BULGARIANS CAPTURE LULUBURGES AFTER TERRIBLE TWO-DAY FIGHT

Bulgarians Force Turks to Evacuate Important Position and Retreat---Many Killed and Wounded in Desperate Charges

(Special to Daily News.)
Sofia, Oct. 31.—After two days' desperate fighting the Bulgarian army gained a complete victory over the principal Turkish forces under the command of Nazim Pasha, the minister of war. The Turks retreated in great disorder and the town of Luleburgas fell into the hands of the victorious invaders.

regarding the battle in Thrace has at last been broken and the announcement made that the town of Luleburgas has fallen into the hands of the Bulgarians.

Sofia, Oct. 31.—The returns of the dead and wounded are not in yet from the Bulgarian army in the operations against the town of Luleburgas, but it is understood that they must have been enormous. Although the Turks fought desperately, they were unable to withstand the awful firing of the Bulgarian army and the desperate charges of the invading soldiers. Sullenly the Turks prepared to withdraw, but the Bulgarians charged and recharged their lines until all was in confusion.

THIRTY SETTLERS ARRIVE EN ROUTE TO MASSET WHERE THEY WILL BUILD

Sewell City, on Masset Inlet, Will be Settled by Experienced Eastern Farmers---Thirty Men and Women Arrive ---Land is Very Fertile

Still on board the Prince George, upon which boat they arrived yesterday from the South, and anxiously await the delayed arrival of the Prince John to take them over to Masset, are thirty men, who are enroute to Sewell City, on Graham Island, where they have purchased land and intend to start in right away and prepare homes for themselves and

begin farming on the fertile and rich lands of these well known islands.

Mr. Sewell, of the Star Realty Co. of Vancouver, who gives his name to the embryo city, is accompanying the party, the company of which he is the head having engineered the proposition and have been working for the last two or three years upon the settlement scheme that now is reaching concrete fruition.

There are twenty-five men and five women, who have been previously engaged in farming in Manitoba and the Northern Middle States.

The land is plotted into forty-acre tracts, making them an eighth of a section each in area, so that a family can locate on one or more as their means allow. There is a saw mill in operation upon the ground and this year the government have been engaged upon road building that has been of a most beneficial and satisfactory nature, enabling the prospective settlers to get their sup-

plies and effects upon the ground with little or no difficulty.

This will be practically the first contingent of agricultural settlers that has arrived upon the islands with a fixed purpose in view and with the means and experience to carry the undertaking successfully through. Altogether the prospect is most rosy for the future of the Queen Charlotte Islands, and the district around Masset on Graham Island particularly. They have a bright and live little newspaper, the Masset Leader, a stipendiary magistrate, good hotel and stores, schools, etc. Next spring there is every prospect of things humming in that part of the province and an influx of settlers from the East and Middle West may be expected to start pouring in to take advantage of the opportunities to build up homes, make money and enjoy generally the manifold blessings that fall to the lot of the favored residents of this rich and prosperous portion of the Dominion.

SIR WILFRID LAURIER AND GRIT LEADERS HOLD A CONFERENCE

Ottawa, Oct. 30.—A gigantic conference of the Liberal leaders in the House of Commons was held here today. The conference was headed by Sir Wilfrid Laurier and was for the purpose of discussing the naval policy of the two parties.

After several hours the Liberals, it is rumored, decided to accept the advice of the chief and await developments in the Tory camp.

It was decided to contest the return of Louis Goderre in Hoch-

elaga, who has been appointed to the cabinet in the shuffle following Monk's resignation. With this end in view it is asserted that the Liberals and Nationalists are making advances toward one another.

It is announced that the point on which Mr. Monk resigned had to do with the question of a referendum on the navy and the question of an existence of an emergency. From the foregoing it will be observed that the cleavage possibly lies deeper and that an open break sooner or later was quite inevitable.

It is also recalled that Mr. Monk, previous to the formation of the Borden cabinet, had some sharp passages with prominent members of the Conservative party which probably left a scar which is not entirely healed yet. On one occasion Mr. Monk was accused of a near intrigue against Mr. Borden as leader of the opposition, to which Mr. Monk replied that the newspaper making the accusation was a fanatical organ and that he was told the editor of it was an adept in betrayals and calumnies.

SENATOR BELL OF N. S. DEAD

Aged Senator from Nova Scotia Died Last Night at Montreal—Had Been in Poor Health.

Montreal, Oct. 31.—Hon. Adam C. Bell, senator from Nova Scotia, died here last night. For some time he had been in poor health and lately underwent an operation, from which he never fully recovered.

The deceased senator was born at Pietou, Nova Scotia, November 11th, 1847. He sat in the Nova Scotia Legislature for nine years, resigning at the end of that time to contest the constituency for the Dominion House. This was unsuccessful. He was called to the Senate last year.

MAN ACCUSED OF ROBBERY IS REMANDED FOR MORE EVIDENCE

A. E. M'KENZIE, WHO IS ACCUSED OF ROLLING A DRUNK LAST NIGHT, APPEARED BEFORE THE CADI AND ASKED A REMAND—OTHER CASES.

Magistrate McMullin presided at the police court this morning in the absence of Magistrate Cars, who has gone on a short visit to the lower coast cities.

J. W. McLean, who was before the court a few days ago on a charge of being drunk and let out to be given a chance of earning enough money to pay his fine of \$10 had not made good, but had rather aggravated matters by becoming in the same condition again. He was ordered by the magistrate to serve the ten days.

A. E. McKenzie appeared to answer a charge of attempted theft from the person of William S. Williamson upon the premises of the Empress Hotel Cafe shortly before midnight last evening. From the evidence it appeared that the accused, who is a stranger in the city, having been around the hotel in question on and off for the last week, was noticed last evening about 11:30 by the porter of the hotel standing over Williamson, who was lying in a drunken stupor on a bench in the adjoining pool room, making a systematic and thorough search of the latter's pockets, presumably with the object of robbing him of any money or valuables in his possession. The porter drew the attention of Mr. J. G. Crombie, an accountant in the city, who happened in just at that moment to partake of a late supper at the cafe, and who immediately telephoned the police. Constable Cargill arrived on the scene in a few minutes and took the accused in charge.

A little later the man Williamson was also taken to the police station. Upon the latter being searched he was found to only have in his possession a watch and a pocket knife and a couple of keys. Williamson upon being examined for the prosecution said he was good and drunk and remembered nothing whatever of the occurrence. He came down the river about a week ago with over \$140, which were all gone. The accused had no questions to

ask either of the witnesses, but stated that he would like to have present the other men who were on the premises of the cafe at the time of the alleged offense.

The magistrate ordered the case adjourned until tomorrow morning to allow the police an opportunity to procure the men in question.

Fishery Inspector Here.

Fishery Inspector John P. Babcock, with his assistant, C. P. Hickman, arrived this morning from Stewart and will leave again tomorrow for his headquarters in Victoria. The work that they were engaged upon did not necessitate their going into the Naas Valley this trip. Mr. Babcock, who has spent the summer in the Portland Canal district around Meziadin Lake and the Naas River does not expect to be returning there in the prosecution of his official researches until the coming spring.

PREPARE FOR THE FUTURE

The future of any city depends a great deal upon the foresight and business acumen of the pioneer business men. Even as an injury to a tree will be shown in the growth of the trunk and will bear evidence of the wound after years, so will a city always bear witness to the follies or wisdom of its pioneers, and the mistakes of today will be the wounds of tomorrow.

When David Oppenheimer wanted the citizens of Vancouver to secure the street ends along the waterfront, they laughed at him and said he was trying to waste money. When he recommended the corner of Pender and Granville streets for the site for the post office he was accused of bartering away the rights of the citizens and compelling them to submit to an inconvenience because he was deriving personal benefit from the sale of

the lot. But now that he is dead and twenty-five years have passed, a monument is erected to his memory and the site of the postoffice proved to be the best corner in the city.

Vancouver had good hard-headed business men in control of the destinies of the city in the early days, and, although they made grave mistakes in many instances, on the whole they laid the foundation for the most remarkable city in Canada today. The early councils and boards of trade worked together and continually for the advancement of the city.

Prince Rupert has the right kind of men, business men who foresee the future in store for the city and who appreciate the requirements of the present, and it behooves these men to get together, compare ideas and formulate schemes for the solid foundation of the city which must inevitably grow out of the Prince Rupert of the present.

TEN BUSINESS COMMANDMENTS

I. Thou shalt not wait for something to turn up, but shalt pull off thy coat and go to work that thou mayest prosper in thy affairs and make the word failure spell success.

canst not see thy way clear to pay them.

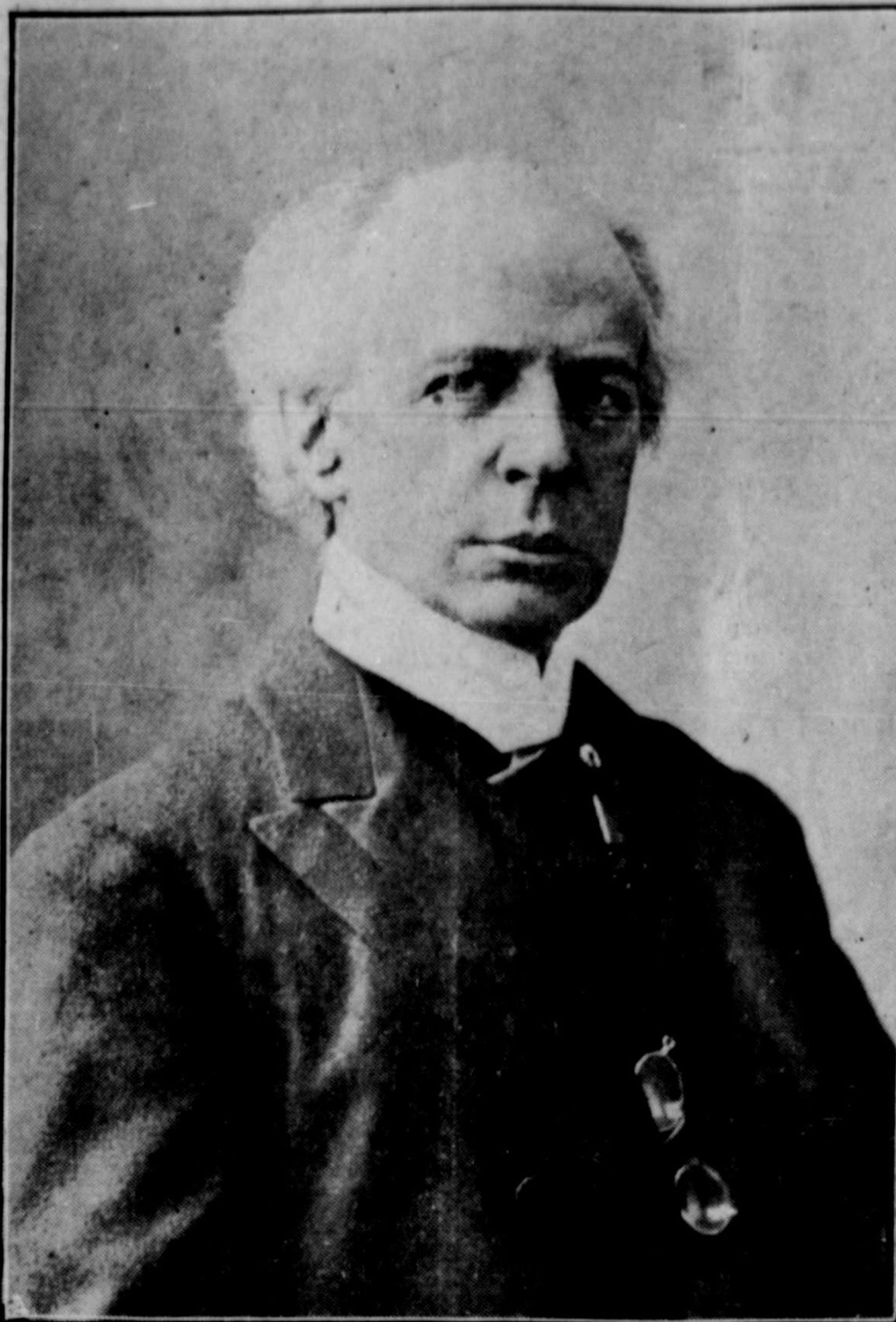

M'BRIDE CONDEMNED BY UNION MEN OF NEW WESTMINSTER, B. C.

ROYAL CITY WORKERS CONDEMN M'BRIDE AND GOVERNMENT FOR THEIR ACTIONS IN REGARD TO STRIKING MINERS AT LADYSMITH—UNION BEHIND THEM.

Vancouver, Oct. 30.—Locked-out coal miners at Cumberland and Ladysmith will receive the financial backing of the United Mine Workers of America. This, in effect, is the statement of George Pettigrew, member of the executive board, who passed through this city on Wednesday en route to Nanaimo from Indianapolis. The company is endeavoring to secure non-union miners and engineers. The men realize that this will be a turning point in the history of the union on Vancouver Island; for better or for worse and so are determined to leave no stone unturned to win their fight.

About 140 Chinese and Japs have gone back to work, but are unable to accomplish anything like the work done under normal conditions. The locked-out miners are firm.

The New Westminster Trades and Labor Council, at its last meeting, October 23rd, unanimously passed the following resolution:

"Whereas, The Mines Regulation Act provides that the miners have the right to appoint a committee to examine the mines in regard to the safety of the workings; and

"Whereas, In exercising that privilege the committee appointed by the miners on Vancouver Island discovered the presence of gas in the workings, the government inspector of mines also reported finding the same conditions; and

"Whereas, Members of that committee were discriminated against by the mine owners; and

"Whereas, The Miners' Union appealed to the Premier of the

province asking that he hold an investigation into all the circumstances, which request he refused; and

"Whereas, It is one of the fundamental principles of organized labor that an injury to one is the concern of all; therefore, be it

"Resolved by the New Westminster Trades and Labor Council, That we, the central body of organized labor in this city, enter a most emphatic protest against the government in allowing such discrimination to continue, and urge upon them the necessity of making a strict investigation into all the facts, and that a copy of this resolution be sent to Sir Richard McBride, premier of British Columbia, and to Thomas Gifford, M. P. P., member of this constituency.

GEORGE TITE'S DARK PAST

The following clipping was reprinted in the Victoria Times of October 28th from the issue of that date 25 years ago, and will prove interesting in that it has reference to one of Prince Rupert's leading citizens:

"In the police court today George Tite was charged with using a catapult on Sunday morning. He admitted using it, but did not know he broke windows. TRAWLERS LEAVE GRIMSBY FOR BIG RUPERT FISHING CONCERN

GEO. E. FOSTER AND ANDREW KELLY START ON THEIR LONG VOYAGE TO PRINCE RUPERT FROM ENGLAND. WILL ARRIVE HERE NEXT JANUARY.

Two more steam trawlers are now on their way from Grimsby, England, to Victoria via the Straits of Magellan, according to advices which were received by the Times yesterday. On October 8 the sister trawlers, G. E. Foster, named after the minister of trade and commerce, and the Andrew Kelly, which takes its name from the well-known merchant in Winnipeg, started from Grimsby on their 15,000 mile voyage.

The two trawlers resemble somewhat the Celestial Empire, of Vancouver. They are heading from Grimsby to St. Vincent, and will then cross the Atlantic to Montevideo. They will stop at Punta Arenas for supplies, and then steam to Coronel for more coal. Whether the trawlers will be able to make the long run to the coast from Coronel to Victoria is not known. It is possible that they will have to drop into Acapulco or San Diego for coal as their bunker capacity is not large.

Expected in January.

It is not expected that the Foster and Kelly will be here before the middle of next January as the

voyage will take between 90 and 100 days. The little vessels will on their arrival here will be overhauled before being sent north to Prince Rupert to commence fishing operations. The two trawlers are the first to leave England for the big cold storage company, the Canadian Fish & Cold Storage Co., which has its headquarters at Prince Rupert. The trawlers will enter the deep-sea fishing business, and their catches will be placed in ice and shipped across the continent. The company has erected a plant at Prince Rupert, which is the largest of its kind in America, for the packing of the fish.

The Foster and Kelly will form the nucleus of a big fleet of trawlers, which will come to this coast to operate in conjunction with the big cold storage plant. The British Columbia water will soon rival the celebrated Grimsby fishing grounds as with the B. C. Fisheries and Canadian companies operating large fleets of trawlers and other companies in the course of formation, the fishing industry of this province is bound to assume amazing proportions.—Victoria Times.

IMMENSE BODY OF IRON ORE

Bella Coola Resident Discovers Rich Body of Hematite Ore Near That Place.

What promises to be the largest deposit of hematite iron ore that has yet been discovered, and possibly one of the largest in North America, has been located by Messrs. William McNair and Peter Kenyon, of Vancouver and Bella Coola, respectively. According to their calculations, there are at least 20,000,000 tons of hematite ore in sight.

This vast deposit occupies a most favorable position and can be transported to tidewater at Bella Coola over very easy and favorable grades.—Bella Coola Courier.

SHERMAN DIED LAST EVENING

Vice President of U. S. Died Last Night After Illness of Some Time—Nation Mourns.

Utica, N. Y., Oct. 31.—Vice President of the United States James Sherman died last night at 9:42 at his home here. All the members of his family were at his bedside when the end came.

Although he rallied considerably in the morning, his condition gradually became worse throughout the day and it was early seen that he could not live long. He was fifty-seven years old, having been born in 1855.

GOOD SHOWING AT RED REEF

Copper Mine at Stewart Owned by Victoria Man Makes Good Snowing of \$5 Ore.

H. E. Newton, of Victoria was an arrival yesterday on the Prince George, en route to Stewart, Portland Canal. Mr. Newton, who is an old-time resident of British Columbia, having lived in Victoria for over 25 years, besides being a well-known business man of that city, is heavily interested in mining in different parts of the province.

At the present time he is on the way to Stewart, where he is developing a very likely looking prospect, a group of claims known as the "Red Reef". This property is located right on tide water at the head of the canal, within half a mile of the Stewart townsite.

A considerable amount of work has been done. At the present time thirteen men are employed engaged upon three separate tunnels. Ore was found last August running about five dollars per ton and from present indications there is every reason to believe there is an extensive body of it.

The location of the property being such, that the ore can be holed straight down to the water's edge from the mine, is of the first importance, and that is now required is to ascertain the extent of the body of paying mineral. The values are gold and copper.

Mr. Newton, who is one of the most enterprising and determined mining men who has ever gone into the Portland Canal District, is at the present time the biggest operator up there. He is going to decide upon this trip whether it will be possible to keep working all the winter, the heavy snow fall being a deterrent to the development of the mine at the early stages. It is understood that several big speculative concerns are ready to take hold of the property at an early date, if the present owner wishes to sell.
