Why Milk Curdles.

Everyone knows that milk has a tendency to curdle during thunder storms, and that meat seems to spoil more quickly at such times. A French scientist of the Pasteur Institute has discovered the cause of these changes. The result of his experiments prove that electrical fields have no effect either upon milk or upon meat, but that in consequence of the lowering of atmospheric tension that follows a thunder storm, there is an emanation of gases from the soil that stimulate the decomposition of organic substances and the growth of putrefactive microbes. He suggests that this may explain the sudden change for the worse in extensive wounds that often occurs with a low barometer, and the rapid increase in epidemic diseases under the same conditions.

ADVISES BOARD OF INSPECTORS.

We have received a letter from a gentleman who suggests that the City Council appoint a board to investigate all outside properties placed on the market in Prince Rupert with a view to protecting the citizens from the wildcatter and his illegitimate propositions. He instances properties which have been placed on the market in British Columbia that have been falsely represented to the buying public and argues that a civic board of inspectors, who would approve of every outside proposition before it would be allowed sale, would be a great protection to the legitimate realty broker in the city.

PREPARING FOR THE FALL FAIR.

The forming of an agricultural society last night is an important step in the history of the city and in the development of the North. With a duly constituted board in charge, it is now an almost certainty that the proposed fall fair next autumn will be gone ahead with in a manner which will bring credit to the districts represented.

The country is such a large one and the means of transportation so meagre that it would be a matter of great difficulty to cover the ground in a few months time. The various districts surrounding Prince Rupert have enthusiastically endorsed the proposition and now that the agricultural and mineral society has been formed the concentrated efforts of those interested cannot help but end in success.

Robt. Lowery, in Greenwood Ledge. Roses were picked in Kaslo last week. St. Elmo expects a boom in the spring.

A machine shop has opened in Kelowna. The planing mill at Gerrard will run all winter. A Frontier Club has been organized at Lillooet.

Hay was \$16 a ton in Vernon twenty years ago. A cannery will be built at Summerland next year.

Owing to a lack of snow there is a wood famine in Quesnel. The new post office at the mouth of Mud River is called Chilcoo.

In a year the Indians in Canada earn over five million dollars. Celery is a little less than 8 cents a pound in New Denver.

J. O. Williamson is the new postmaster at South Fort George. Potatoes are \$80 a ton at Fraser Lake and grain 10 cents a pound.

The Imperial Oil Co. has 8,000 gallons of oil stored near Penticton. Mr. Eggert, from Atlin, has opened a jewelry store in Penticton.

Ten residents of Summerland are going to England for Christmas. For twenty-five years C. A. Phair has run a store in Lillooet.

Molson expects to get a creamery and flouring mill within the next year. The building of the government office at Fort Fraser has been completed.

The ice surface in the new skating rink at Silvertown will be 50 by 200 feet. George Stillman of Spokane will start a wagon box factory in Medicine Hat.

A K. of P. lodge has been organized in Penticton with forty-three charter members. The police have shut out pea pool and slot machines in South Fort George.

In Vancouver recently a man was sent to jail for stealing a set of false teeth. English farmers have recently bought some land not far from Poplar Creek.

The steel is laid for two miles west of Penticton on the Kettle Valley Railway. All the mines around Ainsworth now have telephone connection with that town.

Jim Hickey and Nick Schug have found five feet of coal near Graham Island. Creamery butter is 40 cents a pound in Vernon, and fresh eggs 60 cents a dozen.

All the hydraulic claims in the vicinity of Barkerville have quit work for the winter. H. C. Thomlinson has been appointed manager of the skating rink in New Denver.

The Merritt Herald will buy more type and move into new quarters next January. A colony of Seventh Day Adventists are arranging to start a colony on Graham Island.

M. C. Gray of Pullman, Wash., will establish a big stock farm on the Fraser at Salmon River. George E. McLaughlin has been appointed manager of the hockey team in South Fort George.

In some parts of the Nicola Valley beavers are so numerous that they have damaged crops. C. Knutson of Spokane expects next year to build an hotel at Penticton that will cost \$120,000.

Frank Peacock has been appointed superintendent of the Diamond Vale coal mine at Merritt. The population of Victoria and its suburbs is 62,000. It had about half as many over fifty years ago.

At a salary of \$3,000 a year, J. S. Gordon has been appointed city superintendent of schools in Vancouver. In one day recently Herman Clever shipped \$4,700 worth of beef hides to Minnesota from New Denver.

Red Thompson has quit the salt sea and is once more putting zephyrs of wit into the Chased Tribune. The C. P. R. has reduced its freight rate on potatoes from Ashcroft to the coast from \$4 a ton to \$2.60.

There are about 100 Chinese lotteries in Vancouver, most of whom checkrack anybody who wins a prize. Through the orchards on the benches of Penticton the Kettle Valley Railway has a right-of-way 100 feet wide.

Merritt is a busy town, for any place where the river passes through the town you can see the beavers building dams.

Bruce Ridpath seems to have two good men in McLean of Westminster and Cameron of Port Arthur, says the Toronto News.

The Tecumsehs of the N. H. A. must be using the "dark lantern" methods. Outside of signing up Horace Gaul, who has a bad pair of knees, and their sensational offer of \$1,000 for Taylor, who belonged to another club, nothing has been heard of the Indian outfit.
