

JACK JOHNSON NEARLY LYNCHED BY ANGRY MOB

BULGARIAN FORCES CAPTURE TURKISH FORTS AT ADRIANOPLE AFTER HARD BATTLE

BULGARIANS CAPTURE TURKISH FORTS AFTER DESPERATE FIGHT

MANY DIE IN BATTLE AT ADRIANOPLE BEFORE TURKS DESERT FORTIFICATIONS AND WITHDRAW INTO THE CITY—BULGARIAN LOSS VERY HEAVY.

Vienna, Oct. 20.—Despatches received here from the seat of war say that the Bulgarian forces are operating against Adrianople and have captured two of the outer forts guarding the Turkish city after some desperate fighting.

Both sides suffered heavy losses in the conflict. Time after time the invaders charged against the outer works under the heavy bombardment of their artillery, and it was only after a great many had fallen that the Turks reluctantly withdrew.

G. T. P. MAKE NICE SHOWING OF GRAHAM ID. VEGETABLES

PRODUCTS OF LAWN HILL SOIL ON DISPLAY IN G. T. P. TICKET OFFICE WINDOW ARE ATTRACTING MUCH FAVORABLE COMMENT—GOOD LAND.

Occupying the entire window of one side of the G. T. P. ticket office on Centre street is a fine exhibit of vegetables that have been grown this summer in the neighborhood of Queen Charlotte City, on Graham Island. The display, which consists of a portion of the exhibits that were shown at the Lawn Hill exhibition a week ago, though necessarily having suffered somewhat from repeated handling and transit, are in excellent shape, and rival anything that could be shown by farmers in any part of the Dominion. Sizing up the exhibit and noticing the size and quality of the varied display, which includes potatoes, cabbage, cauliflower, beets, carrots, turnips, parsnips, mangels, horse-radish, together with grain and timothy grass, two things are impressed upon one's mind—first, the undoubted richness and fertility of the soil of the islands,

and, secondly, the excellent and intelligent class of settler that must be there to produce such results.

Exhibits such as this one, and others from the fertile valleys of the Skeena, prove indubitably that we have a vast agricultural country tributary to Prince Rupert, which, in the very near future, and upon the completion of the railroad, when settlers will throng in to take up the land and get ready for farming operations, will put us upon a par from an agricultural standpoint with any portion of the Dominion. Prince Rupert is in a fair way to have the local market supplied entirely with farm products grown in the surrounding district.

The fact that such an excellent start has been made will ensure numerous other settlers coming in right away seeking to emulate the successes achieved by these early pioneers.

RETURNS FROM SURVEY CRUISE

Dominion Government Steamer Lilloet Finishes Work of Season in Chartering Coast

The Dominion hydrographic steamer Lilloet, Captain Musgrave in charge as head of the party, arrived in port on Saturday, having completed her season's work in the waters of this northern district.

After having taken on a supply of coal for her trip down she will leave for Esquimalt to go into winter quarters. Captain Musgrave states that the work this summer has been most satisfactory, the task of charting the shore line of Hecate Straits on the Queen Charlotte side, having been the main work proceeded with. On account of the tremendous shore line it will take several seasons for one boat to complete the survey. The most recent work done was by a party at the entrance to the harbor of Paoof and Skincuttle Inlet.

REPORT SAYS TURKS WIPED OUT REGIMENT OF SERBIAN ARMY

UNCONFIRMED REPORTS OF ANNIHILATION OF SERBIAN REGIMENT CAUSES CONSIDERABLE EXCITEMENT IN BUDAPEST AND LONDON.

Budapest, Oct. 21.—Meagre reports received here yesterday, which, however, cannot be verified, say that the Turkish troops practically annihilated a Serbian regiment yesterday at Novibazar. Considerable excitement is manifested in the report and anxious

crowds are waiting further intelligence.

London, Oct. 21.—Unconfirmed rumors that a Serbian regiment was totally wiped out yesterday by Turkish forces are causing considerable interest here and the bulletin boards are being watched closely.

ANGRY CROWD ATTEMPT TO LYNCH JACK JOHNSON FOR ABDUCTING YOUNG LADY

Colored Champion Narrowly Escapes With His Life When Infuriated Mob Chase Him With the Intention of Lynching Him ---Defense Fund Raised in Five Minutes

(Special to Daily News.)
Chicago, Ill., Oct. 21.—A howling mob of several hundred infuriated white men blocked traffic for several hours on Saturday in front of the First National Bank in an effort to reach Jack Johnson, the champion pugilist of the world, and lynch him for the abduction of a young girl, Lucille Cameron, for which he was arrested earlier in the day and was released on bail of \$1,500. He escaped through the rear door of the bank and made his getaway, but later the mob surrounded him again and it was only after

a desperate struggle between the citizens and the six strong pugilists who acted as a bodyguard for him and the coming of the police reserves that he escaped a horrible death. His "golden smile" has vanished and he is wearing a furtive, hunted look.

The Cameron girl was released on \$25,000 bonds to appear as a witness against Johnson and Jeanette Door, who will both be arraigned on charges of engaging in the white slave traffic.

Poplar Bluff, Mo., Oct. 21.—When the report reached here

yesterday that Jack Johnson had been killed by the mother of the girl whom, it is alleged, he abducted, \$1,000 was raised in five minutes to forward to the woman to help her fight the case. The report of the killing proved incorrect and general sorrow was expressed on all sides, as the girl lived in this city and feeling runs very high.

Chicago, Oct. 21.—Jack Johnson and the girl whom he is accused of abducting both say that they will marry in spite of what the law may do.

PASSENGERS EAT ALL THE FOOD ON SOPHIA

Four Hundred Passengers Southbound on Princess Sophia Ate All the Provisions and More Bread Was Ordered by Wireless

Loaded down with outgoing passengers from Alaska and the Yukon, the Princess Sophia called in here on Saturday afternoon about four o'clock. She had over three hundred and fifty first class passengers, her accommodation only being sufficient for two hundred and fifty. This fact necessitated fixing up quarters on the lower freight deck for the surplus.

Sleeping places having been provided for the returning Alaskans and Klondykers, the next thing to be considered was how to feed such a horde. Bread com-

pletely ran out before reaching Prince Rupert. A wireless reaching the city about 11 a.m. on the day they reached here, Mr. Clifton, of Clifton's Bakery had the task of rustling 600 loaves before the ship reached port. He performed this Herculean task, a wagon load of bread being on the dock to greet them. After being held on board some little time, whilst the doctor and the customs officer performed their official duties, the big good natured crowd were let loose and swarmed up town to take in the sights of the city. Although be-

ing given fair warning to look out for the quarter hour whistle, the Sophia pulled out, leaving six passengers behind, the latter rushing pell mell down to the wharf just a few minutes too late. It looked at first as if they would have to be enforced visitors to Prince Rupert for a few days, but the good natured and ever obliging Captain Campbell, although having to contend with a strong outgoing tide, made another landing, much to the rejoicing and delight of the stranded ones and the spectators both on the wharf and the ship.

G. T. P. WINTER SCHEDULE SOON

Only One Boat per Week Will Operate Between this City and South on G.T.P. Run

Commencing next week the G. T. P. steamship service between this port and the south will be weekly instead of semi-weekly as at present.

The Prince Rupert's last trip under weekly service will be leaving Seattle the 23rd, Vancouver 24th, arriving at Prince Rupert on the 26, leaving southbound October 28th. The Wednesday steamer arriving at Rupert will be continued (the Prince George Rupert on this mid-week run on trip of November 6th).

The Queen Charlotte Island-Stewart-Granby Bay schedule will be altered to a two-weekly service for the winter months, as has been the custom in the past. The last trips under weekly schedule will be leaving Prince Rupert to Masset on the 23rd of October; to Granby on the 26th, and Skidegate, Queen Charlotte City, etc., on the 27th.

After these dates trips will commence to Granby Bay and Stewart, November 6th; Masset, November 8th; Queen Charlotte City, November 10th, and every two weeks thereafter.

LOADING UP THE PRESS.

From the office of the chief government whip at Ottawa, upon letter paper bearing the royal arms, and marked "Personal and Important," there was addressed on October 5th a circular letter to Conservative editors. It is well that the country should know how political "news" is obtained nowadays. The letter says: "Attached herewith you will find several galleys of news matter of a political character. This is the beginning of a free service for the purpose of giving wider publicity to authentic government news and other political information of a timely character. Your paper has been recommended to be placed on the list in the belief that you will be willing to make use of the service. This service will be weekly and entirely without cost to the papers receiving it. All that is required in return is that a copy of your paper be sent to the undersigned in order that a check may be kept on the matter published.

"You will notice the articles are varied in character and tone so as to suit particular requirements. I would be pleased to hear from you as to the quality of the matter which would suit you best in order that I may know what to send you from week to week if you take advantage of the service. "This service will not be furnished the large city papers, and overlapping will be avoided as far as possible if you

will let me know what other papers have a circulation in your territory.

"The news matter will be absolutely authentic, and the requirements of particular localities will be considered. You may use the matter dated from here as a 'special' or as editorial comment, just as you choose.

"The news matter will be up-to-date, and written by a staff thoroughly in touch with their subjects.

"Kindly let me hear from you by return mail as to the amount you can make use of and the particular kind of matter you require.

"I ask you to consider this letter confidential."

Among the things that were sent out on this first week's service were statements that in connection with the Hudson Bay Railway the Hon. Frank Cochrane "in one short year has accomplished more than the Liberals did in fifteen years of power"; that the Hon. Dr. Reid, minister of customs, "with vision and foresight, suited his ways to an expanding country."

As this service is for Canada, it will be interesting to watch the local Tory press and endeavor to pick out the load-stuff.

Probably the press agency will be patterned after McBride's press service, of which Charlie Gibbons is the head. This agency also does not hesitate to send out copy in official envelopes bearing the royal coat-of-arms.

HAYSPORT GIRL DEAD IN DITCH

Hotel Waitress Leaves to Visit Friends and Is Found Next Day Drowned in Slough.

Lying on her back in a shallow puddle of water hardly sufficient to cover her, the dead body of Violet Casterdon was discovered just outside the hotel at Haysport. Miss Casterdon was a young English girl of eighteen years of age but recently out from home, and an employee of the hotel. From information to hand it appears that she left the hotel shortly after 9 o'clock Thursday evening, presumably to visit a lady friend, to whom she had come out from England, who resided a short distance away. It being dark and the sidewalk narrow with no guard rail, she must have stumbled and fell into the slough, a distance of seven or more feet. The people of the hotel were not aware that she had not returned in the usual way until the next morning when she did not appear at work.

At about 7 a. m. the next day Eugene McGrath, who was on his way to his work noticed the deceased in the position above stated.

The Provincial authorities were immediately notified and Constable Doolittle left for Haysport, returning Saturday morning with the body. There is nothing to lead to the supposition that death was brought about other than by an unfortunate accident, and it has not been decided up to the present whether an inquest will be necessary.

Crown of Galicia Arrived.

Saturday morning there arrived in port the big freighter Crown of Galicia, carrying the steel pipe for the city's future water supply from Shawatlans Lake. She left Liverpool on July 26th last with an assorted cargo, calling at several ports in South America en route. Captain Halliday, her skipper, a bluff and ruddy old Scotsman, reports the trip having been accomplished in excellent weather as the time made from Liverpool would cause one to imagine, no adventures of a very special nature having occurred during the voyage.

NEWS NOTES OF THE GREAT WEST

Vancouver bank clearings for the past fiscal week show an increase of \$1,300,000 over the corresponding week last year.

The last section of the railway connecting Vancouver with the Kootenays is contracted for. It will cost \$100,000 a mile. The contract is for thirty-eight miles.

In Regina, on the recommendation of the Board of Trade, a committee has been appointed to organize a company for the construction of a million bushel elevator.

In Winnipeg, a new skating rink is announced, to accommodate four thousand persons.

Brandon will build a new school, to cost \$75,000.

In Portage la Prairie, the Methodist Church announces an extension to cost \$10,000.

In Moosejaw, a new Canadian Pacific townsite, Assiniboia, Sask., was placed on the market. The first day's sales were over three hundred lots, with total receipts of \$138,000. Assiniboia is situated on the new Weyburn to Lethbridge line. It will become an important divisional point. The steel will be to Assiniboia before winter.

In Calgary, the United States land selling organization of the department of natural resources of the Canadian Pacific Railway, the general agents in Canada and publicity correspondents will hold a convention on October 25th and 26th. They will leave on the afternoon of the 26th in a special train to tour Central and Northern Alberta and Saskatchewan. This meeting is in line with the policy instituted by J. S. Dennis, assistant to the president, head of the department of natural resources, of half yearly meetings, and agent to work in co-operation all over. At a banquet on the evening of the 25th inst., the winners in the Canadian Pacific alfalfa growing competition will receive prizes.

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

Mathewson was never greater in his big league career than then, but no man great enough to beat 17 ball players ever lived. Three times he fought back the Boston rush and then carried them into two extra inning sessions, despite his ragged support. In his three contests he allowed but two earned runs, while the Giants scored eleven runs, nine being presented to the Red Sox through the miserable support. Backed up as he should have been, Christy would have won two games, while the other was a fair draw. Giants Outplayed Boston. Beyond sympathy for Mathewson in defensive play, there is certainly no roar coming. Herzog Star of Series. The star of the series is Herzog, the Giants' sterling third baseman. He outplayed, outbatted and outscored all the others, fighting his way through the eight innings without an error. "Red" Murray is next in line. On form the Boston stars are Yerkes, Stahl and Hooper. Summed up, it was a series which included the wildest mixture of brilliant and wretched playing, impossible catches and easy chances marred, wonderful and bush league pitching, desperate and dumb work on the bases—a veritable swirl of all that goes to make up baseball from every angle of the game.

SPORT CLIPPINGS

Outfielder Jack Dalton, of the Toronto Club, has been sold to Brooklyn of the National League. Dalton has acted as utility outfielder for Toronto nearly all season. Dalton was looked upon as a regular in the spring, but the sensational playing of Benny Myers forced him to the bench. George R. MINING NOTES OF THE CANAL

The annual general meeting of the Red Cliff company is to be held in Vancouver on the 31st inst. Locally no information is obtainable in regard to when the big mine will resume development or of the proposed New English company to take over the same in conjunction with the operation of a smelter plant.

It is reported from the Northern Terminus that good ore is being encountered in the face of the drifts being run from the 50 foot level in the shaft. A considerable quantity of high grade silver ore has already been sacked.

The main cross tunnel in the Red Reef is now in a distance of over 110 feet.

Foreman Pat Daley of the Salmon-Bear River is crosscutting to the ore body in the lower tunnel.

The drift in the Indian Mines is in a full face of the ore carrying galena and gold. A splendid feature of the ore is the very persistent gold values to be had, averaging around \$10 per ton.

Supplies are being taken in to the Cascade Falls, wood stacked and the camp put in shape to work throughout the winter.

Harry P. Gibson and Pete Ronn own the Gibson group of six claims across the railway track from the townsite of Bitter Creek and about 1,000 feet above the railway.

Pack horses were taken over to the Marmot River by Bruggy and McGee, who purpose sending out a trial shipment of high grade silver and gold ore from the Montana group.

Grant Mahood is still continuing work on the Daly group, which consists principally of open cuts following the course of the ore.
