### RALPH SMITH AND DUNCAN ROSS WILL SPEAK TONIGHT

PUBLIC MEETING TONIGHT INSTEAD OF TOMORROW, AS ADVERTISED — MR. SMITH IS ONE OF CANADA'S BEST SPEAKERS AND DEBATERS.

The advertised public meeting for tomorrow evening at the Westholme Opera House will take place this evening, as it is absolutely imperative that Mr. Smith, who is president of the Federal Investment Co. of Vancouver, one of the largest financial institutions of the Terminal City, returns to the south as soon as possible. ### STORM DELAYED PRINCE RUPERT

**Big Boat Eight Hours Late on Account of Storm—Brought Big Passenger List.**

After one of the roughest passages ever experienced by any of the officers or crew in these waters, the Prince Rupert arrived from the south yesterday afternoon about 5:30, some eight hours late owing to her having to anchor for just that length of time during the storm the day before yesterday at Namu Pass. Carrying a particularly large passenger list for this season of the year, as well as a number of head of live stock in the shape of horses for Jack Lindsay, the transfer man, Captain Barney Johnson had his hands full, but on every side was heard praise by the passengers for the able and masterly way he handled the ship.

From the accounts of several of the passengers, officers and stewards, for a time during the roughest part of the trip the scene must have resembled many that are often enacted while crossing the Atlantic. Women shrieking and in hysterics, children crying, stewards rushing wildly up and down, with the horses below stamping and neighing, caused an old-timer of Atlantic travel to smile to himself.

He lashed the ship to the pier and the passengers were landed without difficulty.

### T. D. PATTULLO ACCEPTS NOMINATION FOR OFFICE OF MAYOR OF THE CITY

#### Committee Waits upon Mr Pattullo With Petition Bearing Several Hundred Names and he Accepts the Nomination as Mayor

In response to a petition by J. Dennis Allen and several hundred citizens, Mr. T. D. Pattullo last night signified his willingness to accept nomination as mayor in the forthcoming municipal campaign. While Mr. Pattullo's name has been mentioned for some little time as a possible candidate for the office of mayor, it was not until last night that he gave his answer, which, in view of the very large and representative petition asking him to accept the nomination, could only be in the affirmative.

A committee of the citizens waited on him last night and received a verbal answer, which was later confirmed in writing.

Mr. Pattullo has an excellent public record and is known as a thorough business man. It is possible that he will be elected by acclamation.



## Editorial Notes and Clippings

EX-ALDERMAN PATTULLO  
WILL BE CANDIDATE.

Ex-Alderman T. D. Pattullo, in response to a largely signed petition, has expressed his willingness to accept the nomination for mayor at the forthcoming election.

No pledges nor promises are made in Mr. Pattullo's acceptance of the request of the citizens, but he intends to use his every effort to give the city a sane, clean, businesslike government, and, with a capable board of aldermen, will do much to advance Prince Rupert in this next year, which everything indicates may be one of the most important in the history of the city.

Now it is that the city must have the best brains possible in the council, for the foundation or the future city must be solidly laid or untold troubles will result in after years—the follies of today will be the tragedies of tomorrow. Enough follies have taken place in the city hitherto and it is now time for action. We must have a council capable of conducting the interests of the city with a view of the requirements of today and also with foresight for the future metropolis, and the citizens are to be congratulated that ex-Alderman Pattullo has consented to enter the contest.

Mr. Pattullo is a business man of the highest calibre, who from his public record has proved himself to be as diligent in the carrying on of the business of the city as of his own interests.

OPTIMISTIC  
SIR RICHARD.

Sir Richard McBride last night at Victoria, B.C., is credited with saying that Mr. Borden "would bring down a naval policy that would pass the Commons without a dissenting voice." Mr. McBride must count more on the patriotism and loyalty of the Liberal members of the House than upon the Conservative members who, for purely partisan reasons, opposed a navy for Canada founded on the principle that they had unanimously voted for one short year before. In spite of their partisan opposition, a naval act was passed which is yet, and now, the law of the land; but Mr. Borden, tied hand and foot to the Nationalists, who don't want a navy of any kind or even a dollar of contribution, so far has not dared to move.

Sir Richard McBride is justified in his optimism; if Mr. Borden brings down a decently adequate naval proposal, the Liberals will support it unanimously, for they are pledged to deal with any proposal Mr. Borden may make "on its merits." Can Mr. Borden say the same of his following? How about his Nationalist colleagues in the cabinet and the Nationalist supporters in the House. He will have to choke them with the butter fat of office spoils if the thing is to go through "without a dissenting voice."

JOHN OLIVER ATTACKS GOVERNMENT  
ON THE LACK OF A LAND POLICY

Former Leader of the Opposition Tells of Lack of Land Policy  
of the Government---Advocates Extra Inducements to the Settler

Vancouver, Nov. 13.—"I believe that God Almighty intended the land of this province for the use of the men who are willing to go on it and till it, and not for the speculator," said Mr. John Oliver of Delta at the close of a lengthy lecture in Orange Hall to the Vancouver Liberals. The former leader of the Liberal party had for his theme "The Land Laws of the Province," and he urged the adoption of a radical system of land settlement.

Mr. Oliver, on rising to address the meeting, said that as a man who had had practical experience in farm clearing in Ontario and in British Columbia, he was able to appreciate the benefit to the country that followed the making of wild lands productive.

Reviewing the history of the land laws of the province, he said that when the McBride government took office in 1903, practically all the province was virgin territory. It would have been possible then, he said, to formulate a land settlement policy that would have made it unnecessary for the people of the province today to have to send out \$20,000,000 a year for agricultural products. But the McBride government, which is above the law, is also above taking notice of resolutions of its followers. The only notice taken of the resolution was in Premier McBride's speech at Revelstoke a few weeks ago when he told the convention that he had been too busy to consider a land policy, but would appoint a royal commission to investigate the conditions.

He claimed that the timber wealth, the mineral wealth and the fisheries were all being de-

pleted, and it was necessary for thinking men to agitate that a portion of this vast natural wealth now being depleted be put back into the development of the agricultural wealth of the province.

"At present I say that the men who are on the land here today are not here because of any encouragement they have received at the hands of the McBride government, but in spite of the obstacles placed in the way of settlement by the McBride government.

"A year ago at Revelstoke a Conservative convention even called on the Premier by resolution to formulate a policy of land settlement in order to reduce the present high price of agricultural products. But the McBride government, which is above the law, is also above taking notice of resolutions of its followers. The only notice taken of the resolution was in Premier McBride's speech at Revelstoke a few weeks ago when he told the convention that he had been too busy to consider a land policy, but would appoint a royal commission to investigate the conditions.

"What does this mean? It means that the government intends to shirk the land question.

CANADA'S WHEAT IS NEEDED  
TO FEED EUROPEAN NATIONS

DOMINION OF CANADA EXPECTS TO EXPORT MORE THAN ONE HUNDRED MILLION BUSHELS OF WHEAT TO OLD WORLD THIS YEAR—BRITAIN NEEDS QUARTER OF AMOUNT.

Ottawa, Nov. 13.—The weekly report of the Department of Commerce and Trade contains figures which go to show the demand for wheat this year will be unusually heavy. Great Britain alone will need to import 25,000,000 bushels more than she did last year, the harvest being a failure.

Germany, The Netherlands, Italy, Spain and Portugal, Scandinavia and Switzerland, all will

need more wheat this year than last, and the total of additional requirements amounts up to 92,000,000 bushels for the wheat producing countries to supply.

It is understood that Canada is expected to export 104,000,000 bushels this year, the United States about 96,000,000 bushels, Russia, 126,000,000 bushels; the Balkan states, 56,000,000 bushels, and Argentina, Australia and Chile, 178,000,000 bushels.

## REMARKABLE PRANK

Lightning Photographs of Tree  
on Woman's Body at  
Coquitlam

One of the strangest incidents ever recorded in the history of natural science took place on the mainland recently at Coquitlam. According to a message received Mrs. M. McEachran received a shock from a flash of lightning with the effect that a tree that was struck was clearly photographed on her body.

The picture of the tree, as in the case when a picture is flashed on to a negative is upside down. Mrs. McEachran was rendered unconscious by the shock, but recovered very shortly afterward.

It appears that Mr. and Mrs. McEachran were sitting at a table near a window in their home on Pipe Lane road when the lights were extinguished by an unusually vivid flash of fork lightning. Immediately afterward a bolt passed close to Mrs. McEachran and tore a hole in the

floor of the room in which they were sitting and a large fir tree adjacent to the window fell with a crash.

It was this tree which was so faithfully portrayed on Mrs. McEachran's body.


