STRIKE RIOT IN WISCONSIN; THIRTY HURT

Superior, Wis., Sept. 20,-The city has been terrorized for several days by the striking car men, and yesterday mob violence ran riot, the five thousand strikers and their sympathizers defying the police for several hours. Six cars were burned and in the conflict which followed thirty persons were seriously injured.

Life is not safe in the city, and the police force is inadequate to handle the situation. Reinforcements have been sent for to aid in restoring order.


