



## ROOSEVELT REPORTED NEAR POINT OF DEATH

### PRAIRIE CAPITALISTS WILL COME TO RUPERT AND INVEST--BRICK BLOCK TO BE BUILT

#### SIR WILFRID DISCUSSES BORDEN AND THE RAILWAY

LIBERAL CHIEF TELLS OF THE C. P. R. ISSUE OF STOCK AND THE TORY GOVERNMENT'S INABILITY TO DEAL WITH THE SUBJECT.

Toronto, Oct. 16.—In speaking of the Borden cabinet and the increased capitalization of the Canadian Pacific Railway, recently, Sir Wilfrid Laurier, ex-premier of Canada, said: "Last August the C. P. R. presented a petition to the government to be authorized to issue a certain amount of stock. We know such a petition was presented, but we know also that nothing was done about it. So we do not know how much additional stock they asked authorization for."

**Do Not Want Good Railways.**  
"The company waited for an answer from the government, but they did not get it. The government had to decide two points. First, whether the proposed issue was necessary to improve their lines as represented. No wonder this did not meet with enthusiastic approval from the government."

## CONDITION OF WOUNDED EX-PRESIDENT WORSE THAN WAS AT FIRST THOUGHT

Bullet Has Been Extracted From the Breast of Col. Roosevelt--Schranck, a Socialist, Says He is Glad He Shot and Hopes Roosevelt Will Die---Crowd Tried to Lynch the Assassin---Police Have Difficulty

(Special to Daily News.)

Milwaukee, Oct. 16.—The reports from the physicians in charge of the wounded ex-President, Theodore Roosevelt, say that the condition of their patient is not as satisfactory as could be desired, and that he is in a serious condition. The bullet has been extracted from his breast.

Following the shooting, the would-be murderer, who gave his name as Otto Schranck, was seized before he could fire the second bullet.

Police and several plain clothes men who were in the vicinity took him from the infuriated citizens who were calling loudly for a rope to lynch him

with. The central station was notified and the patrol wagon, loaded with constables and detectives, arrived within a few moments. It was with the greatest difficulty that they made through the crowd with their prisoner and placed him in the patrol wagon. Guns had to be drawn and batons freely used to secure the safety of Schranck.

At the police station he boasted loudly of his act and said that he hoped Roosevelt would die, as he had betrayed the workers. He was glad that he had shot the Colonel and lamented that he did not have an opportunity of firing the second shot before the gun was knocked from his hand.

Great crowds followed the patrol to the jail and all night the excited citizens, including many Socialists, gathered on street corners and discussed the tragedy. Politics were entirely forgotten, and only the fact that a great American had been shot was remembered.

Special editions of the evening papers were issued and the shooting of President McKinley was compared with the shooting of Roosevelt.

Later.—A bulletin just issued says that there is apparently no change in Colonel Roosevelt's condition. The bullet, a .32 calibre, has been extracted from his breast.

## VANCOUVER DOCTOR FINED FOR SUPPLYING "HOPHEAD"

DR. SPANKIE FINED IN POLICE COURT FOR GIVING OPIATE TO "DOPE FIEND"—INFORMATION WAS LAID BY SISTER

Vancouver, Oct. 16.—Because he sold opiates to Earl Harvey, contrary to the Medical Act, Dr. J. E. Spankie was fined \$25 in the police court.

Alice Harvey, the sister of Earl Harvey, who, by the way is facing a charge of false pretences, laid the charge and stayed to the bitter end to see that the law was served.

Earl Harvey told the doctor, according to the evidence, that he wanted the dope for his grand

mother or aunt. Acting on his representations the doctor gave him a prescription.

When arraigned before Magistrate Shaw on the charge which he now faces, Harvey broke down and cried, though he is a sizeable man. His sister explained that he had taken "hop." Dr. Spankie was called upon to explain.

Mr. E. J. Grant defended Spankie. Harvey's case will be called on Wednesday.

People in the vicinity of Second avenue last night were startled to hear a deafening uproar suddenly break out on the still night air and continue. Thinking that it was free-for-all or an Indian potlatch, policemen, store keepers, lawyers, doctors, kids and dogs all made in the direction of the yelling.

Investigation proved that it was but the excited fans from the Empress and Hub bowling alleys watching the much talked-of game between the four ball throwers from each house.

Inside the Hub, where the game was in progress the scene was one of the utmost excitement. The play was so keen and the bowlers so expert that everyone was keyed to the highest pitch and a strike or spare brought forth howls of delight from the respective boosters of the side successful, while an unlucky split brought out cries of derision. Small boys were there in profusion and joined in the work of setting pins, meantime cheering both sides, being bound that they would be on the winning side at least.

The last frame of the third game was the scene of the greatest excitement. Men danced about in nervous anticipation or whispered in the awful din some word of warning or advice which was never heard even by themselves. Opposing enthusiasts were on their knees watching the foul line and calling out anything which might frustrate the bowler.

**A CANADIAN FLEET**

Mr. Borden and his newspaper supporters have got it into their heads that there is some distinction between the permanent naval policy of Canada and an emergency policy. There is no such distinction. The same policy will meet both requirements.

Mr. Rogers who rejoices in a reputation for expert manipulation unbeaten in Canadian politics, took occasion to remark that the Canadian West was suffering at the present time from the ill effects of the "rotten, dishonest and incompetent" policy of the late government. No doubt he expected his hearers to believe him, but as there is no one in Manitoba who would believe Mr. Rogers, either on the platform or off, the statement regarding the Laurier government will not cause any serious worry.—Saturday Sunset.

**TO COMPENSATE SEALERS**

**United States Has Made Payment of \$200,000 to Canadian Govt.**

Ottawa, Oct. 15.—The government of the United States, after five months' delay, has paid to Canada the \$200,000 which it agreed to hand over to the Dominion for compensation when the pelagic sealing treaty was signed in 1911.

By this treaty it was agreed pelagic sealing was to be abolished, and Canada was to be compensated for the discontinuance of the fishing by her citizens in two ways. The United States, Russia and Japan agreed to give a percentage of every catch in the Pribilof, Commander and Rotlim Islands to Canada.

The United States was to advance \$200,000 to Canada and Japan to buy out the citizens who were engaged in pelagic sealing. No payment for animals killed has yet been made by any of the governments involved.

**CLERKS POINT OUT M'MANIGAL**

Ortie McManigal is identified by several hotel clerks who knew him under alias.

Indianapolis, Ind., Oct. 15.—For the first time since he confessed to dynamiting, Ortie E. McManigal, before a jury in the "dynamiting conspiracy" trial was identified by hotel clerks as having visited various cities at times when explosions occurred.

H. L. Pearce, Kansas City, Mo., in the pages of a hotel register, traced J. W. McGraw as having registered at a Kansas city hotel August 20, 1910, three days before McManigal blew up a portion of a \$1,500,000 bridge across the Missouri river, which, he says, was arranged for by W. Bert Brown, of Kansas City, and James B. McNamara.

"Do you see McGraw in the court room?" asked James W. Noel, special assistant district attorney.

"That's the man," said Pearce pointing to McManigal. The line of testimony was followed by the Government as tending to carry out McManigal's confession that he actually caused the explosions detailed in his confession and for which the government charges members of the executive board of the International Association of Bridge & Structural Iron Workers paid him at the rate of \$200 a "job."

R. J. Quigley, of Duluth, identified McManigal as a visitor to Duluth hotel in July, 1910, shortly before an explosion at Superior, Wis.

F. W. Gillis said McManigal was the J. G. Bryce who frequently registered at an hotel in Rochester, Penn., where later was discovered nitro-glycerine in quantities hidden in a shed.

The activities of James B. McNamara on his return to Indianapolis after blowing up the Los Angeles Times building were also traced in hotel registers. At the suggestion of his brother, J. B. took the name of "Frank Sullivan," dropping all the aliases he used on the Pacific coast.

**KAISER OFFERS OTTOMAN HELP**

German Emperor Gives Turkey Permission to Us Embassy as Hospital.

Berlin, Oct. 15.—Germany's first sign of sympathy for Turkey is reported in news from Constantinople that the Kaiser has ordered the German ambassador to place a large part of the embassy at the disposal of the Turkish foreign minister for hospital purposes and the accommodation of the wounded soldiers.

**WHITE PASS RY. MAKES STRIKE**

Went Out to Develop Tonnage and Found Copper Lead of Consequence.

Seattle, Wash., Oct. 15.—Not expecting to discover a mine, but indulging in the forlorn hope that they might possibly find an ore body of some kind that would give increased freight to their line, the management of the White Pass & Yukon Railroad this year took an option on a number of copper prospects near White Horse. On April 30th, 200 men were placed at work, and the prospect soon developed into a mine, from which was shipped up till September 30th more than 22,000 tons of ore. The rock, upon being smelted at Tacoma, gave a return of from \$10 to \$15 a ton. A little investigation of the property warranted the expenditure of the sum necessary for the construction of a short spur from the railroad to the mine.

**CRITICIZES SALUTING FLAG**

London Lord Mayor, However, Will Send Gift Flag to School.

London, Oct. 15.—The practice of school children saluting the flag is criticized by a York alderman, the children of which ancient British city received a flag as a gift from far away York in Western Australia. The objecting alderman says that many children go to school under compulsion and therefore should not be compelled to salute the flag except with the unanimous consent of their parents. The lord mayor of York, however, said that the flag had been sent to him as chief magistrate and he would send it to each of the city schools for salutation.

**Masons Bar Liquor Men.**

Los Angeles, Oct. 15.—Hereafter no Mason in California can engage in the liquor business and remain in good standing. This is the ruling of the California Grand Lodge of Free and Accepted Masons. Not only was the amendment passed to prevent saloonmen from entering the order, but a rider preventing Masons in good standing from entering the liquor business in any way was almost unanimously adopted.

**BANK CLERK SUES BANK**

Contracted for Three Years' Service and Then Left After Month's Notice and Wants Deposit.

Vancouver, Oct. 15.—May a clerk who has contracted in England to stay in the employ of a bank in Canada for three years, end his contract with a month's notice? This is the question that Judge McInnes was asked to answer in a suit by Mr. C. P. Ashmore, former teller for the Bank of British North America, against the bank for \$100 deposit money and some of his salary. His Honor will render judgment in a few days.

It was contended by counsel that the Bank Act and the act relating to masters and servants conflicted. The counterclaim of the bank amounts to \$400 for breach of contract.

NEWS NOTES OF THE GREAT WEST

In Edmonton the municipal street railway will build ten miles of new track next year.

The city gas engineer returns from an inspection of the new wells at Pelican Rapids. He reports an enormous flow of natural gas, ample to supply the city's needs.

The engineer reports favorably on the 28,000 acre coal property on Smokey River. He will recommend a railway and early development.

Department of Agriculture will run a special train for delegates to the Dry Farming Congress at Lethbridge the week of October 21st, from Regina.

Vancouver building announcements include a six storey hotel, to cost \$120,000; a six storey apartment house, to cost \$80,000 and five three storey apartments, to cost \$160,000.

W. J. Hamilton, one mile from Cranbrook, took 250 crates of raspberries from a half acre, sold at \$2.75 a crate, or a rate of \$3,750 an acre; one-eighth acre of currants and gooseberries returned nearly \$500.

The Vancouver City Council adopted a railway terminal agreement assuring eight million dollars expenditure on station, hotel and yards.

Five fur sales at local mart this year returned a hundred thousand dollars.

Million pounds of halibut and salmon arriving daily from the North.

Yukon gold output this year is five millions.

Saskatoon's electrical department estimates for 1913 figures at a hundred and fifty thousand dollars. Will string 120 miles of wire for power and light extensions.

Excavation started on two office buildings to cost three hundred thousand.

Announcement was made that the Dominion government will build seismological observatory at Victoria, to cost ten thousand dollars.

Two factories manufacturing overalls and boots and shoes locate in Brandon.

Calgary's school population shows increase of 25 per cent. over last year.

ment, as their determination to degrade the National Transcontinental shows they do not believe in good railways.

"The next point the government had to decide was at what price the stock should be issued. Today the stock sells around \$275, and the government had to decide how much should go into the treasury of the C. P. R. and how much to the shareholders.

"But the government decided neither point. They simply ignored the petition of the C. P. R. The company waited and waited for an answer, which never came. Then the company called a meeting of the shareholders and decided to issue their stock under an old statute, which they claimed exempted them from the necessity of asking government authorization, and under this they issued \$60,000,000 of stock at \$175 which was worth \$275.

"Indignation in the West. This action had caused great indignation in the Northwest, where it is considered that it will help place an additional burden on the shoulders of the people. Doubtless Hon. Mr. Rogers, who is campaigning in the Macdonald constituency, and others, sent in indignant telegrams, only to get the reply that after six weeks' delay the government had not even considered the question; and if that is the case do you consider that these men were any good? (Laughter.) "And why had they not considered the petition of the C. P. R.? When it was first presented Mr. Borden was in Europe, and it waited until he returned. Then he came back, and it was an-

RE VOTERS' LIST.

1. Owners of real estate. This means any person who has a deed of land registered in the Land Registry Office or an agreement for purchase of land registered in the Registry Office.

2. Many persons have land under agreement from the Grand Trunk or the government whose title is not registered in the Land Registry Office, and their right to vote is doubtful. Therefore, voters so situated are advised if possible to register either as householder or license holder.

3. Any person holding a trade license may vote, but before doing so he must, in October, make a declaration showing his right to vote in Form 1. These forms can be obtained at the City Clerk's office. The declaration must be filed with the City Clerk within forty-eight hours after it is made.

4. A householder means a person who has resided in Prince Rupert from the 1st of January, 1912, and who occupies a dwelling, tenement, hotel or boarding house, or any portion of a dwelling house, tenement, hotel or boarding house. He must also pay rates, taxes or assessments which are not chargeable on land, and which rates, taxes and assessments so paid amount to not less than \$2.00. Water rates and dog licenses do not count. Practically the only tax that can be paid is the road tax, \$2.00, and any person who, being a householder as above described, has already paid his road tax must also make a declaration before he can be placed on the voters' list.

All voters must be 21 years of age and British subjects.
