## NEW YORK GARMENT WORKERS OUT ON STRIKE

### CONSIDERABLE DAMAGE DONE AT QUARANTINE STATION BY SATURDAY NIGHT'S STORM

#### Sweeping Demands by Turkey Peace Outlook Not Promising

**TURKEY DEMANDS THAT PRACTICALLY EVERYTHING SHE POSSESSED BEFORE OPENING OF HOSTILITIES BE RESTORED — BULGARIANS' DEMANDS ARE EQUALLY AS IMPOSSIBLE**

(Special to Daily News.)  
London, Dec. 29.—Although peace negotiations still continue, the outlook is not at all promising. Turkey is altogether too sweeping in her demands and asks that practically everything possessed before the opening of

hostilities be restored. The demands of the Bulgarians are quite as impossible as those of the Turks. The former, it is said, desire to get control of the Dardanelles, which among diplomats is regarded as ridiculous.

There seems to be little likelihood of a cessation of hostilities.

#### BOLD BANDITS DISCUSS RAID ON LOCAL STORE

**UNRAVELLING THE MYSTERY CONNECTED WITH AN AUTOMATIC PISTOL DISCLOSES A PROJECTED HOLDUP BY SOME OF PRINCE RUPERT'S BAD BOYS.**

Considerable time was taken in the police court this morning by an attempt to unravel a mystery connected with the disappearance of a formidable looking automatic pistol. The gun in question is estimated to be worth about \$15, and is claimed to be the property of a Mr. Anderson of the Clinton Rooms. It was taken from the latter place some time last September and was located on Saturday upon the premises of F. M. Crosbie, second hand dealer. Several "bad boys" are in the business, one of whom, George Tremayne, who has been before the court before and was out on suspended sentence, has confessed to stealing the gun from the Clinton Rooms. Since

he took it it has gone through the hands of several people, notably two boys, Perry Storring and Herbert Valpy. The latter was the actual vendor to Crosbie, receiving \$3 for it, which sum he hung onto. A mysterious black mask also figures in the case and was first mentioned as being seen in the room at the Clinton House occupied by Tremayne at the time he first appropriated to himself the gun. Perry Storring volunteered this information and hinted that Tremayne and he discussed the advantages to be accrued from a possible raid on the Prince Rupert Fish & Cold Storage Co. The three boys were finally committed for trial before Judge Young, and may come up for election this afternoon.

#### BIG STORM ON SATURDAY NIGHT CAUSES MUCH DAMAGE AT DIGBY

**MORE THAN THIRTY FEET OF NEW GOVERNMENT WHARF AT QUARANTINE STATION BLOWN AWAY—PILES BROKE LIKE MATCHWOOD—PILE DRIVER TURNED TURTLE**

Serious damage was effected to the Dominion government wharf in course of construction at the quarantine station on Digby Island by the storm on Saturday night. Although being more strongly braced than the plans submitted to the contractors actually called for, the outer thirty feet that was completed was swept entirely away, the pile driver tools, etc., being dumped into forty feet of water. So fierce was the wind that the piles snapped off close to the mud like matches, only two or three remaining out of fifty or sixty. This morning efforts are being made by the contractors to raise the pile driver, when the work of rebuilding will be proceeded with the utmost expedition.

#### SOME PERTINENT FACTS ABOUT SAVING THE TELEPHONE FRANCHISE

##### Mr. Pattullo States a Few Facts About Mayor Newton's Break With the 1910 Council--The "Empire" Had Absolutely Nothing to do With Saving the Franchise for the People

S. M. Newton, Esq.,  
Mayor of Prince Rupert and  
Editor of the Empire.  
Dear Sir:

In view of your reply to Mr. Naden, regarding the municipal telephone system, and in view of the fact that I offered to install a system for the city, you will permit me to make one or two observations in this connection.

Previous to my offer to the Board of Trade, I was aware that an outside company was preparing to enter Prince Rupert with a telephone system and it was clear that unless some immediate steps were taken the city would be saddled with a private corporation owning its telephone system possibly for all time. As the city was not at this time a body corporate in a position to handle the situation, I submitted my proposal to the Board of Trade, which at that time was

acting something in the capacity of a city council. This was what finally brought the matter to a head and the board unanimously decided that citizens should be called upon for subscriptions sufficient to install a telephone system to be taken over by the city as soon after incorporation as it could be arranged. This was done, and as pointed out by Mr. Naden, good citizens like Mr. Law, Mr. Westenhaver and others gave both of time and money to that end.

The action of the Board of Trade met with my most hearty support, which I showed in a substantial way by immediately subscribing \$500 toward the project which I subsequently supplemented by a further advance from the bank of \$750, making a contribution of \$1,250 out of a total at that time of about \$15,000.

While the Empire has repeatedly told the public how it saved the telephone system to the city, the time has come when the public should be informed that, con-

trary to this being the case, the Empire had neither directly nor indirectly anything whatever to do with the taking over by the city of the telephone system.

For instance, consider your honesty in the telephone issue. A few nights ago you stated in the Empire that it was like hauling teeth to get the telephone system away from the men who had caused its installation. Now that statement was not a mere misrepresentation or a mere misstatement; it was a deliberate lie, and it is a striking commentary upon the kind of honesty of which you so loudly boast.

Unscrupulous demagogic, like some forms of virulent disease, must run its course, and itself furnishes the best remedy for its ultimate and complete extermination and eradication. Into a cold realization of this fact you are about to be injected. It might well for you to prepare for the plunge.

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**NEW YORK'S MAYOR  
AFTER DR. PARKHURST**

Impossible to Enforce Statute Not  
Wanted, He Says—Tells Students What He Thinks of the Vice Law.

New York, Dec. 30.—Speaking for an hour and a half on "The Control of Vice and Crime" before the University Forum of New York University, Mayor Gaynor defended his administration of the laws concerning gambling, disorderly resorts, the liquor traffic and the observance of Sunday and delivered a scathing attack on the Rev. Dr. Charles H. Parkhurst, who, in a letter to the Mayor, criticized his administration and charged that at one time undesirable women had lived in one of his houses in Brooklyn.

Mayor Gaynor said that he was not a good man, and had never considered himself one. But he hadn't any patience with "rancorous" preachers, he declared, who wrote abusive letters about the Mayor of this city and published them in the newspapers, forgetting to send them to the Mayor. He said he had no desire to scatter disorderly resorts and disorderly women throughout all parts of the city, as a certain preacher had, nor to bring up again the days when one preacher went in disguise into those very resorts. The Mayor added that he had no desire for such an "oracular demonstration" of vice nor to "feast his eyes upon unfortunate women." Among those who listened to the Mayor's attack upon Dr. Parkhurst were many women.

He characterized such critics as "impossible," asserting that they suffered from a well defined disease in medicine known as "paranoia," and were under the constant delusion that they alone were righteous and that all the sinning rest of the world ought to be, not saved, but destroyed.

The Mayor dwelt upon the futility of enforcing laws which had not public opinion back of them.

**BONAR LAW AS LEADER  
IS HOPELESS FAILURE**

Canadian Leader of Unionist Party in British Parliament Cannot Hold His Followers Together

London, Dec. 28.—Cromwell on the eve of the battle of Dunbar, said, "The Lord hath delivered the enemy into my hands."

Premier Asquith might have said the same thing after reading Mr. Bonar Law's speech at Ashton-on-Lyne, for it has the effect of hopelessly splitting the Unionist party just at a time when the fortunes of Liberals were at their lowest ebb and when the Unionists were looking forward with the utmost confidence to the next general election with the practical certainty that they would sweep the country on

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the cry of "Down with the Insurance Act and Lloyd George."

The Liberals were disheartened and demoralized. Even the cabinet ministers were beginning to admit that they had little or no hope of success at the next general election. This was the situation only a fortnight ago. The Liberals have been raised from the lowest depths of despondency to the height of enthusiasm, while the Unionists are divided into two hostile camps. For this state of things Mr. Bonar Law is held responsible by many people, but he is not primarily to blame.
