



## VANCOUVER ISLAND MINERS GO OUT ON STRIKE

### MEN OF ULSTER SIGN COVENANT TO PROTECT THEMSELVES AGAINST HOME RULE BILL

#### SOLEMN COVENANT SIGNED IN IRELAND TO PROTECT RIGHTS OF PROTESTANTS WITH LIVES

(Special to Daily News.)  
Belfast, Ireland, Sept. 20.—The following covenant will be signed on September 28th by the anti-home ruleists, according to the statement made by Sir Edward Carson here yesterday:  
"Being convinced that home rule for Ireland would be disastrous to the material well being of Ulster and the well being of Ireland; that it would mean the subservience of our civil and religious freedom and perilous to the unity of the British Empire, we, whose names are underwritten, men of Ulster and loyal subjects of King George, humbly relying on God, in Whom our

fathers relied in days of stress and trial, hereby pledge ourselves in solemn covenant that throughout this, our time of threatened calamity, we will stand by one another in defending ourselves and children and our cherished position of equal citizenship in the United Kingdom, using all the means found necessary to defeat the present conspirators, who aim to set up home rule in Ireland.  
"In the event of such a parliament being forced upon us, we mutually pledge ourselves to refuse to recognize its authority, in sure confidence that God will defend the right."

#### LARGE PLANT IS STARTED ON THE ISLANDS

On Skidegate Inlet, close to Queen Charlotte City, Sir George Doughty of Grimsby fishing fame has started what is to become the largest fishery on the Pacific Coast. A salmon packing plant with a capacity of 20,000 cases per season and a large cannery are already established, and a herring plant with an annual capacity of 20,000 tons is being added. A little later on two new industries will be undertaken. One will be the manufacture of what is called marvis, which is to fish what bovril is to beef. The other is the manufacture of fish food, which will be a cheap food for horses and cattle.

#### RICHES OF NO AVAIL; MUST GO TO PRISON

Los Angeles, Sept. 20.—Although she possesses in her own name nearly \$100,000, the bride of Lloyd Knapp, a young electrical engineer, was powerless to save him from an exacting justice, and Knapp must spend twelve months in San Quentin penitentiary. Knapp was convicted of uttering spurious paper to provide funds for dinners at popular cafes with which to woo the girl who became his wife.

#### PLEASED WITH PRINCE RUPERT

Amongst the departures on the Prince George this morning were Mr. G. H. Catt, accompanied by his two sons, J. H. and J. Catt. The former is a gentleman of independent means whose home is in Hampshire, England, but who has acquired extensive interests in the famous Okanagan Valley, the garden of B. C. Mr. Catt and his sons have been in the habit of spending a considerable portion of each year upon their ranch in the Okanagan, where they have a beautiful country house. This summer a visit has been made to Prince Rupert and district, and a most delightful summer outing spent in the Lakelse Valley. They are more than enthusiastic over all they have seen of this portion of the province during their stay here this summer. After a short stop over at Vernon, they will leave for England, where they will spend the winter, returning to B. C. again in the spring.

Whilst in the old country they will take advantage of every opportunity of dilating upon the future of Northern B. C., and will be able to furnish information at first hand of the immense development that is taking place here.

In an interview in the Paris Matin, Miss Christobel Pankhurst has announced her intention of returning to England at once to wage a war of violence. She said:  
"I am ready to return to prison and am determined not to pay a penny of my fine. We are resolved to fight men as men, by violence. Our militant party has received powerful financial assistance and is becoming a great force. Next month we will have a demonstration in Albert Hall. Ten thousand seats have already been sold. We have penetrated all classes of society, even the aristocracy."

#### STRIKE RIOT IN WISCONSIN; THIRTY HURT

Superior, Wis., Sept. 20.—The city has been terrorized for several days by the striking car men, and yesterday mob violence ran riot, the five thousand strikers and their sympathizers defying the police for several hours. Six cars were burned and in the conflict which followed thirty persons were seriously injured.  
Life is not safe in the city, and the police force is inadequate to handle the situation. Reinforcements have been sent for to aid in restoring order.

#### RETURNS FROM SCIENTIFIC EXPEDITION TO YUKON FOR THE DOMINION GOVERNMENT

Mr. N. Demers, who, with Mr. Clement S. Lewis, contracted to collect the fauna of the Yukon for the Dominion government's Victoria Memorial Museum at Ottawa, has returned to his home in this city after a most successful expedition of several months' duration.  
Specimens of every beast and bird, from a mouse to a moose and from a humming bird to a baldheaded eagle, was to be included in their search. Mr. Demers and his partner left for their field of operation in the early part of the summer, taking with them a specially constructed gasoline power boat, built in this city, of exceptionally light draft, which enabled them to ascend rivers and navigate shallows and sandbars with comparative ease. The country in which the hunting and trapping was carried on was at the headwaters of the Liard, Nusellin and Hoole rivers, a vast area that afforded opportunity for obtaining specimens of every known bird and animal in the Yukon Territory. Mr. Lewis is a fur trader of long years' experience and thoroughly acquainted with the country and the Indians of the district, without whose aid it would be almost impossible to make a success of such an undertaking. Mr. Demers spent years in the wilds of the Yukon and made a particular study of the fauna of the north. He is well versed in this study and has from a child made a hobby of the collection of fauna.

Naturally, in making such a collection many wonderful and unique specimens were bound to be procured. Amongst such were two absolutely white lynx, and also two white porcupines with silver tipped quills. These albinos were, of course, freaks of nature that occur in animal life as they do amongst humans. Moose were simply abundant, and it was just a question of obtaining the best specimens possible. A scientific point of interest is the fact that in obtaining specimens a great deal of importance was attached to noting the altitude in which they were found and obtained. Mr. Demers, whose long experience in life in the wilds, living alone with nature, pursuing his favorite study, would furnish data for a big volume, says that expeditions of this nature are amongst the happiest recollections of his life, and even though forced to return to his business interests in the city, his heart is always really in the great big mighty Yukon, where so many happy hours of his life have been spent in the last few years.

#### SIXTEEN HUNDRED MINERS STRIKE; LADYSMITH AND CUMBERLAND MEN OUT DEMANDING BETTER CONDITIONS

(Exclusive Wire to The News.)  
Ladysmith, B. C., Sept. 20.—By a vote of 213 for and 105 against the miners at the Canadian Collieries (Dunsmuir), Ltd., Extension mines decided last night to go on strike in sympathy with the thousand men from the Cumberland mines, owned by the same company, who, following the discharge of two union leaders last week, are now out on strike. Between six and seven hundred miners are idle today.

Trouble has been brewing for some months and rumors of a probable strike have been talked of freely for some time. At the beginning of August the union men made demands from the company for better conditions and increased pay.

One mine was closed down by the company at that time and the manager was replaced by a more

popular man in an effort, it was alleged, on the part of the company to avoid trouble.

Had the South Wellington and Nanaimo miners decided to strike with those of Cumberland and Extension the walkout would have occurred sooner, as it was the intention of the union leaders to tie up the whole of the island collieries as the cold weather approached, and so force their demands, which included the establishment of a minimum wage and the payment of the same scale as is in force in the State of Washington.

It was thought last year that a minimum wage could be obtained by legislation, but during the recent provincial campaign Premier McBride, at a meeting here, expressed his disapproval of a minimum wage, saying that he feared that it would become a maximum scale, and since that

time the miners have been preparing for a strike. On May 1st they held a monster demonstration at Nanaimo, the point where the United Mine Workers of America were weakest. It is understood here that had the Nanaimo union been stronger the planned for general strike would have taken place several weeks ago, but at that place the men have a working agreement with the company which does not expire until next May, and some of the men were loath to strike before that time.

If the company and the men do not come to an agreement within a few days it is feared that the other collieries may be closed also.

The miners, it is reported, have the assurance that the United Mine Workers of America will back the local branches of that organization in their fight against the mine operators.

Lastly but not least, patronize the town paper or papers. It is from them that those who are unfortunate enough to be unable to visit a place in which they are interested draw their conclusions. From the advertisements the volume of trade and the enterprise of the citizens is learned. The place that can't support the papers that are trying to advance the city is, in the eyes of the investor, a poor place in which to sink his capital.

## SUICIDES INCREASING

The Journal of the American Medical Association in its latest issue (August 31) calls attention to the alarming increase of suicide in this country. Our suicide rate is now above 16 in 100,000 of population, and last year there were some 15,000 suicides in the United States. In our cities during the last twenty years the suicide rate has risen from somewhat more than 12 in 100,000 of population to more than 20 in 100,000.

The larger cities of the country, those above 250,000 in population, used to hold the unenviable distinction of a much higher suicide rate than the smaller cities, but in seventy-nine cities under the quarter of a million mark the suicide rate was last year equal to or above that of the twenty-one larger cities.

The overstrained life, the haste to make money at any cost, so inevitably full of sore disappointment, has now spread beyond the more crowded centres of population and is sapping contentment with modest means and conditions of life that used to characterize the smaller towns. Feverish solicitude about everything has in many instances replaced calmer striving and its satisfactions.

The results as revealed in statistics are startling, but worth knowing for the sake of the stimulus they give to a large sympathy with the failures in life, for many can thus be saved from themselves. The figures also are valuable because of the light they throw on an unfortunate forced artificial development of one phase of our modern civilization as exhibited in city life. Such knowledge will foster openness of mind for suggestions as to the sad need of reform of social conditions.

### LABOR FOR G. T. P.

Toronto, Sept. 14.—A Grand Trunk special train from Montreal will pass through Toronto some time today, carrying several hundred construction laborers to western camps of the G. T. P. This consignment will be followed by others to fill the depleted ranks of help in British Columbia and Alberta camps. The canvassing for laborers, following closely on the return of President Chamberlin, points to further energetic efforts to recruit labor in the east. When passing through Toronto Mr. Chamberlin said that the dearth of labor was the only hindrance to the rapid construction of work along the G. T. P. line. The destination of this party is Tete Jaune Cache, on the eastern side of the Rockies.

### TO BE BRITISH BUILT.

Ottawa, Sept. 18.—The first contract for the first vessel for government service was let to an English firm, Thorycroft, of Southampton. This first new armed steamer is for the customs patrol service on the St. Lawrence. The price contracted for is believed to be \$75,000.

Fifteen boys, of from twelve to fifteen years of age, set fire to a farmer's home near Butte, Montana, and attempted to lynch him. They were arrested and given a hearing, but the cases were adjourned until next week.

NEWS NOTES OF THE GREAT WEST

The rumor that the passenger station at Coquitlam would be moved from its present site has been denied by Sir Thomas Shaughnessy.

Lzaak Laurilla, who was admitted to the Vancouver General Hospital the other day, claims that he was refused entry to the Spokane hospital by the customs house officials of the United States on the grounds that he might become a public charge.

Four cases of infantile paralysis have been reported at Toronto. Two deaths have occurred.

Three million bushels of last year's grain crop is still stored in the elevators at Fort William awaiting shipment.

Chief of Police Bradshaw, of New Westminster demands that every recruit to the police force be a total abstainer.

Vancouver raised \$6000 in a single day to pay off the mortgage of the Children's Aid Society home.

Agassiz, B. C., has just closed the most successful fair ever held in that district.

New Westminster capitalists are planning the erection of a mammoth ice rink, on which to play the Pacific Coast series of hockey matches.

The Railway Commission has ordered the railway company to erect and maintain a station at Salmon Arm, B.C., suitable for the accommodation of freight and passenger service.

The peach crop in the Okanagan this season was phenomenally large, but owing to the scarcity of pickers hundreds of tons of fruit rotted on the ground.

The Salvor, the wrecking steamer of the B. C. Salvage Company, Esquimalt, started operations this week on the raising of the steamer Newport, of the Pacific Mail Line, which sank last month when the wharf at Balboa where she was moored gave way, toppling several great pieces of machinery on her.

According to constitutional lawyers, a flaw in the constitution of Holland may prevent that country from ever having a king again.

The cabinet at Ottawa have not yet considered the date for Thanksgiving, but it will probably be on Monday, October 21st.

Germany is considering the advisability of boycotting the Panama-Pacific exposition. If Wilson is elected, the Germans will participate.

The Attorney General of New South Wales says that as far as he knows there is no method of keeping the beef trust out of Australia. It is estimated that if the beef combine gets a hold in that country the increased meal charges will amount to \$75,000 pounds.
