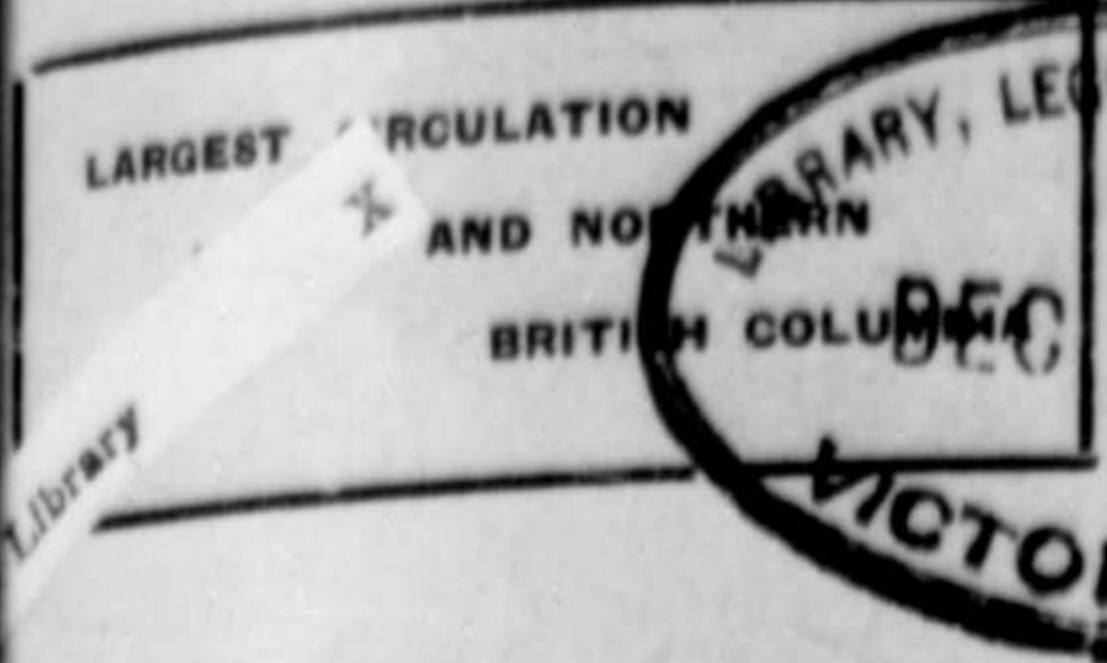

NO HOPE OF PREVENTING AUSTRIAN-SERVIAN WAR

LOCAL MEN GIVE OPTION ON CLAIMS TO EASTERNER FOR IMMENSE SUM OF MONEY

ALL HOPE ABANDONED OF PEACEFUL SETTLEMENT OF ADRIATIC TROUBLE

War Will be Matter of Hours Only Between Austria and Servia---
Five Army Corps Are Mobilized on Servian Frontier---
General Conflagration is Feared

(Special to Daily News.)

Berlin, Nov. 25.—Relations between Austria-Hungary and Servia are so strained that the diplomatic circles have abandoned all hope of preservation of peace and look for a commencement of hostilities at any hour. Every effort has been made to preserve peace but apparently without avail. The press of both countries is clamoring for war and hurling insults at the other.

Servia persists in her intention of holding a port on the Adriatic coast, and is hostile to Austrian protests. Roumania has taken a hostile attitude toward Servia, while Russia is mobilizing troops on the Austrian frontier in support of the Balkan state and her demands.

It is anticipated that immediately Austria declares war against Servia Russia will commence hostilities in aid of her allies and pour Cossacks into Austria.

Austria has mobilized five army corps on the Servian frontier and it is expected that within a few hours war will be declared and they will at once cross the border.

The final culmination of the threatened war is one that diplomats are loathe to discuss, as it is feared that Germany will back Austria in her demands, while Great Britain will join hands with Russia and Servia. Italy and France may also be drawn into the conflagration, Italy be-

ing a party to the triple alliance will join with Germany and Austria, and France, a partner to the triple-entente will enter with Russia and Great Britain.

REV F.W. KERR SPEAKS ON THE MORAL PLATFORM FOR A MAYOR

Would Have Proper Observance of Sabbath---Advises Civic Control---Abolition or Greater Regulation of Segregated District

In outlining his ideals of the platform in the coming mayoralty contest at the Empress Theatre last night, Rev. F. W. Kerr, pastor of the Presbyterian congregation, very wisely emphasized the fact that a moral mayor was of far more importance to the city than a moral platform.

He distinctly stated that he would never be a party to a delegation that would demand pre-election pledges from the candidates. He did not want promises from the candidates, but was anxious to see the city elect men that can be trusted to advance the moral welfare of the city. "Promises look too much like bribes," he remarked.

The principal plank in the moral platform of Prince Rupert's next mayor should be, according to Rev. Mr. Kerr, to lay the foundations for an industrial city, profitable employment for the residents being one of the greatest moral safeguards

of any community. In connection with this the reverend gentleman advocated municipal employment bureaus, municipal lodging houses and a fair wage commission.

"The absolute annihilation of the segregated district," is the deal policy, said Mr. Kerr, but the ratepayers should at least demand that the denizens of that district be prohibited from parading the streets, that delivery boys should not be allowed to enter the district and that a side walk be constructed direct from Fulton street to 9th Avenue, so that respectable people and especially young boys and girls would not find it necessary to pass the very mouth of the pit.

The recent action of the City Council permitting the pool rooms of the city to keep open on Sunday was discussed at considerable length. Rev. Mr. Kerr said he could not understand the council's action in the matter, thus permitting an infraction of

the criminal code of Canada. He believed that every true Canadian respected the Sabbath and that all are interested in maintaining its proper observance. The opening of the pool rooms had been instigated not by those who patronized them, but by the proprietors themselves. The opening of the pool rooms on Sunday he considered a dangerous step and that it was difficult to say where it might end. If the pool rooms are open why not bars, skating rinks, picture shows, etc.?

In introducing the subject the preacher made it clear that theory and practice are two different matters. It might be impracticable to carry out his ideals to the letter, but he was confident that much moral progress could be effected by compromising over ideals.

A large congregation listened to the address with interest, nearly every seat in the theatre being occupied.

RUPERT MEN BOND CLAIM FOR BIG SUM TO EASTERN EXPERT

MESSRS. CHAPPLE AND CAMERON INTERESTED IN CLAIM ON PORTLAND CANAL WHICH OPTION IS TAKEN FOR \$100,000

Mr. E. F. Cassels, a mining man and capitalist from New York, has taken an option on the Silver Tip group of claims, at Salmon River, near the head of Portland Canal. The properties are owned by Mr. J. W. Chapple and Robert Cameron of this city, and two prominent Stewart pioneers. The sum for which the option calls for is reported to be in the neighborhood of \$100,000.

Mr. Cassels is no stranger to the north. Away back in the late eighties he first struck Juneau, Alaska, remaining in that district for over seven years. Three years ago he came to Stewart on the top of the mining excitement that prevailed there for a few months.

In conversation with a Daily News representative on Saturday afternoon, he reiterated his firm belief in the great future in store for this district from the mining point of view. Salmon River, he says, is destined to become within the near future, a great mineral producer, the ore being there without a doubt; all that is necessary is to get things in shape to get it out, to where it can be turned into a commercial commodity.

FIFTY DIE IN PANIC AT SPANISH PICTURE SHOW

Bilboa, Spain, Nov. 25.—A cry of fire in a moving picture theatre caused a panic which resulted in 50 persons, mostly children, being killed. The number of injured is unknown as many were taken home by friends while dozens were taken to the hospitals.

The show was being held in a large tent at a small admission and consequently the place was packed with women and children.

10 KILLED IN STREET SMASH

Many Injured When Two Suburban Cars Crash Together—Ten Killed

Montreal, Nov. 25.—Ten persons were killed here today in a terrible collision between two suburban cars. Apparently the motorman did not see the danger in time to stop and the two heavy cars crashed together, killing 10 and injuring many. Both cars were crowded at the time of the accident.

Immediately the accident occurred the hospital ambulances responded to the emergency call and the injured were at once taken to the hospitals, while the dead were removed to the morgue. Some of the injured may die.

PIONEER YUKONERS IN RUPERT ON WAY SOUTH

Dr. Thompson, M.P., and Arthur Treadgold, the Great Mining Promoter South on the May

Amongst the passengers going south for the winter on the Princess May Saturday were Dr. Alfred Thompson, M.P., of the Yukon, and A. N. C. Treadgold, a prominent mining man of the north.

Dr. Thompson had just time during the short stay of the boat here to visit his brother, Mr. J. H. Thompson, one of the leading business men of this city.

The doctor, who has a large number of friends here amongst old time Klondikers, was looking in the best of health and extremely fit after the summer spent in the northern metropolis. He is very enthusiastic about the future of the mining industry in the north, and says the output of gold for this season will be about \$5,000,000, well up to the average.

Arthur Nation Christian Treadgold, the man who became famous away back in days of 1900 and 1901 as the great commissioner of the Klondike, is one of the most remarkable men who ever wended his way North.

An old country University man of no particular private means following the profession of a school master, he went to the Klondike during the original rush of '97, and soon jumped into prominence as a daring and successful mining promoter. The story of his operations during the last twelve years in the north would fill a volume. It was he who first caused the Guggenheims to be come interested in the Klondike. Today he is engineering a huge mining proposition in opposition to the Guggenheim interests. The company at his back is no other than the South African Consolidated Co., Ltd.

Mr. Treadgold will return north again in the spring, when operations upon an extensive scale will be undertaken.

DOCTORS ARE ARRESTED FOR CRIMINAL OFFENCE

Mis-use of Mails for Quack Cure and Mal-Practices Causes Many Arrests.

Washington, Nov. 23.—Post office inspectors and United States marshals in 72 leading cities of the country began today practically simultaneous raids for the arrest of 173 physicians, questionable medical and surgical practitioners and proprietors or agents of drug concerns, charged with criminal medical practice or the sale of drugs and instruments used for criminal purposes.

All of the arrests are to be made for alleged violation of Section 211 of the Penal Code of the United States, which bars from the mails any vile or obscene matter whether sealed or unsealed; any advertisement, letter or circular proposing or suggesting criminal practices; or any packet containing any substance, drug or thing intended to be used for immoral or unlawful purposes.

Chief Inspector Robert Sharp, of the Post Office department, and many of his force of 390 inspectors have been working upon the cases for many months. The development of the plans which culminated today is the most extensive raid in the history of any department of the government.

Strict enforcement of municipal and state laws in the east, it is said by the postal authorities account for the comparatively few arrests in the large cities in that part of the country, but it is said by the postal inspectors that a hotbed of this sort of criminality is in the Pacific Coast states.

On the coast they had comparatively little difficulty in obtaining a mass of evidence against accused persons.

NEW YORK GUNMEN WILL HEAR DEATH SENTENCE ON TUESDAY

FOUR GUNMEN WHO KILLED ROSENTHAL WILL RECEIVE SENTENCES ON TUESDAY FROM CHIEF JUSTICE GOFF—INFORMERS ARE FREED.

New York, Nov. 22.—Sentence on Harry Horowitz, alias "Gyp the Blood"; "Lefty Louie" Rosenberg; "Whitey" Lewis and "Dago Frank" Girofici, convicted of first degree murder for slaying Gambler Herman Rosenthal, will be imposed next Tuesday, November 26th.

This date was fixed by Justice John W. Goff in the state supreme court after motions to set aside the verdict and demands for a retrial had been denied.

The gunmen retained their nerve and were defiant and sullen throughout the proceedings.

Justice Goff granted a motion to release the wives of Horowitz and Girofici, who have been held in the house of detention here since the arrest of their husbands several weeks ago.

"Lefty Louie" said he was christened Louis Rosenberg was 21 years old, a native of Austria and married. His vocation was salesmanship, he said, was temperate and had served one jail sentence.

"Gyp the Blood" was recorded as Harry Horowitz, a clerk, 24 years old, a native of New York City, and married and temperate.

The state's informers, Rose, Vallon, Webber and Schepps, who have been held in prison during the trial, probably will be released this afternoon. The district attorney agreed today that there was no further need of keeping them behind the bars.

Rose is going to London to complete a book on the underworld and later will go into the theatrical business. Webber, who is wealthy, plans a tour of the world. Vallon has announced his intention of going to the Argentine Republic, where he plans to open a gambling establishment. Schepps says he will go to Hot Springs, Ark., to recuperate from the effects of his long confinement.

William Shapiro, driver of the "murder car" and jointly indicted

with the gunmen and Becker, also will go free. In return for his testimony for the state the district attorney's office will move that the indictment against him be quashed. Of the seven indicted for the Rosenthal murder this leaves but one defendant to be tried. He is Jack Sullivan, "King of Newsboys."

TWENTY-FOUR KILLED IN FRENCH MINE EXPLOSION

Gard, Near Nimes, Scene of Horrible Disaster—Only 68 Men in Mine Between Shifts

(Special to Daily News.)
Alais, France, Nov. 25.—Twenty-four men were killed this morning by an explosion of gas in the coal mines here.

Had the accident occurred sooner several hundred would have lost their lives as the full shift had just gone off duty and only 58 men were in the mine at the time of the disaster.

A rescue party, hurriedly formed, has recovered 21 bodies while the other three are in a remote part of the mine which can not be penetrated just yet.

Alais is a city of 20,000 inhabitants and is situated in the heart of the coal mining department of Gard, twenty-five miles northwest of Nimes.

THE SEWER BY-LAW

Tonight is the last opportunity the council have for arranging for an expert to give his opinion on the sewerage system before the by-law is voted upon.

Next Saturday the ratepayers will cast their ballots for or against the expenditure of a million, or more, of money. Sewerage is absolutely essential and must be installed, and we would not for a single moment depreciate the value or necessity of proper drainage, but we do not approve of the

business methods of the council who would have the by-law accepted first and corrected afterwards. This is too much like the methods of olden times when a man was executed before his trial.

The expenditure of the amount of money involved is too great not to take every precaution, and while the plans may be excellent and the proposed system without flaw, the word of one man is not sufficient to have the by-law set before the voters, no matter how expert and proficient that man is.

MINISTER OF PUBLIC WORKS IS CHARGED WITH BRIBING VOTERS

MACDONALD ELECTION IS PROTESTED AND HON. R. ROGERS AND ROBILIN WITH OTHERS ARE CHARGED WITH BRIBERY, CORRUPTION AND INTIMIDATION.

Below will be found the charges in full as set forth in the petition for the disqualification of Alexander Morrison, the recently elected candidate in Macdonald, Manitoba. Hon. Robert Rogers, whose political record is credited with much that is unsavory, is largely connected with the alleged bribery and corruption. Feeling runs high over the arrest during the campaign of several of the Liberal workers and the subsequent mock trials and maladministration of justice. The following is from the Winnipeg Free Press of November 16th.

A petition against the return of Alex. Morrison of Homewood as member for Macdonald was filed this morning at the court house. The petitioners against the return are Dr. Andrew W. Myles of Treherne and John E. Woods of Somerset, electors of the division.

The petition charges that Mr. Morrison was, by himself and

agents, before, during and after the said election, guilty of bribery, treating, personation and undue influence, whereby the said Morrison is incapacitated from serving in Parliament. The statutory charges of bribery and corruption are set forth in the petition. It is charged that voters were paid money to refrain from voting. Further charges are those of providing liquor, hiring and promising to pay for carriages to convey voters to the polls, and illegally supplying transportation to voters. Undue influence and intimidation are also charged. The personal disqualification of Mr. Morrison is asked for, but the seat is not claimed for the opposition candidate.

Misuse of Police Power.

The most interesting charge is the one in which the misuse of the police powers of the province is charged. It is alleged that Hon. Robert Rogers, Sir Rodmond

P. Roblin, Hon. Colin H. Campbell and W. H. Sharpe, M. P., acting as agents for Mr. Morrison, "employed and set to work and gave instructions to certain justices of the peace, police constables, police officials, detectives, agents and other persons, to arrest and put in jail and keep confined therein persons whom they should discover in the said electoral district to be engaged in soliciting votes for or in advocating the candidature of R. L. Richardson."

Either Government or Ministers.

It is charged that said justices of the peace, constables, etc., were paid for carrying out said instructions, either by the provincial government or by the said Hon. Robert Rogers, Sir R. P. Roblin, Hon. Colin H. Campbell, W. H. Sharpe, M. P., as agents for the said Alexander Morrison.

It is charged that, in accordance with these instructions, these officials "at said election falsely and maliciously and without reasonable or probable cause, arrested or caused to be arrested on warrants issued in blank to them, and on other warrants corruptly and wickedly issued, contrary to law, a number of persons in said electoral district who were found soliciting votes for and advocating the candidature of R. L. Richardson, on false, factitious, pretended and malicious charges, preferred by them against said persons; and caused said persons to be deprived of their liberty and confined to jail."

It is further charged that "by the arrest of said persons the right of freedom of free discussion and free speech, and the right to solicit votes at said election for and to advocate the candidature of Robert L. Richardson were taken away and destroyed." This is given as a reason why Mr. Morrison is, under the law, incapacitated from serving in Parliament, and his election made wholly null and void.

Intimidation.

It is further charged that the police constables, police officials, detectives and agents, under instructions from the parties mentioned, made it known in several places and districts among large numbers of electors who intended to legitimately solicit votes for the opposition candidate, that they had power to, and would, arrest all persons found soliciting votes for, or advocating the candidature of, Mr. Richardson; and further made it known to such electors that soliciting votes for R. L. Richardson or advocating his election constituted a criminal offense which would render the person found guilty of committing it liable to immediate imprisonment. By these means, it is charged, persons were frightened or intimidated from soliciting votes or advocating the candidature of R. L. Richardson; and it is stated that they refrained from doing so, and also refrained from casting their votes at said election.

The petitioners ask the courts to declare that the respondent was not duly elected; that Alexander Morrison was guilty under the law of corrupt and illegal acts and practices; that he may accordingly be adjudged disqualified and incapable of sitting in the House of Commons, or of voting.

CLAIMS DOCTOR LEFT FORCEPS IN ABDOMEN

North Yakima, Wash., Nov. 23.—Charging that he left half of a pair of forceps in her abdomen while operating on her, Mrs. Emma Hickey of Sunnyside is again suing Dr. Wilbur Fordyce for \$25,000 damages here. The first trial resulted in a disagreement.

OPPOSES CHANGE IN THE PHILIPPINE GOVT.

Presbyterian Missionary Declares Filipinos Consider U. S. Rule Satisfactory.

Pasadena, Cal., Nov. 23.—Rev. K. P. MacDonald, in charge of the Presbyterian mission province of Camarines, in the Philippines, for three years, declared here that the islands are unfit for independence, such as is proposed to be given them by the next Congress, July 4, 1913.

"Do not confuse independence with self-government," said Dr. MacDonald. "They have self-government now in a great degree in municipal and insular affairs of a local nature. But the Filipinos of the better class themselves realize that they are being better governed by the United States than they were before, and there are few of them who would welcome independence. Most of the leading Filipinos are afraid to admit this, however, as it would make them unpopular with the ignorant natives."

T. F. McCully, Tom James and William Cornick, all well known mining men of the Portland Canal district, arrived in the city on the last trip of the Prince John from Stewart.

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FOGEL WANTS TRIAL LATER

Owner of Philadelphia Nationals Asks For Postponement Pending Sale of His Club.

New York, Nov. 23.—It was learned tonight that Horace Fogel, president of the Philadelphia National League Baseball Club, has sent a letter to all of the club presidents in the league requesting that his trial, set for November 26th, on a charge of conduct unbecoming a National League president, be put over to a later date. He said that he desired this postponement because he was negotiating the sale of his club and desired to conclude it before the case came up.

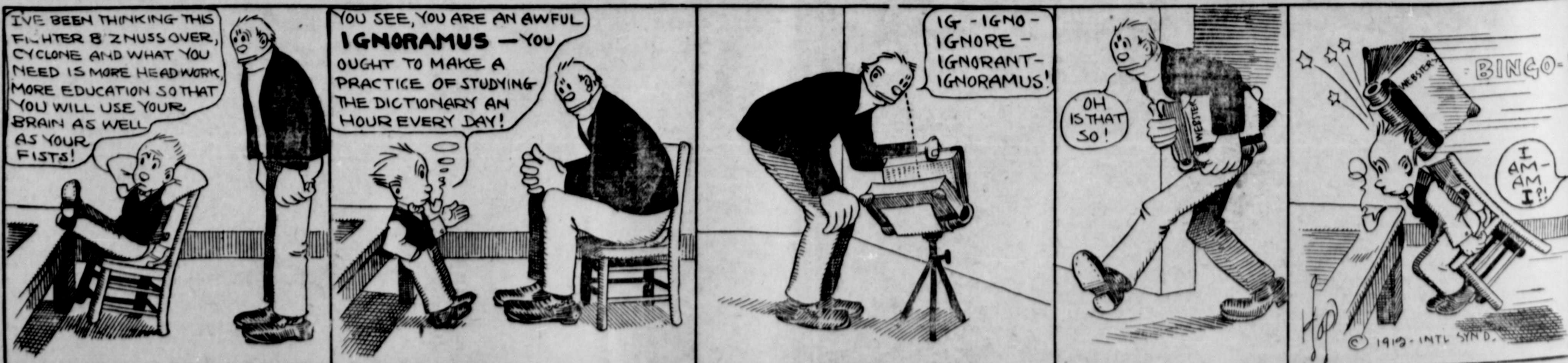

Not long ago Burns changed his offer of a split of 60 per cent. of the receipts to \$1,200 and Bayley turned it down flat. Now Burns offers \$1,700 and three round trip tickets which amounts approximately to \$2,000, and the champion is considering it very strongly.

Bayley is to have his choice of referees. He has in mind Freddie Lowes, "Cap" Stewart of Calgary, Bob McDonald of Edmonton and Jimmy Hewitt of Vancouver. Any one of these men will suit him.

The fight will be under clean break rules, and it may be said right now that Bayley has not any doubt whatever of his ability to beat the challenger.

WOLVERTON BACK TO BERTH ON COAST

Will Take Charge of Sacramento and Will Be Highest Priced Man on Circuit.

Sacramento, Cal., Nov. 23.—A message from Jack Atkin, chief owner of the Sacramento Coast League club, who is now in Los Angeles, advised Manager Charles Graham that nothing now stands in the way of signing Harry Wolverton, former leader of the New York Yankees as leader of the Senators for 1913. Graham at once forwarded a contract to Wolverton, who is now wintering in Philadelphia, and Sacramento's quest for managerial material for next year is at an end.

The last point of doubt was cleared up by Atkin's ratification of Wolverton's demand that he be allowed to purchase his release at a specified price at the end of the 1913 season should he not care to continue with Sacramento.

Although no figures have been given out, Atkin and Graham say Wolverton will be the highest salaried manager in the Coast League. He will have absolute control in the selecting of players and will also make his own decision as to whether he will be a bench or playing manager. The Sacramento owners believe that his playing will be limited to that of pinch hitting, in which capacity he finished the American League season this year in the 300 class.

Graham forwarded to Wolverton the full details of all deals now pending for new players for 1913, also a complete review of the players now under reserve and contract with the club.

That the former heavyweight champion does not enjoy the popularity he fondly imagined he basked in is evident from the tone of the letters which are being sent daily to the sporting editors of the Calgary papers. It appears foolish of Burns to try to dictate to the ring champions of Canada, and he has made himself the laughing stock of the country by his attempts to bully Bayley into a fight which would result in a boost of T. Burns' bank roll. His presentation of the championship belt to Dick Hyland is the biggest sporting joke of the year, outside the interview that Tommy gave out a few months ago to the effect that he was going to return to the ring. Hyland, no doubt, was threatened with being blacklisted unless he accepted the honor. Mr. Burns will now go ahead and stage a few "championship" bouts, but from the outcry that is being raised around Calgary he has not succeeded in pulling the wool over the eyes of the ex-prairie fight fans as he supposed he would, when he hung up that new belt.—Victoria Times.

Hogan Is Through. As a result of his successive defeats by Frankie Burns and Leach Cross, "One Round" Hogan, who not so very long ago was heralded as a promising aspirant for the lightweight crown, has decided to retire from the ring. In Taylor, Ottawa loses a most sensational player. The wonderful Listowell player has probably the largest following of any individual hockey star playing the game. The fact that Fred Taylor played on a team was enough to draw out the crowds.

Taylor is an ardent advocate of the seven man game, and the determination of the N. H. A. to stick by the six man rule had a lot to do with his migration to the coast. He also declares the six man style a "man killer," forcing a player to go sixty minutes practically without a rest. "It might be all right on a small rink, where seven men would be a crowd, but with the big rinks we have in the N. H. A. I don't see the need of it," says Fred. "Seven men on the ice are none too many. With the six men style the forwards are called upon to do so much that they can't check back as they ought to, and this makes it hard on a defence."

COAL MINE MANAGER IS SENTENCED TO PRISON

C. E. Houston, of Pacific Coal Company Goes to Jail for Fraud

Tacoma, Wash., Nov. 23.—"There is in Seattle an honest woman, a loving woman, who has been upon her knees all day weeping and praying that the stigma of a prisoner husband should not be placed upon her babes—a stigma they would carry all their lives. This woman is hoping with an aching heart that she, her two babes and myself are not disgraced forever. I never profited one penny from any sales to the government. I never authorized anyone to approach a juror; furthermore, I warned against it. I would not make this plea for myself. A man is supposed to stand anything that comes to him, and what I say is not for myself, but for those whom I love and are dear to me."

With the foregoing dramatic speech, the first he ever made in his life, Charles E. Houston, manager of the Pacific Coast Coal Company of Seattle, the largest concern of its kind in the Northwest, convicted of defrauding the government of about \$50,000 by conspiracy to obtain contracts on collusive bids, faced Judge Cushman in the Federal court last night for sentence, every resource of expert counsel having been exhausted to save him from prison.

The picture he drew brought tears to the eyes of the little band of spectators and friends who accompanied him, but it could not save him from prison. "It is the sentence of the court that you pay a fine of \$2,000 and be imprisoned in the King County jail for one year," said Judge Cushman.

John H. Bullock of Portland and San Francisco, who was formerly president of the John J. Seson Company, also convicted of being in the conspiracy, received a like sentence.
