

BULGARIANS REACH SUBURBS OF CONSTANTINOPLE

GOVERNOR OF MONTANA IS BADLY BEATEN BY SOCIALISTS WHO INSULT AMERICAN FLAG

BULGARIANS IN SUBURBS OF THE TURKISH CAPITAL CITY

Invasers Reach Outskirts of Constantinople and Will be in Gates Before Long---Turks to Rally But Cannot Win Battle

(Special to Daily News.) Constantinople, Nov. 5.—Turkey has asked the Balkan allies, through the mediation of the great powers, for an armistice, but up to a late hour last night the allies had made no reply to the proposal. It is thought that it is the first step in the final settlement of the war.

London, Nov. 5.—That Turkey will gather together and try to reform the soldiery just outside of Constantinople is the report that has reached here. The final stand will be made behind fortifications just outside of the city. That the Turks will not be able to withhold for long against the allied forces is conceded in all military circles. More than half of the Turkish artillery has been captured. Serbia alone having seized over 300 field pieces.

Budapest, Nov. 5.—The line of

battle is practically in the suburbs of Constantinople and the fighting is clear across the peninsula. The Bulgars are pushing on desperately so as to enter Constantinople before the powers intervene to force peace. Although in point of numbers the Turks are greatly superior to the Bulgarians, they are entirely disorganized. Encouraging reports are being sent out by the authorities in Constantinople, but these are entirely false.

MONTANA GOVERNOR INJURED BY BUTTE SOCIALIST CROWD

GOVERNOR NORRIS AND PARTY ARE SERIOUSLY INJURED BY SOCIALISTS, WHO ATTACK THEM AND DRAG THE AMERICAN FLAG IN MUD.

(Special to Daily News.) Butte, Mont., Nov. 5.—Governor Norris, of Montana, and several of his friends were attacked and seriously injured last night by a mob of screeching, howling Socialists, who made every effort to kill the Governor.

When passing a street corner on which the Socialists were holding an open air meeting, the automobile in which he and his friends were riding was stopped and they were badly beaten. While all were more or less cut and bruised, the Governor was the object of the attack and is rather seriously hurt about the head. Not content with injuring the party, the Socialists tore the American flag into shreds and dragged it in the mud, jumping on it and screaming threats. It was some little time before

the streets were cleared by the police, who charged and recharged the crowd.

DESTROYED EVIDENCE

Counsel for J. J. McNamara on Witness Stand at Indianapolis.

Indianapolis, Nov. 4.—Leo M. Rappaport, an attorney, who received \$14,000 as a fee of the McNamara defense fund raised by the American Federation of Labor, was asked in the dynamite conspiracy trial whether he had destroyed evidence after John J. McNamara had been indicted in Los Angeles. Rappaport testified that he went to Los Angeles six days after McNamara's arrest in Indianapolis and took with him a check book and a bank book, that he talked with McNamara in the county jail about the check book and that on returning to Indianapolis he destroyed the book.

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COUNCIL TALKS LONG AND DOES NOT TRANSACT MUCH BUSINESS

City Fathers in Convention Debate Small Matters, But Do Not Accomplish Much---Expert to Report on Matthews' Statement

No business of importance was transacted at the meeting of the city council last night, although many minor matters were debated with all the heat of argument so pleasing to the crowded galleries.

The chief passage of arms was over the hiring of Miss Dunn, or rather the non-employment of that young lady, who has been making constant application for over a year for a trial on the telephone switchboard.

Mr. Love, the late superintendent, did not recommend her for the position, and Mr. Wilson, his successor, in a report recommended that Miss Brandt be maintained in the position she was filling and which Miss Dunn was asking for.

After discussing the matter for nearly an hour the superintendent's report was adopted and the two young ladies names were balloted upon.

The report of the sewerage system handed in by the city engineer was set aside to be considered on Wednesday night at a meeting for that purpose.

Of course the council debated "signs." They seldom miss signs from their meetings. This time the Gidley Company, watch makers, were the unlucky ones, and because they have a small sign which does not burn 200 candle power, they were ordered to take it down.

James Matthews, late superintendent of the Electric Light plant fired his parting shot at the Prince Rupert city council, when on the day of his departure he instructed Messrs. Williams & Manson to write to the council requesting immediate payment of the sum of \$27 for the rent of his typewriter, or legal proceedings would be instituted. The subject which was received in stolid silence by the council was referred to the city solicitor.

A letter was received from Miss Agnes Dunn, stating that in an interview accorded her that afternoon with the present superintendent of the city telephone system, her application for an appointment as a probationer in the telephone office was refused, the superintendent stating that after careful consideration of the matter, he had decided to retain the services of Miss Brandt.

Alderman Clayton, as chairman of the committee, said that it was the latter's intention to give the superintendent an absolutely free hand in the management of his department, also holding him responsible for the fit management of same.

Ald. Morrissey championed the cause of Miss Dunn, stating that her being an older resident of Prince Rupert, should most decidedly give her the precedence over a comparatively new comer. The alderman further wanted to know whether a letter signed by two citizens politically inclined had not been received either by the superintendent or the committee favoring Miss Brandt's being retained in the present position.

Aldermen Clayton and Montgomery absolutely disclaimed any knowledge of any such letter, the latter sustaining the action of the committee.

Alderman Morrissey, waxing quite indignant over the matter, wished to inform the Council that fifty years having gone over his head, during period he had had the opportunity of meeting a perfect legion of engaging and charming young ladies, none had appeared to him more eligible for

the position in question than the young lady, Miss Agnes F. Dunn. The matter was finally settled by ballot, which was suggested by Alderman Morrissey, resulting in the retaining of Miss Brandt by a vote of 5 to 4.

The report of the city engineer covering the sewerage system of the city as far east as Donald street and the height of land on Montreal Hill was received.

The chairman of the Board of Works, in view of the intricate and exhaustive character of the report and its great importance, asked that it be held over for consideration at an adjourned meeting of the Council, to be held at the earliest possible opportunity.

Several of the aldermen spoke in a most flattering manner of the excellence of the report furnished by the city engineer.

The city solicitor suggested

that a bylaw be immediately drafted by himself, with the assistance of the city engineer, dealing with the matter so that voting upon it could take place this year, thereby ensuring a more thorough opinion of the public's wishes than would be obtained later when only those being registered owners of real property in the city would be able to vote on the money bylaws. This was agreed to by the Council.

It was decided to request Mr. Ross, the well known electrical engineer and manager of the City of Seattle system, who was responsible for the installation of the plant in this city, to pay a visit to Prince Rupert at the earliest possible opportunity and overlook the plant and give an opinion as to its safety and efficiency. It was further suggested that if possible the future super-

WASTING TIME AT THE COUNCIL.

A stranger in the council chamber last night would indeed have gone from it with an exalted idea of the way in which business is carried on by the Mayor and aldermen. Especially would he have been struck with the eloquence and remarkable ability shown in the discussion (of more than an hour in length) on whether or not the superintendent of the telephone department should discharge a young lady who is satisfactorily filling the position and give it to another who made application.

In most places and in almost every civic plant in the province the superintendent of the department is allowed to hire and discharge his help as he sees fit, but in Prince Rupert it is different. Instead of the superintendent being responsible only to the committee, his

actions are discussed in open council and the aldermen openly endeavor to go over his head and employ and discharge the operators at the switchboard.

Altogether the meeting last night would prove very enlightening to a visitor and student of legislation, but it does not help the ratepayers to any great extent to have the council sit night after night discussing trivial matters while business of import is hurried over.

We are not taking sides with either young lady who was unfortunate enough to appear in the limelight, but we do think that the council could do more effective work did they pay more attention to the important questions of the community and leave these little questions to be threshed out between the committee and the superintendent.

FRANK GOTCH SAYS HE IS THROUGH WITH WRESTLING

HARDSHIPS OF TRAINING COME SO HEAVY ON CHAMPION THAT HE DECIDES TO GIVE UP GAME FOR GOOD—IF THIS IS SO, THE PADDED RING LOSES ONE OF THE GREATEST MEN WHO EVER JUMPED OVER ROPES.

Chicago, Nov. 4.—The mat game will know its greatest exponent, Frank Gotch, no more. The absolute horrors of training outweigh in the Gotch mind the love—or need, as the case may be—of money. In other words, the champion will attempt to worry along now on what he has accumulated—and live in peace and quiet. Also he will live without the torture of having to think that within a certain time he will have to start the hideous grind of going "on the road" to get himself in shape for a hard match.

Dante never pictured worse fortune or harrowed a soul with more frightful ideas of an inferno than Gotch entertains about training. It's a strange situation, but a true one nevertheless. And other athletes who have reached a certain age after troublesome years of the grind talk in much the same strain as does Gotch. Ask Jack Johnson and he will tell you, if he is in the mood. Gotch looks as fat and sleek as a retired business man whose one aim was to extract most of the good things out of his life. The writer "joshed" the champion for his appearance, but he simply took off his woolly overcoat and then gave the writer a survey.

SOME OF THE RULES OF THE GLOVE PASTIME NEED REMODELLING

TIME IS RIPE TO MAKE AN ATTEMPT TO DEVISE MANUAL THAT WILL COVER ALL POINTS OF BOXING—BETWEEN ROUND FINISHES TROUBLESOME.

It would prove difficult, no doubt, to frame up a set of boxing rules that would cover every point that was likely to crop up, says W. W. Naughton, the expert boxing writer, but it certainly looks as though the time is ripe for making an attempt. The initiative in a movement of that kind should be taken by some official body that is far removed from the petty jealousies of the game pugilistic, and it appears to the writer that the New York Boxing Commission just about fills the bill. It would be the easiest matter possible for the commission to designate a few Eastern experts and entrust to them the task of devising a manual that would be a guide to ringmen and referee and would win the appreciation of the public.

Some years ago Jack O'Brien and Bob Fitzsimmons boxed in San Francisco and Fitz collapsed in his corner during the resting spell which followed the thirteenth round. As it was evident the Cornishman was past continuing, the referee declared in favor of O'Brien, and then confusion arose. Some wanted to know if O'Brien has won in thirteen rounds, and Fitz's backers answered "Decidedly not."

Fitzsimmons did not come up for the fourteenth round," argued the O'Brien crowd. "But Fitzsimmons went to his corner an undefeated man at the end of the thirteenth round," retorted the Fitzsimmons followers.

The question was never settled satisfactorily, and even now the record books credit O'Brien with a victory in thirteen rounds without carrying any footnote to explain that Fitzsimmons really went to pieces while his seconds were grooming him for the fourteenth round.

There was a similar occurrence in the Charley Mitchell-Jim Flynn bout. Both men were in fighting attitude when the gong signalled the end of the fifteenth round. On hearing the bell they dropped their arms and went to their corners. Miller then complained of a broken rib, and a few seconds later Referee Spider Kelly went over to Flynn's corner and hoisted Flynn's sweat sodden gloves aloft, the orthodox manner of denoting the winner. There was heavy betting that Miller would "stay" fifteen rounds, and the fellows who wagered that way clamored for their money. The sporting authorities here were almost a unit in declaring that Miller had lasted the full fifteen rounds, but there were other angles to the betting.

Can't Be Two Winners. Isn't that a nice kettle of fish? How in the name of all that is reasonable could there be two winners? If Miller stayed—or averted defeat—for fifteen rounds he must have won AFTER fifteen rounds. The pool sellers wriggled out of the tight corner by refunding all the fifteen round money to the original placers and the Miller-Flynn fifteen round incident may be considered closed. But when the New York Boxing Commission, or whoever it may be, appoints a committee to frame up-to-date boxing rules, it seems to me that the following should be inserted somewhere: RULE—When from any cause it shall be made to appear between rounds that a boxer is unable to continue, the referee shall await the signal for starting the following round. Then, if either boxer fails to toe the scratch, he shall be adjudged loser. It may be worded more gracefully and with more regard to euphony and construction, but the idea is there. The thing is to do away with a boxer winning or losing "between rounds."

Council Talks Long But Not Much Business Done

(Continued from Page 1.)

intendent, who was to be engaged at once, be present at the examination, giving him the chance to get started off right with every opportunity possible to make good in the position.

Alderman Dybhavn, chairman of the Board of Works, made a motion, which was carried unanimously, that a telephone be installed in the ante room of the council chamber for the convenience of the Council and the public attending the meetings of the City Council.

In the matter of the installation of the Gamewell fire alarm system, a report of the Fire and Light committee was read and adopted concurring entirely with the plans of the fire chief and Mr. Woods as to the location of the alarm boxes. Alderman Morrissey still disagreeing as to the fact that there were no boxes on Fraser street, stating that a petition from the residents of that locality would very shortly be handed to the Council looking for redress in that matter.

The report of the building inspector to the Fire and Light committee to the effect that he had notified several owners of buildings on Comox avenue that they were not complying with the bylaw in regard to fire protection, there being several cases of defective flues and other irregularities in the matter of proper fire protection, had been received by the committee. The report of the latter was read by the city clerk to the Council and adopted.

Alderman Morrissey brought up again the manner in which the boats at the Government wharf were getting away with the city's water without paying for it. It was practically straightened up by the report of the Fire committee that upon interviewing Manager Jack Beattie upon the subject it transpired that the latter was keeping exact track of every drop that they took through the instrumentality of two water meters provided by the Provincial government and was charging up the same to the boats thus served.

Alderman Morrissey was still a bit skeptical as to the existence of the meters, and further said that he would like to see a little real money as the result of the sale of the water. Boats, like certain individuals, might do a skip, ships that pass in the night being a proverb in common use. However, the Council decided that there was nothing to be really alarmed about, and Mr. Beattie would be given a schedule of charges and act as collector for the city.

POLISH EAGLE RAISING HEAD

Sees Chance of Independence in Possible Clash of Austria and Russia

London, Nov. 4.—A Vienna despatch to the Daily Mail says:

"For the first time since Napoleon's invasion of Russia, a hundred years ago, the White Eagle of Poland is raising its head and looking to the threatened conflict between Austria and Russia to free the Polish nation from the hated Russian yoke.

"While the eyes of Europe are riveted on the battlefields of Thrace and Macedonia, a great national movement is spreading in Poland. Its aim is to unite all the Poles in common action for the possible outbreak of hostilities between Russia and Austria.

"The Polish nation numbers twenty-five million, of whom twelve million are Russian subjects, over six million Austrian subjects inhabiting Galicia and four million Prussian subjects. There are two million Poles in America."

The information upon which the correspondent bases the foregoing is somewhat slim, being to the effect that meetings are taking place all over Galicia with a view to removing all the present difficulties existing between the different parties in Poland, between the Poles and Ruthenians.
