## RUSSIA AND AUSTRIA NOW PREPARING FOR WAR

KANSAS CITY FINANCIER WILL OPERATE FLEET OF HALIBUT BOATS FROM PRINCE RUPERT

### WAR IS EXPECTED BETWEEN RUSSIA AND AUSTRIA INSIDE SIX MONTHS

Foreign Diplomats Are Pessimistic as to the Probability of War  
---Russia is Preparing to Transport Troops---Kamil Pasha Predicts All Europe Will be Involved

(Special to Daily News.)  
London, Oct. 22.—A gigantic war, involving all Europe, instigated by a clash between Austria and Russia, is the alarming prediction of Kamil Pasha, president of the Turkish Council, in today's issue of the London Chronicle. All foreign diplomats here are pessimistic over the outlook, and Lloyd's today is charging 15 per cent. for insurance against war within six months between Russia and Austria.

Both Austria and Russia are watching the Balkan war situation with hungry eyes, each

standing ready to grab desirable Turkish territory at the slightest pretext. Russia today has 1,800 cars ready to transport a force of 80,000 men to the scene the moment Austria makes a move in the direction of intervention.

Should either Austria or Russia, all diplomats here agree, attempt any annexation move it would bring all the other powers together in the most disastrous war in the history of the world.

Kamil Pasha says the present disturbance in the Balkans is a prelude to a general conflict. He predicts that Austria will pre-

cipitate the clash and that the other European powers will be forced to join unless they care to stand idly by while Russia and Austria split up the Ottoman Empire.

A despatch from Constantinople indicates that a revolution is threatened in Turkey, but most of the Turkish government officials scoff at the report. Estimates of the killed so far on both sides as a result of Turkey's clash with the Balkan states is placed today at 4,000.

The Turkish and Greek fleets are expected to come together soon in a desperate battle for mastery of the seas.

#### FEDERAIS ADVANCE

Federal Army Advanced Against Vera Cruz—Des Moines Looks After Foreign Interests.

Vera Cruz, Oct. 23.—Federal troops commenced to advance against the city today at noon. General Diaz calmly awaited their arrival. Foreigners took refuge on the boats in the harbor, while the consuls boarded the U. S. battleship Des Moines, which is here to protect foreign interests.

## CHRISTIANS ARE MASSACRED BY TURKS BEFORE KOTSCHANA IS LEFT BY THEM

Christians Cut Down in Cold Blood by Turks---Bulgarians Have Many Successes---Greeks Capture City---Boys Petition King Nicholas for Permission to Scout

(Special to Daily News.)

Belgrade, Oct. 23.—The first column of the second Servian army captured the town of Kotschana after desperate fighting. Before retiring, says a report, the Turks massacred all the Christians in the city.

Constantinople, Oct. 23.—Many engagements have occurred along the Bulgarian frontier, the invaders being in nearly all instances victorious. Several important towns have been captured in the vicinity of Adrianople. Many Turks were killed, hundreds were taken prisoners

and three gatling guns were captured by the Bulgarians when they attacked the Turks' retreating from Djumbala.

Athens, Oct. 23.—Five hundred Greeks landed from the fleet blockading the island of Lemnos and occupied the capital of the island, Kastro, today. Three Turkish officers and fifty-two men were captured.

Athens, Oct. 22.—Two Greek regiments which invaded Turkey near Arta yesterday are occupying Grimbova Heights. The King and his premier are going to the front.

Gettinsie, Oct. 23.—School boys here have formed a corps of scouts and offered their services to King Nicholas. Some are less than ten years old.

Sofia, Oct. 23.—The war office has forbidden relatives saying goodby to soldiers at the railroad stations.

Judge Young left on this morning's train for Hazelton to hold court. Accompanying him were the following members of the legal profession in Prince Rupert: Messrs. Fred Peters, Adair Cars, and Linnell. Several cases are to be disposed of.

## WILL OPERATE A FLEET OF HALIBUT BOATS FROM CITY

J. S. SMITH WILL OPERATE A LARGE FLEET OF HALIBUT BOATS FROM PRINCE RUPERT TO BANKS—WEALTHY GRAIN DEALER FROM KANSAS

Mr. J. Sidney Smith, a wealthy Kansas City grain dealer, who was a visitor to the city few months back and who was greatly struck with Prince Rupert and its commercial possibilities, returned here this morning on the Prince George.

Mr. Smith, who remained upon his last visit several weeks before leaving, decided to go into the fish business in Northern B. C. just as he said to a News representative this morning "for something to do." While in the South he has been busily engaged in making arrangements for the building of a fleet of halibut boats, two of which will be ready in about two months' time, when they will be brought up here to start active operations. The boats, which are being built in

Vancouver, will be of the latest and most modern type, about 90 feet long, and will be furnished with all the most up-to-date appliances to make a success of the prosecution of the fishing industry.

Mr. Smith, who is a genuine and enthusiastic booster for Prince Rupert, says he is confident of the great future before this city and wants to get in the game and be prepared to do business by the time that the railway is completed. He will remain here a few days before returning south to attend to the final business of getting ready the first of his fleet to sail for this port.

COMING TO B. C.

#### AMERICAN CO. IS A COMBINE

Hundreds of Doukhobors Leave Saskatchewan for this Province

Inquiry Into United States Shoe Machinery Co., Boston, Proves That It Is a Combine.

Nelson, Oct. 22.—Over six hundred Doukhobors, men, women and children, passed through Nelson this week on a special train bound for Glade and Brilliant. About the same number were last night on the Crow's Nest line on their way to the same settlements. All came from Saskatchewan.

This influx of 4,200 of Pete Verigin's people will increase the total number in British Columbia, where the chief colonies are at Brilliant and Grand Forks, by nearly 5 per cent.

About 250 of the newcomers are children under the age of 5 years and there is a large percentage of children under 12 years.

Ottawa, Oct. 22.—The board which inquired into the charge that the United States Shoe Machinery Company of Boston, which holds all patents for modern shoe machinery, is a combination in restraint of trade, has reported against the company. This case was instituted by shoe manufacturers of Quebec when Hon. Mackenzie King was minister of labor and has steadily been pressed. Decision means that the company's patents may be canceled and if it ignores finding of board it can be fined \$1,000 per day. This was the first case heard under the Anti-Combines Act.

**WORK FOR RUPERT  
AND THE NORTH.**

In commenting on the proposed fair to be held in this city next fall, the *Omineca Herald* whole heartedly endorses the scheme, which will bring the producer and the consumer together and be the means of cultivating a bond of fellowship which must work to the advancement of the country. It will also stimulate an interest in the Interior claims the *Herald*, which does not now exist in the minds of the Prince Rupert citizens.

Prince Rupert must depend a great deal on the wealth of the Interior, as well as the riches of the fisheries and islands, and while this city is the natural outlet for the Interior, and the produce must necessarily come this way, it becomes the citizens to lose no opportunity of cultivating the very best of feeling with the hardy settlers and miners who are developing the land and mines of the North and are providing the backing for this city.

Every opportunity should be taken by the merchants and citizens of Prince Rupert to encourage the development of the land to the east of us and advance the products of that section of the province in preference

to those from the South. If this is done, and no opportunity is lost to "boost" the neighboring communities, much of the trade that now passes Prince Rupert and goes to the mail order houses of the east will come to this city.

Not only must the Prince Rupertites "boost" their neighbors, but they must commence the work at home, and buy everything possible from local merchants in preference to sending the money out of the city. While we don't think that many persons send out of Prince Rupert for their merchandise, the practice is growing in the west of sending to the mail order houses of Eastern Canada for goods which often are not worth the cost of bringing them here.

When a merchant invests thousands of dollars in a city and lays in a stock suitable to the requirements of the community he should be patronized, even if his prices are a few cents higher than those catalogued by a mail order house. He has had faith enough to invest his all in the place and is doing his share to build up and advance the city, and it is incumbent on the citizens to do their portion by buying as much at home as they possibly can.

## IMPRISONMENT REST OF LIFE

Indian Murderer is Sentenced to Life Imprisonment for Killing Constable

Calgary, Alta., Oct. 22.—Life imprisonment was the sentence imposed upon Jim Ham, an Indian, also known as Mike Running Wolf, convicted of killing H. N. W. M. P. Constable Francis Davis near Bassano, June 3rd last. The jury was out less than an hour and found the defendant guilty of manslaughter.

## G. T. P. MUST CARRY C. N. R. FREIGHT, SAYS H. H. STEVENS

VANCOUVER MEMBER OF PARLIAMENT SAYS THAT THE G. T. P. MUST CARRY FREIGHT FOR C. N. R. CONSTRUCTION  
—HE WILL FORCE THEM TO DO SO.

Vancouver, Oct. 22.—Asked regarding the complaint which Palmer Bros. & Henning, contractors working on the C. N. R. construction work west of Edmonton, are alleged to be making against the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway for alleged discrimination in hauling freight between Fitzhugh station and Tete Jaune Cache, Mr. H. H. Stevens, M. P., who has been approached by the C. N. R. contractors and others interested, said:

"Yes, I will take up with the Dominion government the complaint which is being made against the Grand Trunk Pacific for refusing to carry materials and equipment between Fitzhugh station and Tete Jaune Cache, a distance of fifty miles, for the contractors who are doing the C. N. R. construction work in that neighborhood."

The Grand Trunk is operating two passenger trains and several freight trains daily over this fifty mile strip of road. They are carrying men, supplies and construction materials for Messrs. Foley, Welch & Stewart, but refuse to carry any materials for the contractors doing the work on the C. N. R. The result is that the C. N. R. contractors are forced to take their materials into the points of distribution by pack mules and wagons.

The reason given by the G. T. P. is that the line is not finished yet and not doing a commercial business. It is being operated, they say, purely as a part of the construction of the rest of the line. I am advised, however, that the G. T. P. is accepting fares and rates for

freight carried for parties other than the contractors doing G. T. P. work.

Their pretext that the line is not finished is, in fact, not in strict conformance with the truth. The line has not been approved, as I understand, by the government. One reason that it is not reported 'finished' is because the bridge at a point near Tete Jaune Cache is not being used as yet. Instead of using it, as could be done now, I am advised, a temporary bridge around the main crossing is used. This is merely to avoid reporting the line finished.

This action of the Grand Trunk Pacific is on a par with the whole policy of the road. The G. T. P. is being built with public funds and public credit of Canada, yet this company seems to

take a pleasure in obstructing legitimate development wherever it would appear to compete with Grand Trunk interests. The fact

has been recently confirmed that it is the intention of this company to violate the spirit of the agreement with the Canadian people by making Boston or some other American port its eastern terminus and to direct all the traffic possible through the United States over the eastern part of their run."

Mr. Stevens intimated that he would use all of his power in Ottawa to have the government open the fifty miles of G. T. P. line now completed between Tete Jaune Cache and Fitzhugh station for C. N. R. as well as G. T. P. construction work. He is preparing data and having maps drawn to uphold his contention.

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## NEWS NOTES OF THE GREAT WEST

In Calgary excavation has been commenced for a ten-story block, to contain stores, offices, and a modern vaudeville theatre. The cost, when completed, will be between \$750,000 and \$1,000,000.

The Anglican church congregation of Edmonton have purchased 200 feet frontage, and will erect a \$90,000 church thereon. The tannery plant opened this spring already finds it necessary to erect an extensive addition as the business has outgrown its capacity.

The ore production from the Boundary and Kootenay mines last week was over 50,000 tons. Demonstrations at Nelson prove the existence of platinum ores in the province.

The city council of Saskatoon is considering the installation of a \$60,000 garbage incinerator.

All records in Winnipeg for grain movement were broken the other day when 1,342 cars were inspected. Nearly all the wheat was of milling grades. All grain was showing remarkably high grade.

A new rink has been announced for Fort William, to cost \$7,000.

**"Uncle Jerry" Arrived Today.**

Mr. J. Kugler, known to nearly all residents of Prince Rupert as "Uncle Jerry," and one of the most popular and enterprising real estate men that this city has ever had, arrived on the Prince George this morning from Vancouver. Mr. Kugler is making a flying trip up to New Hazelton, in which place he is heavily interested. He will leave on tomorrow's train and will endeavor to return on Sunday, in time to catch the Prince Rupert going south on Monday next.

**Busy Scene on Waterfront.**

The G. T. P. tug Escort No. 2 arrived in the harbor yesterday with an unusually heavy tow, consisting of the barge North Bend, the car barge Georgian No. 2 and the Ocean Falls barge No. 4, all bearing lumber for the Lester W. David Co., Ltd. With all the craft and the large steamer Crown of Galacia, together with the Prince George and the British Empire, lying at the waterfront this morning, it made a busy looking scene.

**Declares Dividend.**

The British Columbia Copper Company, Ltd., whose operations are carried on in the Greenwood mining district, have just declared a fifth quarterly dividend of 3 per cent, at New York under date of October 15th. This is of interest to a large number of old residents of the Boundary country at present located in Prince Rupert, as showing the progress and development going on in mining in that part of the province.

**Dies from Cramp.**

One of the settlers on the Klene-a-Klene River informs us that an Indian, One Eye by name, having his home in that locality, was found dead near the bank of the river. He had been missing for about three weeks, his two daughters and their husbands, with another Indian, Tulin, had been hunting for him. They found him with his clothes tied around his neck. The theory is that in fording the stream he was attacked by cramps and died after reaching the bank.—Bella Coola Courier.

**Before the Cadi.**

Two Indians were up before Magistrate Carss this morning on the charge of being drunk. One was fined \$10 and \$2 costs, the other being held to endeavor to find out who supplied him with the liquor. John Duggan, on a charge of vagrancy, was given thirty days in the city bastile.

**RE VOTERS' LIST.**

I am instructed by the City Council to publish the following notice with regard to voting at the next municipal election.

The persons who will be inserted on the voters' list are as follows:

1. Owners of real estate. This means any person who is a holder of land registered in the Land Registry Office, or an agreement for purchase of land registered in the Registry Office.

Many persons have land under agreement from the Grand Trunk or the government, who do not register it in the Land Registry Office, or their right to vote is doubtful. Therefore, voters so situated are advised if possible to register either as householder or license holder.

2. Any person holding a trade license may vote. Persons holding a trade license must make a declaration showing his right to vote in Form 1. These forms can be obtained at the City Clerk's office. The declaration must be filed with the City Clerk, within forty-eight hours after it is made.

3. Any householder can vote. A householder means a person who has resided in Prince Rupert from the 1st of January, 1912, and who occupies a dwelling, tenement, hotel or boarding house, or any portion of a dwelling house, tenement, hotel or boarding house. He must also pay rates, taxes or assessments which are not charged on land, and which rates, taxes or assessments are paid annually not less than \$2.00. Water rates and dog licences do not count. Practically the only tax that can be paid is the road tax, \$2.00, and any person who, being a householder as above described, has already paid his road tax must also make a declaration before he can be placed on the voters' list.

All voters must be 21 years of age and British subjects.
