THIRTY KILLED IN WRECK NEAR NEW ORLEANS

AUSTRIAN-SERVIAN TROUBLE OVER ADRIATIC MAY LEAD TO GENERAL EUROPEAN WAR

THIRTY KILLED AND FIFTY INJURED IN MISSISSIPPI RAILROAD DISASTER

**Terrible Scenes Surround Collision of Freight and Excursion
Trains Near New Orleans---Nine Dead Bodies Recovered
---Many Still in Debris of the Coaches**

(Special to Daily News.)
New Orleans, Nov. 11.—Thirty persons are believed to have lost their lives and at least fifty received serious, some fatal, injuries in a terrible railroad wreck 27 miles north of this city, near the town of Montezla, on the line of the Yazoo & Mississippi Valley Railroad, when the through freight train crashed into the rear end of a crowded excursion train of ten coaches.

Nine bodies have been recovered and many remain to be taken out of the debris of the wrecked coaches, where they are known to be.
The scenes surrounding the accident were harrowing. The excursion train was packed to the doors with men, women and children. Families were separated, some being in one car while others were in different coaches and the hunt for relatives and

friends by panic stricken women and men, together with the screaming of the dying and wounded was awful. Every effort was made at once to recover the bodies of those dead and save the injured. Doctors and nurses on hearing of the disaster here at once prepared to go to the place on an emergency wrecking train.

It appears that a small row boat, just big enough for two, started off in the morning with the avowed object of crabbing, the occupants intending to return in time for tea in the afternoon. Not turning up when expected and their friends becoming anxious, the brother of one of the party set off to hunt for them, locating them on the opposite shore sitting by the sad sea waves.
The sea was running so high that it was found impossible to effect a landing upon the little launch and the three were perforce obliged to make the best of it and do a nimpromptu camping out act, highly romantic although slightly inconvenient. Their many friends were delighted to hail their return safe and sound this morning.

EUROPE MAY BE PLUNGED INTO BIG WAR BY AUSTRIAN-SERVIAN TROUBLE

Austria's Warning to Servia Not to Touch the Adriatic Has Been Disregarded and May Lead to a General European Conflict---Germany Believed to be Behind Austria

Belgrade, Nov. 11.—The vanguard of the Servian army, under General Yankovich, has reached the Adriatic Sea and is expected to size Durazzo on Wednesday, according to despatches received here and subsequent official announcements.

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PROSPERITY CONTINUES Financial Statement Shows In- crease in Revenue

Ottawa, Nov. 8.—The Dominion financial statement for October shows that the prosperity of Canada continues. Consolidated revenue for the month aggregated \$14,756,946, an increase of two millions over corresponding month last year. The revenue for the year is expected to reach one hundred and sixty millions. The public debt was decreased by four million dollars during the month.
The fishery statistics for September show that the catch in British Columbia amounted to 638,07, and in all of Canada \$1,638,057, and in all of Canada \$1,662,572.

IGNORANCE CAUSES INDIANS TO KILL BEAVER FOR SKINS

**TWO NATIVES RELEASED ON SUSPENDED SENTENCE WHEN
CONVICTED OF KILLING BEAVER---STIKINE AND
NORTHERN INDIANS MAY DO SO.**

Before Magistrate Little at Terrace, on Saturday last, Ben Bennett and Phillip Roberts, the Indians charged with killing beaver in the closed season, were given their liberty on suspended sentence. Provincial Constable T. Parsons found them in the possession of twenty pelts, valued at \$240., which have been confiscated by the government. The Provincial Act reads that only the Indians of Liard, Stikine and Peace River district, the northernmost portion of the province, are exempt in this regard, it not applying to the Skeena River Indians.

Indian Agent Charles C. Perry of Metlakatla represented the Indians. Mr. Perry showed very clearly that there was a good deal to be said in favor of his charges. While it was admitted that the Indians had trapped beaver, he showed that they acted with judgment and discretion, only taking the full grown beaver of the male kind. He stated it as his unqualified opinion that absolutely no injury was worked in this way upon the propagation of the species in the province. The Indians had been in the habit of killing a certain number for food until, quite recently, an act was passed putting the natives of the interior of the province upon the same footing as the white man.

The provincial authorities are going to take stringent measures against a number of white men, however, who are known to be both illegally trapping beaver and buying the pelts. It is thought that at the next session of the Provincial house the new act in regard to the Indians of this district will be amended so as to make them exempt, as are their brothers of the northern part of the province.

AS LOWERY SEES IT.

It is feared in some quarters that Japan will some day take British Columbia. Japan is almost master of the Pacific Ocean, and is looking for another place of settlement. As the Rocky Mountains make an ideal barrier, British Columbia will be an ideal place for the Japs, provided they can get it.—Greenwood Ledger.

A SINISTER ORGANIZATION.

The Edmonton Capital is not enamored of the arrangement by which Hon. Robert Rogers becomes minister of public works in the Borden cabinet. It says:

"With 'Bob' Rogers dominating the great spending department in the Dominion and his man Friday in the person of W. J. Roche holding the department of interior for him by proxy, the guiding genius of that sinister organization

which has made Manitoba politics a by-word throughout the Dominion has now got its clutches fairly upon the federal capital.

What the outcome of the new arrangement will be no one in Canada will even doubt. Under these illustrious auspices Canada is due to see to what extent partizan favoritism can be carried with the most important departments of the nation placed in the control of a ruthless hand.

Certainly the advent of Rogers to the spending department seems to suggest but one thing throughout Canada, and the leading politicians in both parties seem fairly well agreed that the new arrangement will result in the adoption of the same system of spoliation as has been the disgrace of Manitoba. Canada is after too sensitive and too sound at heart to be successfully debauched for more than a short time.—Victoria Times.

BRITAIN WILL NOT INTERFERE BETWEEN TURKEY AND BALKANS

PREMIER ASQUITH MAKES A SIGNIFICANT STATEMENT IN REGARD TO BRITISH POLICY IN EAST—BALKANS ENTITLED TO FRUITS OF VICTORY.

London, Nov. 10.—In a stirring speech at the Lord Mayor's inaugural banquet on Saturday night the Premier, Mr. Asquith, made several significant statements in regard to the Balkan question and British interference in the troubles of the Near East. He said:

"Upon one thing I believe the general opinion of Europe will be unanimous, that is that the victors should not be robbed of the fruits which have cost them so dearly."

He referred to the unsuccessful efforts made by the powers of Europe to prevent the conflict and to the great changes the war had made in the map of Europe. He said the fall of Constantinople might occur at any moment.

The Prime Minister added: "In these anxious times it is satisfactory to be able to announce that the relations of England with the other powers, without a single exception, were never more friendly."

The map of Europe would have to be recast, the Premier said,

and nowhere was there any disposition to rob the victors of the territory they had acquired. "England," he said, "has no direct interest in the exact form which the political and territorial redistributions may take. The special relations of the powers—geographical, economic, ethical and historical—with the scene of the conflict were such that they cannot be expected to claim a voice when the time comes for the permanent settlement."

Premier Asquith refrained from indicating the points that must emerge for solution. "For the moment and as long as a state of belligerency continues," he declared, "His Majesty's government deprecates raising and pressing isolated questions which if handled separately and at once may seem likely to lead to irreconcilable divergencies, but which may assume different, perhaps a more practicable aspect, if left to be settled from the wider point of view in the general settlement."

BONA FIDE SETTLERS.

The Editor:

We shall be very thankful to you for giving space in your esteemed paper to the following statement:

In the number of October 26 of the "Strike Bulletin" we find a misstatement entitled "Colonizing." The gentlemen of the strike committee are evidently seeing ghosts. To put them at ease we hereby declare:

1. That we are not connected in any way with the construction of the G. T. P. railway and are not furnishing any labor to said line.

2. That our colonization work is exclusively such, and we sell farms only to bona fide settlers, who will start immediately to clear and cultivate same. Now, it is very probable that some of these people during the winter time when there is no work on the farm will look for outside work, and some of them may work on railroad construction, but, being generally recognized as most desirable laborers, they certainly will not dream for a moment to work for a cent less than any other laborer in this country and certainly not for an idiotic wage of 50 cents a day as suggested by the gentlemen of the strike committee.

3. We most heartily agree with the statement that "the workers will own the earth," but it will be workers who till hard and know how to keep and enjoy the result of their work, and certainly not people whose ideal seems to be to avoid any kind of work at any price.

Vadso Inquiry

Vancouver, Nov. 9.—Captain Eddie, examiner of masters and mates, held a preliminary hearing as to the circumstances surrounding the stranding of the Boscowitz steamer Vadso, which went ashore at Baynes Sound two weeks ago, and has since been floated. The substance of

the testimony was to the effect that the water shoaled so suddenly that the steamer ran on the rocks before the instructions to the engineer for full speed could be carried out. The evidence will be forwarded to Ottawa by Captain Eddie, and any other action will be ordered by the marine department.

BULGARS BRED FOR FIGHTING

Bulgarian Peasants Trained in Art of War—Determined and Happy People Used to Hardships

Writing in the London Daily Mirror Charles Woods, a noted journalist, tells of the character of the Turks and their foes, the Bulgarians. Of the latter he says:

As far as Bulgaria is concerned, the men, for the most part types of a healthy peasant race, are as hardy as their Turkish enemies. For years all ranks have been so trained as to perfect themselves in the art of war.

The men, who march well, often singing as they go, are cheerful under the most adverse conditions. After the hardships of manoeuvres, which in Bulgaria are really carried out under war conditions, the men show no signs of fatigue, and ambulances are hardly ever required. During a final assault drums beat, and the men cheer in a manner which would be a good example for any European army.

Music and dancing are great things in the Bulgarian army. The cadets at the officers' college are taught dancing, which they practice together as part of their military instruction. Squads of young men are even obliged to sing as they march about the barracks square.

The Bulgarian army is well clothed and equipped. The men wear a rough service dress, with a brownish colored overcoat, on active service. The foot and leg gear for the most part would

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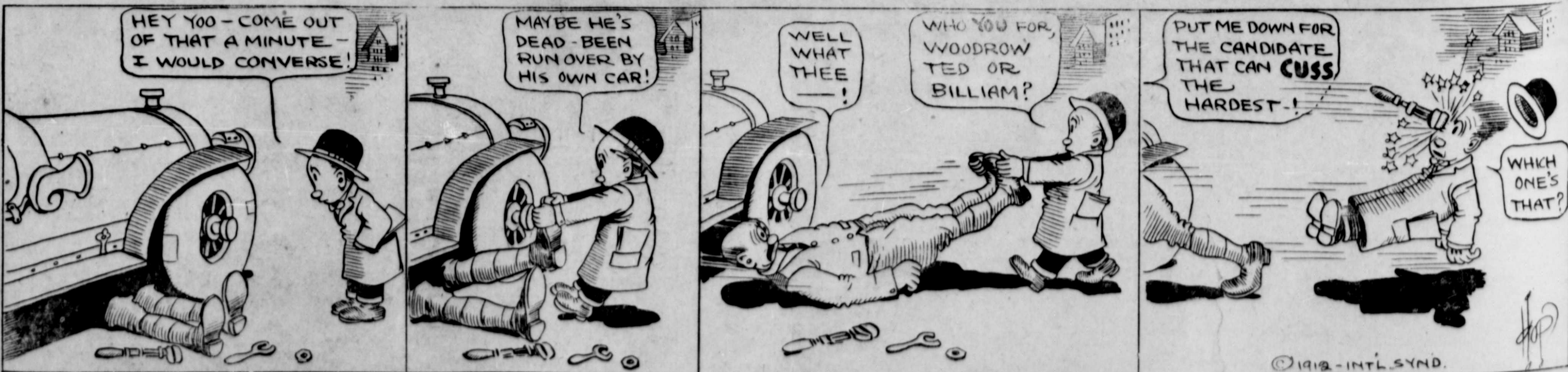

An English amateur lacrosse team that contemplated a trip to Australia asked of the Australian authorities: "First class passages to and from Australia for fifteen players and one manager, all travelling and hotel expenses while the team is in Australia, and an allowance of three shillings per day per man from the day the team leaves England until their return." They are not likely to make the trip on the proposed plan.

T. J. Richards, vice captain of the Australian rugby team now playing against college and club teams in San Francisco and vicinity, says regarding rugby union football in his country: "The season opens in May and closes in September of each year and 2,325 school boys take part in the various grades of competition—one grade of boys having their weight limited to 98 pounds. There are also 1,540 men playing in competition, other than school sides. The winners of each grade receive at the end of the season a permanent pennant.

Ten teams comprise the first grade section of the above players, 3,865 in all, are under the direct supervision of the Metropolitan Union of Sydney only, a city with a population of 600,000 people.

Joe Bayley and Fighting Dick Hyland will meet again. Though the date of the battle has not yet been selected, the two principals are agreeable to another match and all that remain to bring the pair together is for their respective managers to sign the necessary articles.

Tommy Burns is willing to stage a second bout at Calgary, but Hyland is not particular where the bout takes place. Morris Condon states that Bayley will fight again within a month and it is possible that the battle will be arranged immediately following Bayley's fight with Johnny O'Leary, of Seattle, at Prince Rupert on November 15.

To Meet Barrieau It also looks as though a bout between Ernie Barrieau, the crack Vancouver boxer, and Joe Bayley, of Victoria, lightweight champion of Canada, is assured.

Managers Chet McIntyre and Morris Condon got together last evening and made tentative arrangements for the proposed bout, which it is proposed to pull off somewhere on the coast.

While no forfeits were posted, the managers agreed that in view of the strong public demand for this match they would undertake not to tie up their charges for any bouts other than those which they now have in hand. Barrieau is matched to meet Kid Sealer at Edmonton a week from today while Bayley is booked to take on Johnny O'Leary, the clever Seattle lightweight, in a fifteen round argument at Prince Rupert in the near future. Neither Bayley nor Barrieau will engage in any other bouts before their championship battle according to the agreement entered into by the managers.

Favors Bayley Oscar Grant, a well known Coast boxing authority, who is now paying Victoria a visit, is a spectator at the Bayley-Hyland fight, states that Hyland can never defeat the champion. "Bay-

ley is too rugged, strong and can stand more punishment than Hyland can hand out" is Mr. Grant's opinion of the two men. "Bayley's punching powers, also, will wear Hyland down, should the pair meet over the long route."—Victoria Times.

PEN BECOMING ARISTOCRATIC

Women Sentenced in Vancouver Refused Admittance in Penitentiary—Not Desirable Class

New Westminster, Nov. 8.—Discussing the refusal of the provincial jail authorities to receive fifteen women prisoners yesterday, and others on previous occasions, Chief Bradshaw states that the reason for the refusal is because of lack of accommodation. WILL BUILD NEW ROAD TO COAST

Announcement Made at Montreal of Line from Hudson's Bay to the Pacific

Montreal, Nov. 9--The announcement is just made here of the arrangements to construct a railway from Hudson Bay across the Peace River district and through to the Pacific Coast by the Alberta Peace River & Eastern Railway.

The company will proceed to build four hundred miles of line immediately the snow is off the ground, the first portion of the road being in the Edmonton-to-Peace River country.

\$5,000 PER DAY FOR NEW BABES

Bonus in Australia Will Reach Huge Sum--Parliamentarians Invited to Extend Trip.

Sydney, N.S.W., Nov. 6--It has been decided to invite the imperial parliamentarians, who are to visit Canada in August next, to extend their visit to Australia.

A new expenditure of \$5000 a day is anticipated by the Federal treasurer in connection with the bonus for babies.

The Lord Mayor, Alderman Allan Taylor, has suggested that the city of Sydney discard the rate now imposed on improved or rental value, and instead impose an all round rate of four pence (eight cents) in the pound on the unimproved capital value.

The estimated cost of the bridge which it is proposed to build to connect North Sydney with the City of Sydney, is \$2,500,000. The bridge is designed to accommodate four lines of railway.

Mr. Winston's Churchill's utterances at the Cutlers' Feast in England that "We must hold what we now hold, and must unite and consolidate the Empire," meets with general approval here.

The Sydney Evening News says that the remarks may be well taken to heart by Britons overseas.

The request in a petition presented to the New Zealand parliament that the government release the Waihi strikers has been refused.

LOCAL NEWS ITEMS

The Princess May arrived from Skagway on Saturday at about 1 p. m. with a considerable number of passengers from Alaska and the Yukon, as well as from the way points along the coast.

The Princess Beatrice left for Vancouver and Victoria yesterday evening at 8 o'clock with a large passenger list, including about twenty persons from Masset, who arrived from the latter place earlier in the day on the Prince John and were fortunate enough to make connections.

The C. P. R. steamer Princess Ena, which recently discharged a heavy cargo of machinery at Aliford Bay for the B. C. Fisheries Co., arrived at the Government wharf on Saturday evening and is unloading 560 tons of coal for the city and local dealers.

In Calgary the mixed farming special train travelling Alberta under the auspices of the Provincial government in co-operation with the C. P. R. is meeting with great success.

NEWS NOTES OF THE GREAT WEST

In Edmonton the City Council submitted a bylaw granting two hundred and twenty-five thousand for Royal Alexandra Hospital for Children. Work has commenced on a six storey reinforced concrete and tile fireproof theatre and hotel.

In Lethbridge the Associate Boards of Southern Alberta are arranging a banquet at Lethbridge to Henry Holmes, Raymond, winner of the \$2,500 prize for the best bushel of hard wheat at the International Dry Farming Congress.

In Winnipeg building permits for ten months ending October 31st pass the nineteen million mark, being one million two hundred and fifty thousand advance on total for the whole of last year.

In Fort William announcement is made of a new passenger depot costing \$20,000.

In Regina a permit has been issued for the erection of a million dollar hotel, work starting immediately. A local departmental store is adding a twenty thousand dollar addition.
