

## BALKAN STATES ALL DECLARE WAR ON TURKEY

### SEVEN DAY ADVENTISTS FORM COLONY ON GRAHAM ISLAND AND ERECT BIG SAWMILL

#### SETTLERS ARRIVE FOR UP LINE COLONY NEAR TERRACE

**TWENTY-FIVE RUSSIANS, VANGUARD OF COLONY, ARRIVE THIS MORNING—WILL SETTLE NEAR TERRACE.**

Arriving on the Prince Rupert this morning were twenty-five Russians, the vanguard of the Russian settlement that is about to be established in the vicinity of Hazelton. The party was accompanied by Mr. E. A. Piehugin, secretary to Mr. A. M. Asenchev, C.E., the head of the company, with headquarters at Vancouver, who are engineering the enterprise.

The spectacle of witnessing these big husky Russians filing down the gang plank with their characteristic dress and big bundles on their shoulders was somewhat uncommon, used as the people of Prince Rupert are to the sight of all sides of foreigners of all nations.

#### JOE BAYLEY MAY FIGHT HERE NEXT MONTH THINK PROMOTERS

**ARRANGEMENTS ARE UNDER WAY TO HAVE CANADIAN CHAMPION AND O'LEARY OF SEATTLE BOX HERE EARLY IN NEXT MONTH.**

Messrs. Wright and Strassberg, who have been in communication with Morris Condon, manager of Joe Bayley, the lightweight champion of Canada, and a popular idol of the local fight fans, say that they believe terms will be arrived at for the staging of a boxing exhibition in this city sometime early in November between Joe and O'Leary, the fast Seattle lightweight, who is coming to the fore so rapidly.

Bayley meets either Pal Brown or "Fighting Dick" Hyland in Tommy Burns' arena at Calgary on Thanksgiving Day, and the fight here will follow that mill. Hyland is a top notcher and so is Brown, and a victory over either one of those lads would put the British Columbian in the limelight on the other side of the border as well as in the eyes of the Canadian fight fans. Especially since Tommy Burns has been handing out the dope in favor of Brown.

Messrs. Wright and Strassberg have received a telegram from Condon making certain demands regarding the financial arrangements and this has been promptly replied to in a manner which the local promoters are confident will meet with the approval of Bayley and his manager.

## ALL THE BALKAN STATES ARE NOW ARRAYED AGAINST THE OTTOMAN

### Bulgaria and Greece Make Formal Declaration of Hostilities and Invade Turkey---Bulgarian Forces Capture Important Position

(Special to Daily News.)  
Constantinople, Oct. 19.—Heavy fighting is reported to have taken place yesterday in the region of Kirk-Kilesseh, northeast of Adrianople. Large forces of soldiers were engaged on both sides.

The departure from this city yesterday of the Balkan ministers and many prospective combatants was unattended by any hostile demonstration. Thousands of Greeks and other involved persons left the city to join their respective armies.

London, Oct. 18.—Turkey failed to detach Greece from the Balkan confederation and all four countries are now arrayed against her and have made formal declaration of war.

Sofia, Oct. 18.—The Bulgarian army today occupied Kurtukala, an important strategic point in

European Turkey, twenty miles north of Adrianople.

Athens, Oct. 19.—In the Chamber of Deputies yesterday Premier Venizelos read to the deputies a message from King George telling of the formal declaration of war against Turkey. Greece, the message said, was forced to take up arms to aid their Balkan brothers who were fighting against Turkey.

Grecian troops have invaded the Ottoman Empire.

#### SERVIA FORMALLY DECLARES WAR AGAINST THE OTTOMAN

**TURKEY RECEIVES FORMAL DECLARATION OF WAR FROM SERBIA—SERVIAN MINISTER WITHDRAWS FROM CONSTANTINOPLE—ENTHUSIASM IN BELGRADE.**

(Special to Daily News.)  
Belgrade, Serbia, Oct. 18.—Formal declaration of war was made between Turkey and Serbia late last night. Instructions were sent from the government here to the minister at Constantinople to make a formal declaration to the Porte today. Following his presentation of the hostile intentions of his government, the minister will immediately call for his passports and leave Turkey for Belgrade.

Immense crowds paraded the streets last night singing patriotic songs and cheering the fact that war had been formally declared. As the night went on the crowds increased and until morning listened to the patriotic speeches of their leaders, or discussed the probable success of the war in excited groups.

Marconi, inventor of wireless telegraphy, had to submit to an operation yesterday and suffer the removal of his right eye. It was thought at first that the eye could be saved and the best doctors in Italy worked unceasingly to prevent the removal, but it was feared that the other eye might become affected in sympathy and after a consultation it was decided to remove the eyeball.

Cumberland, B. C., Oct. 18.—A meeting of the Cumberland miners was held here the other afternoon, when the feeling ran very high, and considerable differences were in evidence.

The Canadian Collieries, Ltd., have opened up No. 7 shaft, and about forty-five men are working under police protection. The men have pickets out, but everything so far is orderly and quiet.

#### COLONISTS ON GRAHAM ISLAND HAVE SAWMILL AND FACTORIES

**REV. T. H. WATSON OF SEWELL CITY TELLS OF WORK OF COLONY OF SEVEN DAY ADVENTISTS WHO ARE CARVING HOMES IN WOODS OF MASSET INLET.**

"A sawmill, a boat building yard and a glove factory will be started at our settlement at Sewell City and at Woden River," said Rev. T. H. Watson, spiritual head and advisor to the colonists who are forming the nucleus of a large town on Masset Inlet, Graham Island. "We are Seven Day Adventists, and are forming a colony of our own in what we believe to be one of the best districts of British Columbia.

"Land has been secured and will be divided into individual holdings among the settlers. Already about thirty persons have arrived and in the spring many more will come, bringing with them their wives and families.

SAVE THE LANDLORDS.

The following letter appeared in the Peterborough (Ont.) Examiner recently and has given rise to much discussion in that city:

To the Editor:
Dear Sir: The question is often asked, why should Canada contribute ten million dollars to the British navy, and I would like to point out a few reasons why we should not do so.

Now, if we send money we only save the land owners of Great Britain and help continue their life of luxury. I would say, why not build ships on the St. Lawrence and stimulate the business of Eastern Canada? Then we would get the benefit of our own money and have our own navy.

MR. BORDEN'S TROUBLES.

The Ottawa Free Press thus condenses Rt. Hon. Mr. Borden's troubles into small compass, but that does not make them any lighter:

"The West wants wider markets; the canners want no duty on tomatoes; the suffragettes want a vote; Armand Lavergne wants no navy; Ottawa wants a drill shed; the manufacturers want the preference decreased; and there's no end of trouble for Premier Borden."

CRESTON INDIANS GIVE TROUBLE.

As a result of the inability of the Attorney General's department to arrest the Indian murderers Paul and Spintlam, the Indians in the neighborhood of Creston are beginning to give annoyance not only to white ranchers in that locality but to government parties making surveys of the land, and it would not be surprising if we should hear of outrages being committed by the aborigines

there and perhaps of further loss of life among the whites. The government has so clearly demonstrated its powerlessness to regulate the natives and keep them in order that the settlers about Creston are uneasy lest Paul and Spintlam's example should be followed by other young bucks in the province.

CREOSOTING CROSS TIES

Canadian Railways Save Million Dollars by Creosoting Railroad Ties—Prolongs Life of Wood.

Ottawa, Oct. 18.—The annual replacement of cross ties in Canadian railway lines is about 10,000,000, according to statistics compiled by the forestry branch of the Department of the Interior. The average life of a tie—i. e., seven years—could be prolonged to seventeen years if proper preservative treatment were adopted, and an annual saving of 350,000,000 feet, board measure, of timber could be effected. This is equivalent to three years' cut of one of the very largest mills in the country.

While the initial expense of creosoting would bring the cost per tie from 58 to 93 cents, it would save \$1,400,000 annually.

Since 1910 two timber treating plants have been established, treating in 1911 206,209 ties, or 1.5 per cent. of the total cut.

The number of ties purchased in the Dominion in 1911 was 13,683,770, an increase of 4,469,808, or 48.5 per cent. over 1910.

The rapid development of railways in the Western provinces is largely responsible for this increase.

Eighteen kinds of wood were used: Jack pine, with 40 per cent.; tamarack, with 19 per cent.; Douglas fir (used to a very great extent in new electric lines in British Columbia), with 14 per cent., and hemlock, with 12 per cent., were the leaders. A remarkable change is that of cedar in decreasing from 40 per cent. to 5.4 per cent. of the total.

NEWS NOTES OF THE GREAT WEST

The Calgary forestry branch of the Canadian Pacific department of natural resources offers \$2,400 in prizes for tree growing in Southern Alberta. Plantations to be planted in the spring of 1913 and prizes awarded in the fall of 1914. There will be a sweepstakes prize of \$600, two grand prizes of \$300 each, two prizes of \$100 each and twenty prizes of \$50 each. Department furnishes half the trees required by each competitor, the balance will be furnished at special prices.

Estimates of the Saskatoon city engineer for 1913 total \$600,000. He will construct thirteen miles of sewer and water mains and ten miles of sidewalks.

Three steel rotary kilns, said to be the largest in Canada, arrived. They will handle fifteen hundred barrels of cement daily. The plant is nearing completion.

In Winnipeg the city will submit a bylaw for \$1,000,000 for extension of the school system.

In Regina a permit has been issued for a moving picture theatre to cost \$40,000.



Victoria, Oct. 17.—The Thanksgiving Day fight, which it was proposed to stage at Calgary between Joe Bayley and Pal Brown, is off. Tommy Burns, the promoter, wired Morris Condon that Brown absolutely refused to make the weight of 133 pounds at ringside, and the champion won't meet the Hibbing challenger under any other conditions.

In his message Burns asked Bayley's manager whether Fighting Dick Hyland would do as a substitute, and Condon has answered in the affirmative. Thus if Hyland can make the weight, Bayley will fight in Calgary on the 29th, despite Brown's withdrawal. The exact terms as set forth by Condon for the Bayley-Brown contest are demanded in the new contest, and Burns says he will meet them.

ROAST FOR REFEREE

But Edmonton Fight Fans Disagree with Newspaper Critic.

Edmonton, Oct. 18.—The Edmonton Journal makes a rabid attack on Referee Woody for his decision in the Scaler-Barrieau bout, claiming that Scaler was the victor in every round but one. **RE VOTERS' LIST.**

I am instructed by the City Council to publish the following notice with regard to voting at the next municipal election. The persons who will be inserted on the voters' list are as follows:  
1. Owners of real estate. This means any person who has a deed of land registered in the Land Registry Office or an agreement for purchase of land registered in the Registry Office.  
Many persons have land under agreement from the Grand Trunk or the government whose title is not registered in the Land Registry Office, and their right to vote is doubtful. Therefore, voters so situated are advised if possible to register either as householder or license holder.  
2. Any person holding a trade license may vote, but before doing so he must, in October, make a declaration showing his right to vote in Form 1. These forms can be obtained at the City Clerk's office. The declaration must be filed with the City Clerk within forty-eight hours after it is made.  
3. Any householder can vote. A householder means a person who has resided in Prince Rupert from the 1st of January, 1912, and who occupies a dwelling, tenement, hotel or boarding house, or any portion of a dwelling house, tenement, hotel or boarding house. He must also pay rates, taxes or assessments which are not chargeable on land, and which rates, taxes and assessments so paid amount to not less than \$2.00. Water rates and dog licenses do not count. Practically the only tax that can be paid is the road tax, \$2.00, and any person who, being a householder as above described, has already paid his road tax must also make a declaration before he can be placed on the voters' list.  
All voters must be 21 years of age and British subjects.

ing the mill at Woden River. This we expect will be in operation in two or three weeks. It is fitted to cut as high as thirty-five thousand feet of lumber per day. Of course it may not be kept running to the full capacity all the time, but we have in sight about thirty million feet of timber. Mr. George Crane, the prominent Vancouver contractor, is deeply interested with us and it will be under his careful supervision that the lumbering and logging industries will be carried on.

Mr. D. Hazelton, an experienced boat builder from California, will be in charge of the boat building yard, where gasoline and small power boats will be constructed, while Mr. G. J. Campbell will have supervision over the farming community.

"The ladies and young girls will be employed in the glove factory.

"A very important item in our plan is the establishment of an industrial school, where mechanical arts and agricultural science will be taught, as well as the usual branches of English.

"It will take an immense amount of labor to bring our land under tillage, but we intend first to clear and cultivate a ten acre patch of ground as an experiment. Here every vegetable and grain which we think is suited for growth in the mild climate of the island will be given a chance. Then we will know exactly what will produce the most."

Mr. Watson is a very quiet man, with great, sympathetic blue eyes and hands that show plainly that the work of clearing the land and starting the big project is not left by him for the members of his flock to do. It was a hard matter to get him to tell anything of his own work, but he is loud in the praise of the efforts of his fellow workers and his great friend and neighbor, Rev. (Father) Hogan, for whom he has the greatest admiration.
