to utilize for the benefit of this country the vast fund of material that will be produced by the 450 speakers at the congress. Side by side with the public health officials will be found representatives of various large business institutions seeking knowledge that may be practically applied to bring about less disease and more life. The interest of these institutions in the health movement is largely of a business character. They act on the theory that better health and longer life mean improved industrial and economic conditions. Among them is the Association of Life Insurance Presidents, which will be represented throughout the congress by its general counsel, R. L. Cox of New York, and by its health committee composed of F.
