## GREEK FLEET BLOCKADES TURKISH PORT OF LEMNOS

### ROOSEVELT IS RECOVERED SUFFICIENTLY TO BE ABLE TO SPEAK AT MASS MEETING

#### MEXICAN TROUBLE LOOMS LARGE AND MAY INVOLVE THE REPUBLIC

UNITED STATES MAY BE EMBROILED WITH MEXICO—SECRETARY RETURNS FROM JAPAN AND HARBOR OF VERA CRUZ IS CLOSED—ARMY TEN MILES AWAY.

Washington, D. C., Oct. 21.—The return of Secretary Knox from Japan and the presence in this city of Lane Wilson, ambassador to Mexico, and important developments in the military situation at Vera Cruz are the elements serving to concentrate attention on the Mexican situation. Reports say that everything is quiet in Vera Cruz and are likely to remain so unless the Federal gunboat bombards the city. General Beltran's forces are about ten miles from the city. The harbor is closed, and the United States may be dragged into the situation if the Sigurana starts to unload.

#### DUKE PRAISES LOYAL SPIRIT

H. R. H. Duke of Connaught Praises Spirit of Loyalty He Found Throughout Canada.

Toronto, Oct. 21.—At a Canadian Club luncheon in his honor, the Duke of Connaught said that he was impressed during his trip to the West at the spirit of loyalty apparent everywhere, and he was totally disillusioned as to the story which he had heard that the West favored separation. One thing that he noticed was the democracy of the country, which still retained the principles of monarchy across the sea, solving one of the greatest problems of modern times. The importance of education and the means for providing it throughout Canada drew from the Royal Highness most favorable comment.

#### TEN STATIONS ON COAST

Establishment of Wireless Station at Alert Bay Makes Tenth on E. C. Coast—Helps Ships.

Making the tenth wireless station on the British Columbia coast, the Alert Bay station, it is anticipated, will be ready for operation by the middle of December. The site has already been cleared and the operator's dwelling begun. The establishment of this station will ensure any vessel traversing the inside passage to Prince Rupert being in wireless communication during the entire voyage. It is rumored that another wireless station is to be erected on Langara Island in the Queen Charlottes. Pachena and Estevan are having new wireless instruments installed.

#### GREEK FLEET BLOCKADES HARBOR OF TURKS

Grecian Admiral Closes Port of Lemnos and Declares Blockade--- King George is Congratulated by Brother Sovereigns on Action of Invading Turkey

(Special to Daily News.)  
Athens, Oct. 21.—King George of Greece received telegraphic replies from his three allies in reply to his message that the Greeks had crossed the frontier. King Ferdinand of Bulgaria said that the news filled him with the sentiment of sublime confidence that the Almighty was defending the rights of the weak and oppressed against the oppressor,

and he trusted that his fervent prayers for the success of the joint efforts of the allied armies would be crowned with success. King Nicholas of Montenegro replied very cordially to the message and expressed his sincere hopes for the success of the Greek portion of the allied forces. King Peter of Serbia hailed with confidence the arrival of the Greek army and expressed the

hope that in every action the Greeks would be victorious. The Aegean squadron of the Greek fleet, under the command of Admiral Countouriotis, arrived at Kastro, the capital of the Island of Lemnos, and commanded the authorities to surrender. When this was refused he anchored and landed troops, which advanced to the county town. A blockade was proclaimed of the ports of Lemnos and others on the coast.

#### FIREMEN ARE GRANTED INCREASE OF SALARY BY CITY COUNCIL YESTERDAY

Council Transact Very Little Important Business---Assessor Sends in Very Good Report---Council Discuss Signs on Public Parks and Revoke Former Ruling on Subject

The last performance of the City Council was very tame and the rate payers who attended in the hopes of seeing a good "show" were disappointed. No angry discussions marred the tranquility of the scene and His Worship did not need the assistance of the police in maintaining order. The stage settings were the same as at the last performance, and the usual amount of tobacco smoke clouds hovered overhead, but although they darkened at times, especially when the usual discussion on signs was before for the house, no thunder resulted. The Mayor did not play his part with his usual vim, and evidently forgot his lines, for he did not accuse Alderman Morrissey of attempting to "scalp" him, nor did he say that Alderman Clayton was "after him." Alderman Morrissey and the other Council members did not start any angry discussions.

The city assessor and collector submitted a report of the state of the finances of the waterworks, electric and telephone departments, showing arrears, receipts and expenditures. A letter of invitation from the Ladies' Aid of the Methodist Church to attend their annual dinner on the evening of Thanksgiving Day, Monday next, was read and accepted with thanks. Mr. W. Clarke Durant, manager of the Prince Rupert Hydro Electric Co., wrote stating that upon his recent visit to Vancouver he had consulted with his company upon the matter of their supplying water at the city's gates, and a proposition would be submitted to the Council in the immediate future.

Dr. Cade, the city health officer, reported on the case of Findlay Munro, who had lately been discharged from the hospital and was unable at present to properly take care of himself, recommending that a grant of \$30 a month be made until such time as he was able to work again. Some little discussion followed as to a precedent being established in cases of this kind. Alderman Morrissey thinking that the Provincial government should enact some legislation affecting struggling municipalities in this regard. The Mayor said that in view of the handsome grant made to the hospital by the government, he supposed that they would consider they had done all that was possible along these lines at the present. A motion to make the grant was passed, to be active from month to month upon the

report of the medical health officer. A telegram has been received from J. N. Wilson, the newly appointed superintendent of the electric light plant, stating that he was leaving Vancouver this week and would be in Prince Rupert on Saturday. An application from three of the city firemen asking for an increase in their pay from \$80 to \$90 per month next came up for consideration before the Council. The three men in question—Firemen Parker, Morrison and McDonald—are able and experienced in their work and have given the highest satisfaction since being in the employ of the city. They stated that they felt justified in their request on account of the increased cost of living. While this increase was asked earlier than it would be allowed under the salary bylaw, the men agreed to forego any further increase for a year. With the exception of Alderman Bullock-Webster, the Council were all inclined to accede to the request, the former stating that whilst he did not in the least depreciate the efficiency of the men in question, or the reasonableness of their request, he thought in view of the approaching election and the possibility of several of the present aldermen again offering themselves as candidates for another term of office, it would look as if they were attempting to make good

fellows of themselves to ensure favorable consideration from the electors in the near future. Alderman Montgomery thought that if the former was so anxious not to appear in that light it was a pity that he had been so urgent to make a grant of \$50 toward the Rifle Club's Thanksgiving Day shoot. Alderman Clayton took occasion to inform the Council that whilst he was in favor of granting the request, he had not the slightest intention of offering himself next year for reelection. The motion for the granting of the increase was passed. L. W. Patmore wrote requesting payment of the sum of \$551.80, the amount of the costs taxed against the city for quashing the bylaws. City Solicitor Peters said the account was in order and as Mr. Patmore was anxious it should be paid before the end of the month in the usual way, a motion was passed ordering the city clerk to make out a cheque for the amount. A further such of \$20.75, being fees for their own solicitor acting in Vancouver for them, was ordered paid. The application of Superintendent James Matthews of the electric light plant for the payment of \$27.00 for use of his typewriter upon city work did not meet the approval of any of the councilmen, and will not be paid. A report of the city pound keeper showed that up to date this year \$711 had been received for licenses and poundage fees. The Board of Works recommended that a large gilded wooden sign be placed over the city hall. The recommendation was passed. Some discussion followed in regard to the question of the placing of big signs and boardings on city property. An order had been issued some time back ordering all such signs to be removed. This apparently had only been taken seriously by a few of the offending advertisers. Shortly before the arrival of the Duke of Connaught some drastic measures were considered necessary and Alderman Dybhava, as chairman of the Board of Works, had himself gone around the proposed route of the royal progress and with assistants forcibly removed the "naughtiest" of them from the possible gaze of the historic procession. The majority of the aldermen seemed in favor of allowing the signs to remain as evidencing the

Editorial Notes and Clippings

AN UNFAIR METHOD.

Mayor Newton has signified his intention of running again by publishing in the Empire a front page article warning the electors against sundry things.

The fact that the granting of the hydro electric franchise is mentioned proves conclusively the methods by which he hopes to retain his position as chief magistrate of the city.

That he would drag the scheme into the political arena before a definite proposal has been submitted to the Council, and while at the same time he is asking the company to submit rates for power at the city gates, and is warning against the company's proposals no matter what they may be, proves this.

This paper does not hold any briefs for the Hydro Electric Company, but as a plain business proposition no man will say that it is just to either the city or the company to condemn the scheme before it is considered. The Council did not even intend to let the rate payers know what the proposal of the company was, and they would still have been in ignorance as to the offers of the Hydro Electric Company had not the information been obtained elsewhere and published.

After consideration the best thing that the citizens can do may be to keep the corporation out of the city, but, on the other hand, it may be very advantageous to the rate payers to have it doing business here, and the method adopted by the Mayor in practically declaring war against the company before negotiations have been properly entered into will not meet with the approval of any thinking rate payer.

AN "EMERGENCY" CONTRIBUTION.

By way of excusing the proposition to vote a contribution of \$30,000,000 to the British navy without first asking the people of Canada whether or not they want to adopt that kind of defense policy, it is urged that this is merely an emergency measure and that in due course a plebiscite will

be taken on the programme proper.

If, however, a gift of thirty millions is merely a temporary expedient, what in the name of common sense and Canadian finance is the Premier's idea of the annual naval estimates of the future?

And, again, how many "temporary contributions" are to be proposed while the government's naval policy is still in the making?

The fact is, Mr. Borden is sparing for wind. He knows that the moment he commits himself on this question to something definite without going to the people with his programme, he parts with his chief supporters in Quebec.

He is trying, therefore, to gain time. If he can get his "emergency" contribution through on the understanding that he will take a plebiscite later, the naval problem will be solved for another year, possibly for longer than that.

Long before the issue becomes a live one again, indeed, he may bring off a general election, or, if not, something may happen to relieve him of the necessity of choosing on which particular horn of his present dilemma he will be impaled. The chapter of accidents is part of the true politician's faith.

If, then, Messrs. Monk and Nantel should be prevailed upon to accept the "emergency" contribution, it would be possible for Mr. Borden to run his campaign in the provinces inhabited by English speaking people on the strength of what the government had done for the British navy, while his French supporters carefully assured their constituents that this was merely a temporary measure, and that never, never again would their money be taken to pay the soldiers and sailors of Albion.

It rather looks at this time of writing, however, as if Messrs. Monk and Nantel would decline to pull Mr. Borden's chestnuts out of the fire, and in that case it will be quite impossible for the Conservative party to repeat its recent performance of taking its profits from the exploitation of one propaganda in one part of the country and at the same time from the exploitation of another diametrically opposed to the first elsewhere.

In other words, Mr. Borden seems on the eve of discovering that the gentleman who said it was impossible to fool all the people all the time was approximately correct in his estimate.—Vancouver World.

fact that this is a live city and also that the erection of the same had been the means of giving employment to a number of citizens and circulating a considerable amount of money.

Alderman Morrissey was particularly emphatic in championing the cause of the signs, which, he stated, in many cases were of a highly artistic nature and removed the stigma from the city that it might be taken for a cemetery. The main difficulty was as to what course was to be pursued in regard to those citizens who had taken the order seriously and removed their signs. Were they to be requested to put them up again? The Mayor said that many of the Council did not understand the motion at the time it was put or they would not have voted in the way they did.

Alderman Douglas promptly replied that there was too much of that kind of voting going on, to which the Mayor replied that perhaps the Council were not all as comprehensive as the worthy finance minister.

The motion to stringently carry out the order for the removal of the signs on city property was finally lost, there being a tie vote, the Mayor's casting vote being against the removal.

In committee of the whole with Alderman Bullock-Webster in the chair, the Council discussed at some length the matter of finance. The subject was the rate of interest that municipal bonds should carry. Mayor Newton had discussed with Mr. Holt of the Royal Bank and had been advised by that gentleman that 5 per cent. would in future have to be yielded by these municipal bonds, he was therefore in favor of raising the rate to that amount. After some discussion, in which it was stated that the Bank of Montreal was not in favor of advancing the rate, the city solicitor giving the bank's reason for that opinion, and expressions from several of the aldermen that it would be unwise to act too precipitately in the matter, the Mayor's motion to raise the rate was lost.

At Work Hauling Pipe

L. A. Barbeau, the well known local transfer man, who has the contract for the city for hauling the pipe that arrived for the city's waterworks system the other day on the Crown of Galicia, has a string of teams busily engaged transferring the pipe on the wharf as fast as it can be unloaded from the ship. It gives quite a busy appearance to Centre Street, the making of the very considerable grade by the fine teams that are engaged upon the work being a matter of considerable interest to the many citizens who pass up and down to the wharf during the day. It is expected that the unloading will occupy the remainder of the week. The pipe that will be used for the Shawatians Lake part of the work will be handled by Captain Abington, of the Rupert Marine Iron Works.

He must also pay rates, taxes or assessments which are not charged on land, and which rates, taxes and assessments so paid amount to not less than \$2.00. Water rates and dog licenses do not count. Practically the only tax that can be paid is the road tax, \$2.00, and any person who, being a householder as above described, has already paid his road tax must also make a declaration before he can be placed on the voters' list. All voters must be 21 years of age and British subjects. ERNEST A. WOODS, City Clerk.
