MAN DROWNED IN RIVER NEAR PORT ESSINGTON

AUSTRIA REFUSES TO DEMOBILIZE TROOPS ON SERVIAN FRONTIER AND CAUSES ALARM

YOUNG MAN SWEEPED OVER FALLS TO HIS DEATH AT ESSINGTON

MINOR M'FADDEN SWEEPED OVER FALLS WHEN CANOE UPSET IN FALLS RIVER—COULD NOT REACH LIFE LINE—BODY NOT YET RECOVERED.

Swept over the falls of Big Falls River, a tributary of the Skeena river coming in at Port Essington, M. McFadden, an employee of the Hydro-Electric Co. lost his life on the day before Christmas. Up to the present only the most meagre details are available, as to how the sad fatality occurred.

Later details of the accident just to hand are that on Tuesday morning McFadden and two other men started to cross Falls River, a tributary of the Oxtail, in a canoe. When near the edge of the falls the canoe upset.

McFadden was caught by the current and although he made an attempt to grasp the life line that stretches across the top of the

falls he only could touch it. Before he could grip it the water tore him away and he was hurled over the thundering falls.

His companions escaped narrowly and at once hastened to get aid. All day Tuesday and yesterday men searched the river and dynamited the pools in hopes of recovering the body, but without avail. More men leave tomorrow from Prince Rupert to aid in the search.

Minor McFadden was a very popular young man amongst his companions. He is known to have a mother living somewhere on Vancouver Island.

AUSTRIA REFUSES TO DEMOBILIZE TROOPS AND CAUSES MUCH ALARM

Diplomatic Circles Are Much Worried Over the Refusal of Austria to Withdraw Her Troops From Servian Frontier—Is Thought That She Wishes to Force Protection on States

(Special to Daily News.)

London, Dec. 25—The action of Austria in refusing to demobilize her troops on the Servian frontier in view of the fact that the cause of the recent friction has been removed by the peace negotiations at the suggestion of the great powers is causing considerable apprehension among the various chancelleries of Europe.

Paris, Dec. 25 — Diplomatic circles here are much worried over the failure of Austria to withdraw her troops, which she recently massed on the Servian border. The Powers suggested to Serbia that she withdraw her demands, which threatened the safety of the peace of the world. This was done and the Austrian troops are not demobilized. It is feared that Austria has designs of participating in the

cutting up of Turkey, or wishes to exercise a protective government over Albania.

St. Petersburg, Dec. 25—The action of Austria is causing a stir amongst military men here. It is taken to mean that Austria intends to force her protection over the crippled Balkan states. This Russia will not allow, and the result may be a world-wide war.

UNITED STATES TAKES ACTION AGAINST ROAD

Biggest Suit on Record Is Entered Into by United States Against Southern Pacific.

Los Angeles, Dec. 24.—The greatest suit in equity in the history of the world, involving nearly a billion dollars worth of California lands, is on file in the United States District Court here against the Southern Pacific Railroad by the United States government.

Uncle Sam's fight is to establish title to all of the oil lands in California now claimed by the Southern Pacific Company. The land consists of 125,000 acres of the richest oil fields in the state, including the Kern River, Sunset, Maricopa, McKittrick, Midway, Elk Hills, Devel's Den, Lost Hills and Coalinga fields. This land is variously estimated to be worth from \$5,000 to \$7,000 and acre.

The bill was filed by T. J. Butler and B. D. Townsend, special assistants to Attorney General Wickersham. A large number of special agents also were engaged in collecting material for the suit. It is alleged by the government that while the Southern Pacific Company was securing the lands which it claimed under its grant from Congress, it had in its employ a corps of the most competent mineral experts in the United States, and this in face of the fact that the railroad company was not entitled to any mineral lands under its grant. As a result, the government alleges, the Southern Pacific secured the very best oil lands in the state.

CHARLES DEAN, ALLEGED ROBBER, MAY BE FREED

Man Accused of Bank Robbery at Royal City May Escape Because Witness Died.

New Westminster, Dec. 24.—On the seventh of January next Charles Dean, the only Bank of Montreal robbery suspect now held in the city, may regain his freedom.

Mr. Adam Johnson, the prisoner's solicitor, was granted an order by Chief Justice Hunter in Vancouver, calling upon the Attorney General and the governor of the provincial jail to show cause why the prisoner should not be discharged.

The hearing of the application will take place on January 7th in Victoria before the Chief Justice of the province.

Dean, following various demands in the police court, after being brought here from Los Angeles, was to be tried at the recent assizes, his case, however was traversed until the spring assizes.

Since the first preliminary trial one of the principal witnesses, who claims to have seen the accused in an automobile in company with four other men on the morning of the robbery, has died. This was young Russel Greenwood, who a short time ago was instantly killed by a live wire.

Another one of the witnesses is a well known character around the city. No mention has ever been made to date of who the owner of the mysterious automobile was, or what eventually became of the machine.

GOVERNMENT SHOULD LOOK INTO GRIEVANCES OF COAL DIGGERS

PERCY K. WINCH TELLS OF THE SUFFERINGS OF THE MINERS AND THE CONDITIONS SURROUNDING THEIR WORK—WAS MEMBER OF CORONER'S JURY AT EXTENSION.

The following is an extract from a letter written by Percy K. Winch to the Vancouver World. Mr. Winch, who operated a cigar factory at Ladysmith, has been engaged in business in the districts affected by the coal strike for a number of years. He is a very thorough man and has given much of his time to studying the conditions in and about the mines. Furthermore, he was a member of the coroner's jury at the time of the Extension explosion, so knows whereof he writes.

It is taken for granted opinion that it is the high wages of coal miners in British Columbia that makes the price of coal so high, and has caused the converting of coast shipping into oil burners, and even the locomotives on the island. As the men claim they are only receiving about \$2.50 per day, it would give the government an excellent chance to discover the cause of the high price of coal which is affecting every consumer, and working to the disadvantage of increased shipping.

The last unfortunate explosion which occurred at Extension mines brought out the wonderful fact that there was no dangerous gas in the mine previous to the explosion, as sworn to be the case by the company's fire bosses, but by a strange coincidence a gas explosion occurred with such violence that it tore the shoes of one man and blew great big timbers in all directions, and caused the death of about thirty miners, leaving many a poor widow and little orphan to suffer without any visible means of support. By the awful sight of seeing the first two or three bodies arrive, and the poor souls seeking to claim the dead all through the night and day, waiting anxiously for their dead as every train came in, you could realize more what an awful calamity it was—a grief that can only be fully understood in a small town, with crepe on every other door. If you could only imagine the burying of so many bodies in the presence of three thousand people and the pitiful cries of the poor unfortunate souls; if only that scene could have been witnessed by the people who take things for granted and

news for gospel, it would have left an everlasting impression.

These were the conditions that brought out a strong recommendation to the government to make it necessary for the men to appoint one of their own men to act in the capacity of a gas committee once or twice a month in conjunction with the twenty fire bosses, who were unable to discover gas that caused the last explosion.

The men claim that on reporting gas one of their men was discriminated against, and cannot work even as a helper in the mines, and, strange to say, these fire bosses who continually reported the mine clear of gas previous to the last explosion are the very men the company brought from Ladysmith to Cumberland to act as bosses for the Chinamen and try to break the strike, thereby forcing the men back on unconditional terms, thereby discriminating against any of these men who have taken part and eventually to weed them all out whether their grievances were right or wrong.

AN UNHAPPY LOT.

Everyone is happy at this season and little Johnny and Mary more than the older folks, for Christmas, with its presents, its feasting and joy, is to them the event of their small lives. To the older folks the real unadulterated happiness of the babes is the source of extreme pleasure. Take them from Christmas and it would be a bare, hollow imitation.

Is it not sad to think that while your children had their Christmas tree, decorated with tinsel and bent beneath the load of good things, that several thousand little tots in British Columbia had to forego the pleasure of Christmas, through no fault of their own? In the joy of self-satisfaction the little children of the striking coal miners at Cumberland and Ladysmith are forgotten. It is too bad, their child life is so meagre in any case.

Imagine your little son, your wee brother, or nephew, being handed a lunch bucket and a pit lamp when he reaches

the mature age of thirteen or fourteen years, and then see him disappear into the inky blackness of the mine and grope his way some three or four miles from the light of day.

What real childhood can be crowded into the period before the advent to the mine? And what would it have cost to make this strike Christmas one to be remembered and cherished in the black reaches of the slopes by the solitary little fellows guarding the trap doors and the safety of hundreds? One Christmas cup with the "boys"; one cigar, the price of a show ticket, would never have been missed by you, but would have been appreciated by those little boys and girls, suffering because their fathers and brothers are striking for their lives.

It is not too late yet. New Year Day is celebrated in the coal camps, and especially amongst the Scottish miners is it a sacred day, and even now those drinks, cigars and odd quarters can be collected and telegraphed to the strike committee.

MORGAN SAYS HE DOES NOT CONTROL FINANCE

J. Pierpont Morgan Before Senatorial Committee Disclaims Any Power with Money.

Washington, Dec. 24.—J. Pierpont Morgan told the money trust investigation committee of the House that "all the money in Christendom and all the banks in Christendom" could not form a monopoly that would control money. Mr. Morgan disclaimed any knowledge that he wielded a vast power in modern finance and

declared emphatically that he sought no such power.

For nearly five hours the chief witness called by the committee in its probe of the intricacies of the modern finance stood a running fire of questions that covered every phase of financial operation.

Mr. Morgan gave at length his views on competition, combination, co-operation and control in industry and finance, particularly the latter. He declared that he "did not mind competition," but that he preferred "combination" in his operations. He was emphatic in his declaration that there is no way one man can get a monopoly of money.

MOVING SLOW ON THE LAST LAP OF CANAL

More Than 40,000 Men are Now Engaged on the Work

Washington, Dec. 24.—As the Panama canal nears completion and on December 1, only one-seventh of the entire excavation remaining to be completed, the work force is increasing in number. There are now at work on the canal and the railroad the largest force in the canal history, 40,150 persons, according to the canal figures. Of these, except a few women, all are men, and 30,136 are white Americans.

BIG MILL AT MASSET STARTED LAST WEEK

Seven Day Adventists Colony at Sewell City Commence Operations

Last Monday with a great tooting of whistles the mill of the Masset Inlet Lumber Company started operations. A large crowd was present to witness the turning of the first wheel on the largest mill in the northern part of Graham Island. The first log was a splendid cedar and the first completed stick of timber a 2 x 6 scantling, was presented to Magistrate Harrison, who brought it to Masset Wednesday on the launch Westover.

The Masset Inlet Lumber company is comprised of members of a Seventh Day Adventist colony that has taken up land near Sewell, the new town soon to be placed on the market by the Star Realty Company of Vancouver and Masset. G. H. Crane is manager of the sawmill and was on the ground to witness its first work. He announced that ultimately his company will have lumber yards at various places on the northern part of the island.

One of the conditions in the agreement between the company was that the lumber must be sold at Vancouver prices—which will prove a considerable boon to settlers who have been paying very high prices for their lumber.—Masset Leader.

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Young Wife's Death a Mystery.

San Francisco, Dec. 24.—Surrounding the death of Mrs. Lillian Armitage, wife of Ralph W. Armitage, well known architect, is being investigated by the police, following an autopsy by Coroner's Physician David E. Stafford, who declared death resulted from some subtle poison. Mrs. Armitage was a bride of a year. According to relatives, Mrs. Armitage went to a medicine closet Wednesday morning, supposedly to take a harmless remedy. Shortly afterward her condition necessitated calling in a physician. She died without regaining consciousness at 3 o'clock that afternoon.

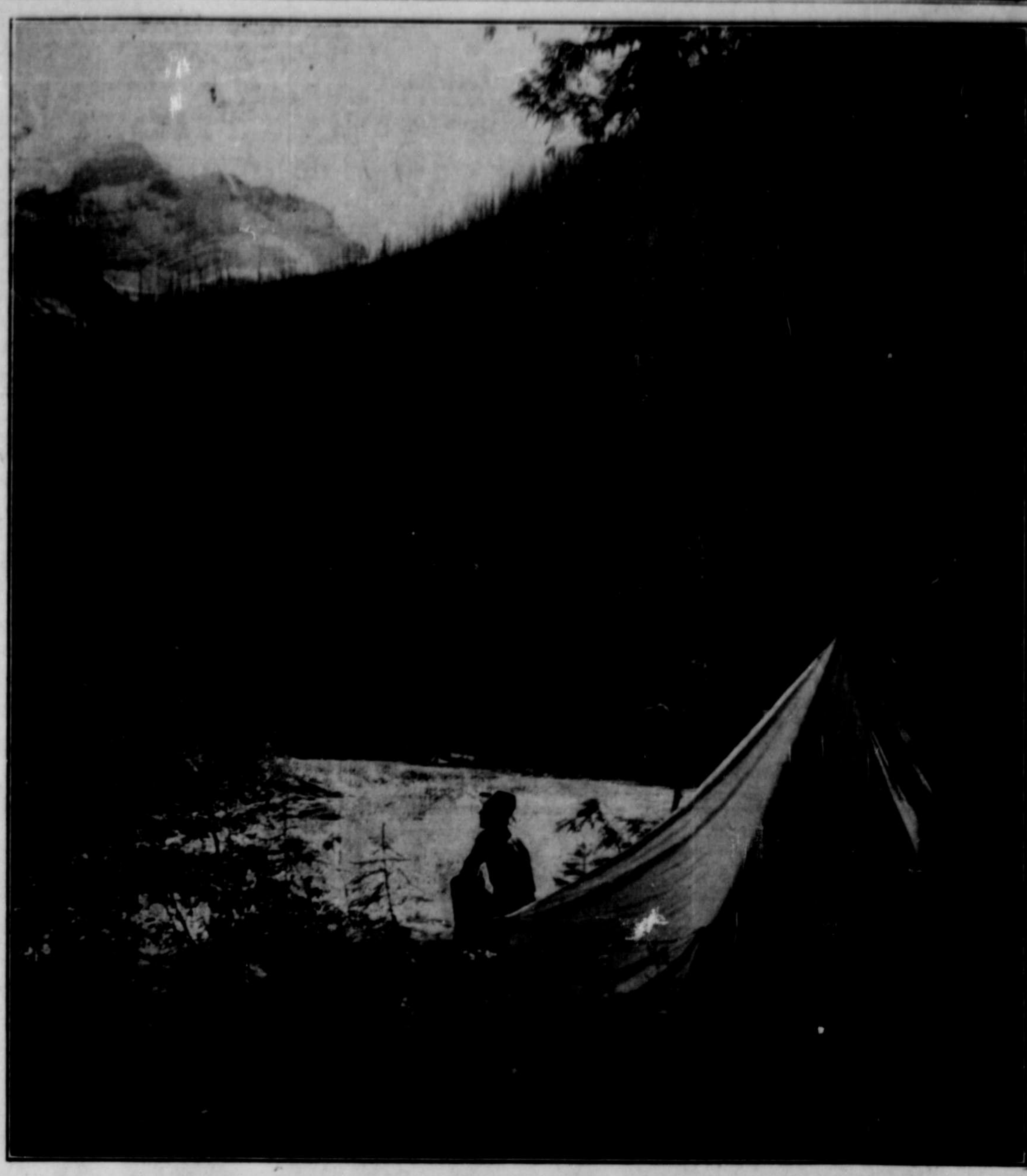

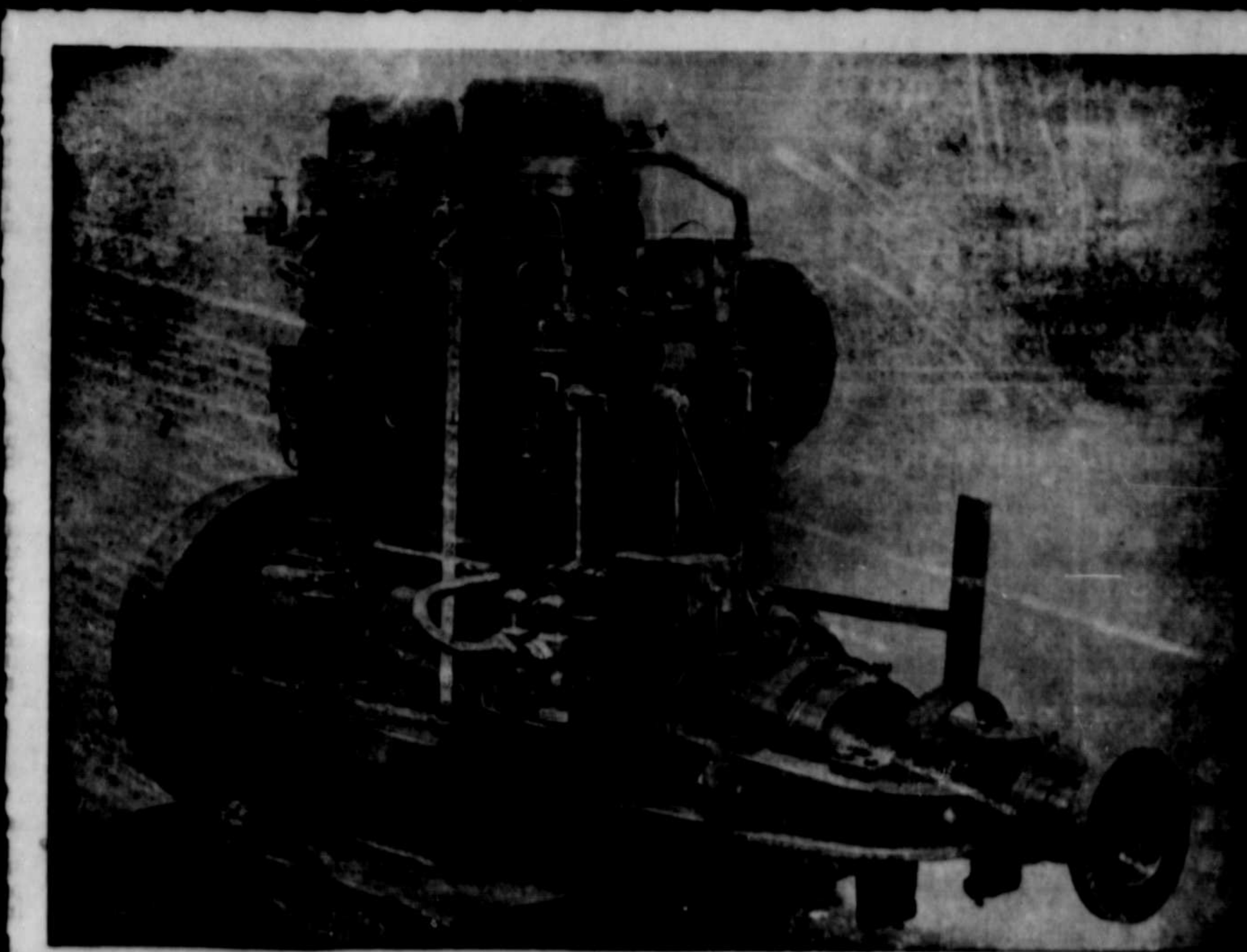
