

NINE MEN KILLED BY AVALANCHE AT CORDOVA

GREAT BRITAIN PROTESTS AGAINST CANADIAN BOATS BEING DISCRIMINATED AGAINST

GOVERNMENT APPROVED LOAN AND WORK STARTED AT ONCE

BOWSER WIRES THAT CITY CAN BORROW MONEY IF THEY PAY THE GOVERNMENT DEBT AND COUNCIL ORDER WORK TO COMMENCE AT ONCE—PURCHASE HORSES.

Mayor Newton announced last night that a telegram had been received from the Provincial government in regard to the sale of the city's debentures, in which it was stated that when the debt was paid the money could be raised. This has been done and his Worship insisted that work be commenced at once upon the uncompleted Section One.

Alderman Dybhavn asked if it might not be as well to purchase horses for hauling the material for the filling instead of renting them. The Mayor said he thought that was a matter that could be very well left with the Board of Works.

Alderman Dybhavn said there was very little time to decide. The Mayor replied that he had never thrown any obstacles in the way of the Board of Works getting horses or anything else they thought necessary for carrying on the work of the city.

TO HAVE WALKS Council to Make Provision for Walks When Money is Available.

Last evening at the meeting of the City Council a number of petitions were read from different bodies of citizens asking for sidewalks, electric lights and water connections. They were all referred and filed, the Mayor reiterating his oft-repeated remark that for weeks and weeks the Council had been vainly attempting to wrest money for those purposes from the adamant heart of the Bank of Montreal.

Further replying to Alderman Bullock-Webster, he said that no particular foreman had been promised the job of doing the back filling, as it was not the intention of the Board of Works at the present time to undertake this work.

Miss Hurst Remains. It was announced last evening at the meeting of the City Council that Miss Hurst, having made arrangements to prolong her stay in the city, had been induced to withdraw her resignation and will remain on at present as stenographer to the city clerk's office.

HIGHWAYMEN ARE ACTIVE IN THE CITY OF CALGARY

Fourth Holdup in Three Days in Metropolis of Alberta—Police Arrest Suspect.

(Special to Daily News.) Calgary, Dec. 9.—Four highwaymen held up the F. J. Herbert grocery store in the Crescent Heights district of the city about 9 o'clock the other evening and took all the money in the cash register, about \$30. The men were not masked. They asked for cigars. When the proprietor turned to serve them he looked into the muzzle of a revolver. He quickly obeyed the order to throw up his hands. One man kept him covered while another tore the telephone from the wall and broke the connection and the other two helped themselves to the cash. Within an hour after the robbery the police arrested James Greeves, who was identified by Herbert as one of the highwaymen. This is the fourth holdup that has been successfully pulled off in the city in three days.

BRITISH TRADE GROWING

Increase for Month of November Almost Thirty Million Dollars.

London, Dec. 10.—The November statement of Board of Trade shows increases of \$18,005,000 in imports and \$14,859,500 in exports. The principal items in the imports were \$7,500,000 in cotton from America and \$6,125,000 in cotton from Egypt. In the imports manufactured items showed the largest increase.

Lumber for the City.

The Council last evening had but one tender for lumber for the plank roads contemplated for Fifth avenue from McBride street to Dunsmuir and also at Seal Cove. As it was uncertain whether the bylaws would be objected to by the residents, the matter was left in such a way that it will be taken only on condition that it is required. The tender received was from the Lester W. David Co., Ltd., the prices being \$15.50 to \$17.50 per thousand, the quality of the lumber being fir.

SECOND READING OF NAVY BILL TODAY

SIR EDWARD GREY ENTERS OBJECTIONS TO THE PROPOSED SCHEDULE OF RATES

Great Britain Will Not Allow Canadian Steamers to be Taken Under the American Anti-Trust Law—Recognize Rights of Coastwise Shipping

(Special to Daily News.) Washington, D.C., Dec. 10.—Great Britain's formal protest against the rates of the Panama Canal as proposed to be charged by the United States in regard to American coastwise shipping through the canal was presented to Secretary of State Knox last night by Ambassador Bryce.

CITY SOLICITOR DOES NOT FAVOR A CHANGE

Recommendation That Different Terms Be Allowed to Aldermen Objected To.

City Solicitor Peters at last night's meeting of the City Council read over some roughly drafted recommendations that he had prepared, to be forwarded to the commission appointed by the government to inquire into the matter of the revision of the Municipal Clauses Act. It will be remembered that the commission had notified the Council that it would be impossible for them to visit Prince Rupert in the course of their deliberations.

Several very important and urgently needed changes were embodied in the city solicitor's report. Alderman Dybhavn brought up the question of the advisability of the aldermanic board being elected for a period of two years, the Mayor to be elected annually as at the present time. The suggestion did not meet with a very enthusiastic reception by the other members of the Council. The Mayor stated that in the city of Kingston, Ont., where he had resided for a number of years, this procedure had been put into effect and was discarded after eight years, chiefly owing to the apathetic state the municipality got into as regards live interest taken in the elections. The city solicitor did not favor the suggestion and would not embody it in his recommendations unless ordered to do so by the Council. The matter will be taken up by the Council upon the further consideration of the city solicitor's report.

DUE TO BOOZE Medical Health Officer Says Indigents Result of Drink.

The report of Dr. Cade, city medical health officer, was before the City Council last evening. It showed thirteen births and six deaths for the month of November, and the milk and general health of the city excellent. Mention was made of the action of the law as regards interdicts. In the health officer's opinion the law was not enforced rigorously enough. It appeared that as far as indigents were concerned, they consisted almost entirely of men who came here with some money and spent it solely for liquor, becoming in a short while destitute and thereby a charge upon the city. The report will be forwarded to the License committee.

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AUSTRIAN FLEET ON A WAR FOOTING AT PODA

Concentration of the Fleet Causes Uneasiness in European Countries.

London, Dec. 9.—It is reported today from Paris that the entire Austrian fleet has been concentrated at Pola, the chief naval station of Austria-Hungary. This is taken as an indication that the threatened trouble between Austria and Russia over the Balkan question of an Adriatic port is not yet settled and may come to the fore again.

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MORSE CREEK BRIDGE MUST WAIT GOVERNMENT'S ACTION

RAILWAY COMPANY WANTS TO KNOW WHAT GOVERNMENT WILL DO—COUNCIL AGAIN DISCUSSES SIGNS—EXPERT WILL COME AND EXAMINE POWER PLANT.

Nothing of a very momentous nature occurred at the weekly meeting of the City Council, held last evening at the city hall. It was chiefly remarkable for the urgent solicitude of the Mayor that municipal work should be pushed with all expedition possible, so as to provide work for the many citizens who were desirous of obtaining employment upon the same.

Aldermen Clayton and Morrissey were absent from the deliberations of the city fathers.

The first subject that came up was that of signs, upon the reading of a communication from Hayner Bros. in regard to their much discussed electric sign.

It will be gratifying to the public to learn that a further stage has been reached in the matter. The delinquent sign has finally been removed and another one is in course of being built at Brown's electrical establishment that aims at fulfilling the requirements of the municipal by-law governing the same.

It was finally agreed that the Light committee be given power to act in regard to the matter, and they are going to inspect it

before it is allowed to be put up by the firm in question.

J. D. Ross, the electrical expert and superintendent of the Seattle electrical plant, wrote offering to visit the city if the Council still thought they required his services. The communication was referred to the Fire and Light committee.

G. R. Naden, chairman of the citizens committee, wrote the Council in regard to the erection of the bridge at Morse Creek. He stated that his committee did not feel like approaching the G. T. P. in regard to their promised payment of 40 per cent. of the cost of the undertaking until they had definite information as to the action of the provincial government and the city as to their preparedness to come through with the remaining 40 and 30 per cent. respectively.

Alderman Montgomery wanted to see the city make some definite arrangement as to the payment of their share. It was finally decided to give the city clerk instructions to write to the provincial government, together with Mr. W. Manson, M. P., for a definite statement upon the subject.

SCHOOL MAY BE BUILT AT SEAL COVE AT ONCE

School Board Asks for School—Council Do Not Favor, but May Have To.

Despite the fact that the report of the Finance committee upon the application of the School Board for a grant of \$5,000 for a school house at Seal Cove was that it would have to be refused, it still seems likely that the building may be put up.

The Council as a whole favor making the necessary grant for the purpose without putting it to a vote of the people. The School Board feel that they are justified in their request, as there is sufficient money left over from the estimates to build the school.

The city solicitor showed last night where it might be as well to grant the request of the School Board gracefully, as the latter had rather peculiar and embarrassing powers. They could insist upon the question of the granting of the money being put to the vote of the people. There was altogether nearly \$7,000 surplus from the levy made by the Council for school purposes for this year, more than enough to erect the building in question. The Mayor favored referring the matter back to the Finance committee, which was accordingly done.

STATE DEPARTMENT REPORT

Hon. Louis Coderre Tables Statistics of Department for the Last Fiscal Year.

(Special to Daily News.) Ottawa, Dec. 9.—Company incorporation by Federal letters increased from 544 to 656 in the last fiscal year, according to the report of the State Department, tabled by Hon. Louis Coderre. The aggregate capitalization was \$490,565,999, including \$42,939,999 secured by existing companies through supplementary powers. The revenue of the department was \$218,000.

PUBLIC PATRONAGE SHOULD BE ABOLISHED SAYS COMMISSION

PUBLIC SERVICE COMMISSION ADVISES THAT CIVIL SERVANTS BE GIVEN MORE PAY AND THAT PUBLIC PATRONAGE BE ELIMINATED FROM PUBLIC OFFICES.

Ottawa, Dec. 10.—The Public Service Commission, which has been investigating conditions in the public and civil service for several months, has made its report public.

According to the report, the commissioners find that there is a lack of co-ordination in the

service. In the west especially, the commission states, there is a great lack of adequate pay.

One of the strongest recommendations they make is that political patronage be abolished in the civil service, as this tends to fill public positions with men who are not capable of filling the offices to which they are appointed.

**CIVIC WORK STARTED.**

Well, the city is free from the garnishee placed upon it by Attorney General Bowser. The debt has been paid and the money held up can be now secured for the very necessary work of the improvement of the city.

The citizens must feel a glow of pride coursing through their veins when they consider the excellent advertisement and name Prince Rupert has attained from His Majesty's loyal government at Victoria. What man will not straighten himself up and step out with a freer air and more determined step when he realizes the confidence reposed in him and his fellow citizens by the governing body of this great province? Really it is a pleasure to be garnisheed at any time by anybody, but usually you are given a sporting chance, but not when you are garnisheed by the pugnacious Bowser, the little "Tin God" of the Tory party. He does not allow the sporting chance, but forbids that necessary work which should have been accomplished months ago be delayed until the frosts of winter have set in.

The debt was in the neighborhood of \$124,000. The city is one that no man will deny has a future before it equalled by no other city on the continent. The assessed value of property in the vicinity of \$20,000,000, but we cannot be trusted with \$124,000, especially when the bill is being disputed.

Between the Attorney General, Bowser, and the present Mayor and Council the city is in an excellent muddle indeed, but hurrah! we are to be trusted to handle somebody else's money, but not that of the provincial government, which can allow \$7,000,000 to outstanding on first payments from American land speculators.

**MR. ROGERS' FAILURE.**

Even Mr. Rogers' well wishers will recognize that his attempt at Ottawa yesterday to meet the Macdonald charges was a complete failure.

It will not do for him, from his place of privilege in the House, to abuse the victims of his election methods. Nor will the reading of affidavits from his well greased Manitoba factory avail him anything. Decent and manly men will regard these tactics as a cowardly aggravation of his offence.

Mr. Rogers cannot escape this way. If these men were guilty of breaches of the election law, it was undoubtedly the duty of the authorities to arrest them. (But even in that case they were as entitled to bail as the two personators who were arrested redhanded in their operations in St. James on behalf of Mr. Rogers' candidate.) It was equally the duty of the authorities to prosecute them if it had evidence that they had broken the law.

The government, by abandoning the prosecutions, in each case without producing a tittle of evidence, made it abundantly plain that these four men, instead of being breakers of the law, were the victims of a police and judicial outrage, perpetrated in the interests of politicians and at their instigation.

Every defence that is attempted confirms this conclusion. Mr. Rogers' harangue yesterday, with its failure to justify the action of the police, convicts him of having been a party to this detestable, cowardly and illegal conspiracy against the freedom of British citizens. — Winnipeg Free Press.

**PRESIDENT WOODROW WILSON HAS SCOTTISH BLOOD IN HIM**

**GLASGOW FOLK CLAIM PRESIDENT OF THE UNITED STATES AND TELL HOW HIS GRANDFATHER GOT INTO TROUBLE FOR ATTENDING NONCONFORMIST MEETING.**

Glasgow, Dec. 9.—We've been hearin' a fine lot about the new President o' the United States this past week, especially about "his Scottish Associations." Ae paper went sae far as to ca' him—in big letters—"The Scottish-American President." It hasn't been sae hard to connect Woodrow Wilson w' Scotland as it was to connect Theodore Roosevelt. We got Roosevelt dragged in by the scruff o' the neck when we discovered that though he was Dutch on his father's side his mither's forefolk could be traced back to the wee Stirling shire village o' Baldernock. Therefore he was a Scottish American.

William H. Taft was the only United States president in any time that fairly beat us. We ne'er managed to discover what connection he had w' Scotland, but he maun hae had some, if we could only hae traced his

family tree far enough back. As for Woodrow Wilson—the thing was easy. He has freens livin' in Glasgow, an' his great grandfather on his mither's side passed awa in the city in the forties o' the nineteenth century.

This great-grandfather seems to hae been a bit o' a worthy. He was a "Cameronian" wha left that strict Presbyterian sect because he was censured by the Presbytery for attendin' a missionary meeting. He and twa-three mair set up a kirk which has aye been famous among the kirks o' Glasgow, an' to this day—as Elgin place Congregational Church—draws a bigger congregation than ony ither. The new President's granny married a Presbyterian minister an' emigrated to America in 1836, an' there ye are. Three generations doon cam President Woodrow Wilson, the descendant o' a race o' Scottish Presbyterians.

**CLERGYMAN LASHED BY MILITANT SUFFRAGETTE**

**Mistook Minister for Lloyd-George and Lashed Him with Whip.**

Aberdeen, Scotland, Dec. 8.—Militant Suffragettes brought about two scenes of extreme violence in which a woman's shoes and horsewhip were used as weapons.

The first outbreak occurred when three of the women, Joyce Locke, Fanny Parker and Mary Pollock, who had been caught in possession of explosives in a music hall, were brought up before the magistrate. After hearing the evidence the magistrate remanded them for further inquiry. As he informed them of this, Joyce Locke removed her shoes and hurled one of them at the magistrate's head and then threw the other at the head of the clerk of the court. She was promptly committed for contempt of court.

The second outrage was committed by one of the members of a party of suffragettes who were waiting at the railroad station for the departure of Chancellor Lloyd-George. The woman mistook the Rev. Forbes Jackson for the Chancellor of the Exchequer

in disguise and lashed him across the face with a heavy horsewhip. She was at once arrested.



The amount was subscribed following an urgent cable request from China that aid be sent to the government, which is working hard to prevent the spread of Russian influence in China. ALL DANISH WOMEN TO BE GIVEN FRANCHISE

Measure Brought in to Provide Votes for Women The most noteworthy fact about the Women Suffrage Bill just introduced into the Danish parliament is that the Government itself takes the entire responsibility for the measure, which is based on Democratic principles. Should the reform be carried to a successful issue all Danish women over 25 years of age will be enfranchised, as no mention is made of a property qualification such as exists in Norway.

STRANGE DEATH

Man Found in Mud With Neck Broken—Is a Mystery A mysterious death occurred the other day, to a Soham (Cambridgeshire) farm hand, named Andus. Two youths were walking along the banks of the boundary drain separating the fens, and saw the man standing upright in the waterway, with the water reaching to his chin. Further investigation showed that the man was dead and that his feet had sunk deep in the mud. A rope was placed under his arms and it took six men and three boys to pull him out. It was found subsequently that death was not due to drowning, but to the fact that deceased's neck was broken. Around his neck was a body strap quite loose and unbuttoned. There was no evidence to show how the man's neck had been broken.

It is reported that the forces of Gen. Zapata, in the south, and those of Gen. Salazar, in the north, are supporting Magon.

Berlin, Dec. 9.—The minister of education has issued a new decree against "dime novels" and "trashy literature." He says that the danger to the German youth from this source of "mental poison" is increasing. He urges parents not only to supervise and watch over the class of novels and romantic reading indulged in by their children, but also recommends the exclusion from homes of daily papers and weekly or monthly publications which tend to blunt the moral sensibilities of the young.

Northwest Hardwood Lumbermen's Association Discusses Situation at Convention.

Minneapolis, Minn., Dec. 9.—The northwest is confronted with a shortage of hardwood lumber, according to W. H.
