MAN CAUGHT ASLEEP IN BUILDING IS ARRESTED

SIGNING OF THE COVENANT AT BELFAST CREATED NO BIG DISTURBANCES ON SATURDAY

GREAT BLAST SUCCESSFULLY SHOT; FIVE COYOTES BORED

SATURDAY AFTERNOON BETWEEN FIFTEEN AND TWENTY TONS OF POWDER WERE SHOT OFF IN A GIGANTIC BLAST NEAR HAYS COVE—MANY TONS OF ROCK DISLODGED.

Dislodging thousands of tons of earth and stone, hurling great trees crashing to the ground, and causing a wave a such proportions that its heaving threw a timber with such force against a pile that it was displaced, was the work of a blast set off at exactly 2 o'clock on Saturday afternoon by the workmen who are excavating and filling near Hays Cove for railway yards.

At 2 o'clock Contractor Archie McDougall saw that everything was in readiness and gave the word. Immediately the whole side of the great bluff rose and fell like a gigantic sea comb. Tall cedars and stumpy hemlocks shivered for an instant, swayed and went crashing to the ground. The earth for some distance trembled and a moment later, like the lash of a rattlesnake, an immense concussion caused wave hurled itself ashore. Picking up a huge timber it crashed with tremendous force against the piling of the bridge work that crosses the permanent wharf, displacing it and dumping a quantity of steel and bolts from the tool house into the water below. This can all be recovered at low tide.

From every standpoint the blast was absolutely successful.

FISH IS CAUSE OF FIVE DEAD

Assistant Manager of Canadian General Electric and Family Are All Drowned.

Omemee, Ont., Sept. 30.—William McCaffery, his wife, mother and two children were drowned in Pigeon River yesterday when their canoe upset. They were fishing and McCaffery hooked a fourteen pound muskies, which pulled so hard that it overturned the frail craft.

McCaffery was assistant manager of the Canadian General Electric Company of Toronto.

ARMY OFFICERS KILLED FLYING

Two American and One Britisher Killed in United States While Flying on Saturday.

Washington, Sept. 30.—Corporal Scott and Lieutenant Rockwell, two army aviators, were killed on Saturday afternoon when the aeroplane in which they were flying fell to the ground from a height of thirty-five feet.
Hampstead, N. Y., Sept. 30.—John Longstaff, a former British army officer was instantly killed and his mechanic was seriously injured when the biplane in which they were flying broke and fell with them to the ground.

ARRESTED MAN IS WELL KNOWN

Nephew of Head of Allan Line Is Arrested in Calgary on Serious Charge—To Go to Toronto.

Calgary, Sept. 30.—Roy Thompson, son of a wealthy K. C. and nephew of the president of the Allan Steamship Line, is in jail here charged with obtaining money under false pretenses.
Thomas is alleged to have secured large sums by means of worthless cheques at Toronto, and is being held awaiting the arrival of detectives from that place. He was living at a good hotel here.

MAN FOUND IN PANTORIUM LATE AT NIGHT ARRESTED

GEORGE LYNCH, ALIAS THOMPSON, FOUND ON THE FLOOR OF THE PANTORIUM LATE SATURDAY NIGHT, WAS ARRESTED—COULD GIVE NO SATISFACTORY EXPLANATION.

Being unable to give a satisfactory account of his presence in the Pantorium building, Sixth street, on Saturday night, a man giving his name first as George Thompson and then as George Lynch was arrested by Police Constable Cargill. He was brought up before Magistrate McMullin this morning, who, after hearing a portion of the evidence, adjourned the case until 2 o'clock.

George Thompson, but later gave his name as George Lynch. In court this morning he presented a sorry appearance and was evidently working under a severe strain. When asked why he had given an alias he said it was to shield his people from the disgrace of his arrest. He continually reiterated his statement of innocence. He had been put in there by a little Frenchman, he said, to have a sleep.

Mr. James Knouse, the proprietor of the establishment, was returning from the theatre shortly after 11 o'clock on Saturday night, when he looked into the store and saw a man lying on his back on the floor. He immediately telephoned to the police and Constable Cargill was despatched from the station and arrested the man.

LABOR DEMONSTRATION AT LAWRENCE ENDS IN FIGHT WITH POLICE OFFICERS

Many Are Injured in Battle of Knives and Clubs in Lawrence, Mass.—One Labor Leader Was Arrested But Later Liberated by the Police—Many Were Taken to the Hospitals

(Special to Daily News.)
Lawrence, Mass., Sept. 29.—Prior to an immense labor demonstration here yesterday the police and some of the paraders came to blows and a pitched battle resulted, in which knives and clubs were used. Two officers were stabbed and may die

and a number of the labor men were removed to the hospital suffering from the clubbing administered by the police. One leader of the Industrial Workers of the World, who were taking part in the demonstration, was arrested, but was later liberated. Carlo Tresca, of Pittsburg, an

editor who is an organizer of the Industrial Workers, was the man arrested, but gained his liberty a few moments later. Persons who saw his arrest say that he was rescued by comrades, but he says that the police let him go. All the police deny any knowledge of his arrest.

LOCAL JOTTINGS

Large Deals in Winnipeg Suburbs.
Winnipeg, Man., Sept. 30.—Among the rapidly developing districts of suburban Winnipeg none has shown more steady and substantial growth during the present year than the well located residential suburbs of Tuxedo Park, King George Park and Pomona, along the south bank of the Assiniboine. The announcement of the sale of King George Park a few days ago at the purchase price of \$46,000 has called renewed attention to the possibilities of the district in question, coming as it does so soon after the transfer of the Pomona property to the same purchaser. In spite of unsettled weather, the year's record of building permits for Winnipeg now stands well above the \$17,000,000 mark, being practically a month ahead of the corresponding figures of last year. Buildings for residences continue to make up the bulk of the new permits being issued.

Industries Locate at Watrous.
Watrous, Sask., Sept. 30.—The establishment at Watrous of the branch plant of the Farmers' Machine Company is taken generally as marking a new era in the city's industrial development. The factory will employ 25 men at the outset, many of them being skilled workmen drawing large pay. The company is also a manufacturing and wholesale ready well known in the West as house, doing an extensive business in fanning mills and all kinds of farm machinery. A ten acre site has now been secured from the G. T. P., and the new factory is expected to be ready to begin operation in the near future. It is believed that the coming of the machine company and of the Perfection Fanning Mill Company, recently locating here, will lead the way for many new industries in Watrous.

NO DISTURBANCE IN BELFAST WHEN COVENANT WAS SIGNED

NATIONALISTS TAKE HUMOROUS VIEW OF SIGNING OF COVENANT ON SATURDAY—SIR EDWARD CARSON WAS FIRST TO SIGN AND WAS FOLLOWED BY MANY ULSTERITES.

Belfast, Sept. 30.—As a crowning proof of their determination never to submit to the domination of an Irish parliament on the lines of the home rule bill, thousands of Ulsterites, as the Unionists and Orangemen are designated, devoted Saturday to signing the solemn covenant prepared by the anti-home rule leaders.

Thousands of the rank and file of the party signed the covenant after Sir Edward Carson had done so. Solemn religious services were conducted during the signing of the document.

No serious disturbances took place during the day, although several minor fights occurred, but these were soon stopped.

The Nationalists took very little serious interest in the proceedings, and considered the whole affair in a very humorous light, which tended greatly to lessen their hostility.

Sir Edward Carson was the first to sign the covenant, which pledges him to "use all means

After the signing of the covenant Sir Edward Carson left for Liverpool.

SAFETY IS PROVIDED BUT NOT ENFORCED.

Premier McBride takes every opportunity to tell of the model Coal Mines Regulations Act he has given the people of British Columbia, and every man of any prominence in the mining world who ventures into the province is interviewed with a view to having him commend it.

Undoubtedly the act is a good one, and although it could be perfected to give more safety to the miners, it is a great improvement on the old one, but the carrying out of the act is done in the same manner as was the former one, which means that thinner after miner has died in the bowels of the earth when he might have lived for years. And it is through the laxity of the government in allowing the coal companies the latitude they should not have that we in Prince Rupert are apprised of the shortage of coal which may have a very serious meaning before very long on account of the strike in the collieries at the other end of Comox-Atlin district.

The reason for the strike is one which every man will sympathize with, to a certain extent at least, and a word on the making of the famous coal act will instance the cause for the strike.

When McBride was framing the act he sent to the Extension mines and asked for a repre-

sentative body of miners to aid him in his work. In compliance with his request a delegation, headed by Donald McLean, one of the most proficient miners in Canada, who was then overman of No. 2 mine, Extension, and George Pettigrew, head of the union, responded. Some of their suggestions were accepted and were embodied in the act and others were not, but on their return to work they were handed their pay cheques and dismissed. What was it done for, and why, when the government was apprised of the fact, was no action taken? All those underground toilers, who each day gamble with death, wanted was protection.

Later on the initial reason for the present strike was the discharge of two miners who acted as "gas men." These gas men are appointed by the unions to make the rounds with the inspectors and see that he notices everything. Again it was for the safety of life. And McBride, the minister of mines, when approached the other day would give the miners absolutely no satisfaction to their demand for an investigation.

The question of wages, while it is important to the miner, is a secondary consideration to the protection of life, and he, more than anyone, recognizes the inefficiency of the Department of Mines.

C. P. R. to Develop Elko.
Elko, B. C., Sept. 30.—In connection with the recent announcement of C. P. R. officials of the intention of the railway to double track its line from Lethbridge across the mountains to Elko, it is pointed out by insiders that railway development has been responsible, more than any other one cause, for the lucrative fortunes that have been made in recent years in well selected lands and townsite properties in British Columbia. The decision of the C. P. R. to locate a tourist hotel at Elko, similar to the one already built at Banff, to say nothing of the proposed railway repair shops at this place, is taken as an additional confirmation of the assured prospects of the town as viewed in official circles.

12 PER CENT. RAISE AVERTS TELEGRAPH STRIKE ON C. P. R.

TEXT OF AGREEMENT PROVIDES FOR ONE HOUR REDUCTION IN WORKING DAY OF AGENTS AND OPERATORS—ONE DAY OFF FOR DESPATCHERS.

Montreal, Sept. 28.—The full text of the agreement reached between the C. P. R. officials and the operators of the road was given out and may be summarized as follows:

Twelve per cent. increase in wages to all operators.

One hour reduction per day in working hours for agents and operators.

Advance of 5 cents per hour for all work over regular schedule of ten hours per day.

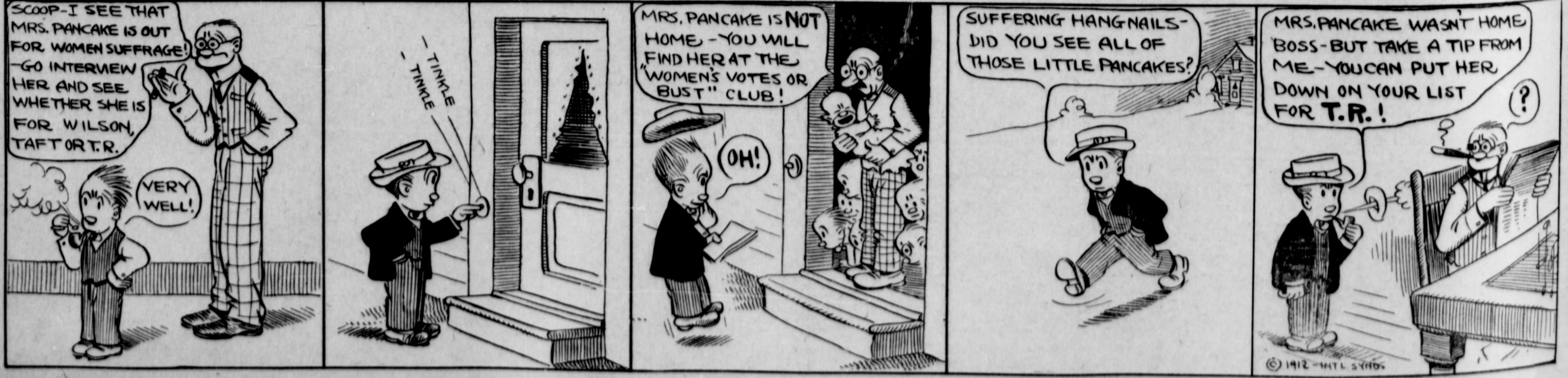
One day off for all train despatchers each week, with no reduction in pay.

Linemen will receive 10 per cent. increase in salary and an allowance for overtime and Sundays.

David Campbell, vice president of the Order of Railroad Telegraphers, who was one of the representatives of the men at the conference, said that the settlement was considered satisfactory. He also said that the talk about a strike was quite uncalled for under the circumstances. The C. P. R. officials had met them in a most amicable spirit and had continued this spirit throughout the negotiations.

NEWS NOTES OF THE GREAT WEST

Cutting Nearly Complete.
Red Deer, Alta., Sept. 28.—Cutting has practically been completed in this district, but no threshing has been done and very little will be done for a few weeks yet. The weather has been fine and warm, but slight showers are falling this evening. Most of the farmers report no damage from the frost.

New Hospital Matron.
Nelson, B. C., Sept. 28.—Miss Mildren Vogan, a graduate of Albany, N. Y., City Hospital, has been named matron of the Kootenay Lake General Hospital by the directors of the institution. She was selected from among 43 applicants. The salary is \$75 per month.

Half Million Deal.
Vancouver, Sept. 28.—For a price stated at \$500,000, a transfer was made of the Port Moody saw mill, towboats, lumber and timber limits of the Emerson Lumber Company, Limited, to the National Finance Company and the Thurston & Flaville Lumber Company. This transfer will become effective on October 1st, after which Mr. Robert Thurston and Mr. D. Flaville will take over the active management of the concern, which has a daily output of 75,000 feet of lumber and 150,000 shingles.

Made Record at Hay.
Chilliwack, Sept. 28.—E. A. Dunnville and men made what is considered a record day's work on Tuesday, when 47½ tons of hay were put through the hay press in ten hours. The work was done on a farm on the Bamford road.

Give Warning of Explosives.
Victoria, Sept. 28.—At the meeting of the Canadian Mining Institute, Mr. F. Napier Denison, of the Meteorological Service, gave an explanation of working of the seismograph. The instrument, which he had with him for the purpose of illustration, is to be placed underground in the Nanaimo coal mines. Mr. Denison said observation has already led to the conclusion that there is some connection between earthquakes and mine explosions.

A Delicate Operation.
Fort William, Sept. 26.—One of the most delicate operations that has ever taken place in the McKellar hospital was performed there on little 2-year-old Margaret Jessimin, whose parents live at 219 Robertson street. The child's windpipe was opened and a wild cucumber seed extracted. The seed was well imbedded in one of the tubes. A tiny electric light was thrust deep into the throat and the seed located. With delicate care, for fear of injuring the windpipe, the seed was extracted, after which a very fine specially prepared silver tube inserted, and the child now lies in a very precarious condition, breathing through the tube.

May Have Socialist Candidate.
Vancouver, Sept. 20.—It was decided, after a lengthy discussion, by the Trades and Labor Council to appoint a committee to interview the Socialist party in order to get their views as to the advisability of taking part in the coming municipal election to the extent of placing a candidate in the field. The committee will report back to the Trades and Labor Council at a future meeting. A report was received from the committee appointed to investigate the administration of the general hospital, stating that the rumors regarding the institution were exaggerations.

Survey New Transcontinental.
Edmonton, Alta., Sept. 28.—Engineers and surveyors in the employ of the Alberta, Peace River Eastern Railway Company, which purposes building a new transcontinental line from Hudson's Bay to the Pacific Coast, by way of Edmonton, have started on ponies on a trip of more than 2,000 miles into the north country to survey the route. They will meet the McDougall party at Lesser Slave Lake and tramp 700 miles, finishing the trip on dog teams and return in twelve months.
