commerce congress recently, recommended a system of financial guarantees for both sides for the fulfillment of agreements and secret ballots prior to strikes.

#### PARLOR CARS NOW RUN ON THE YUKON RAILWAY

Whitehorse, Y. T., Sept. 17.—The first of a number of parlor cars for the White Pass Railroad has been completed and came over the road on its initial trip recently, when it was the rear coach on the regular train. The cars are being constructed in the company's shops at Skagway, and they are as complete as the first one turned out they will not be exceeded for beauty and comfort on any of the big transcontinental roads.

On the rear platform of the car is a vestibule where from four to six chairs may be placed and the passengers be protected from cinders and inclement weather.

## PRINCE RUPERT AS IT WAS, NOT AS IT IS.

The August issue of a widely circulated magazine published at Vancouver contains an illustrated and well meaning article on the city of Prince Rupert, its advantages and prospects. It is unfortunate and quite inexcusable that the editor of a reputable British Columbia magazine did not make an effort to secure more authentic information as to the present status of the city from a mercantile and financial standpoint. The following clipped from the article gives a very erroneous impression of the business development of this prosperous city: "At the present time nearly every line of business is represented, and mention can be made of only a few of them. A wholesale dry goods house has been built and doing business for the past eighteen months; there are three daily and weekly newspapers—the Optimist, the Empire and the Journal. There are a number of grocery stores and several carrying stocks of general merchandise, two hardware, two gents' furnishings, one for two furniture, and numerous fruit and cigar stores. A board of trade has been organized, and branches of the Canadian Bank of Commerce and the Union Bank of Canada have also been opened. A wholesale and retail meat and provision store has been doing business for over a year. There are two good hotels, the Prince Rupert Inn and Annex, which belong to the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway Company, with first class accommodations, in addition to

which there are numerous other hotels, lodging houses and restaurants." Those who have visited Prince Rupert within the last two or three months know that this is far from being accurate. Instead of two chartered banks, five are doing a flourishing business; instead of one wholesale house there are at least half a dozen; instead of two good hotels there are three times as many. The paragraph is applicable to Prince Rupert as it was two or three years ago, not as it is today.

## ALDERMAN MONTGOMERY WOULDN'T INTERFERE.

A despatch from Edmonton states that the City Commissioners have decided to appoint a female member on the police force. Although the City of Prince Rupert has the reputation of keeping abreast of the times, no such radical action has as yet been taken here. It is quite possible that Alderman Clayton would favor such a step as a possible means of preventing any future interference with the police force on the part of Alderman Montgomery. This is presuming, of course, that the latter gentleman's experience has taught him that it is dangerous to interfere where women are concerned.

Mr. J. W. Stewart, a member of the firm of Foley, Welch & Stewart, railway contractors, has just returned to Vancouver from a four months' pleasure trip spent in Southern California and the highlands of Scotland. He was accompanied by his partner, Mr. P. Welch, of Spokane. Mr. Stewart is well known by many residents of Prince Rupert.

## DETAILS OF DRAMATIC DEATH OF COUNT AND COUNTESS NOGI

Tokio, Sept. 13. — General Count Maresuke Nogi, supreme military councillor of the empire, and his wife, the Countess Nogi, committed suicide tonight in accordance with the ancient Japanese custom as a final tribute to their departed Emperor and friend, Mutsuhito. The death by their own hands of the famous general and his wife was as dramatic as it was sad. The general cut his throat with a short sword and the countess committed hari-kari.

Following the Samurai custom, the couple had carefully prepared their plans for killing themselves and timed them so that they could be coincident with the departure forever from Tokio of the dead Emperor.

## Attended Services.

General Nogi and the Countess had attended the funeral services of Mutsuhito at the palace here, and it was expected they would proceed to Aoyama with the cortege. Instead, however, at the conclusion of the ceremony at the palace they withdrew to their modest home in Akasaka, a suburb of Tokio, and there began their final preparations for death.

First, the General wrote a letter to his new Emperor, Yo Shihito, which later was found beside the body. Then he draped in mourning a portrait of the late Emperor on the wall, after which he and his wife dressed themselves in full Japanese costume and drank a farewell cup of sake from cups which had been presented to them by Mutsuhito.

## Darkness Had Fallen.

Darkness had fallen, and General Nogi and the Countess sat and awaited the signal they had agreed upon to announce their leave taking. This was the booming of a single gun in the palace yards at Tokio, which was to let the people know that the body of the Emperor was starting on the funeral car for its last resting place.

As the boom of the gun resounded through the clear, still night, General Nogi arose and, grasping in his hand a short sword, plunged it into his throat while the Countess stabbed herself through the body. A student who resided in the Nogi home heard the fall of the bodies and rushed into the room.

## Both Still Breathing.

Lying upon the floor were the hero of Port Arthur and his wife.

Both still were breathing, but their spasmodic gasps showed plainly that death was near. The student hurried for aid, but when he returned, both the General and the Countess were dead.

The tragedy created a profound sensation, and expressions of sorrow were heard on every hand. Especially grief stricken was Prince Arthur of Connaught, the British special envoy to the funeral of Mutsuhito. Prince Arthur was to have gone with General Nogi to the former capital of Shogunate, Kamakura.

Those who knew General Nogi well declared that his calmness in killing himself was the kind of stoicism he always has displayed no matter what crisis faced him. They instanced the famous charge of the Japanese up 203-Metre Hill during the Russo-Japanese war, when, as commander of the Japanese third army, Nogi saw the Russians mow down his forces in hundreds, among them two of his own sons, and yet quietly and fearlessly continued the battle, taking the hill and eventually handing the surrender of Russian Lieutenant General Stoessel at Port Arthur.

## TERMINALS AT FORT GEORGE FOR PACIFIC &amp; GT. EASTERN

Fort George, Sept. 16.—It has come to light that the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway is cutting its 400-foot right-of-way a mile or so west of this town, because the depot of the Pacific & Great Eastern Railway, the line from Vancouver to Fort George, will be located there.

The statement is made by a responsible official of the Grand Trunk Pacific that the Pacific & Great Eastern, which will link up Fort George with the Pacific Coast, will come down the Mud River and enter Fort George from the west, having its station and yards immediately west of this town.

As the G. T. P. is being built by Foley, Welch & Stewart, and as that firm of contractors are the owners and builders of the P. & G. E., there is nothing out of the way in killing two birds with the same stone by cutting the transcontinental through line and the coast line's terminal grounds at the same time.

Preparations for work on the Pacific & Great Eastern are being rushed forward without any delays. The coast terminals at North Vancouver have been satisfactorily arranged for and the government permit for the bonds has been secured.

Five survey parties have been in the field for some time working between Lillooet and Howe Sound, and now it is announced from Foley, Welch & Stewart headquarters that within the next

fortnight right-of-way clearing will commence from a point near the junction of the Squamish and Cheakamus rivers, just beyond the present terminus of the Howe Sound & Northern Railroad eleven miles from Newport, at the head of Howe Sound.

Two weeks later, it is stated, actual grading will be started in the direction of Green Lake summit. A wagon road for the hauling of supplies will replace the pack trail extending over the summit to Pemberton Meadows. Some weeks ago several Foley, Welch & Stewart sub-contractors left Tete Jaune Cache for the coast to take up work on the P. & G. E., and by the end of next month construction should be in full swing.

It is also further announced that construction at the Fort George end will commence with the opening of spring.

## C. P. R. TELEGRAPHERS STILL NEGOTIATING

Winnipeg, Sept. 16.—No action has as yet been taken by the C. P. R. telegraphers in regard to declaring a strike. At midnight negotiations were still in progress with the company at Montreal. It is believed that definite action will be taken one way or the other before noon tomorrow.

## ARE YOUR LIPS BECOMING UGLY?

The "Cupid's Bow" is Said to Be Giving Way to Thin, Hard and Straight Lips.

Poets have raved and singers have sung of the beauty of woman's mouth—the magnet which draws man into the meshes of matrimony. But, alas! women's mouths are no longer beautiful. We look in vain for the "Cupid's Bow"—the "sweet, red, splendid kissing mouth." That type is giving way to lips which are thin, hard and straight, and which, while expressing character, detract largely from the beauty of the modern woman. At any rate, that is the view

expressed by several artists in an interesting symposium of opinions published in the Morning Leader recently. And artists should know, seeing that their livelihood depends on their observations of the human form and face.

"The mouth," says one artist—Mr. G. Sheridan Knowles, R. I.—"is the feature which is most rarely perfect. Many women have good eyes, or a good nose, but very few have a perfect mouth. This may be deplored, because the mouth has the greatest share in expressing character, and cannot be overlooked. My own ideal is the subtle mouth—that is to say, a mouth which expresses distinct character and is in harmony with the rest of the face."

"The Venus of Milo has comparatively thick lips, but other equally famous statues have thin ones. My own opinion is that a compromise between the two extremes is the ideal. The 'Cupid's Bow' mouth may be ideal for a

child, but something more subtle is needed for a woman. There have been many conventions in lips. The Gainsborough and Reynolds convention was comparatively thin lips without any Cupid curves. The assetti convention was the other extreme—very thick lips.

One explanation offered of the fact that woman's lips are becoming less beautiful is that they are made thinner and straighter on account of the degeneration of teeth, caused by the unnatural conditions of today, and there is no doubt that lips depend upon good and regular teeth for their beauty and lose their graceful outline when the teeth degenerate.

Mr. Alfred Praga, president of the Royal Miniature Society, agrees with Mr. Knowles that one very seldom sees a perfect mouth nowadays. "My ideal," he says, "is the rosebud of 'Cupid's Bow' type, which is the only pure type of beauty. It may not show character, but that does not matter. Character is not a pure, natural thing, but is acquired, and pure beauty always ends where character begins. Unluckily, woman is developing much character



now, and the result may very likely be that she will lose the beauty of her lips. "It cannot, I think, be too well understood that a beautiful mouth is at its best in repose. The present fashion of smiling and showing the teeth is deplorable.

able. From the artistic point of view, a smile is nothing but a contortion of the face, which ruins the features for the purposes of portraiture. Face muscles that should be in repose are brought into activity, and the result is by no means beautiful. The mouth is stretched across the face, the lips lose any curves they may have and the whole face suffers."

On the other hand, Mr. G. G. Kilburne, R. L., says that he has no difficulty in finding models with beautiful mouths. "I notice many perfect mouths when walking about the streets," he continues; "one sees, indeed, a great number of beautiful women in London."

"Of course, there are many types of beauty, and one type may be as beautiful as another that is widely different. Probably every artist has his own ideal, and it is difficult to say definitely which lips are the most beautiful. They must not be too thin, and they must not be thick enough to become coarse. Certainly the rosebud mouth, which is often held up as the ideal, cannot be accepted as perfect, because, as I have said, it fails to express character."—Tit-Bits.

Miss Felton as the "Girl from Texas" ably portrayed this particular type of girl. The supporting members of the company also displayed a thorough appreciation of their parts. The scenery was well arranged and specially suited for the play. The entire performance was well up to the standard set by this company in previous bills.

## BIG FUR BUSINESS OF FAR NORTH

Edmonton, Alta., Sept. 18.—Seven hundred and twenty-five thousand dollars is the value of furs brought to Edmonton from the north country and trans-shipped today to London, Paris, St. Petersburg, New York and Boston. The Hudson's Bay head the list with \$375,000 worth of fur; Revillon Brothers have \$150,000; the Northern Trading Company reports \$100,000, and independent fur traders make up the balance. The skins are of the highest quality and are in the best condition.

There are several silver fox skins, each valued at from \$1,250 to \$1,000, and others ranging in value from \$500 to \$1000. The catch of fox furs was larger than in former years. The other skins are marten, mink, beaver, fox, bear, deer of various kinds and muskrat. Most of the fur are from the country north and east of Slave Lake and the Mackenzie river, and from the Peace river district and the northern portions of the provinces of Alberta and British Columbia.

Indians are the principal hunters at the northerly posts of the trading companies, although a number of white men are engaged in the business. The average catch for an experienced trapper is valued at from \$1,500 to \$2,000 a season, though at times the hunter earns from two to three times that amount by taking silver foxes, which are not only rare, but also difficult to lure to the baited traps.

The Chipewyan Indians, who are the chief hunters for the Hudson Bay Company, made their largest catches in the Great Slave Lake district, where the country is as wild and undeveloped as nature left it centuries ago. There is a fascination about the remote north which in-siduously works its way into the blood, and as a result the white men, who have lived there for two or three seasons find it difficult to leave and live in restricted civilization altogether.

At the present time the residents of the far north travel about in carriages or dog trains. There are some horses and oxen in the country, but they are used for other purposes. Trapping
