

## M'BRIDE REFUSES AID TO THE STRIKING MINERS

### TWO FISHING BOATS ON WAY FROM ENGLAND TO NORTHERN BANKS EXPECTED SHORTLY

#### PORT MANN WILL NOT BE THE TERMINUS OF C. N. R. LINES

SIR DONALD MANN TELLS VANCOUVER PEOPLE HIS RAILWAY WILL COME INTO THAT CITY—NEVER MAKE PORT MANN AN OCEAN PORT; TO HAVE SHOPS THERE.

Vancouver, Oct. 3.—Sir Donald Mann, vice president of the Canadian Northern Railway, on arriving at Vancouver, promised that Vancouver will be without fail the ocean terminus of the system and that statements alleged to have come from him in Winnipeg papers to the effect that Port Mann was to get that distinction were fictitious.

Port Mann will be the assembling centre for trains and will have the big shops of the company, but Vancouver will be the main terminus, he says. There will be subsidiary shops in this city.

Sir Donald pointed out that it would be absurd to think of making False Creek, with only 455 acres, the location of their whole yards. In other cities the railroads were putting their terminals farther out, both because of the high price of land and because of the smoke nuisance. It is the same in Toronto and Winnipeg, and the C. P. R. was doing the same here.

Port Mann will get the big shops of the company and the coal barges will put in here. But ocean vessels, when the company has its line established, will make their port at Vancouver. Sir Donald further said that the transcontinental will be finished in 1914. He expects to award a contract soon for a branch line between Kamloops and Kelowna.

#### TWO GRIMSBY TRAWLERS ARE EXPECTED WITHIN FEW DAYS

TWO MORE BOATS ON WAY OUT FROM ENGLAND FOR NORTHERN HALIBUT BANKS—CANADA WILL ARRIVE IN A FEW DAYS.

Vancouver, Oct. 2.—Making a slow trip out from the United Kingdom, the first of the steam trawlers to come here to fish in Queen Charlotte Island waters for the Doughty interests, the Canada, as she has been named, is expected to put in an appearance here within the next ten days.

The little vessel is now out from Grimsby, England, about three months, and she has reported at coaling ports at various intervals. After the Canada arrives she will be given a thorough overhauling and in about a month will be ready to go north.

The Canada is bringing out a crew composed of Grimsby fishermen. Following the Canada out from England is another steam trawler, the Trymple. She will not report for some time yet, as she sailed several weeks after the Canada. Both trawlers were former units of the great Grimsby fishing fleet and have seen considerable service there. The

Canada is of 151 tons and was built in Beverly in 1892.

Officials of the B. C. Fisheries, Ltd., state that the salmon pack at the big Alford Bay cannery at present amounts to 20,000 cases. Provided the weather holds good the packers hope to make their catch 25,000 cases. When the salmon fishing is ended the men will turn their attention to halibut fishing, and it is expected that large hauls will be made during the winter.

The Canada will be the first of the fleet of the company to start in the halibut business, and in view of the fact that her skipper and crew are new to the fishing industry and its requirements on this coast, their work will be watched with great interest by other fishermen.

There was a report in circulation that the Doughty interests were to enter the whaling business and would erect a station on the Queen Charlotte Islands, but this has been denied by officials of the company.

## PREMIER McBRIDE MAKES NO ENDEAVOR TO STOP COAL FAMINE SUFFERING

### Premier When Appealed to by the Miners for Protection Under the Act, Positively Refuses to Appoint Investigation Committee—Miners' Correspondence

Cumberland, V. I., Oct. 3.—In Cumberland and Ladysmith the strike situation remains the same—no men are at work in either camp. A deputation waited on Sir Richard McBride on Friday, when the question was discussed and he asked that the presentation be placed in writing. Accordingly the miners' representatives addressed the following letter to the Premier: Sir Richard McBride.

Honored Sir: We beg to submit herein facts in connection with the cases of discrimination that has finally culminated in a stoppage of work by the miners employed by the Canadian Collieries Co. at their mines at Cumberland and Extension, for your consideration.

Some two or three months ago Oscar Mottishaw and Isaac Portray were elected as a gas committee to examine the mines of said company at Extension and report on the condition of the same as required by law.

During their examination they found and reported gas in five working places. The management of the mines, upon the posting of this report, called on the chief inspector of mines, Mr. Graham, to come to Extension and make an examination of the places in question. This he did, and the report of the gas committee was verified. Soon after this the place where Oscar Mottishaw was working was finished and he was refused another place. New men were employed while he was idle waiting for an opportunity and asking for work. Not wishing to be the cause of any trouble between the management and the men, he left there and went to Cumberland, where he secured employment, working for a contractor in the mines of the same company. He had only worked there three days when the contractor, Mr. Coe, received instructions from the superintendent, Mr. Henderson, to discharge him. Mr. Coe demurred, saying that Mottishaw was a good workman and he had no reason to

discharge him, asking Mr. Henderson what reason he would give Mottishaw. Henderson insisted he must discharge him, saying he could tell him that he could not pay him \$3.50 per day, the amount he had agreed to pay him, whilst the men were being paid that amount for the same work. Mr. Coe complied with the request of Mr. Henderson, and discharged Mottishaw.

As Mottishaw was a member of the U. M. W., the matter was taken up by the union at Cumberland, and it was decided to send a committee to interview the management. The committee went to the office of the company, but were refused a hearing, Mr. Lockhart, superintendent, saying he would not deal with any committee, but would deal with the individual who had any grievance. Then Mr. Mottishaw went to the office to enquire the reason why he was discharged, and was informed by the superintendent that they did not have to give any reason. They reserved the right to hire and discharge unquestioned. Then a mass meeting of all the employees of the company in Cumberland was called, and another committee was sent to interview the management, but when they went to the office the management refused them a hearing also, Mr. Clinton, who came to the door to meet them, saying: "We don't want to hear you at all," and shut the office door.

The committee returned to the meeting and reported. The meeting thereupon decided to take a holiday until the management would meet a committee and provide some means for the adjustment of difficulties and differences that may and do arise around large industrial operations.

Now, sir, the information that we desire from you is this: When men are appointed or elected as a gas committee at any mines in this province and do their duty under the law, what protection does the law afford them? Does

it prevent the employer or his agents from discriminating against them or discharging them in case they make a report not satisfactory to the management?

Mr. Robert Foster, President U. M. W. of A.:

Have carefully perused your letter and fail to find grounds warranting an enquiry under the Coal Mines Regulation Act. Letter follows.

Sir: I have the honor to acknowledge the receipt of your letter, setting forth particulars of the alleged discrimination cases by the Canadian Collieries (Dunsmuir), Ltd., against certain employees, acting on gas committee.

In reply I beg to confirm my telegram of today as follows:

Have carefully perused your letter and fail to find grounds warranting an enquiry under the Coal Mines Regulation Act. Letter follows.

Departmental enquiries are governed by sections 48, 49, 50 and 52 of said act, and in the absence of any specific charge a complaint against any person or persons affected by the operation of the said act, the department cannot undertake proceedings.

"This means," says the miners' representatives, "that not withstanding the direct question put to him, as to what protection men who are appointed or elected on gas committees will have, he evades the question entirely."

## SKIDEGATE CHANNEL IS TO BE CLEARED ANTICIPATE PEOPLE

CAPTAIN CAMERON LOSES SMALL BOAT IN MAKING PASSAGE FROM ISLANDS TO CITY—SKIDEGATE PEOPLE EXPECT TO HAVE CHANNEL CLEARED.

Captain H. S. Cameron, owner of the sturdy little craft Gilford, arrived in port yesterday afternoon from Skidegate after one of the roughest and stormiest trips he says he has ever experienced in his ten years spent in navigating these Northern waters.

On leaving Skidegate the Gilford had in tow, all snugly fixed up for the trip, a small gasoline power boat, but so bad was the weather that after losing her three times they were forced to abandon her to her fate, which will mean that by this time she is probably along the beach somewhere in small pieces of wreckage.

Residents of the Queen Charlotte Islands, and particularly those around Skidegate, have high hopes that before very long something will be done by the Dominion government toward making the passage known as the Skidegate Channel navigable, if not at present for very large vessels at least for those of an ordinary size.

This would mean the blasting

out of a number of rocks, at the present time a distinct menace to any form of navigation. Two hundred miles of a bad water as is to be found on this coast would be saved by being able to use this passage in going to the west coast rather than by having to make it around the north shore of Graham Island.

## NEW AIDS TO NAVIGATION ANNOUNCED FROM OTTAWA

MANY CHANGES OF LIGHTS AND DISCOVERY OF SEVERAL UNCHARTED ROCKS ON BRITISH COLUMBIA COAST ANNOUNCED.

The Marine department has issued bulletins to the effect that a day beacon has been erected at Napier Point, Campbell Island, Luma Passage; the beacon at present on Koya Point, at the entrance to Houston Stewart Channel, Queen Charlott Islands, is to be moved to Danger Rocks.

Telephone communication for the protection of shipping has been established by the government of Canada between the light station on Lennard Island and the government telegraph office at Tofino.

The telephone line consists of a land line from the light station to a small cove at the northeast end of Lennard Island, distant 1-6 mile from the lighthouse; a cable from the above cove to a small cove on the west side of Low Peninsula, distant about 3-4 mile from the southeast extremity of Village Island; and a land line over Low Peninsula to Tofino.

Mariners are warned not to

anchor vessels in the vicinity of the cable.

An uncharted rock has been discovered in Gordova Bay, on the east coast of Vancouver Island. Commander Henry Pybus, R. N. R., struck the rock, which is five fathoms round, on August 5th with the yacht White Cloud. It has been named Pybus Rock.

A new arc of visibility has replaced the old lamp at Porlier Pass, in the Straits of Georgia. It is a fixed white light and is situated on Race Point.

An uncharted rock has been discovered in Hudson Bay Pass, Dundas Islands, Chatham Sound (latitude N. 54 deg. 30 min. 24 sec., longitude W. 130 deg. 48 min. 30 sec.). When on the rock the south point of Randall Island and the north point of Baron Island are in line. It is small and surrounded with deep water and covered with help.

The United States government have replaced the whistling buoy at Neah Bay with a gas and whistling buoy.

## Editorial Notes and Clippings

## THE VALUE OF ADVERTISING.

The following from the Gleichen Call is very applicable in Prince Rupert, even more especially as the markets are five hundred miles from Prince Rupert, and naturally those interested in the city with the intention of coming here to live wish to know the extent and nature of the business transacted. If they do not see the advertisements of the different mercantile lines, they naturally conclude that the articles are not purchasable here, and bring a large supply with them, so as to obviate the necessity of sending the distance to the nearest city, Vancouver.

"The other day a man from the States arrived in Gleichen, and among other things said he was surprised to see some of the businesses represented in Gleichen. 'Do you know,' said he, 'I could not understand from the paper you have been printing, why some businesses were not represented in your advertising columns that I now see. The fact is, I bought a lot of things in Calgary that have not been mentioned by your advertisers for months. I mean ever since I subscribed last year. I am a farmer now, but was once in business, and for the life of me I cannot see how people expect to do business without at least mentioning their wares in the local paper. In a new country like this, I don't see how they expect to do business unless they advertise the goods they handle. I would not think of it even back in the old settled states, and every wide-awake farmer carefully reads the local paper for months before he settles in a new country. I heard you Canadians were slow, and I am sorry I shall have to write back to my friends that in some respects you are. But I am mighty glad I can say you are making good in the farming line and in

some others. Your business men, however, should wake up to the fact that farmers are readers and do business with those who properly represent their wares to us."

## MR. CLEMENTS AND THE HAZELTON TOWNSITE.

H. S. Clements, the member for Comox-Atlin, made a grave mistake for himself when he gave an interview the other day favoring one of the Hazelton townsites. The result is that everybody on the other townsites immediately became his bitter enemy.

Mr. Clements needs to take a few lessons in suave politics from that pastmaster in the honey smoothing business, Sir Richard McBride. Sir Richard would have gone boldly into the different Hazelton townsites and would have promised them all they wanted; would have praised them and left them with the idea that each and every one of them would be the metropolis of the Interior. You never would find McBride guilty of the indiscretion practiced by Clements.

But there may have been "method in his madness." For the proximity of an election is freely admitted by all, even the staunchest Tory, and might not Clements, who, after redistribution, will have to choose between contesting the northern or southern ends of Comox-Atlin, have done this thing so that the pain of parting in the light of his accepting the Comox end of the district be less severe?

The theory that he will desert the northern end of his riding is borne out by the rumors that are circulating about the district to the effect that the hunting-electioneering-inspection trip he is now engaged upon on board the government launch Evelyn is for the purpose of introducing a substitute contestant for the forthcoming election to the people of Queen Charlotte Islands.

## INDIANS NOT DYING RACE

Declares Bishop Who Has Worked Among Them—Many Prosperous Communities.

Winnipeg, Oct. 3.—"The Indians of Northwestern Canada are not by any means a dying race." This statement was made by Bishop Newman of Saskatchewan to a reporter here. His Lordship spoke of a recent trip extending over a period of seven weeks, which he took among the Indians of the North country. He had found, he said, flourishing conditions in almost every settlement visited. The Indians, when living in their natural state, were a healthy, hardy and industrious race. They were always ready to take advice given for their benefit by white men. It was only when they erected for themselves hovels that filthy conditions came into existence. In several settlements His Lordship found a great number of men and women, as well as boys and girls, who had progressed very favorably with regard to education. A great majority are easily taught, and learned to read and write quickly.

At the time of the Bishop's visit the natives at Moose Lake and Cedar Lake were building churches, while at Pelican Lake a beautiful building had just been completed. It was dedicated for service during his visit. At Lac la Ronge, a very old settlement, the Indians had, of their own initiative, erected a saw mill, cut their own lumber and had built a school. From His Lordship's observations he did not believe that the Indians were by any means a dying race. On the whole they were exceedingly healthy. Some tuberculosis, he said, did undoubtedly exist, but this disease was seldom met with where the people lived according to their natural environment. A movement is on foot, he says, to have the Indians abolish the hovels in which some of them live, as it was found that their conditions improved when they lived in the open.

With regard to missionary work in the Far North, Bishop Newman said it was a regrettable fact that this part of Canada had to rely on Great Britain for its Anglican church workers. The young men of Canada appear to be under the impression that the

salaries are not high enough in proportion to the effort required. As a result there was a scarcity of workers in this large field, sufficient workers not being obtainable from England.

Bishop Newman is a veteran worker among the Indians and understands them thoroughly. For eight years he had been in charge of the diocese of Saskatchewan, which extends far into the North country. Prior to his present appointment he held the bishopric of Mosinee for twelve years.

## THREE KILLED ON WAR BOAT

Lieutenant and Two Men Killed; Others Injured by Explosion on Torpedo Boat Destroyer.

Newport, R. I., Oct. 2.—Lieutenant Morrison and two seamen of the United States torpedo boat destroyer Walke were killed, and eight others injured, yesterday when the turbine and steam chest of the boiler exploded while the boat was running at full speed through a heavy sea.

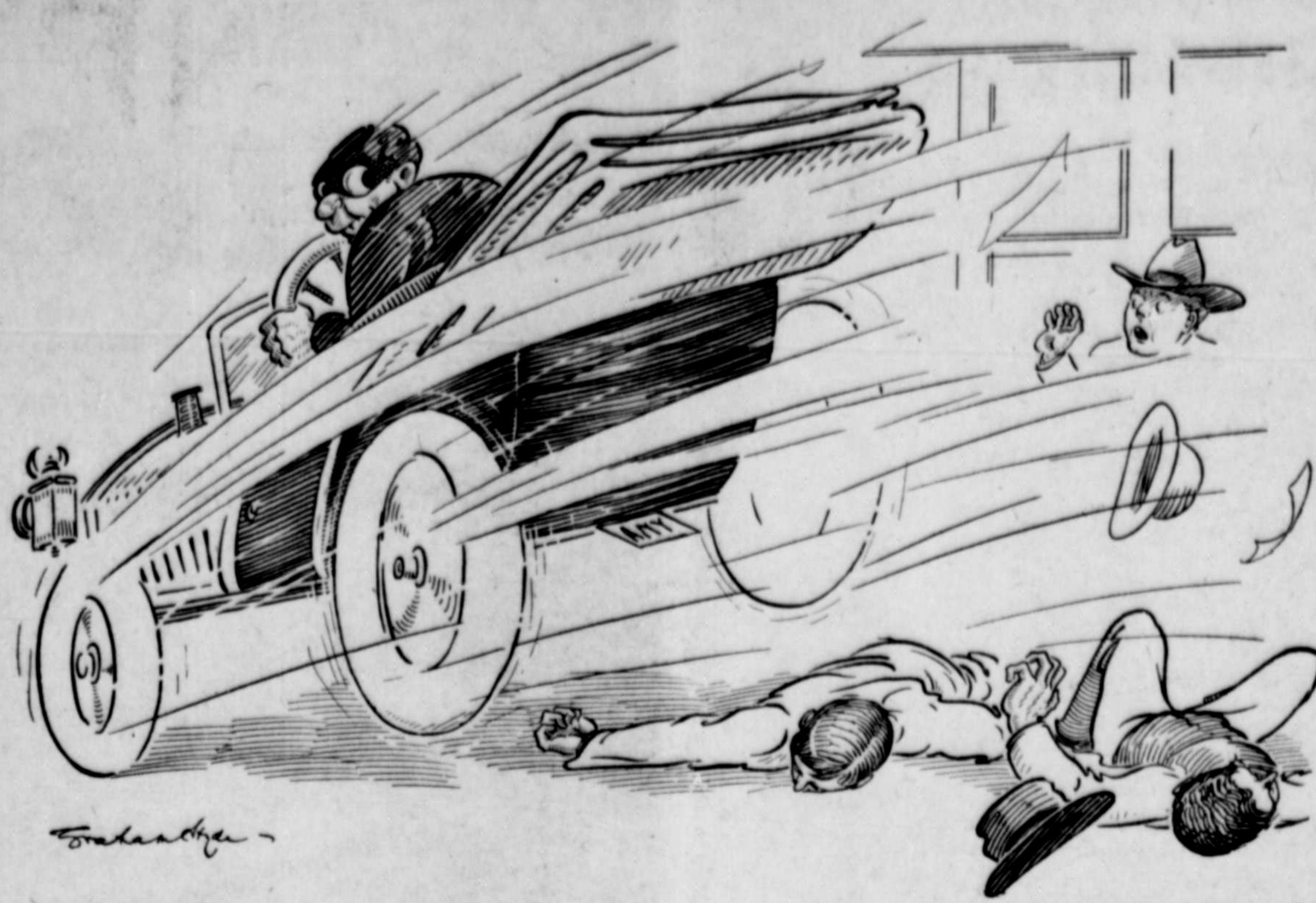
Wilfrid Doughty, in charge of the Sir George Doughty fishing interests at Skidegate, is in the city, a guest at the G. T. P. Inn.

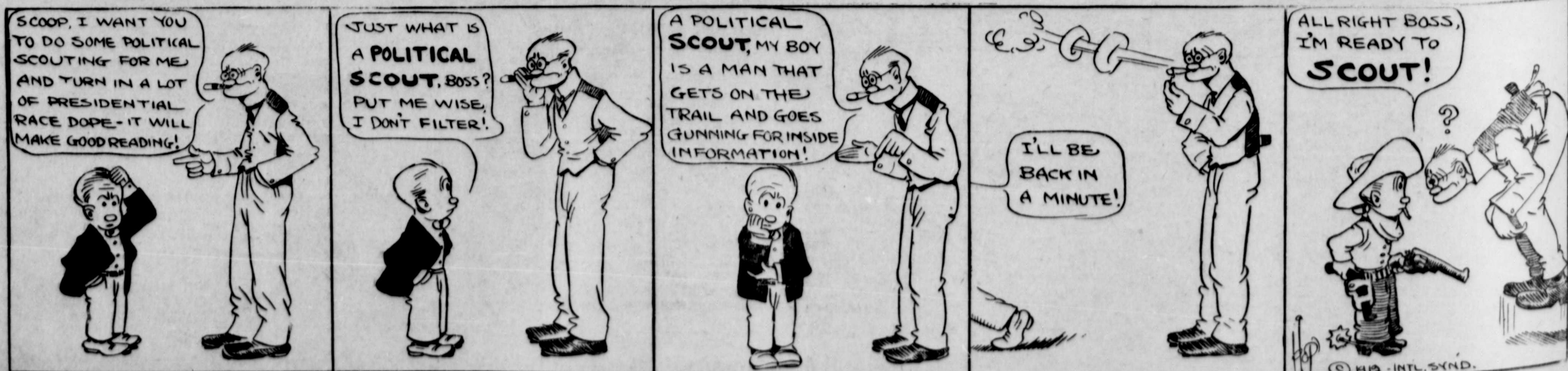

NEW YORK WON CHOICE OF DATES AND PLACE OF OPENING GAME BY TOSS OF COIN—UMPIRES SELECTED AND SEATS RESERVED.

New York, Oct. 2.—The opening game for the world's baseball series will be held in this city, Tuesday, October 8.

The games will alternate between here and Boston, one game in each city until the series is concluded.

The toss of a coin decided which city was to get the opening game. President McAleer of the Boston club, chose heads, the coin falling tails and the game went to New York.

A similar toss with the same result, fixed the opening game for Tuesday, October 8. The Boston club preferred Monday, Oct. 7th.

The Boston club will control the sale of tickets in that city. This is a victory for Ban Johnson in the American League.

The umpires selected were: National League—Klem and Rigler; American League—O'Loughlin and Evens.

In New York the sale of tickets will be handled by the National Commission. Boston has worked out a plan, it was announced, whereby tickets will be delivered, so far as is practicable to

persons who have already made application. Their applications have been filed and they will be notified to send the money.

The tickets, good for three games each, will be issued.

In New York, with a view to defeating the speculators, the only seats reserved will be a block of 8,500 in the upper grandstand.

Seats in the lower grandstand and bleachers will be sold at the Polo Grounds, each person purchasing a ticket must pass directly into the grounds.

In the event of rain, it was decided that the visiting team remain in town until the game is played.

Among the reserved seats will be a block of 75 for the National commissioners, two for each member of the opposing team and not over fifty tickets for members of the local papers. The number to be allotted to out-of-town correspondents was not announced.

## RICH ROCK AT NEW PROSPECT

Reservoir Group Proves to be Good—Near Rocher de Boule Mines

The Reservoir group of seven-teen claims on Rocher de Boule mountain are showing themselves to be something in the mammoth class. Messrs. Halleron and Thompson were out the past week and brought in some samples with them to have assayed. They had three different samples run, and four samples they still have. The city of Winnipeg will immediately start the survey for a pipe line to Shoal Lake for a visible water supply.

A sample vegetable market was opened recently. Thousands of housewives and others were attracted and purchased their winter supplies. The producers secured satisfactory prices and the consumers got a price lower than by the usual method of purchasing.

A building permit has been issued for a warehouse, to cost \$50,000.

The largest single shipment of flour ever made by one company comprised thirty-seven cars.

Saskatoon's returns from taxation this year amount to six hundred and fifty thousand dollars, compared with four hundred and twenty thousand last year.

In Vancouver a new lumber mill for the Fraser River will cost \$350,000, and will have a capacity of 125,000 feet daily.

A steel company purchased a site for a \$300,000 plant, to employ 200 men.

In Regina the city proposes to provide householders with free verandah lights and current to burn all night, for the purpose of better lighting the streets and to make it possible to find house numbers at night, etc.

In Lethbridge of twenty-two carloads of wheat shipped from Bow Island station for which gradings have been received twenty-one graded No. 1 hard.

In Cluny the Western Horse Ranch, Ltd., farm on Crowfoot Creek received 10,000 sheep, pure bred ewes, Cotswold, Merino, Shropshire, Southdowns, all registered stock. They trailed in sixty days from Chester, Montana, via Pend d'Oreille and Medicine Hat. The Western Horse Ranches Company is acting on the recent suggestion of Minister of Agriculture Hon. Martin Burrell, and have been curtailing their horse business for sheep. At present most of Western Canada's mutton is imported from Australia frozen. This gives a great market, and the company thinks this is a good time to enter the business. The announcement, coming just after the united movement of the Canadian Pa-
