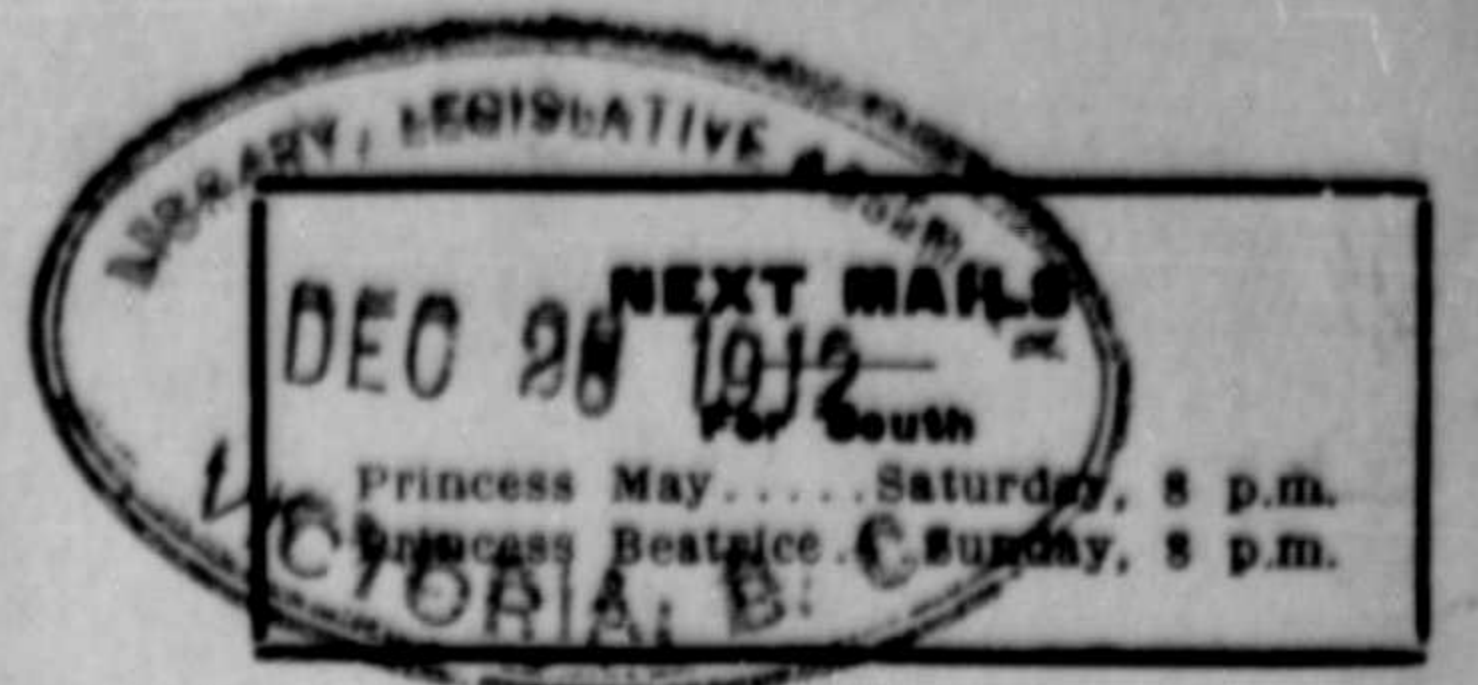

## TURKS WILL NOT GIVE ADRIANOPLE TO BALKANS

### ADRIANOPLE TO BE RETAINED BY TURKEY AT ALL HAZARDS

**OTTOMAN DETERMINED NOT TO YIELD BIG CITY TO THE BULGARIANS—MAY CONTINUE HOSTILITIES—ALBANIANS INSIST ON ABSOLUTE INDEPENDENCE OF ALBANIA**

(Special to Daily News.) London, Dec. 21.—The Telegraph claims to have received authority for its statement that Turkey is resolved to retain Adrianople at all costs and is willing and ready to resume hostilities with the Balkan states. A most pessimistic view is taken here of the final outcome of the peace negotiations.

London, Dec. 21.—The Balkan allies are said to not take a kindly view of the Turkish proposals in regard to the autonomy of Albania. The allies insist that Albania be given her independence and be absolutely free from the suzerainty of the Ottoman Empire.

#### OFF TO THE RELIEF OF CAPTAIN SCOTT

**Antarctic Steamer Terra Nova Leaves for the Far South.**

Christchurch, N. Z., Dec. 20.—The sailing of the Terra Nova from Christchurch to pick up the party of end in its third year of the Scott expedition to the Antarctic. It is likely the vessel will bring Scott back to civilization in March. The ship arrived in Akaroa, N. Z., on April 1, 1911, with the last news of Scott. It was then learned that on January 3, 1912, Captain Scott, with a party of four men, was 150 miles from the pole and was advancing hopefully for his goal although he was far behind in his schedule of march and had been beaten by some weeks by Captain Amundsen. Captain Scott sent back by Lieutenant Evans this laconic message: "I am remaining in the Antarctic another winter in order to continue and complete my work."

#### NOT HURT ON ROAD

**James Quinn Received Injuries in Vicinity of Fiddler Creek—Resting Easily.**

James Quinn, the man who was so seriously hurt by a fall of rock near Fiddler Creek on Thursday, is resting quietly today and his condition is as well as could be expected. He was not injured in connection with the G. T. P. construction work, as was stated at first, but in some workings in the prospect mines in the vicinity. He was brought by his companions to Fiddler Creek, where the train stopped to take him aboard. Word was sent ahead to Terrace to Dr. Traynor, who boarded the cars at that place and took charge of the injured man and accompanied him to the city.

## MAN CAPTURED IN VANCOUVER IS IDENTIFIED AS A TRAIN ROBBER

**Man Captured After Desperate Fight With Young Sinclair is Identified by Three Witnesses as the Man Who Held up the C.P.R. Train Near Vancouver on December**

(Special to Daily News.) Vancouver, Dec. 21.—George Wilson, highwayman, captured by Mr. J. H. Sinclair with the aid of Vancouver police, is the bandit who held up the passengers in the observation coach of the Imperial Limited of the Canadian Pacific Railway on the night of December 7th. He was positively identified by three of the passengers in that coach.

Despite the fact that the prisoner was masked and with eleven other masked men at the time of his identification, each witness unhesitatingly and positively pointed out Wilson as the highwayman who boarded and held up the C. P. R. car. Although the police were sure that they had the right man, it was not until yesterday morning that they had collected sufficient evidence to take the case to the courts. Arriving from the east yesterday morning, the third and last of the passengers to be brought here by the C. P. R. was in company with several other witnesses taken to the police station. Wilson was then in a condition to be identified, the bruises sustained in the fight with Sinclair and the police being practically all healed.

#### SUFFRAGETTES KEEP ON DESTROYING THE MAIL

**Frenzied Women Pour Ink and Acid into Letter Boxes—Set Fire to Train**

London, Dec. 20.—After a few days of inactivity the militant suffragettes have renewed their letter box outrages. Outside of attacking a pillar box near the Stock Exchange, where sixty letters were destroyed by an inky fluid, the outrages were mainly confined to Southeast London. A bottle which contained ink was found in a pillar box labelled "Defiance to His Majesty's Government. Votes for Women." Similar attacks are reported in Edinburgh and Tunbridge Wells. Three women have been arrested in London owing to the outrages; also one who broke a fire alarm box at Covent Garden, summoning the fire department. A more serious outrage, this time by a male suffragette, came before a Wealdstone magistrate, who issued a warrant for the arrest of a man accused of endangering the safety of passengers on the Great Central Railway by setting fire to the compartment of a train in which he was travelling. The accused refused to attend court and wrote a letter to the magistrate expressing suffragette sympathy. Mrs. Pethick Lawrence at a woman's suffragette meeting in London said they must prepare for destruction. They must prepare to smash and be smashed, even if their bodies be made to suffer. A militant suffragette named

They paused there but a moment, then with a step forward and pointing at Wilson with his right hand he declared: "There is the man." Following this the passenger was again taken from the room, blindfolded and the prisoners rearranged before his return. Each man in the line was compelled to make a remark in his natural voice, and again, blindfolded and with his back to Wilson, the passenger unhesitatingly picked out his tone as that of the robber. These tests were repeated with each of the other passengers with the same result. There are now five charges registered against Wilson on the police record. One, attempted robbery with violence; two, attempted murder; three, holding up the C. P. R. transcontinental; four and five, holding up two Vancouver residents.

## Editorial Notes and Clippings

### MAYOR NEWTON AND ILLEGAL GAMBLING.

In his challenge to The News (published in his mouthpiece last night), Mayor Newton is making a bold grandstand play to enlist the sympathy and support of the intelligent and fair minded electors of Prince Rupert, which, through the rankest inefficiency in handling the affairs of the city during the past year, he has most hopelessly lost. To those who have their eyes open as to what is going on in this city the challenge is absurd. Everybody on the street knows that "illegal" gambling is being carried on openly and that nothing is done to stop it.

If Mayor Newton is so blind he cannot see it for himself, it is only another demonstration of his inefficiency and ample proof to the electors that the first plank in his platform, "a strict enforcement of the law," would be the first plank to be broken if the city should be subjected to the calamity of his re-election for another term.

### CONSERVATIVE CONDEMNATION.

Evidence continues to accumulate on every hand that the indignation aroused by the methods resorted to in the

Macdonald by-election campaign is not a matter of party feeling. Conservatives are heard giving no less outspoken expression than Liberals to their condemnation of practices in regard to which there is only one opinion that can be entertained by men of honest mind. In the current issue of the Orange Sentinel, the following is the closing paragraph of the letter of the Ottawa correspondent:

"The amendment to the address proposed by the opposition is virtually a vote of censure for the practices permitted in the Macdonald by-election. No one can deny that government supporters were guilty of creditable conduct in that contest, and it is a matter for regret that the main retort of the ministerial spokesman has been of the tu quoque description. What the Liberals did in Brockville and London, which the Conservatives rightly condemned at the time, has surely nothing to do with the methods employed in the Manitoba contest."

This paragraph carries all the more weight from the fact that it comes at the close of a letter which is undisguisedly friendly to the Borden government.—Winnipeg Free Press.

## POLITICIANS PROTECTED CRIME —CAUSED DYNAMITE MURDER

CLAIMED THAT THE COURTS WERE HINDERED BY LOCAL POLITICIANS IN DEALING WITH BRIDGEWORKER'S UNION AND THE RESULT WAS THE CRIMES GREW INTO MURDEROUS ONES

Indianapolis, Dec. 20. — Politicians standing between the labor unions and the courts were blamed for the McNamara dynamite plots at the outset of the government's arguments to the jury at the trial of forty accused "plotters." Pronouncing the series of explosions scattered over the country as a conspiracy "more dastardly and more threatening to society than the crime of an individual," James W. Noel, special assistant attorney, told the jury they were called upon to return verdicts in the most important trial in recent years. "Organized crime has been done here in an amazing degree," said Mr. Noel, "and it grew because the local arm of the law failed. Had the local authorities done their duty the conspiracy could not have spread, but it ap-

pears that politicians for obvious reasons stood between the labor unions, the criminals and the local courts.

"The strike of iron workers was called and plain assaults became murderous assaults. Then, unchecked by the local courts and favored by politicians, the criminals grew bolder with dynamite and nitroglycerine.

"The Los Angeles Times building was blown up with twenty-one people and after that reckless disregard of life came wanton desire to take life. Of one hundred explosions that occurred in the United States the government has proved ninety-two explosions were on the property of open shop contractors or firms who refused to recognize the International Bridge and Structural Iron Workers' Union."

### A STABBING AFFRAY AFTER CARD GAME

Tacoma Laborer Dead and Seattle Grocer Injured as Result of Dispute

Seattle, Dec. 20.—Michael Chimient, a laborer 32 years old, of Tacoma, is dead, and B. Fallane, a grocer, aged 35, is in the city hospital suffering from knife wounds sustained in a running fight. The two men quarrelled over a card game in a saloon on 6th Avenue south and King St. late last night, and knives were drawn. Witnesses told the police that during the argument over the table and stabbed Chimient in the back. Chimient, though severely wounded ran out of the place hotly pursued by his assailant. After running a block Chimient waited for Fallane, who stumbled as he reached his opponent. Chimient pounced upon the fallen man and stabbed him four times, inflicting two cuts in the head and two in the back, and Fallane retaliated by stabbing Chimient in the groin.

Both men were taken to the hospital, where Chimient died early today.

**Mexican Indemnities**  
Washington, Dec. 20.—Twenty-three Americans who were wounded or whose relatives were killed or wounded by shots from across the Mexican border in April or May, 1911, should receive indemnities aggregating \$86,000 from the Mexican government, according to a report by congress by a commission of

army officers authorized to investigate the cases.

# INDIANS DRIVE WHITE MAN FROM HIS HUNTING GROUNDS

**STEWART MAN ROBBED OF ALL HIS SKINS AND DRIVEN OUT OF THE COUNTRY BY INDIANS—ARE BOLD BECAUSE OF FAILURE OF GOVERNMENT TO CATCH GUN-A-NOOT.**

Gus Anderson, a well known trapper, returned to Stewart the first of the week, having been driven out of his hunting grounds at the headwaters of the Blackwater river by a party of five armed Kispix Indians. While away from his camp inspecting his line of traps the Indians ransacked his belongings, taking from between his blankets seven martens skins and also a moose. When he returned to his camp they told him he could not trap in that section, and ordered him to pack his outfit and make haste for the outside.

Similar outrages have been recorded time and again in the press, but no action has been taken looking to their suppression by the authorities. Last March Frank Martin and Carl Swan had their cache looted and Martin was told by the Indians to cease trapping and leave the Naas country.

The failure of the authorities to arrest Gun-a-Noot, the notorious murderer, who is still at

large in the wilds of the interior, lends color to the belief that the Indians feel immune from interference by the police and therefore take high-handed methods of overawing the white trapper and prospector and commit innumerable petty depredations to drive him out of the country.—Portland Canal Miner.

## JOE BAYLEY TO BOX AT COQUITLAM SOON

Lightweight Champion Will Appear at C.P.R. Town in Near Future

Vancouver, B.C., Dec. 19th.—There is a chance that Joe Bayley, the lightweight champion boxer of Canada, may defend his title in the near future at Coquitlam. Morris Condon of Victoria, manager for Bayley, and Percy Hartney, the Coquitlam boxing promoter, were both in the city today and they talked over the prospects for pulling off a contest at the C. P. R. town. Condon expressed his willingness to let Bayley box on a percentage and Hartney thought pretty well of the proposition, so much in fact that he is going back to Coquitlam to figure out how much expense will be entailed in enlarging the boxing pavilion there in order to accommodate the big crowd of fans who would go up from Victoria. Good is ready and willing to go on with Bayley on any sort of fair terms just to get a crack at the championship title, and if the Coquitlam promoter goes through the bout seems a certainty.

Good will go to Nanaimo tonight to box a miner named Tom Moore for fifteen rounds to a decision. Moore claims the lightweight championship of the North of England and boasts a record of half a hundred scraps. He is to beat Good, but the latter has a strong following who will be on hand at the ringside ready to take up all the Moore coin. Jimmy Hewitt of Vancouver will referee the bout.

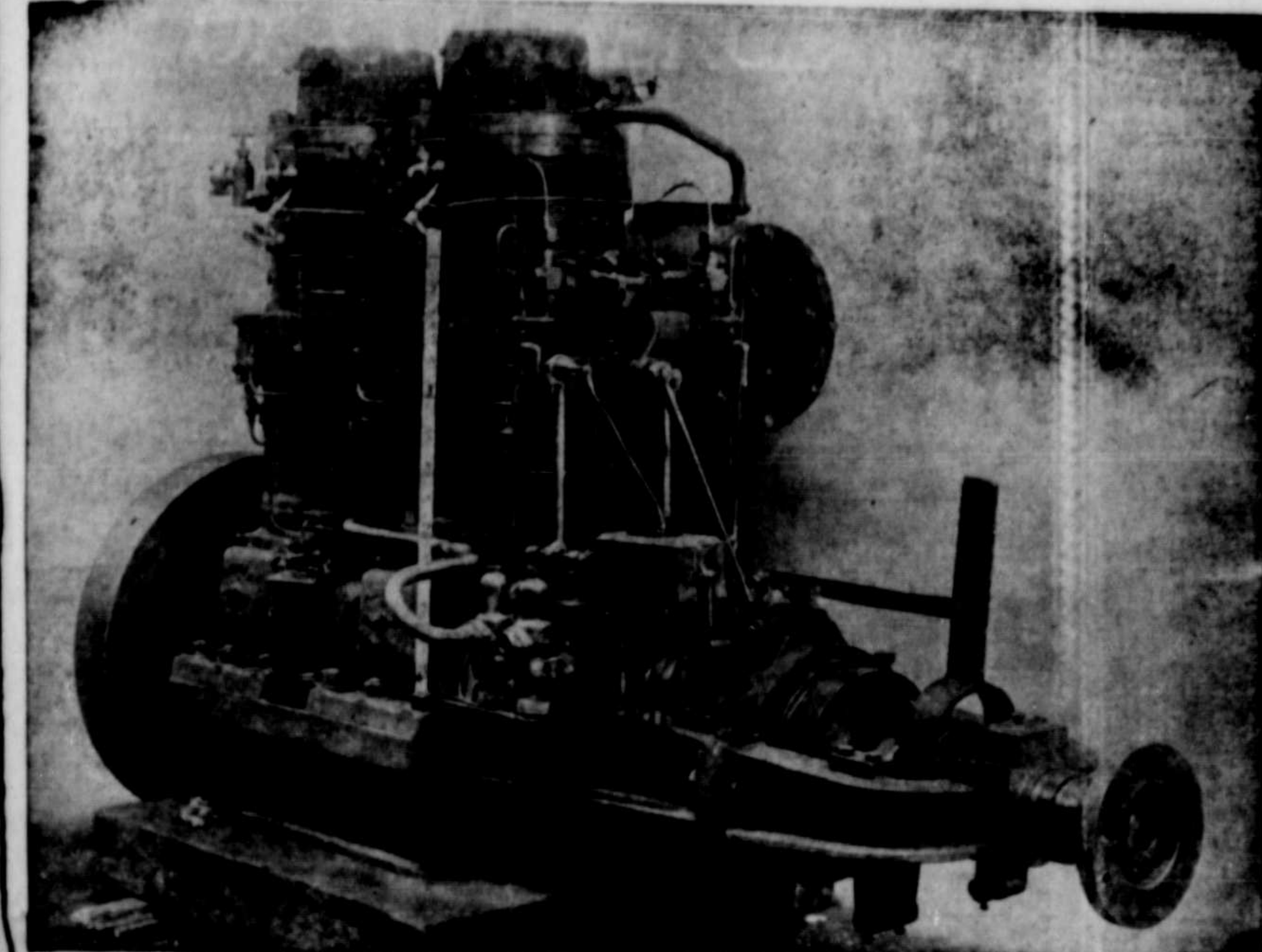
