CAMERON BAY CASE ENDS IN FAVOR OF ROCHESTER

ALD. MORRISSEY AND MAYOR HAVE WARM TIME AT COUNCIL OVER RIGHTS OF FREE SPEECH

ROCHESTER GETS DECISION IN THE SUPREME COURT ON CAMERON COVE

Chief Justice Hunter Awards Against the Grand Trunk Pacific in Case of Cameron Cove Filling---Penalty of \$100 Per Day Must Stand as Ordered by Railway Board

Exclusive Wire to The News. Vancouver, Dec. 17.—J. Y. Rochester of Prince Rupert won a victory today in the Supreme Court in his fight with the Grand Trunk Pacific over the filling in of Cameron Cove at Prince Rupert. W. A. Macdonald and A. Cars appeared for the plaintiff, while the defendant company was represented by D'Arcy Tate.

After argument by the counsel, Chief Justice Hunter ordered that the decision of the Railway Board given January 2, 1912, be made a rule of the Supreme Court of the province. This will result in the enforcement of the \$100 per day penalty.

ST. ANDREW'S SOCIETY ELECTED NEW OFFICERS

GERMANY UNAFFECTED BY CANADA'S PROPOSED ACTION

CANADIAN NAVAL POLICY DOES NOT AFFECT GERMANY—NOT EVEN DISCUSSED THERE—WHEN INTERVIEWED PUBLICIST SAYS MATTER OF COLONIAL POLICY.

(Special to Daily News.) London, Dec. 16.—The Manchester Guardian's Berlin correspondent writes: "The silence observed by the German press over the Canadian offer of dreadnaughts continues almost unbroken. A distinguished publicist, who has great influence on the German policy, assured me that Germany took no direct interest in this development of English Imperial politics. 'We Germans,' he said, 'have decided to

build a fleet that shall correspond to our position and needs as a great power. Whether Britain builds three ships more or less does not concern us. Purely British affairs can have no effect on our decision.' "In much the same spirit writes Prof. Schiemann in the weekly review, Kreuz Zeitung, the official organ of the Conservative party. The whole affair he says is purely colonial politics between Britain and her dominions."

EIGHTH TRAGEDY OF DEATH FILM OCCURS

Eight Men Shown in Moving Picture Film Meet with Accident.

(Special to Daily News.) Paris, Dec. 17.—A sensation was created here when it became known that Walter Mumm, a well known sportsman and member of a prominent family, had been shot on Thursday night and seriously wounded by an American. The bullet, it is said, entered Mumm's chest and penetrated a lung. No arrest has been made and no charge has been preferred against anyone for the shooting. It is expected that the Mumm family desired to keep the shooting quiet, but the public prosecutor's office has opened an investigation. The person who did the shooting, it is understood, has left for London.

The Hoodoo Film.

St. Louis, Dec. 17.—The shooting of Walter Mumm in Paris, France, marks the eighth tragedy centreing around airmen who participated in the aviation and balloon meet held in 1910 in St. Louis. A motion picture was taken of the prominent men at the meet. Mumm was in the picture, as were seven other balloonists and aviators, who since have been killed. Colonel Theodore Roosevelt also occupied a prominent place in the film, which has been termed "The Death Film."

Mumm was aide to Alfred Le Blanc in the international balloon race which started November 2nd, this year.

PANAMA CANAL WILL DO NO INJURY TO CANADA

Canadian Pacific Liners Will Not Go Direct from Orient to England.

(Special to Daily News.) Montreal, Dec. 17.—It was announced by C. P. R. officials today that the railway company would not make use of the Panama Canal, as has been hinted, in the Orient-England trade, but will continue to use the trans-Atlantic and trans-Pacific liners as feeders for the transcontinental railway.

TEXT OF LAURIER'S AMENDMENT TO BORDEN GOVERNMENT'S RESOLUTION

The Defense of the Empire Will be Strengthened to a Greater Extent by the Establishment and Maintenance of Two Fleet Units by Canada to Protect Her Own Shores.

Sir Wilfrid Laurier's amendment to the Borden naval policy is as follows: "That all the words after the word 'that' be struck out and the following be substituted therefor: 'This House declines to concur in the said resolution and orders that the same be referred back to the committee with instructions to amend the same in the following particulars, namely: To strike out all the words after clause A and substitute therefor the following: 'The memorandum prepared by the board of admiralty on the general naval situation of the Empire and communicated to this House by the Right Honorable the Prime Minister on December 5th, shows that several of the most important foreign powers have adopted a definite policy of rapidly increasing their naval strength.

"That this condition has compelled the United Kingdom to concentrate its naval forces in home waters, involving the withdrawal of ships from the outlying portions of the Empire.

"That such withdrawal renders it necessary that Canada, without further delay, should enter actively on a permanent policy of naval defence.

"That any measure of Canadian aid to Imperial naval defence which does not embody a permanent policy of participation by ships owned, manned and maintained by Canada and contemplating construction as soon as possible in Canada, is not an adequate or satisfactory expression of the aspirations of the Canadian people in regard to the naval science and is not an assumption by Canada of her fair share in the maintenance of the naval strength of the Empire.

"This House regrets to learn of the intention of the government to indefinitely postpone the carrying out by Canada of a permanent naval policy.

"It is the opinion of this House that measures should be taken at the present session to give effect speedily to the policy embodied in the naval service act of 1910, passed pursuant to the resolution unanimously approved by this House in March, 1909.

"This House further is of the opinion that increase in power and nobility of the Imperial navy by the addition by Canada under the above act of two fleet units to be stationed on the Atlantic and Pacific coasts of Canada, respectively, rather than by a contribution of money or ships, is a policy best calculated to afford relief to the United Kingdom in respect of the burden of Imperial naval defence and in the words of the admiralty memorandum, to 'restore greater freedom to the movements of the British squadrons in every sea and directly protect the security of Dominions,' and that the government of Canada should take such steps as shall lead to the accomplishment of this purpose as speedily as possible."

Clause A in Premier Borden's resolution referred to above reads as follows: "That from and out of the consolidated revenue fund of Canada there may be paid and applied a sum not exceeding \$35,000,000 for the purpose of immediately increasing the naval forces of the Empire."

ALD. MORRISSEY SHORT OF WIND IS OUT-POINTED BY THE MAYOR

SIX-ROUND BOUT OF WORDS BETWEEN MAYOR AND A.L.D. MORRISSEY ENDS IN FAVOR OF THE MAYOR, ALTHOUGH IT IS HINTED THAT HE HIT BELOW THE BELT

Although last night's session of the city council was not productive of any great results, it afforded a certain amount of amusement to the little band of heroes who turn up religiously every Monday night, to listen to the "pearls of wisdom" that fall from the lips of our respected city fathers.

City Clerk Woods read a letter of acknowledgment from the General Hospital Board, thanking the Council for their donation of \$10,000.

Miss Hurst, stenographer to the city clerk, asked for leave of absence without pay from the 21st inst to the 31st, which was granted.

The Atlin Construction Company wrote the company regarding the subject of the laying of the water pipes from the main to the Cold Storage plant, according to the plan laid out in the letter, that was received by the council at its last meeting. They state that they are agreeable to the terms agreed upon, and the matter of the drawing up of the agreement between the company and the city was left to the city solicitor.

The matter of the opening up of Cameron Cove came up, and was the cause of some heated passages at arms between the mayor and Ald. Morrissey. It appears that it is a question in which no less than four sets of interests participate—the provincial government, the G. T. P. Ry. Co., the City of Prince Rupert and Messrs. Cy Peck, J. Y. Rochester, et al. The G. T. P. have petitioned the provincial government in regard to purchasing the lots in the vicinity of Cameron Cove, with the idea of carrying out extensive improvements. The private lease holders are not in accord with the proposals of the railroad company.

Alderman Morrissey in most emphatic terms announced that he was strenuously opposed to the city's taking any part in the dispute whatever. He did not think that it behooved them to throw any obstacles in the way of the G. T. P. in their schemes of development.

Considerable acerbity was evidenced in the discussion that followed between the Mayor and the alderman. Alderman Morrissey made a brave attempt to obtain a hearing, but in the face

of the Mayor's repeated statements that he was out of order, the latter finally ignoring him altogether and requesting the clerk to proceed with the next business, even Alderman Morrissey's Irish pertinacity gave way.

Twice afterward the alderman's fighting spirit flouted itself in an abortive effort to obtain a hearing, but went down to defeat before the calm, cold, sardonic remark of His Worship that he was out of order.

Chagrined at the unfair treatment that he deemed he was receiving at the hands of his chief, the irate alderman at one time in ringing tones announced that he was not there to receive chastisement from Mayor Newton or any other member of the board, and for a moment it looked as if there would be something doing.

The former replied that the alderman would obey the mandates of the chair or he (the latter) would see to it that he did so. At this point the discussion was dropped, the Council going into committee of the whole, with Alderman Bullock-Webster in the chair, for the passage of sundry bylaws that were put through their final reading.

Editorial Notes and Clippings

WHITE SLAVERY PROTECTED IN B. C.

In British Columbia today there exists a condition of affairs which, with the possible exception of Russia, is unknown in the civilized world. It has been our pride and boast that the British law was all powerful: that the evildoer must quake and tremble at the majesty of British authority. We have held ourselves aloof and sneered at the administration of justice in the United States, but we people of British Columbia can do so no more. There is not a single state in the Union which has not a better administration of law than has British Columbia, and we acknowledge it with shame. In no country in the world where there is a semblance of constitutional government would the attorney general dare to override the laws as has Attorney General Bowser, of this province. Today British Columbia is practically in a state of anarchy—there is no law, except that of one man, and in the might of strength of the Conservative majority in the Legislature he rules. Vancouver attained, because of its underworld and the gilded life of the night, a most unenviable reputation from San Diego to Cape Nome. The number of immoral women within its limits was astonishing. It became so bad that it was not safe for a respectable girl to walk alone on the streets in broad daylight, and accompanied ladies were often insulted. The police, under the able supervision of Chief Chamberlain and Deputy Chief Mulhern, saw all this and the moment that the Police Commissioners gave the word and the task of cleaning the city was given to the deputy chief, the detectives and policemen were set to work. The first day over a hundred fallen women were dragged to jail and were given by the magistrate three days in which to leave the city. Those found after that period were sentenced to imprisonment, without the option of a fine.

code of Canada sentenced these girls to jail. They were taken to New Westminster, and here it was Attorney-General Bowser interfered. The commitment papers were taken from the policeman in charge of the prisoners and were torn up and the prostitutes were turned loose "on orders." Since that time this farce in justice has been repeated, and Bowser does not hesitate in announcing that it was done by his authority.

Does a man steal a piece of bread he is sentenced and has to serve out his term in jail, and no more is thought about it. The law demands it and the court following out the instructions of the code, sentences the thief, but harlots and lewd women, who prey on innocent young girls and drag them down to worse than death, are protected by Attorney-General Bowser. Surely a minister of the government of British Columbia is not bound to the women of the street! What is then that causes him to set aside the law, defy the courts, not only police, but higher tribunals of justice. For the county court has sustained the action of Magistrates South and Shaw in sentencing the offenders. It then follows that Bowser is over the law, and therefore there is no law but Bowser's.

Is there a law abiding citizen in this province who does not feel ashamed to know that the white slave traffic in innocent girls may proceed freely and openly in British Columbia protected by the government? Do not fathers rebel at the suggestion? Is there a mother's heart in the land which does not tighten at the thought? But nevertheless it is true. Those girls sentenced and freed can not be re-arrested during the time of their supposed incarceration in jail, and unafraid of police interference they openly carry on the traffic in souls in the largest city in the province.

NO HYBRID POLICY.

The police had performed their duty and the magistrate, on the authority of the criminal

LANSDOWNE IS REAL LEADER OF UNIONISTS

This Made Clear at Autumn Conference of Party—Bonar Law Directs Opposition Tactics.

London, Dec. 16.—At the autumn conference of the National Unionist Association, when the platform of the Unionist party was confirmed, it was made very clear that should there be a change of government in the United Kingdom the task of forming the cabinet would fall upon the shoulders of Lord Lansdowne and not upon Bonar Law.

During the past few months, as all the fighting has been in the House of Commons, and attention has been attracted to that house more than to the House of Lords, Unionists as well as Liberals have come to regard Bonar Law as actually, if not technically, leader of his party, as well as of that part of it which sits in the House of Lords. At the conference, however, it was Lord Lansdowne, not Mr. Law, who was chosen to make the important announcements in regard to the policy of the party, a duty which invariably falls to the leader of the party. Mr. Law, it will be remembered, was chosen leader of the Unionists in the Commons when Mr. Balfour retired, but unlike his predecessor, Mr. Law was not chosen leader of the party. He is simply floor leader in the lower house, and he obtained that position because of the Conservative and Liberal-Unionist elements of what is now known officially as the Unionist party could not compose their differences and elect either of their leaders, Austin Chamberlain or Walter Long, to the place. Bonar Law has not been a great success as a leader, and therefore the action of the national convention in making clear that he was not the leader of the party in the country. Mr. Law's direct manner pleases and arouses the younger element in his party. The great bulk of the old line Conservatives, however,

prefer the old quiet style of Mr. Balfour was the exemplar, and while they do not openly oppose their private object to the somewhat exaggerated views expressed by Mr. Law on what will happen in Ulster if home rule is passed, for example, or his support of the noisy interrupters in Parliament, who the other evening pelted the Prime Minister with paper and in other ways acted in a manner unbecoming members of Parliament. The assumption by Lord Lansdowne of the leadership of the party also indicates that his health, which last summer it was feared had broken down, has since greatly improved.

FORESTS GIVE BETTER RETURNS THAN SHEEP

Figures Compiled Show That Forests Are More Profitable Than Sheep Grazing.

Ottawa, Dec. 16.—A very interesting question in regard to the relative value of forests and sheep grazing was raised in the evidence taken a few years ago by a committee of the British Board of Agriculture to inquire into British forestry. The increase in population makes the question of its future support one of vital importance, and the relative value of the different uses of land in their ability to support population is a valuable index as to the direction in which development of the use of land should be directed.

From the evidence of several witnesses and that obtained at previous investigations it was determined that it took from one

WARDEN AT NEW WESTMINSTER REFUSE TO OBEY COURT ORDER

WOMEN SENTENCED ON APPEAL IS REFUSED ADMITTANCE TO THE PENITENTIARY, AND IS NOW FREE FOR SIX MONTHS—CANNOT BE ARRESTED AGAIN ON THE SAME CHARGE

Vancouver, Dec. 16.—No matter what the circumstances of the case may be, no women convicted of disorderly conduct in Vancouver will be admitted to the New Westminster jail.

Such was the emphatic statement made by the jail authorities when questioned regarding their attitude in refusing admission to Ruth Richards, convicted to serve six months' imprisonment by Magistrate South, which conviction was upheld, on appeal, by Judge McInnes.

With the jail authorities and rulings of the magistrate and judge, backed by the statutes of British Columbia, count for naught. They simply "stand pat" on their previous decisions not to accept prisoners of this call from Vancouver.

Ruth Richards, like others who have gone before her, is free—a free and unrestrained prisoner, legally now serving sentence and therefore immune from arrest on the same charge for six months.

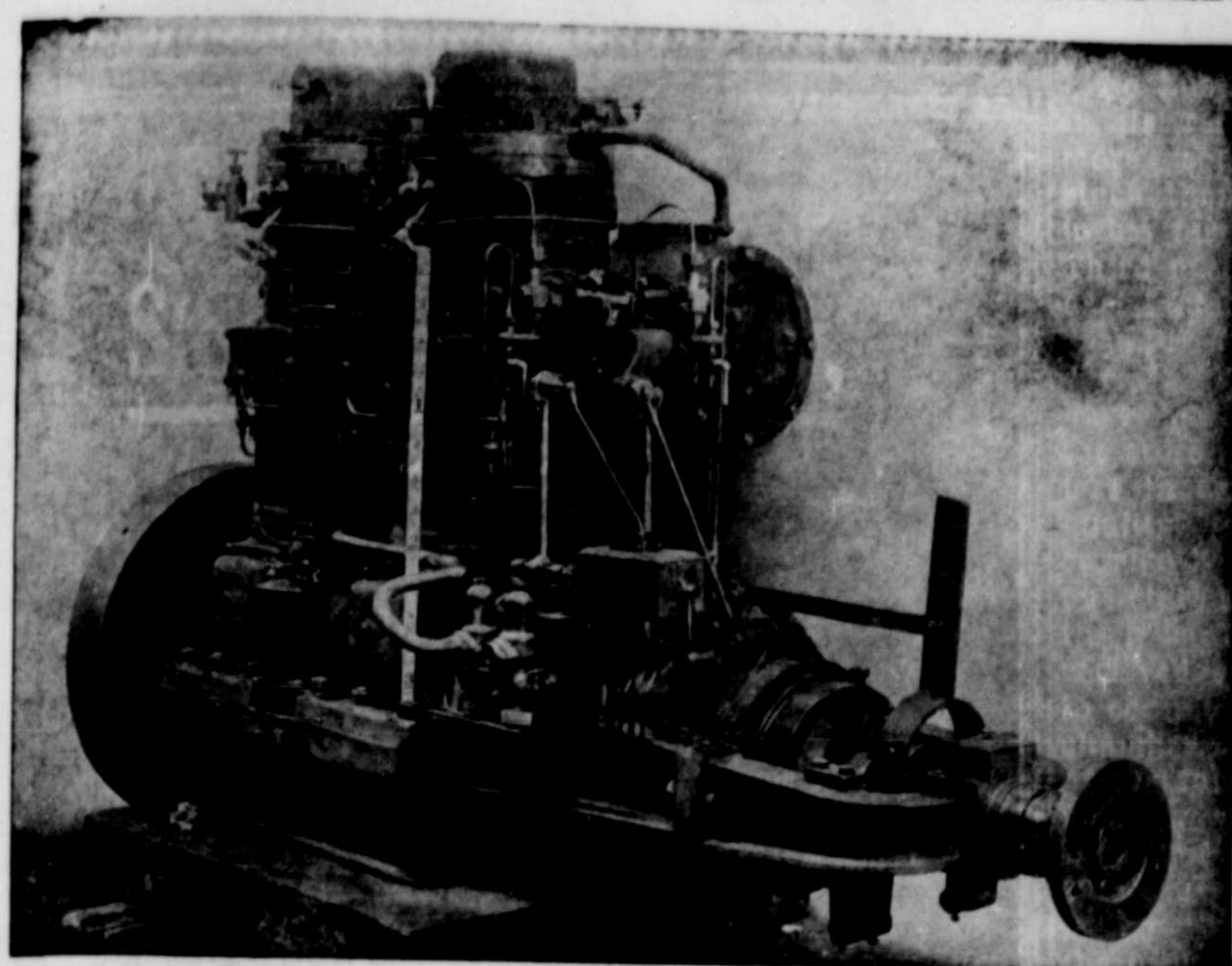
White Boy and Colored Fighter Both Sure of Victory—Mortimer Still Over Weight.

to six acres of the land usually employed for sheep grazing in Scotland to support one sheep, and the committee was of opinion that five acres would be about the average. The land used for sheep grazing is high, broken land and some of it is swampy and unproductive of feed. The number of sheep which one shepherd could look after was considered as about five hundred, so that for the stock necessary for the support of one shepherd and his family 2,500 acres would be required.

On the other hand, the evidence brought out in regard to the number of people supported by a forest on such lands showed that one hundred acres of forest would be the average per man employed, so that the 2,500 acres required to support one shepherd and his family would support twenty-five woodsmen and their families.

This is a comparison of the two uses of the land in a country where each is most highly developed, and shows their final relative possibilities as supporters of population on lands that are rough and elevated.

Both the lord lieutenant and the Ulster king of arms have gone to London and their journey is believed to be connected with the recovery of the jewels.

ELEVEN BOATS BURNED
 Fire at Naples Destroyed Eleven Boats and Barge—Naval Assistance.

Naples, Dec. 17.—A blaze that for a time threatened to become serious occurred here when a barge loaded with 200 tons of paraffin taken from the White Star liner Adriatic from New York caught fire.
