DUKE OF CONNAUGHT AND PARTY ARE ROYALLY RECEIVED AT THE CAPITAL CITY

KIRMESS AGAIN A SUCCESS; PROGRAMME TO BE CHANGED

MANY ATTEND PRODUCTION OF KIRMESS LAST NIGHT AND ARE PLEASSED WITH DANCERS—SEATTLE BABES ARE WONDERFUL AND LOCAL TALENT VERY PLEASING.

Professor Douglas' unique entertainment, known as Kirmess, featuring a bevy of charming and accomplished children, played to a large and delighted audience last evening at the Westholme Opera House.

The first part of the programme, a short black face show, served to fill in the time while the audience was arriving.

The brilliant and refined sallies of the end men and allusions of a topical character caused shrieks of laughter and merriment.

A "Fairy" dance by Misses Edith Brown, Dorothy Tovey and Esther Naden proved entertaining.

Charming little Miss Kyle, one of Professor Douglas' little Seattle pupils, danced a Sailor's Hornpipe in imitable fashion, receiving round after round of applause. Then Miss Gray appeared in a novel dance turn in Eastern costume, making a big hit.

Suddenly and to those in the audience who had not previously seen her, a dazzling star appeared in the programme, completely carrying them off their feet. It was little Dorothy Hendricks, the diminutive little elf of five summers, performing a ballet dance with all the grace, nerve and abandon of the most finished and accomplished artist. To have seen it to have believed, otherwise it would be impossible to credit such a performance by a child of such tender years. Professor Douglas is indeed a marvel as a trainer of children in the terpsichorean art.

Miss Wren of Metlakahla and the Misses Shorey McKay, Jean Bailey and Myrie Bailey in skirt dances proved most pleasing.

In a short xlophone solo, Professor Douglas himself brought down the house.

The ballet act by fourteen little damsels and the flag drill were

both gracefully and cleverly performed, again showing the results of Professor Douglas' excellent training.

Miss Kyle in the famous sword dance, and once again little Dorothy Hendricks in a waltz elog, brought the evening's entertainment to a close.

Tonight will conclude the performance. An entirely new programme of songs, music and dancing is to be provided. The waltz competition and fancy dancing will replace the minstrel show, and this should mean another bumper house. No one should miss seeing the remarkable little kiddies, Kyle and Hendricks, as this will be positively the last opportunity of doing so.

KING WILLIAM'S FLAG IS PRESENTED TO CARSON AT BELFAST LAST NIGHT; WILL DIE AS FREEMAN, SAY UNIONISTS

Three Thousand Persons Attend Meeting at Belfast and Witness Presentation of Flag Carried at Boyne to Carson---Determination Strong to Resist Home Rule

(Special to Daily News.)
Belfast, Sept. 28.—The singing of the national anthem by an audience of 3,000 persons, comprising representatives of Belfast's industrial, mercantile, civil and religious community, tonight brought to a close the great anti-home rule meeting in Ulster Hall amid a fervor never before equalled, even by the anti-home rule convention of 1892.

The most dramatic moment of the whole meeting was when the

unfurling and presentation to Sir Edward Carson, the chief leader in the fight against home rule, of the flag carried by King William at the battle of the Boyne. It was greeted with frenzied cheering.

None of the speakers nor the letters they read from influential men in the Unionist party indicated any of the plans for resistance in the event that the King signed the bill.

Compared with the demonstra-

tions held elsewhere during the week, there was a noticeable absence of talk of armed resistance, but a quiet determination not to accept home rule was manifested on all sides.

Sir Edward Carson quoted in his speech the revolutionary leaders of the American war of independence: "Under God we are determined to, wherever and howsoever called upon, to make our exit from this life, but we shall die as free men. My watchword to you is: 'Be ready.'"

BAPTIST BROTHERHOOD WILL PUT ON COMEDY "OUR BOYS"

What was the cause of the truly magnetic hold that this simple picture of ordinary life in a quiet English country town had upon the public? No play of modern times has ever equalled it in its power to amuse and yet at the same time bring the audience at certain moments almost to the verge of tears.

The story is simple yet of entrancing interest. There are the two old fathers, the haughty old impecunious aristocrat, and the wealthy, ignorant, uneducated, self-made old butlerman. Both really most lovable characters in their different ways. The two sons, of course, total opposites: the good looking, handsome, breezy young Charles Middlewick, devoted to his father, though troubled at times over the old man's gramatical breaks, and Talbot Chamneys, the namby-pamby fop, who apes the blase men of the world and takes no interest in his father's natural desire that he should make a name for himself in English politics.

Then there are the two girls, cousins, the one rich and the other poor. The boys and the girls fall desperately in love with each other, of course, but not arranging things to suit the two old paterfamilias. This causes causes all kinds of complications, the boys being turned out of their comfortable homes to make a living for themselves in the great city of London.

How they succeed furnishes an evening's entertainment that to miss would be a crime. The seats will be on sale on Monday.

Successful Raid.
Last evening at about 10 o'clock a well executed and entirely satisfactory raid was brought off upon a big Chinese joint on the corner of Eighth street and Third avenue, where the police had for some time suspected the existence of a gambling and opium den. The remainder were let go at \$25 apiece. A pipe, opium, playing cards and other Chinese gambling devices were captured and taken to the police station to be used as evidence.

This morning the accused all answered to their names at the police court at 10 o'clock, when the cases were all adjourned until 2 o'clock this afternoon.

DUKE ARRIVES AT VICTORIA AND IS WELCOMED JOYOUSLY

PRINCESS ALICE IS ESCORTED INTO HARBOR BY FLEET OF SMALL BOATS, WHILE THE ROYAL SALUTE IS FIRED FROM THE FORTIFICATIONS.

Victoria, Sept. 28.—Victoria extended the Duke of Connaught and his party a royal welcome when they arrived yesterday afternoon at 5 o'clock on board the Princess Alice.

As the steamer entered the harbor a royal salute of twenty-one guns was fired from the Work Point forts, while the sirens and whistles of the boats shrilly welcomed the Governor General to the western capital of Canada, and, forming in line on either side of the big steamer, escorted her to the dock.

As His Royal Highness, attired in the uniform of a field marshal, came down the gang plank he was welcomed by Lieutenant General Patterson and Premier Brice, who escorted him to the Parliament buildings, where Mayor Beckwith read the civic address of welcome.

In replying to the welcome, His Royal Highness referred to the great changes made in Victoria and British Columbia since the occasion of his last visit to the province, and spoke in glowing terms of the future in store for the country.

In the evening the royal party was entertained at a dinner party given at the Government house. The city presents a beautiful spectacle in its gay decorations, and last night was a blaze of light from the electric lights used in decorating.

Another daring burglary was successfully carried out last night when entry was secured to the Prince Rupert Fish & Cold Storage Co.'s Third avenue store and a considerable amount of money was secured.

THE RETIREMENT OF HON. F. D. MONCK.

The rumored retirement of Hon. F. D. Monck, minister of public works in the Borden cabinet, comes as a sort of surprise, but it is a move that denotes great foresight on the part of the wily Monck, who realizes, no doubt, that the Conservative government cannot remain in power for longer than one term, and prefers the ease and security of a judgeship to the fight which must ensue to keep the Conservative government in power.

Or perhaps he has had an insight to Borden's naval policy and cannot reconcile it to his criticism of the Laurier policy in his pre-election speeches.

Probably the next move of the Premier will be to create a judgeship for Bourassa, so that he will be compelled to withdraw his tongue from politics and leave the government to drag forth the carefully guarded progeny of the

Borden-Churchill combination without frightening it with the yelling of the tri-color waving Nationalist.

NO WONDER UNITED STATES WANT FREE TOLLS ON CANAL

DIRECTOR GENERAL BARRETT REPORTS TO UNITED STATES GOVERNMENT THAT THEIR COMMERCE WILL TAIL IN THE RACE FOR TRADE.

Washington, D.C., Sept. 27—Only about a year and a half remain before the Panama Canal will be open to commercial traffic. Unless the manufacturing, exporting, importing, and shipping interests of the United States exert themselves to the limit during the next eighteen months they will find that they will be distanced from the start by foreign competitors in deriving practical advantages from the Canal and the rapidly developing field of Latin America.

From his own study on the ground of European conditions and from reliable official reports received from both South America and Asia, Director General Barrett makes the above statement at the beginning of his report to the government.

The conclusion of Director-General Barrett, is summed up in the statement that, while the United States Government and some of its commercial organizations and interests are doing

much to get ready for the canal and to develop Pan American trade and deserve great credit for what they are doing, they must in view of these facts redouble and extend their efforts. Otherwise they will tail the international race for the trade of the Panama Canal and Latin America. They must make their slogan from now on without any let up: "Get ready for the Panama Canal and go after Pan American Commerce."

HON. F. MONK WILL RETIRE

Rumor Current at Ottawa Says Monk Will Leave Cabinet to Accept Quebec Judgeship.

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INTERNATIONAL CONGRESS TRYING TO PROLONG LIFE

SCIENTISTS FROM ALL PARTS OF THE WORLD ARE IN CONVENTION AT WASHINGTON IN AN ENDEAVOR TO SOLVE THE RIDDLE OF HUMAN EXISTENCE—450 DELEGATES.

Washington, Sept. 27.—Longer human life is the object of the Fifteenth International Congress on Hygiene and Demography, which is meeting in convention here. Leaders of thought and action in modern sanitary science from all over the world to the number of 450 will appear on the platform to exchange information as to the more important accomplishments of recent years in prolonging life in their respective countries and sections and to make plans for the future.

Germany, France, Great Britain, Holland, Norway, Austria, Belgium, Italy and Switzerland are among the 27 governments sending official delegates to the congress. Men prominent in health work in the United States are on the programme, including health officials of the Federal government and of many of the states and cities.

The congress is beyond question the most important meeting of sanitarians ever held in this country. An unusual opportunity will be afforded for comparing American methods of protecting human life with those of older countries.

Many agencies will be at work to utilize for the benefit of this country the vast fund of material that will be produced by the 450 speakers at the congress. Side by side with the public health officials will be found representatives of various large business institutions seeking knowledge that may be practically applied to bring about less disease and more life.

The interest of these institutions in the health movement is largely of a business character. They act on the theory that better health and longer life mean improved industrial and economic conditions. Among them is the Association of Life Insurance Presidents, which will be represented throughout the congress by its general counsel, R. L. Cox of New York, and by its health committee composed of F. W. Jenkins, Binghamton, N. Y., chairman; J. R. Clark, Cincinnati, Ohio; W. F. Dix, New York; J. L. English, Hartford, Conn.; J. K. Gore, Newark, N. J.; Dr. A. S. Knight, New York; E. S. Scott, Springfield, Ill. The companies in this association have in force about 25,000,000 out of a total of 33,000,000 life insurance policies issued in the United States.

Particular attention will be paid by the association's committee to the addresses and discussion dealing with the control of contagious diseases, including typhoid fever, diphtheria, cerebro spinal meningitis, tuberculosis, etc.; the sanitary aspect of public water supplies, including the sanitary control of water sheds, the purification of water by storage, water purification in Europe by biological methods; water sterilization by chemical methods and the disposal of sewage and wastes by the various processes now carried on in European countries.

Such results may be due to the kind of laws or regulations adopted, to the character of the officers enforcing the law, to the quality of public sentiment or to some other cause or combination of causes. When the cause is once ascertained steps will be taken by the life insurance interests to help in applying it or some

proper modification of it to the situation in this country. It is expected, of course, to do this kind of work through co-operation with the various constituted authorities in the nation, the states and the municipalities.
