Strained Relations Between Two Powers Causing Much Concern ---Albania Threatens Trouble if She Does Not Get Independence Soon

It is strange that the "Terrible" Turks, the menace of Europe for so many generations, the oppressors of the smaller nations contiguous to the Ottoman empire, should be, in less than a month, a crushed nation; that the great army which the Sultan a few weeks before had characterized as like the number of grains of millet in a bushel—uncountable—should be, after four weeks of fighting, a disorganized rabble fleeing before the fierce invaders of little Bulgaria.

Tomorrow, the Bulgars predict, the hymns of praise to Jesus Christ will be sung in the mosque of Constantinople. What pleasure the victory over the Turk would give to the ancient crusaders who followed the red cross to war against

the Mohammedan. General satisfaction is felt all over the world at the humbling of Turkey.

VANCOUVER WILL BE CENTRE OF POVERTY STRICKEN THROUGH

BRITISH PAPER CLAIMS THAT THERE WILL BE 8,000 UNEMPLOYED IN VANCOUVER THIS WINTER—TOO LATE TO REMEDY CONDITIONS.

Vancouver, Nov. 8.—That Vancouver will be the centre of poverty stricken throngs as a result of cessation of labor in many trades is the impression which is gained in England as a result of a despatch appearing in the Daily Citizen, the new daily labor organ of the British Isles. The despatch in question says, among other things, that wages have dropped while the cost of foodstuffs and rent remain "up." Under the heading "Poverty in the Golden West," this is the despatch which has appeared in the Daily Citizen:

"Grave reports of lack of employment are coming through from the Far West, and workers of all grades are being advised to beware of Vancouver.

"It is estimated that unless something unforeseen happens there will be 8,000 unemployed in the Pacific coast city this winter. Distress is already starting many in the face, and thousands have been glad to accept temporary employment in the harvest fields, but this work is rapidly ceasing for the season.

"At one time a man could earn sufficient at agricultural work on the farms in summer to keep him in comfort during the cold weather, but the wages have dropped to a very low point while the cost of foodstuffs and rents show little diminishment.

"Many of the harvest fields undoubtedly want men, but there is no system in the country by which the workers can be distributed properly. An announcement is made, perhaps, that 1,500 men are wanted in Manitoba, and there is a rush there out of all proportion to the number wanted, and wages drop rapidly, while another district's call for men goes unheeded.

"Still, it is too late to remedy the state of affairs this season. Meanwhile, Vancouver, which has been fairly fortunate in past years, is going to be faced with the grim problem that year by year casts a gloom over the cities of the East in winter. Truly 'the Golden West' is a term that is full of tragic satire."

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EMPLOYEES FUND

Civic Employees of Burnaby to Have Protection Fund

Edmonds, Nov. 8.—Striking success has attended the Burnaby employees' benefit fund which was started at the commencement of the present year. This is said to be the only place in Canada where the scheme of forcing municipal employees to lay aside a portion of their salary as a provision for sickness, accident or death is enforced.

An average of 4 cents per day is deducted from the salaries of the men and paid into the treasury, to be used only for the alleviation of suffering caused by accident or sickness overtaking any of the contributors to the fund. At the present time there is \$2,906 in the treasury, while the sum of \$820 has been paid out since the organization of the fund. All applications for assistance are investigated by a board of control, whose decisions are final.

USEFUL HINTS FOR THE HOME

An Attractive Dressing Gown.
The busy woman, who makes an early start in the morning and appreciates the return at night to comfort and ease, finds a cosy dressing gown a charming garment to slip into. A length of some fascinating material, such as flannel or cashmere, is admirable for this, and a simple little gown, with deep collar and quaint cuffs, may be evolved from five yards of 44 inch fabric. A good pattern should be secured for this, when the actual making will prove extremely simple. The collar, cuffs and belt all lend themselves to being embroidered with washing embroidery silks in tones to correspond with the material.

To Make Mushroom Ketchup.
This valuable flavoring for gravies, sauces and soups is easily and economically made at home as follows: Use the full grown flaps of the mushrooms, crush them lightly with the hands and sprinkle a handful of salt on every peck of mushrooms and let them stand all night; then put them into steppan and put in the oven for about twelve hours. Strain through a hair sieve, and to every gallon of liquor put one ounce each of cloves, black pepper and ginger and half a pound of salt; put over a slow fire and boil gently until the liquor is reduced by one-half. Take it from the fire and let it go quite cold before being bottled.

Pure Water.
If ever doubtful about the purity of the supply, boil the water and filter it, and to remove the flat, insipid taste which often results from the boiling take it out of doors into the fresh air and pour it from jug to jug two or three times. The water in this way draws in the oxygen, which restores the sparkling and refreshing quality.

Economical Icing for Cake.
Canadian housewives, when eggs are scarce, adopt the following plan for icing cake: They use a half pound of sugar to the white of one egg and sufficient milk to take the place of a second egg white. This makes an excellent icing, which will commend itself to the notice of all careful housekeepers as the festive season of Christmas draws near.

To Make Grape Wine.
Here is an old fashioned recipe for utilizing the small grapes, of which there is a quantity this year. Take some ripe grapes and bruise them, and to every gallon of the fruit (measured before bruising) add a gallon of water; stir them occasionally, and then strain off the juice. To every gallon of this liquor put two pounds of loaf sugar; put both into a barrel, but do not close it until all hissing sound has stopped. Then secure it firmly, and in six months it will be ready to bottle. Another delightful use to which to put these small grapes is to make them into jelly of the consistency of red currant jelly. This grape jelly makes a delicious accompaniment to cold meats, or to chops and steaks.

Value of Horseradish.
An old fashioned and excellent remedy for rheumatism is made by putting a pint of the best Holland gin into a bottle and adding to it three or four finely scraped horseradishes, being careful to fill the bottle. Tie it down securely with wire and bury the bottle in earth for fourteen days. Take a tablespoonful of the liquid night and morning. An aching tooth may also often be relieved by putting freshly scraped horseradish in the mouth and around the gum. The mouth should afterward be washed out with lukewarm camphorated water.

Cleaning Doeskin.
Make a good lather of shredded curd soap and warm water, and then let it go nearly cold. Wash the gloves on the hands, and, when quite clean, rinse out the dirty water in clean lathered water, leaving the soap well in the gloves, as this keeps them soft. Dull them off the hands gently, turning them inside out, and dry them in the air or in a warm room, but not at the fire.

Coal at Fort George
Fort George, Nov. 8.—Bituminous coal of an exceptionally high quality, discovered north of the Nechaco River, within a distance of twenty miles of Fort George, is the latest and probably by long odds the best find yet made in this immediate district.

Watercress All the Year.
Sow watercress in pots, the lower halves of which are filled with crocks and the upper halves with good mould, and keep them in saucers always full of water. In summer they can stand out of doors in the sun, provided the saucers are kept full of water, but in winter they must be housed. Thus a watercress salad is available once or twice a week all the year round.

Economy of Labor.
To make a scullery table really useful, and able to be quickly cleaned, get a sheet of tin an inch lower in a easterly direction through Lot or two larger than the table. Turn in the edges under the slab, and fix. This will save endless time and labor, for wood adsorbs grease, and is difficult to clean, besides being entirely spoiled by having hot saucers placed upon it, whereas tin can easily be kept in condition with hot soda water and a little sand.

STOLE TO BUY GIRL PRESENT

Calgary Youth Admits Crime—Stole to Give Presents to Sweetheart.

Calgary, Alta., Nov. 8.—Infatuation with a woman, and the resultant desire to shower her with presents beyond his means, led 18-year-old George Beddie to prison today for a term of one and one-half years. Beddie was convicted of forgeries aggregating nearly \$1,000. In being sentenced the young man made a clean breast of his offences and declared that he had forged the cheques to purchase presents for a girl.

"She was not to blame," declared Beddie, "as the gifts were unsolicited. I wanted to do more for her than her other admirers and my desire to outshine the other fellows landed me here."

from the auxiliary, they did not feel like conceding the privilege of the direction of the spending of the money to the latter body. They asked the board to hold the money in trust until it was required for the purpose intended, when they would be on hand to direct its disbursement.

This did not meet with the approval of certain members of the board, Mr. P. I. Palmer being particularly emphatic in declaring that he was absolutely opposed to such a course. The concert had been given under the auspices of the auxiliary, who were a powerful and helpful adjunct to the Hospital Board, and to them alone should the handling of the fund be left. He further said that the letter of Mrs. Burritt and Mrs. McNeill really could not be considered by the board beyond being courteously acknowledged.

After some further discussion a motion was carried that the original action of the board to hold the funds until required and then allow the auxiliary the directing of the furnishing of the ward was carried.

At a special meeting of the board, held during the month, it was agreed that in the case of the disposal of the remains of patients dying at the hospital without friends or having given any special directions in the matter, the several undertaking firms in the city would be given the interments in turn.

It was announced that four more probationers were to be appointed to assume duty about the first of next February, when they hoped the new wing would be completed. This would bring the number up to eight. Later they proposed to augment the number to twelve.

A letter had been forwarded to the medical association of Prince Rupert in regard to their furnishing a series of lectures to the hospital staff this coming winter. A reply had been received stating that owing to a number of the fraternity being away from the city at the present time a definite answer could not be furnished.

Miss Fulton, one of the qualified nurses on the staff, handed in her resignation to the board, which was accepted to go into effect upon the third of the coming month.

The matter of Contractor Hicks and the building of the new wing was thrashed out in a most decisive manner.

Some strong remarks were made by Mr. P. I. Palmer in regard to the way the contractor was living up to his contract. Mr. Palmer did not hesitate to say that he did not believe the building could be put up for the sum of money the contractor had taken it for and it was up to the board to look after their own or they would be decidedly left in the matter of receiving a dollar's worth of goods for a dollar's worth of pay. The permanent work should be finished as it went along before any certificates were issued by the architect allowing of money being paid by the board on account.

Despite the fact that several of the board thought that in order to expedite the early completion of the building 80 per cent. of the money for completed work passed by the architect might be paid, Mr. Palmer's motion that "no further certificates be issued to the contractor until all permanent work was completed according to the specifications and was passed by the architect" was carried.

Mr. Potter, the architect, who returns from a short visit to the South today, will be notified to this effect.

The Provincial government, through Mr. W. Manson, is to be asked for a grant of at least \$10,000 at the next session of the House.
