### HAZELTON WILL ENDORSE SCHEME OF FALL FAIR FOR THE NORTH AT PRINCE RUPERT

#### TORIES RETAIN SEAT IN MACDONALD BYE - ELECTION

MORRISON ELECTED BY A MAJORITY OF BETWEEN EIGHT AND NINE HUNDRED IN MANITOBA BYE-ELECTION ON SATURDAY—BITTER FIGHT

(Special to Daily News.)  
Winnipeg, Oct. 12.—The Government candidate, Alex. Morrison, was elected by a majority of between eight and nine hundred out of a heavy poll of over six thousand votes.  
The fight which was one of the bitterest ever fought in the west was fought on the reciprocity issue, R. L. Richardson, the Independent candidate, standing on the free trade platform.  
Much bitterness was expressed in the fight, occasioned in some considerable degree by the speeches of Hon. Robert Rogers, minister of the interior, who

took and active part in the campaign, and the arrest of several of the Liberal workers.  
The constituency was a Conservative riding, the bye election being the result of the resignation of W. D. Staples, who was appointed to the Grain Commission. In view of the overwhelming majority in favor of the Liberals in Saskatchewan, it was thought that Richardson might stand a chance of winning on the reciprocity issue in Manitoba, but the electors turned out in such force and voted Conservative that he was defeated by a largest majority ever given a candidate in that riding.

#### PEOPLE OF INTERIOR WELCOME THE PROPOSED FALL FAIR NEXT AUTUMN

Ald. Bullock-Webster Returns From Hazelton in Very Optimistic Mood Over Possibilities of the Fall Exposition for the North

Alderman Bullock-Webster returned yesterday morning from Hazelton, where he had been for several days in the interests of the proposed fall fair to be held in this city next year.  
Mr. Bullock-Webster is enthusiastic over the agricultural possibilities of the Bulkley Valley and thinks that no greater benefit could be given the people of that district than a great exhibition where all their produce could be displayed.  
In Hazelton and the surrounding district he found the business men and farmers were sanguine as to the prospects of such an exposition and all promised their aid in making the exhibition one of which the North could be proud.

All manner of data was collected by Mr. Bullock-Webster in his trip and he brought with him several excellent photos of the agricultural products displayed at the recent Bulkley Valley fair. It is almost beyond conception that in the short space of time in which the settlers had been in the district that such marvellous vegetables could be grown. One cabbage, shown in the group, weighs twenty-five

pounds, while other garden vegetables are large in equal proportion. He states that he saw one single potato which he himself weighed that tipped the scales at three pounds and two ounces.  
In addition to the wealth of the soil, minerals and coal will be sent out to the Prince Rupert show in great quantities. Mr. Bullock-Webster was assured by those interested in the development of the mining industry.  
The idea of a concerted effort to hold an annual show for the exposition of the natural wealth of the northern portion of British Columbia is meeting with the approval of all who have heard of the scheme.  
Mr. Bullock-Webster and Mr. L. Crippen intend to make a trip to Queen Charlotte Islands shortly and seek the co-operation of the farmers there.  
The men who are advocating the fair are at present doing so out of pure public spiritedness and are bearing all the expenses themselves.

#### BORING FOR OIL ON GRAHAM ISLAND SHOWS GOOD SIGNS

PARAFFINE WAX AND ASPHALTUM EXUDES SHOW THAT THE OIL IS ON THE ISLAND IN GREAT QUANTITIES—THIRTEEN INCH BORE BEING SUNK.

Masset, Oct. 12.—Increased attention is turning toward the oil fields on the west coast of Graham Island. One drill belonging to the B. C. Oil Fields Company of Vancouver is now sinking a thirteen inch hole at Tiahn Point. This company is so confident of success that offers to purchase stock have been refused and operation expenses are being defrayed by funds subscribed by members of the company.  
On the company's ground paraffine oil exudes and in all directions for miles oil shale in place, from which tar and asphaltum exudes may be seen.

There is no doubt that oil underlies the ground from Frederick Island to Otard Bay, as reported by one of the best geologists the world ever knew, the late G. M. Dawson, formerly head of the Geological department, Ottawa. Prof. Ellis, also of the Geological department, examined the field and in placing his map and report before the department calls attention to the oil and other indications of the existence of the fluid in quantity along the west coast.

#### RAILS REACH NEW HAZELTON; FREIGHT SOON BE DELIVERED

TRACK LAYER PASSED THROUGH THE TOWN ON TUESDAY—SIDING IS NOW LAID—SUPT. MEEHAN SAYS EVERY EFFORT WILL BE MADE TO PERFECT ROAD.

The rails for the Grand Trunk Pacific reached New Hazelton early Tuesday morning, and have since been extended some distance beyond. The siding is also being laid, and as soon as it is ready the railway company will begin hauling freight. Foley, Welch & Stewart will have several car loads delivered here immediately the siding is ready. Possibly the first freight that will come in will be the lumber for the contractors' new buildings, which will include freight sheds, offices, store houses and homes for the freight officials.  
On Saturday General Superintendent W. C. C. Meehan arrived in town on his private car, and he spent the next two or three days here watching the track laying machine, which is in charge of Mr. Dan Dempsey, one of the best railway men on the line. Mr. Meehan is very anxious to

get the siding laid at New Hazelton and to begin hauling freight to this point. He assured the Foley, Welch & Stewart officials that no time what ever would be lost in perfecting the road. The first siding, which will be about three thousand feet long, is being laid on Section One side of the grade and begins at the crossing of the government road, or Eleventh street. This will be Foley, Welch & Stewart's freight headquarters, and where their storehouses will be erected.  
To the Herald Mr. Meehan stated that he was rushing the track laying and ballasting just as fast as he possibly could. He had received no instructions whatever as to any winter terminals. As far as he knew the terminals would be as far east of Prince Rupert as it was possible to get the track. — Omineca Herald.

Vancouver, Oct. 12.—Bert Hughes, who ran over and killed Charles Faus, an elderly man, while on a drunken joyride in a stolen automobile, was convicted of manslaughter by the jury at the assizes in spite of the eloquent plea of his lawyer, Mr. W. DeB. Farris.

Ten Thousand Slain  
London, Oct. 12.—According to a despatch received here from China more than ten thousand Mongols were slain by Yuan Shi Kai's troops.

Diamonds Stolen  
Victoria, Oct. 12.—Diamond rings and jewelry to the value of \$1,600 were stolen from Mrs. Alex. Macdonald's apartments in the Empress Hotel. Mrs. Macdonald is the widow of the "Klondike King."

Communication Cut Off  
Jauze, Mexico, Oct. 12.—The Mexico Northwestern Railway was cut by rebels, entirely cutting off communication with the interior of Mexico from this city.

To Stop Joyriding  
Victoria, Oct. 12.—A Victoria man has patented a device which registers the speed of an automobile on a tape. The key of the machine is left with the police, who can at all times ascertain if the driver was exceeding the speed limit.

Trying to Shoot Sweetheart  
Vancouver, Oct. 12.—Thomas Hofstater is being tried at the assizes on a charge of trying to shoot his former sweetheart Mrs. M. McCarter. In the scuffle which followed the attempt, Hofstater himself was shot. The case is attracting considerable attention.

Eggs are Expensive  
Victoria, Oct. 14.—According to Mr. J. R. Terry, of the department of agriculture, eggs will be higher in price this winter than ever before. The product of the laying competition at Vancouver are now selling for 80 cents per dozen, while the "strictly fresh" bring 60 cents.

#### FISH WILL GO FROM RUPERT

Big Tramp Steamer Will Take 5,000 Cases of Northern Salmon from Here to Europe.

The first shipment of salmon from Prince Rupert to a foreign port will leave here some time this week. The shipment, which consists of over five thousand cases, came in from the cannery at Nanaimo yesterday on the Henriette. It will be shipped from here on the steamship Crown of Galacia, which is expected to arrive in the harbor tonight or tomorrow from Liverpool with a cargo of water pipes for the city.  
The shipment has been specially prepared for export and it is altogether likely that it is the beginning of an important branch of the shipping that is going to make Prince Rupert a busy port during the next four or five years.

#### RICH STRIKE NEAR DAWSON

Good Gold Found on Wathalla Creek, Known as Scroggie Creek Five Cents Per Pan Taken.

Dawson, Oct. 12.—News of a rich placer strike on Wathalla Creek, known to some as the left fork of Scroggie, is brought to the city by recent arrivals. As high as five cents to the pan has been found on the benches. The creek is 10 miles or more in length, with the valley a half mile to a mile in width, and with fine benches. Many claims have been staked on the creek of late, and applications have been received in the gold commissioner's office in Dawson.

#### MODEL FARM ON GRAHAM ISLAND

Tract of Hundred Acres Being Cleared for Winnipeg Man—Great Variety of Vegetables.

Masset, Oct. 12.—For the purpose of clearly demonstrating the possibilities of the soil of Graham Island a tract of one hundred acres is being cleared at Meyer Lake by A. A. McCrae of Winnipeg, who will remain here this winter and direct operations.  
When the tract is cleared of trees and brush a good sized farm will be growing for the demonstrations will be by sections planted as soon as the ground is prepared. It is expected a large part of the tract will be growing next fall.  
Every variety of vegetable and fruit that it is thought will grow in Graham Island soil will be given opportunity and success of the undertaking is being predicted.  
Little systematic cultivation has yet been undertaken, but every vegetable planted thus far has done exceptionally well, proving the suitability of Graham Island soil.

## Editorial Notes and Clippings

BROKEN PROMISE  
OF SIR RICHARD.

Probably there is only one man in the province (at least we hope so) who will defend McBride's action in regard to the striking miners of Extension and Cumberland, and that man is Sir Richard McBride, Premier of the Province of British Columbia and minister of mines, on whose breast was recently pinned the insignia of the Order of St. Michael and St. George.

As he admires the great jewels of the order in the mirror and whispers to himself, "Sir Richard," we wonder if the vision of those seven dead miners in the slopes of the Diamond Vale Colliery ever appear in the glass. Does he see them groping helplessly in the dark drifts of the colliery, stumbling on to their knees and with the sacred name of mother or wife on their lips, pitch forward as the great black wall of after damp advances? Three breaths and the miner is dead. Or does he see in the mirror the seared faces of those widows whose all went into the darkness never to return, or the little ones who cling to the mothers' skirts crying for the father who shall never return? Does he recollect, as he looks down at the King's fayer, the promise he made to those widows and orphans, and how, instead of staying here and carrying out those promises, he lied to them, to the people of Vancouver and to himself, and slunk away to the old land to dine and wine with the lords and gentry there while the fatherless and widows of that disaster, and also of the Extension disaster, feasted on crusts and huddled together around a cold stove?

The same issue of the government paper, the Colonist, that published Sir Richard's intention of sailing for England carried the following item:

"Mr. Thomas Graham, chief inspector of mines, and Mr. Fleet Robertson, provincial mineralogist, have just returned to the city from Nicola, where, under instructions of the minister, they have been specially investigating all the circumstances incidental to and indicative of the cause of the recent disastrous explosion in the mines of the Diamond Vale Coal Company, through which seven of the miners in the employ of that company lost their lives. As soon as the reports of the two officials can be prepared they will be presented to Hon. Mr. McBride as minister and it will be for him to determine whether the circumstances are such as to indicate criminal responsibility or to justify proceedings under the Coal Mines Regulation Act."

What has been done in the matter of the "criminal responsibility" or the infraction of the "Coal Mines Regulation Act"? We ask McBride, what has he done? What effort has been made to carry out the promise of proceedings?

In the event of such proceedings, it is Sir Richard McBride himself, as minister of mines, who would have to face the indictment, for the coroner's jury placed the responsibility of that explosion on the inspectors, and Sir Richard, as head of that department, is responsible.

Now do you understand why the miners at Extension and Cumberland did not receive the inquiry they asked for? The strike itself is a protest against the Department of Mines, for the men say that they have no protection against discrimination in the event of their doing their duty in an effort to save and protect life. Is it not obvious that an inquiry into those statements would have to bring to light the lack of protection afforded in the Diamond Vale disaster, and the thing that McBride—pardon, Sir Richard—fears would be dragged to the light? But it is useless for him to cover himself like an ostrich and think that time has buried all. Away up in the Nicola Valley and in Ladysmith are widows and fatherless children who can never forget and there are "blacklisted" men wandering about in search of employment who whisper curses to themselves as they think of the conditions they remember and which they protested against and as a result were "fired."

ULSTER WILL  
GET JUSTICE

Solicitor General Says Government Have Solved Difficulty of Home Rule as Regards Ulster.

London, Oct. 12.—Speaking at Edinburgh, Sir John Simon, solicitor general, said that the government will be ready to treat the minority in Ireland very generously.

With regard to the home rule bill the people could depend upon the government to seek a solution to the Ulster situation, and in fact that solution had already been found, declared Sir John.

Concluding, the solicitor general said that he was convinced that it would not be Ulster that would be coerced as far as home rule was concerned.

## GOLD QUARTZ NEAR TELKWA

Hugh McKay Back from the New District—Rock Assays \$140 with \$94 in Gold.

A big gold strike has been made about twelve miles from Telkwa, just opposite the head of Deep Creek and on the Babine slope. Some weeks ago Dick Rogers and George Hazelton ran onto what is one of the most promising gold quartz countries in the Northern Interior. Hugh McKay was prospecting around Owen Lake and as soon as he heard of it he started for the new camp. It was late in the season and he was there about the same time as several others and had to come back on account of the snow. McKay, however, saw the rock and he sized up the country, which he says is a perfect gold bearing formation, and he looks for a big rush up there in the spring and he predicts that the new district will be one of the most important. The rock brought down gave assays of \$90 and \$94 in gold. The piece that gave the silver and about \$29 in copper, making a total of \$140. Reports of this strike had reached town before, but no one had been in who had seen the district.

Mr. McKay has holdings in the Owen Lake district, close to Brown & Woods, and he says that if the assays which Brown & Woods have an immense proposition.—Omineca Herald.

1. Owners of real estate. This means any person who has a deed of land registered in the Land Registry Office or an agreement for purchase of land registered in the Registry Office.

2. Any person holding a trade license may vote, but before doing so he must, in October, make a declaration showing his right to vote in Form 1. These forms can be obtained at the City Clerk's office. The declaration must be filed with the City Clerk within forty-eight hours after it is made.

3. Any householder can vote. A householder means a person who has resided in Prince Rupert from the 1st of January, 1912, and who occupies a dwelling, tenement, hotel or boarding house, or any portion of a dwelling house, tenement, hotel or boarding house. He must also pay rates, taxes or assessments which are not chargeable on land, and which rates, taxes and assessments so paid amount to not less than \$2.00. Water rates and dog licenses do not count. Practically the only tax that can be paid is the road tax, \$2.00, and any person who, being a householder as above described, has already paid his road tax must also make a declaration before he can be placed on the voters' list.
