SIXTEEN ARE KILLED IN ENGLISH TRAIN WRECK

SIR WILFRID LAURIER IN SPEECH AT COBALT DECLARES HE WILL REMAIN IN PUBLIC LIFE

EASTERN PASSENGER AGENT VISITS PRINCE RUPERT

Among the newer cities of the Pacific Coast there is none that is being more closely watched by the outside world today than Prince Rupert, known far and wide as the western terminus of the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway and the most promising city of the northwestern coast. As an evidence of the intense interest that is taken in Prince Rupert by residents of the Eastern and Middle States, the visit of Mr. J. D. McDonald, district passenger agent of the Grand Trunk Railway at Chicago, is important. Mr. McDonald arrived in the city yesterday morning on the Prince George and left immediately on a short trip east over the G. T. P., accompanied by the local agent, Mr. A. E. McMaster. On his return last night he expressed himself to a News representative as simply delighted with the scenic grandeur of the trip and the excellent condition of the

road. Mr. McDonald comes to Prince Rupert in order to thoroughly acquaint himself with the true conditions here and the prospects for the future. In his position as passenger agent for the Grand Trunk at Chicago Mr. McDonald comes in contact with a large number of people of importance in the financial and commercial world who naturally are interested in the development of the western provinces and western cities. Having seen for himself the tremendous possibilities of Prince Rupert and district, Mr. McDonald will be able to give authentic information to those in the east who are interested. His visit will in all probability result to the advantage of this city. Mr. McDonald has been attending the recent convention of the American Association of Passenger and Ticket Agents at Seattle. He is accompanied by Mrs. and Miss McDonald.

MANY KILLED AND INJURED IN ENGLISH TRAIN WRECK ENGINE JUMPED OFF TRACK

(Special to Daily News.)
Liverpool, Eng., Sept. 18.—The express train from Chester to Liverpool was derailed at Ditton Junction, nine miles from here last night. Sixteen were killed and fifty injured. The engine left the rails just after the train had crossed over

the bridge spanning the Mersey. The locomotive crashed into a buttress of a span, instantly killing the engineer. The coaches, becoming detached, ran on and crashed into the station platform with terrific force, completely wrecking the buildings and demolishing several of the

coaches, which took fire and cremated many bodies of the victims. It is feared that several of those injured will die. Mr. Fred C. MEDICINAL HOT SPRINGS DISCOVERED AT LAKELSE; SANITARIUM TO BE BUILT

"Prince Rupert is soon to have hot springs and a summer resort second to none on the Pacific Coast," was the prediction made by Mr. D. O. Rochfort, president of the Gardens Co., Ltd., of the Lakelse Valley. Mr. Rochfort, who is a prominent young business man of Victoria, has just returned to Prince Rupert from a visit to Lakelse Lake for the purpose of thoroughly examining his company's new holdings. In conversation with The News representative yesterday he was very enthusiastic over the rosate prospects of the Lakelse district. The company, which is a close corporation, composed of well known men of Victoria, have acquired by purchase 2,000 acres of land extending over five miles of the lake shore. The hot

springs are situated about midway, a few hundred yards from the lake. A townsite has been plotted out and surveyed, containing about 1,800 lots, which will be placed on the market in the near future. It is the intention of the company to build a sanitarium and establish a summer resort, as well as subdivide a portion of their holdings into five and ten acre blocks. These plots will be cultivated, the soil being suitable to the growing of fruit and vegetables. Close to the springs and near a particularly choice piece of beautiful shingle beach, ground has been reserved for the erection of an hotel as well as the sanitarium. Not only will the

DUKE OF CONNAUGHT WILL RECEIVE ROYAL WELCOME FROM THIS CITY

The programme to be carried out upon the approaching visit of H. R. H. the Governor General is as follows:

The royal party will arrive in the harbor on the C. P. R. steamer Princess Alice shortly before noon on Monday, 23rd inst. Upon landing on the Government wharf an address of welcome will be presented to His Royal Highness by the Mayor on behalf of the citizens. Other public bodies will have the opportunity of presenting addresses if they so wish at the same time. At 1 o'clock the Duke will attend a luncheon given in his honor by the Canadian Club. Part of the afternoon will be taken up by visiting the different parts of the city, and a short while spent in listening to the Indian band contest, which will take place upon the Government wharf. In the evening the royal party will attend the concert to be given in aid of the hospital at the Westholme Opera House.

next morning on a special train by the royal party up the line as far as the end of steel. As it will be late before a return to the city will be made, His Royal Highness requested that no arrangements be made for any functions to take place on that evening.

The following morning Acropolis Hill will be visited and the last stone laid by the Duke for the new reservoir. H. R. H. Princess Patricia will, upon the same occasion, plant the first tree in the embryo city park. Later a trip will be taken over the harbor under the escort of the Mayor and other leading citizens in the Dominion government boat Falcon. The royal party will conclude their visit in the afternoon

of the 25th, returning south again on the Princess Alice. Active preparations are being made by the City Council and private citizens toward decorating the city for the approaching arrival of H. R. H. the Duke of Connaught. Arches are to be erected in different parts of the city by the City Council and the Port Simpson Indians. Alderman Dybbavn and City Engineer Mason are today busily going over the ground and laying the plans for the city's part in the decorations. They will erect an arch at the head of the Manson Way and First avenue, and another on Second avenue in front of the Westholme Opera House. The Port Simpson Indians will have their arch of welcome at the meeting of Second avenue and McBride street.

Prince Rupert will be in no way behind the other cities of the Dominion in her outward display of loyalty and pleasure upon the occasion of the eventful visit of H. R. H. the Governor General.

DUKE WILL OPEN EXHIBITION AT ROYAL CITY

(Special to Daily News.)
New Westminster, Sept. 19.—By a slight change in the itinerary of H. R. H. the Duke of Connaught, Governor General of Canada, arrangements have been made whereby the Duke will formally open the Provincial Exhibition at New Westminster on October 3rd. The big fair will be open on Tuesday, but it will not be given its official and formal dedication until Thursday afternoon, when the royal party will be here. The party will leave Victoria on Thursday morning and will arrive by steamer at about 2:30. After the opening ceremonies a few hours will be spent in viewing the exhibits and the grounds, when they will en-train for Vernon.

Coincident with this announcement comes word from Sir Richard McBride, Premier of British Columbia, who was expected to open the exhibition, that he will be unable to accept the invitation. While it was first announced that he would be glad to come to New Westminster, his native city, he decided that his presence in Victoria during the stay there of the Governor General was required, and for this reason would be unable to come to the fair on Tuesday. He will doubtless accompany the Duke on Thursday, as will also Lieutenant Governor Patterson. The fair management feel much pleased that the Duke has consented to visit the fair, and are sure that he will be greatly impressed with the exhibits which will be shown demonstrating the agricultural possibilities of British Columbia.

SIR WILFRID TO REMAIN IN PUBLIC LIFE

Cobalt, Ont., Sept. 18.—Sir Wilfrid Laurier, speaking here today, declared that he would remain in public life. Referring to the trade question, he said: "The problem we aim to solve by reciprocity remains; it cannot be ignored. I shall continue to plead with the east to give justice to the west. My life's aim is to weld the Canadian people into one grand, harmonious condition. This must be done by conciliation."

Sir Wilfrid concluded his address with a reference to the naval question and an exposition of his policy for a Canadian navy. "If England is ever in danger—nay, I will not say that—if England is ever on trial, I, a Canadian of French origin, will be the first to go to the people and call upon the mto assist with all our might. Two inspirations guided my public life, and they continue to do so—Canadian citizenship and British ties, one to the other."

LAUNDRY WILL CHANGE HANDS FOR BIG PRICE

Otto Nelson, the proprietor of the Pioneer Laundry, which, as its name implies, can truthfully be said to have been the first business of its kind started in Prince Rupert, is just about to complete the sale of the entire concern to a local syndicate. G. T. P. MAY BUY SECTION OF THE DOMINION ROAD

Ottawa, Sept. 19.—That the Grand Trunk Pacific may take over the Transcona - Superior Junction section of the National Transcontinental Railway on the basis of the government taking the earnings and paying the expenses of operation until the whole line from Winnipeg to Moncton is completed is an idea which prevails in the capital. As stated by General Manager Chamberlin of the Grand Trunk in Montreal, this proposal has been made and is now receiving consideration of Major Leonard, chairman of the N. T. R. Commission and the minister of railways. It is expected that Chairman Smithers and President Chamberlin of the Grand Trunk will be here this week to interview the government with respect to the proposed lease.

IMPEACH POLICE BY COVER CARTOON.

The cover design on the current number of Leslie's Weekly, a New York publication with a large Canadian circulation, is not only repulsive and indecent, but it is dangerous. It portrays a gorilla, garbed in the uniform of a policeman, bearing a nude figure symbolic of vice and crime. The inscription under the cartoon is not necessary to convey the meaning intended, that crime is flourishing under the protection of the police.

New York and the whole world has been startled by the recent disclosures regarding the affairs of the metropolitan police department, and no doubt the illustration was intended to have only a local meaning, but there is nothing on the drawing or embodied in the inscription to convey this idea.

Every man wearing the uniform of law and order in every portion of the American continent, from the lone constable in the village to the chief of a

mighty city, must feel the impeachment made against his honor; his wife and family cannot but feel the implied insinuation that father or brother is a criminal in the worst sense of the word. The harmful effect of such pictures on the weak minds of those ready and willing to commit crime, but lacking the moral courage to do so, cannot be overestimated. Many a crime has been perpetrated because another offense had been committed. Thomas Nast, the great cartoonist, spoke truly when he said: "One picture, cleverly drawn, can convey more meaning at a single glance, to some persons, than a book of a thousand pages."

It is the duty of every right minded citizen to aid in every way possible the maintenance of law and order and assist in suppressing those men who war against society, and it is to be hoped that no publication of the standing of Leslie's Weekly will again lay such an impeachment on the police of America.

HOUSE OF LORDS IS ATTACKED AS HEREDITARY INCOMPETENTS BY HON. JOSEPH MARTIN, M.P.

Hon. Joseph Martin ("Fighting Joe") for a brief interval premier of the British Columbia government, for many years a prominent lawyer in the Royal City, and now a representative in the British House of Commons, addressed a large gathering at New Westminster last Friday night on the issues of the British political campaign and its effect upon Canada.

Attacks the Lords.
 Prior to taking up the three important campaign issues of home rule, Welsh disestablishment and the new Franchise Act, Hon. Mr. Martin referred to the House of Lords as being an institution harboring hereditary incompetents, who were not fit to legislate for the simplest measure in the government of the country, to say nothing of revising the measures made legal by the House of Commons when such was within their power. It was the purpose of the Liberal party in England to abolish the House of Lords and then if the necessity for a second chamber was made necessary the same would be elected by a vote of the

people in the same manner as any democratic and sane government should.

"To allow the state to continue in interfering with the affairs of the church is a practice which the Liberals of England most strenuously opposed," said the speaker, "and the Tory party is combating us strongly in our proposal to take away the established church of Wales." The condition of affairs in this connection, he alleged, was a disgrace as the old method of meeting expense incurred by the ecclesiastics by levying tithes, and the method of appointing the officials of the church through the prime minister was sadly in need of uprooting.

Mr. Martin was sure that more than half of the Liberal and Conservative of Canada were in accord with the home rule bill, which it was proposed to bring before the House shortly. This measure had been badly misrepresented, but in spite of that fact, the opposition to it was only a very small percentage of the population of Ireland.

"Four counties in the north-

east portion of Ulster," said he, "are practically the only hostile districts, and their voices will be lost in the overwhelming majority which is certain to be forthcoming from the other constituencies of the island. Ulsterites are constituted of members of the Roman Catholic Church and Orangemen, so it is quite natural that a difference of opinion should take place.

Ridiculous Reports.
 "The report that Ulster intended to fight was ridiculous, as, if such a thought was contemplated for a moment, they would have to begin on their neighbors. The home rule measure will be passed by the House of Commons," he concluded, "and the seal of the King attached. If the Ulsterites then revolt their act will be treason, as are the statements made by Bonar Law, the Unionist leader, in inciting the rebel move."

Before concluding, he touched briefly on the new franchise, or suffragette, question in England, declaring himself as strongly in favor of the demands of the ladies.

INDIAN CHIEFS WILL BE PRESENTED TO DUKE

Chiefs of the various Indian tribes of North Vancouver are to be presented to the Duke of Connaught upon the occasion of his visit to that municipality. They will also have an opportunity of presenting an address to him.

Indian Agent Byrne reports that excellent progress is being made by the Indians in the matter of preparing an address of loyalty. An Indian triumphant arch at Victoria Park was commenced on Monday morning.
