TRAIN ROBBER HOLDS UP TRAIN IN VANCOUVER YARDS—GETS AWAY WITH LARGE SUM

DEBATE ON THE NAVAL BILL TO TAKE PLACE ON THURSDAY

SECOND READING OF BORDEN'S POLICY WILL TAKE PLACE THIS WEEK—LAURIER TO RESPOND—FOSTER AND CLARK TO PARTICIPATE IN DEBATE.

(Special to Daily News.)
Ottawa, Dec. 8.—The probabilities are that the debate on the naval proposal will not be proceeded with until Thursday, when Premier Borden will move the second reading of the bill and Sir Wilfrid Laurier will outline the Liberal policy in regard to the naval protection of Canada and the Empire.
Hon. George E. Foster will reply to Sir Wilfrid, and it is understood that the second speaker on the Liberal side will be C. M. Clark, member from Red Deer, who has not spoken this session.

Work Commences.
This morning the work of laying the big water pipes for the main across Shawatlans Passage was commenced under the supervision of City Engineer W. McE. Mason. The further work of removing the pumping plant at present located at Morse Creek to Shawatlans Lake will be undertaken in the near future. It is expected that this part of the work will be completed early in the coming year.

CANADIAN BANK OF COMMERCE MOVES TO THE NEW BUILDING

PIONEER FINANCIAL INSTITUTION OF PRINCE RUPERT INSTALLED IN NEW OFFICES ON SECOND AVENUE—EXCELLENT ACCOMMODATION FOR THE CLERKS.

Immediately upon closing business for the day on Saturday at 1 o'clock, the Canadian Bank of Commerce started to make the big trek from their old quarters on the corner of Third street and Second avenue to the palatial new bank building just completed next to the Prince Rupert Club. The entire staff, together with carpenters and the express people, set to with a will in the work of removing the vast amount of impedimenta that goes to make up the necessary adjuncts of a modern bank.
For the time being the fixtures that have been in use in the late quarters will be used in the new building, the intention being, at no very distant date, to replace them with an entirely new set.
The Bank of Commerce can claim for itself the honor and prestige of being the pioneer bank of Prince Rupert, it having established itself in an up-to-date and commodious frame building on the G. T. P. reserve, in the heart of what was then known as Knoxville, early in the spring of 1907.
The original building, which has become almost historic, was later used as the first city hall, where many a hard fought struggle took place amongst the pioneer city fathers. At the time of the fall of Knoxville the

famous little building having been purchased by Messrs. Ritchie & Agnew, the civil engineers and surveyors, was removed to a lot owned by them on McBride street, and which they at present occupy as a residence and office.
The Bank of Commerce always holds a commanding position amongst the financial institutions in any city in the Dominion, and in this respect Prince Rupert is no exception. Their thoughtfulness and consideration for the comfort and welfare of the members of their staffs finds ample confirmation in the splendid accommodation provided in the upper part of the new building as living quarters for the "bank boys." Large airy bedrooms, spacious dining room and all the necessary offices that go to make up the most comfortable and even luxurious bachelor domain are to be found, and the boys are not lacking in their appreciation of the many good things that fall to their lot.
This morning at 10 o'clock everything was ready for the business of the day upon the throwing open of the doors of the new building and a large crowd of customers and others visited the bank to express their admiration and congratulations upon the latest addition to our civic growth.

BILL TO BE INTRODUCED IN COMMONS TO FORBID SOCCER

ONLY SOLDIERS OR SAILORS TO BE ALLOWED TO PLAY FOOTBALL IS THE INTENTION OF MEN WHO FRAME BILL.

London, Dec. 7.—Colonel Ford, founder of the National Reserve, has been engaged, in conjunction with two members of Parliament, in framing a bill forbidding the playing of football except by those who have rendered or who have bound themselves to render naval or military service to their country.
Laws for the suppression of football have already figured in English history. By an act of Edward III football was prohibited as being one of the pastimes responsible for the decadence of archery. In the reign of Richard II a similar statute was enacted, and Henry VIII, Elizabeth and the early Georges also made laws against football.

RAILWAY COMPANY OFFERS BIG REWARD FOR CAPTURE OF VANCOUVER DESPERADO

Police of City and Railway Company Search for Man Who Robbed Train in Vancouver Yard Limits and Got Away With \$300 in Gold and Jewels

Vancouver, Dec. 9.—Although the local police department, assisted by the C. P. R. constables, have been combing the districts adjoining the C. P. R. right-of-way for trace of the bandit who held up the observation car of the C. P. R. Imperial Limited at 7:45 on Saturday evening, no success has so far crowned their efforts.
Up to noon today absolutely no trace of the holdup man had

been obtained. The boldness of the robber in successfully planning and carrying out a crime of this kind leads the police to believe that they have to deal with a experienced highwayman. In consequence of this, more than ordinary methods are being adopted to capture him, if he is still in hiding in the city, and a special search is being instituted for his apprehension, if he has succeeded in escaping to the adjoining districts.

In order to stimulate the search the Canadian Pacific Railway Company have offered \$500 reward for his capture.
The crime was committed within the railway yards of Vancouver, and the highwayman dropped off the train at Barnet and succeeded in getting away into the thick bushes near the track. He collected money and jewellery to the value of over \$300.

BELLA COOLA TO BE THE TERMINUS OF TRANSCONTINENTAL RAILWAY

HUDSON BAY LINE HAS TWO ROUTES THROUGH BRITISH COLUMBIA, BUT BOTH HAVE BELLA COOLA AS TERMINUS—APPLICATION FOR EXTENSION OF TIME.

Ottawa, Dec. 9.—In its application to Parliament for an extension of time in which to complete its railway from Hudson Bay to the Pacific Coast, the Hudson's Bay Railway outlines its course through British Columbia.
Starting from a point near Kilsquiat, at the head of Dean Channel, or Bella Coola, it will run in a northeasterly direction

to a point at or near Elcatecho Lake, thence in a northeasterly direction by the valleys of the Upper and Lower Nechaco Rivers and Carp Lake to a point at or near Fort McLeod.
Another route may be by the Bella Coola Valley in an easterly direction to Puntz Lake, thence in a northeasterly direction by Nazzoze River to a point at or near Fort George.

ARCHBISHOP CASEY WAS INSTALLED YESTERDAY

Adelaide, Australia, Dec. 7.—At the interstate conference of master printers held in Adelaide recently the dearth of apprentices was discussed at considerable length. Russia Buys Coal.

St. Petersburg, Dec. 7.—Owing to the scarcity of Russian coal and the consequent rise in prices, the Russian minister of communications has bought foreign coal for use on the state railways.

Actress Dies.

New York, Dec. 7.—Prominent in Washington society during the administration of Grover Cleveland, Miss Lancing Rowan, actress, and niece of former Secretary of the Treasury Lyman Gage, is dead following an operation for neuritis.

Arson Trust Found.

Madison, Wis., Dec. 7.—State Fire Marshall Purtall insisted that he has uncovered an "arson trust" which has destroyed \$1,000,000 worth of property. Warrants have been issued for the principal alleged offenders.

ALLEGED THAT GYPSIES STOLE CHILD FROM NEW WESTMINSTER

LITTLE GIRL DISAPPEARS FROM ROYAL CITY SHORTLY AFTER NOMADS VISIT THAT PLACE—TRACED TO NELSON—TRAIL LOST AT SPOKANE.

Nelson, Dec. 7.—Chief of Police Devitt has received a telegram from Mr. Peter Mitchell of New Westminster stating that he believes his daughter has been kidnapped by a band of Gypsies recently in Nelson and asking him to hold the band. No particulars as to the age or appearance of the girl are given.
The Gypsies, whose tribe's

name is Raneo, were in Nelson last week and one of the women was convicted of theft in connection with fortune telling and was released on suspended sentence after refunding the money stolen. Soon after the band left by a Great Northern train for Spokane.
Before coming to Nelson the band had been in Trail, where one of the women was in trouble with the police and was released on suspended sentence.

Oregon Town Wrecked.

Pendleton, Ore., Dec. 7.—Pendleton, is repairing the damage done by a terrific windstorm which lasted an hour and paralyzed telephone, telegraph and light service. County Treasurer G. W. Bradley was badly hurt when a window sash was blown out in the court house, falling on him. Several stitches were required to dress the wounds.

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YOUNG MAN LOST ACROSS BAY AND FRIENDS FEAR FOR HIM

J. ANDERSON BECOMES SEPARATED FROM HIS COMPANIONS AND DOES NOT RETURN AT TIME APPOINTED—SEARCH PARTY LEFT THIS MORNING TO LOOK FOR HIM.

Much anxiety is felt amongst the numerous friends and acquaintances of J. Anderson, the well known and popular young man who drives a delivery wagon for the Pioneer Laundry. It appears that together with two companions he went on a hunting expedition yesterday morning across the harbor. In some manner he got separated from the others and did not return to the boat at the hour they had agreed upon to return home.
His two chums waited anxiously for him until after midnight,

shouting and firing off their rifles in the hope of locating him. The latter then returned to Prince Rupert, and it is beyond a question that Anderson was forced to spend the night wandering around in the woods.
This morning a party went off again in a gasoline launch to search for him, and it is earnestly hoped that they will find him safe and sound and none the worse for his outing. Young Anderson, who has been a resident of this city for a number of years, was married in the early part of the summer.

LITTLE BOY IDENTIFIES MAN WHO CONFESSED BY POST CARD

HICKEY, THE CHILD MURDERER, IS IDENTIFIED BY LITTLE TOT WHO WAS WITH JOSEPHS AT TIME OF KILLING—FIRST MURDER PROVED.

Buffalo, N. Y., Dec. 7.—J. Frank Hickey, confessed murderer of Josephs, the 7-year-old Lackawanna boy, and of Michael Kruck, the New York newsboy, and the slayer of Edward Morey of Lowell, Mass., whom he killed accidentally by giving him an overdose of poison in a drink of whisky, was identified by Gordon Titton, the 8-year-old companion of the Josephs boy, as the man who, on October 12, 1911, the day the Josephs boy was murdered, bought him candy.
"That's the man right there," cried the Titton boy as he pointed to Hickey, lined up with several other prisoners. "He bought me the lemon suckers and the rest of the candy for Joey."

Hickey displayed no concern when the boy pointed him out.
Lowell, Mass., Dec. 7.—Edward Morey died on September 1, 1883, in a drug store here under circumstances which agree to those related by Hickey at Buffalo. At the time of Morey's death there was no suspicion that he had been poisoned and death was attributed to apoplexy.

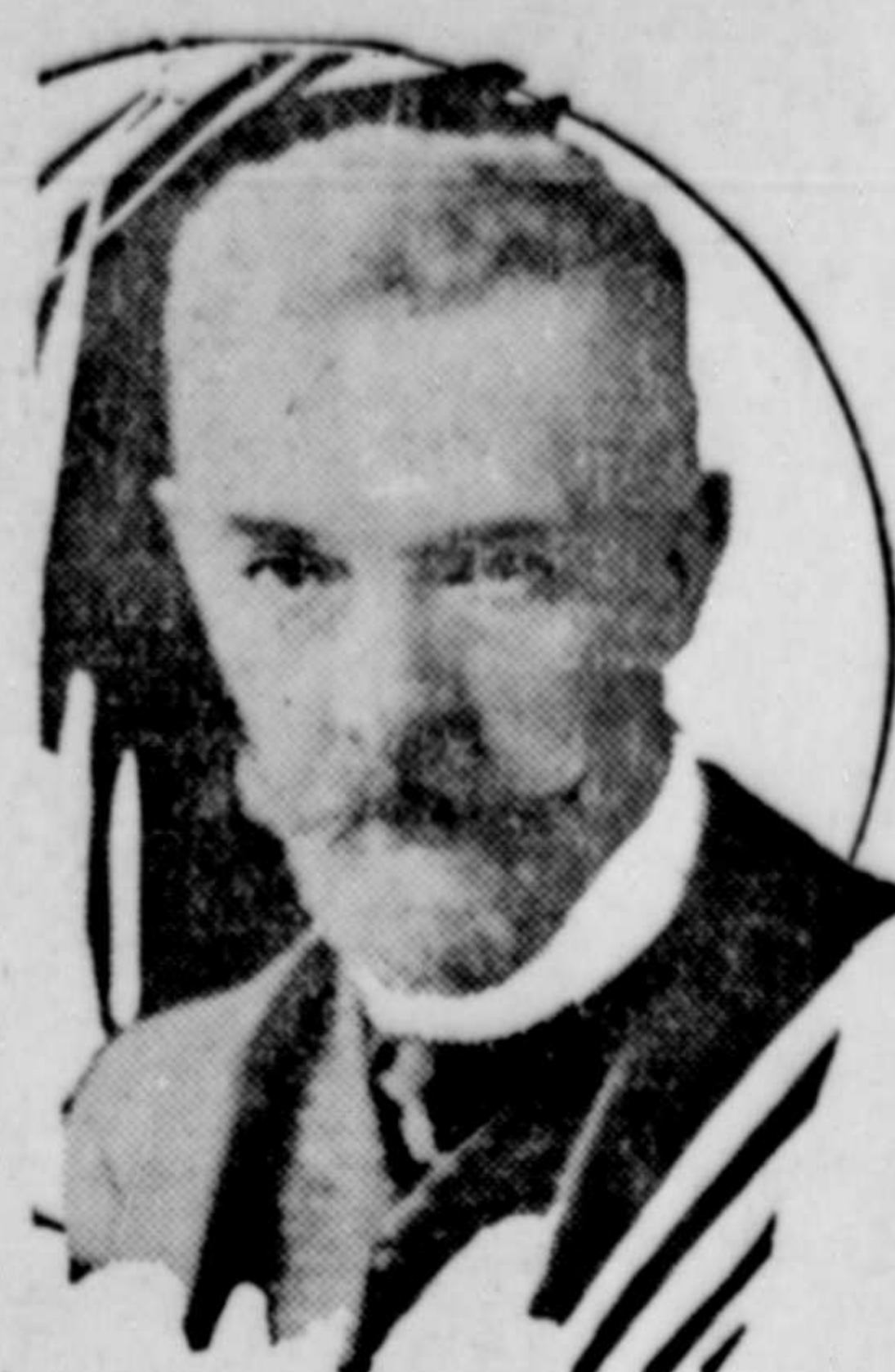
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GERMANY READY TO SUPPORT
AUSTRIA SAYS CHANCELLOR

BARON VON BETHMAN-HOLLWEG IN THE REICHSTAG SAYS
THAT THE GERMAN EMPIRE WILL STAND BEHIND
HER ALLIES, AUSTRIA AND ITALY.

Berlin, Dec. 7.—The Imperial
Chancellor made a declaration in
the course of a speech in the
Reichstag, discussing the Balkan
situation. It was a repetition of
the statement made at the time
of the controversy over the ques-
tion of Bosnia and Herzegovina
in 1908, which then caused an
immense sensation in the Euro-
pean capitals. Although at that
period it threatened to sweep
away the pacific Russian cabinet,
the current of feeling aroused
among the Slavs ultimately
brought peace.

TO SATISFY HIS
CURIOSITY.

The City Council has the
habit of locking the stable
door after the horse is out,"
and doubtless Mayor Newton
will endeavor to carry out this
rule again tonight as he did
last Monday, when he asked
that an expert be called in to
look over and report on the
sewerage scheme which the
rate payers so decisively turned
down. Not content with the
harsh criticism that the propo-
sal received last meeting
night, he said that he would
lay the matter over, which
means, no doubt, that it will
be up for consideration again to-
night.

After refusing to call in an
expert when the issue was a
live one on the grounds that
the expense would be too great,
he would now go to the same
expense on a dead issue. Is
not that a consistent action?
He would have you vote away
\$1,400,000 without any advice
on the subject and now to sat-
isfy his curiosity as to whether
or not the citizens were wise
in turning the proposition
down he would call in an ex-
pert and pay him the same
large sum which a week before
he declared the city could not
afford.

FROM A TORY
JOURNAL

Here is one for Hon. Robert
Rogers et al respecting the re-
grettable incidents in the Mac-
donald election. It is from the
editorial notes of that staid
old Tory journal, the Montreal
Gazette, which says: "A
meeting at Winnipeg has pro-
tested by resolution against
the arrest and detention of
four men on the eve of the
polling in Macdonald on
charges that they were engaged
in illegal work on behalf of the
opposition candidate. Mr. Wil-
liam Sifton has also entered
suit against the officials re-
sponsible for his detention,
claiming damages of \$10,000.
This latter action looks as if
one of the accused has faith in
his cause, and actually thinks
he did not deserve the experi-
ence to which he was subject-
ed. The talkers might shut up
till the trial is held. They are
not impressive." — Victoria
Times.

AUTHORITIES WERE
WARNED.

Several weeks ago, to be ex-
act on November 20th, we drew
the attention of the author-
ities to the fact that some of
the business men of the city
were using the sidewalks in
front of their premises to pile
goods upon, and later we again
referred to the matter. No
action was taken in the mat-
ter, with the result that a little
boy broke his leg the other
night, it is reported, through
some piece of merchandise
placed on the sidewalk falling
on him.

Had the authorities carried
out the suggestion we conveyed
to them the accident would
not have happened. Now,
doubtless, they will enforce the
law—but after the accident has
occurred.

AFRAID OF THE
PEOPLE

It is clearly the intention of
Mr. Borden, advised no doubt
by the Honorable Robert Rog-
ers and the rest of his environ-
ment of machine politicians
to refuse redistribution at pre-
sent. No mention was made of
it in the speech from the
throne, and no promise of any
kind is forthcoming.

The situation is an extraor-
dinary one. During the elec-
tion Mr. Borden repeatedly
pledged himself to introduce a
redistribution measure. But he
was not similarly bound with
regard to senatorial represen-
tation. He now hastens to in-
crease the number of his par-
tisan supporters who can be
relied upon to implicitly obey
the party whip, but absolutely
refuses to allow a proper ex-
pression of public opinion by
making the redistribution nec-
essitated by the last census.
He has implicit faith in his
party hacks, but none what-
ever in public opinion.

The whole attitude of the
administration since its advent
to power has been one of hesi-
tation and timidity, and no
better proof of Mr. Borden's
abject fear of the people could
be given than his refusal to
grant the increased representa-
tion called for by the census.
This fear is responsible for the
feebleness shown by the viola-
tion of his pre-election pledge.

ADVOCATE THE LASH
FOR WHITE SLAVERS

Lyttleton Advises in the House of
Commons that "Slavers"
be Branded

London, Dec. 7.—The criminal
amendment to the white slave
act passed the second reading in
the House of Commons, when
drastic suggestions were made
for the mode of punishment of
procurers of young women.

Lord Lansdowne, the Archbish-
op of Canterbury, and Lord Hal-
dane supported the proposal that
procurers should be flogged as
well as imprisoned.

The Marquis of Crewe, secre-
tary of State for India, opposed
this idea, as relegating the coun-
try to the middle ages. He pre-
ferred the passing of interme-
diate sentences.

The Right Hon. A. Lyttleton
objected to this procedure in fa-
vor of something even more
drastic than flogging, namely,
that both male and female par-
ties be branded.

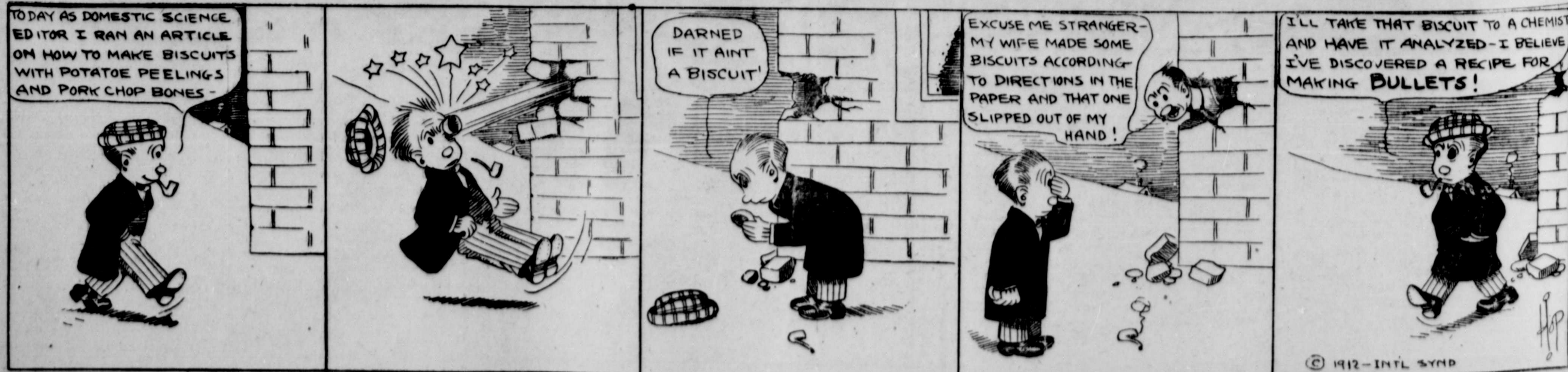

FORTY SIX HOUR SPEECH

Sir John Simon, Solicitor-General, Sets Up a New Record

London, Dec. 7.—A new record in forensic eloquence has been set up by the solicitor-general Sir John Simon, in the arbitration between the post office, which has lasted for nine and one-half days, or forty-six hours in all. This beats the previous record, held by the Attorney-General, Sir Rufus Isaacs, whose speech in the appeal court in the famous financial case of Wyler vs. Lewis, known as "the everlasting law case," extended into the tenth sitting. In the same litigation Sir Edward Carson spoke for eight days. In the period covered by Sir John Simon's address he also delivered long political speeches in the House of Commons and at Bristol and Manchester. Except for a slight hoarseness Sir John was none the worse for his feat.

KING PUNISHES DRIVER

His Majesty Alfonso of Spain in Role of Dumb Animals' Friend

Paris, Dec. 7.—An interesting anecdote of the King of Spain is now going the rounds of Paris. The other day, it is said, a man was driving on a steep hill just outside Madrid a heavily laden cart drawn by two miserable looking horses, both of which looked to be at the end of their tether. One of them, dead beat, fell exhausted and was unable to rise, in spite of the blows showered on the unfortunate beast by the driver with the butt end of his whip. At this point a large automobile came into view over the brow of the hill, driven by a young man, with a lady at his side. The motorist took in the situation at a glance and at once stopped. Getting down, he skillfully raised the wretched horse to its legs, and then proceeded to box the ears of the driver soundly. "Now," he said, starting his automobile, "you can, if you like, go and complain to the King of Spain." The motorist was Alfonso himself, with Queen Victoria.

PRESIDENTIAL SHOW

Governor Wilson Willing to Have Formal Inauguration Deferred Two Months.

Hamilton, Bermuda, Dec. 7.—Governor Woodrow Wilson is willing to take the oath of office as President of the United States without ostentation on March 4, and have the formal ceremonies, which every fourth year attract thousands of citizens to Washington, postponed until the last Thursday in April. To that extent he has approved the propaganda in favor of a later inauguration, which has been advocated in and out of Congress in order that the event may be conducted at a time when the weather usually is propitious at the national capital.

DYNAMITE FROZE AND FOILED ATTEMPT TO BLOW UP BRIDGE

TWENTY-FIVE STICKS OF POWDER PLACED UNDER TRENT RIVER BRIDGE, NEAR CUMBERLAND—UNION LEADERS DEPLORE THE CRIME

Nanaimo, Dec. 7.—A dastardly attempt to blow up the Trent river bridge with dynamite has been foiled by the elements and the police department is searching for the person or persons who it is believed intended destroying the bridge in order to prevent the hauling of coal to Union Bay, the shipping point for the Canadian colliers. Twenty-five sticks of dynamite were placed under the bridge, which is thirty-five feet high and has a span of 120 feet. The point where the dynamite was placed is four miles from Union Bay. Attached to the dynamite was a long fuse which extended 50 yards distant into the woods, where it was lighted. Being a frosty night, the dynamite, according to the police, must have frozen, and by the time the lighted fuse reached the cap the dynamite only burned up in place of exploding as it would have done under ordinary conditions.

To the fact that the night was frosty therefore can be attributed the saving of the bridge. As it is, one of the uprights to the bridge was burnt through by the burning of the dynamite. The chief of the provincial police, Constable Stephenson, believes that the malefactor will be apprehended. All union-miners deeply deplore the attempt to commit such a wicked crime.

Prisoners Taken South.

The Princess May arrived from the North somewhat overdue on Saturday evening, leaving after a short stay for Vancouver and Victoria. There were several passengers going south from this place. Provincial Constable Doolittle went down with two prisoners for the New Westminster penitentiary, Ned Williams, under sentence of two years for stealing a ring, and O. Carlson, who will serve six months for stabbing with a knife.

Fire Engine Repaired.

The fire engine, which was so badly damaged several weeks ago by skidding and falling off the plank roadway at Eighth street and Hays Cove Circle, is again in working order.
