



NAVAL POLICY IS TO GIVE THREE BATTLESHIPS

LOCAL MEN HAVE AN EXCITING TIME LAST NIGHT IN AN OPEN BOAT IN A BIG STORM

TURKISH FLEET ORDERED TO ENGAGE WITH GRECIAN NAVY

NAVAL BATTLE IS DOUBTED—KING GEORGE OF GREECE GIVES HIS REASONS FOR NOT ENTERING INTO ARMISTICE—DISTRUSTED THE TURKS' INTENTIONS.

(Special to Daily News.) Constantinople, Dec. 6.—The Turkish fleet is concentrating in the Dardanelles Straits and the government has decided to order it to engage with the Greecian fleet.

Although the navy has been ordered to engage the Greecian fleet, there is considerable skepticism here as to the probability of a naval battle.

London, Dec. 6.—It has been announced here that the reason why Greece did not participate in the peace negotiations and in the signing of the armistice was the fear that Turkey would not abide by the terms.

Sofia, Dec. 6.—A despatch from Athens gives the reason why King George of Greece did not enter into the peace negotiations and

sign the armistice as a fear that the Turks would avail themselves of an armistice to strengthen their positions.

Ottawa, Dec. 5.—The British Columbia & White River Railway Company has given notice that it will apply to Parliament this session for an extension of the time for construction of its main line and branches.

CANADIAN PACIFIC WILL BUILD THOUSAND MILES

Gigantic Programme Planned for Next Year By That Road.

Winnipeg, Dec. 6.—According to the present plans, the Canadian Pacific Railway will build over one thousand miles of new lines in Western Canada next year.

Included in the programme is 250 miles of double tracking from Head Lake to the Pacific Coast, and between six and seven hundred miles of branch lines.

MR. L. CRIPPEN HAS A MOST EXCITING TIME IN A BOAT

ADRIFT ON THE STORMY MAIN FOR SOME HOURS, HE IS RESCUED BY INDIANS, WHILE HIS HONOR JUDGE YOUNG HAS TO REMAIN ON ROCK UNTIL MIDNIGHT.

Adrift for some time in an open boat without power of saving himself was the experience of Mr. L. Crippen yesterday afternoon.

It appears that Major Gibson, who left this morning for Vancouver, wished to have his boat beached on Digby Island for the winter. His Honor Judge Young offered to tow the launch over there for Major Gibson with his pleasure boat.

Mr. Crippen's assistance was secured and he invited two young ladies to enjoy the pleasure of the outing. Crippen and his two young lady friends occupied the Major's boat, while Judge Young operated his boat alone.

All went well until stormy weather was encountered, when the tow separated from her parent ship. After several fruitless attempts to secure and hold the launch, Judge Young succeeded

in transferring the young ladies into his launch, intending to land them and then return for Crippen.

The Judge landed alright, but too well. Try as he would he could not get his launch into deep water again, having run on a rock in attempting to gain shore, and it was not until nearly midnight that he succeeded in successfully launching his craft.

In the meantime, Mr. Crippen was adrift on the raging deep without any locomotive power whatever. Finally he was rescued by an Indian power launch which conveyed the launch to Digby Island, where it was beached.

Having beached the boat, the Indians returned to where the Judge had stranded and took the young ladies back to the city. Judge Young stayed with his launch and succeeded in getting off the rocks at high water.

THREE DREADNAUGHTS ARE PROVIDED FOR IN GOVERNMENT NAVAL POLICY

Three Battleships Costing \$35,000,000 to be Given to British Admiralty---To be Returned if Canada Builds Navy---

Canadian Men May Serve on Them

(Special to Daily News.)

Ottawa, Dec. 6.—Yesterday afternoon in the presence of a crowded house and amid deep silence, Rt. Hon. Robert L. Borden, premier of Canada, announced his naval policy which for the past few months he has kept so closely guarded.

The leading feature of the proposed act is to provide for the granting of \$35,000,000 for the immediate building of three battleships of the Dreadnaught class which will act as a part of the British navy for the common defence of the Empire. Another important announcement or rather a stipulation in the giving of the three battleships is that when Canada decides to establish a navy of her own, or when a unit of the Imperial navy is established.

ed in Canadian waters the three ships may be recalled.

According to arrangements made with the admiralty of the British Empire Canadian officers and men may serve on the proposed battleships.

The ships will be built in the Old Country under the direct supervision of the admiralty because there are no facilities for the building of such large craft in Canada.

The bill was read a first time after which the House proceeded with the orders of the day.

When the Premier entered the chamber he was given a great ovation. The galleries were crowded and many were seen on the floor of the House, including H.R.H. Duchess of Connaught and Princess Patricia.

For days past members have been besieged with requests for tickets for the galleries for the day, when one of the most important announcements in the history of Canada was to be made. Long before the time set for the introduction of the bill the galleries were filled.

Sir Wilfrid Laurier, the ex-premier and leader of the opposition, acted in a most gracious and magnanimous manner, and after the delay occasioned by the reading of the bill for the first time assured the Premier with good grace that the Liberals were as eager for the protection of the Empire and as true to the flag as the Conservatives, and would work to that end.

Hon. Mr. Borden spoke for one hour and fifteen minutes.

Rumors of Probable Uprising Against Czar in Poland Are Rife.

London, Dec. 5.—Pamphlets have been distributed in the streets of Warsaw calling upon the people to celebrate the anniversary of the Polish revolution of 1830 by declaring that the Polish nation must take active measures against Russia, says a special despatch from Warsaw.

Troops patrol the city, the despatch continues, and there have been many arrests of students and workmen.

The managers of the Polish schools have been informed their institutions will be closed if the students attend church services commemorating the revolution.

Editorial Notes and Clippings**PEACE IN EUROPE.**

With the signing of the armistice by the Balkans and Turkey and the renewed assurance of the powers of the triple entente and the triple alliance that they will go any length to preserve peace, the European peoples are breathing easier and are resuming a smile of satisfaction again. It is hard to predict, however, the length of time that will elapse before the Dove of Peace is again scared from the perch on which she is presumably about to rest.

Churchill spoke wisely when he said that a great European conflict would plunge the continent into the desolation of the Middle Ages. Nothing is so terrible as war. The few weeks of the Balkan struggle with all its horrible pictures—the dead and dying in the trenches and the relentless plague which silently but quickly carries off men by the thousands—is a horrible object lesson to the militarists who would plunge the world into a bloody conflict. What the Balkan war is would be but a miniature of the death and desolation which would fol-

low a European conflagration, and it is comforting to realize that the war lords of the world are profiting by the lesson so vividly portrayed.

THE NAVAL POLICY

The full details of the closely guarded naval policy of the Dominion Government, which was brought before the House of Commons yesterday have not been transmitted to us here in Prince Rupert, and we are practically only told that the proposed act provides for the voting of \$35,000,000 to the British Government to provide three battleships of the Dreadnaught class which will form a part of the British navy until such time as Canada establishes a naval unit of her own.

What provision is made for the establishment of that Canadian navy is not yet known, but from the tone of the proposed contribution of the three ships some arrangement must be under way along the line of the Laurier policy to establish a Canadian navy, which will be built in Canada and be manned by Canadians.

CANADA WILL HAVE TO GIVE FIVE PER CENT

London Financiers Will Not Lend Canada Any Money at Old Rates

London, Dec. 6—Saskatoon's decision to offer her new loan on a five per cent. basis is regarded here as a wise proceeding. It recalls the words of the late C. M. Hays before boarding the ill-fated *Titanic*:

"Canada is not getting too much money, but she is getting it too cheaply."

Five per cent. seems likely to be the ruling figure for Canadian issues, except for the high-class provincial and municipal stocks. There is little doubt that numerous other Canadian issues would appear if they had any chance of success.
