## NEW YEAR IS USHERED IN BY TERRIFIC STORM

### MANY CANADIANS RECEIVE NEW YEAR HONORS FROM THE KING: AVALANCHE AT FERNIE

#### SIX KILLED AND MANY INJURED IN AVALANCHE NEAR FERNIE

##### TERRIBLE DISASTER AT COAL CREEK MINES OF CROWS' NEST PASS COAL COMPANY—LIST OF DEAD AND INJURED.

Fernie, B. C., Dec. 30.—A terrible disaster, in which at least six were killed, occurred at the Coal Creek mines of the Crows' Nest Pass Coal Co. at 7:05 this morning, when a snowslide swept down the mountain to the north of the town and carried with it a carpenter shop, in which twelve or thirteen men were working.

The heavy snowfall of the last twenty-four hours, followed by a rise in temperature, started the avalanche, which carried all before it.

Rescue parties immediately started to work and soon the man and bodies of the workmen were recovered, and one by one they were extricated from their prison by the work of resuscitation being done. In the meantime all the doctors in Fernie were telegraphed and a special train quickly made up was rushed to the scene of the disaster.

It is impossible at the present time to get a full list of the killed and injured, but up to the time of writing, six men are known to be dead, and at least six injured, without hope of recovery. The dead are: JAMES BUCKLEY, Fernie. HARRY NEILL, West Fernie. ALEX. WORTHINGTON, Coal Creek. ROSARIO, Fernie. NASLYEZUK, Coal Creek. KITENARY, Coal Creek.

The only list of injured that has been obtained at present are: Peter Campbell, F. Platt, Ferguson Mitchell, Coal Creek, a man named Jones from Fernie.

The first indication that the slide of Coal Creek had of the avalanche was when the electric system went out of commission. This was followed by commotion and excitement in the town and the work of rescue being done.

Worthington was still missing when found and the motor was used on him for four and a half. At one time he seemed to be reviving, as his eyes fluttered a little, but he succumbed.

#### MUCH DAMAGE DONE BY STORM AT VANCOUVER

##### Plate Glass Windows Broken in Many Parts of City—Telephone Communication Cut Off.

(Special to Daily News.) Vancouver, Jan. 1.—Vancouver is today experiencing the worst wind storm that has been known in recent years and a large amount of damage to property has resulted. Plate glass windows in many parts of the city have been broken and telegraph and telephone communication, both south and east, have been cut off. No fatalities have so far been reported.

#### THE NEW YEAR WAS ROYALLY WELCOMED

Numerous little social gatherings had been arranged for the occasion, dances, dinner parties, sleighing parties, theatre parties, everyone was out to have a good time. The light fall of snow gave to the city the typical midwinter effect, and altogether the joyful celebration was strictly in keeping with the happy occasion.

The sons present included Walter and Robert Allison of Moosejaw, Sask., and Mr. A. H. Allison of Prince Rupert. The daughters are Mrs. M. Ross of Binscarth, Man., and Mrs. Alex. Douglas, of Prince Rupert. This was the first occasion in seventeen years that a complete family re-union has been held. The happy couple were the recipients of numerous presents; including a purse of gold from the sons and daughters, and a beautiful bouquet of flowers from friends and neighbors.

Mr. and Mrs. Allison, sr., who are 74 and 68 years of age respectively, are still hale and hearty.

#### WAS NEWTON WITH THE B. C. TELEPHONE COMPANY?

##### SOME PLAIN FACTS ABOUT THE TELEPHONE FRANCHISE CRISIS WHICH SHOW HOW FAR THE MAYOR WILL GO IN HIS POLITICAL FAKING.

S. M. Newton for two years has been questioning the honesty of various citizens on the telephone franchise. Is he doing this out of mere hatred of better men than himself, or is it to draw a herring across the trail of his own suspicious attitude on that same question three years ago?

This telephone question first came up in September, 1909, when the manager of the B. C. Telephone Co. visited Prince Rupert and quietly announced that his company would install a telephone system in this city under power of their blanket provincial charter. He interviewed the local press and sought their favor. This paper (at that time called the Optimist) immediately sounded the warning and the Board of Trade got busy devising means of keeping this monopoly out. That period was the crisis in the telephone case. Here was a company which guaranteed them the privilege of planting poles and wires any place in the province, while Prince Rupert was a city without incorporation and fostered by the Provincial government which granted the charter to the company. It took courage, rapid action and a bold front to make the fight, but Prince Rupert had good and worthy citizens and they saved the franchise. In accomplishing this several plans were offered the Board of Trade, among them being a suggestion from E. J. Ghamberlin, who had a company willing to put in an automatic system at a cost of \$75,000, and one from F. D. Pattullo, who had a company willing to put in a less expensive system and make an agreement to sell out to the city at a future date. Eventually a citizens' company was agreed upon as the safest way of preserving the franchise for the city. This was quickly formed and the very men who were most prominent in organizing it are the very men who are now being vilified by Mayor Newton's paper for their good work.

Now where was Newton when the city was being threatened with the invasion of the B. C. Telephone Co.? Was he protesting against the entry of these monopolists? Was he fighting to preserve the franchise for the city? Did he contribute any money for the financing of the citizens' telephone company? No! One would think to read his paper today that he would have announced in bold type the visit of the manager of the B. C. T. Co. and denounced his mission, but his paper never mentioned it until it had become a live public topic and an issue in the Board of Trade. He was not as interested in preserving the franchise for the city then as he now is to take credit for something he did not do.

THE FACT IS HE ACTUALLY ADVISED MAKING TERMS WITH THE B. C. TELEPHONE CO. AND DISCOURAGED THE IDEA OF STARTING OFF WITH MUNICIPAL OWNERSHIP OF TELEPHONES.

That is the truth about the telephone crisis and that is how S. M. Newton tried to preserve the franchise for Prince Rupert municipality.

As a political fakir it would be hard to find his equal.

#### METHODIST GYMNASIUM WAS COMPLETELY WRECKED

##### YESTERDAY'S TERRIFIC GALE TORE IT FROM ITS FOUNDATION AND LANDED IT BOTTOM SIDE UP—MR. JAMES BARRIE THE ONLY OCCUPANT AT TIME; SLIGHTLY HURT.

Almost at the very moment that the fine gymnasium building of the Methodist Church was to have been thrown open to the young men of the city as an open day yesterday (New Year's Day) the terrific wind storm that was raging seized it in its fierce embrace, lifted it literally in the air and landed it upside down a short distance away.

James Barrie, an employee of George Tite's furniture store was the only person in the building at the time. In his endeavor to get out he was thrown with great violence against the ceiling and suffered a decided shaking up. It was feared at first that the injuries were serious, but after being taken to the hospital and examined by a doctor it was found that he was only bruised externally and will probably be able to be around again in a day or two. Mr. Barrie is very well known and popular in the city, being a member of several fraternal societies besides being prominently connected with the Methodist Church. It was due to his energy and zeal that the entertainment planned for New Year's Day was mainly due. Much sympathy is expressed by a host of friends for him, and it is their earnest wish to see him around again in a few days, none the worse for the somewhat novel though painful experience.

#### THE MAYOR WILL NOT FACE THE ISSUE

The Mayor is a sidestepper and balks at facts. This is a very bad trait. Why does he not face the issue and print Mr. Pattullo's letter sent to him for publication? Why also does he not controvert the statements made therein? Instead of doing this the Mayor contents himself with asking a senseless question and reprinting the offer of Mr. Pattullo to the Board of Trade, quite palpably designed to prejudice the readers of the Empire and entirely contrary to his constant boast of fairness.

Since the Mayor wants further information, let him examine several resolutions of the local telephone company, one of which was moved by Mr. Pattullo himself, asking the Council to take over the telephone system. Then let him look up the records of the Council and find out where Mr. Pattullo, as chairman of the Finance committee, made special provision for the taking over of the telephone by inserting in the estimates \$25,000 for the purpose.

Better than all argument is the fact that the telephone system was installed by citizens of Prince Rupert, one of whom was T. D. Pattullo, and the telephone system was taken over by the 1910 Council on behalf of the city, of which Council Mr. Pattullo was a member. No amount of argument can controvert these facts.

How much money did the Mayor put up and what influence did he have with the 1910 Council? The Mayor did not put up a single dollar to protect the telephone franchise, and for any influence he might have with the 1910 Council in this or any other direction he certainly did not have enough influence to secure the city printing for himself without competition upon his own terms. The Mayor will have even less influence with the 1913 Council.

Pattullo, the latter being the candidate of the business men, who have allied the political parties in the hope of getting a business administration. Like its predecessors, Mayor Newton's regime has not been popular but the present incumbent is the first mayor with the courage to try for re-election. His record is not a very sturdy one to stand on. His council has been incapable of handling the financial problems, but they did succeed in making a heavy increase in taxes. Progress and lower taxes will be the main plank of the Pattullo workers.—Omineca Herald.

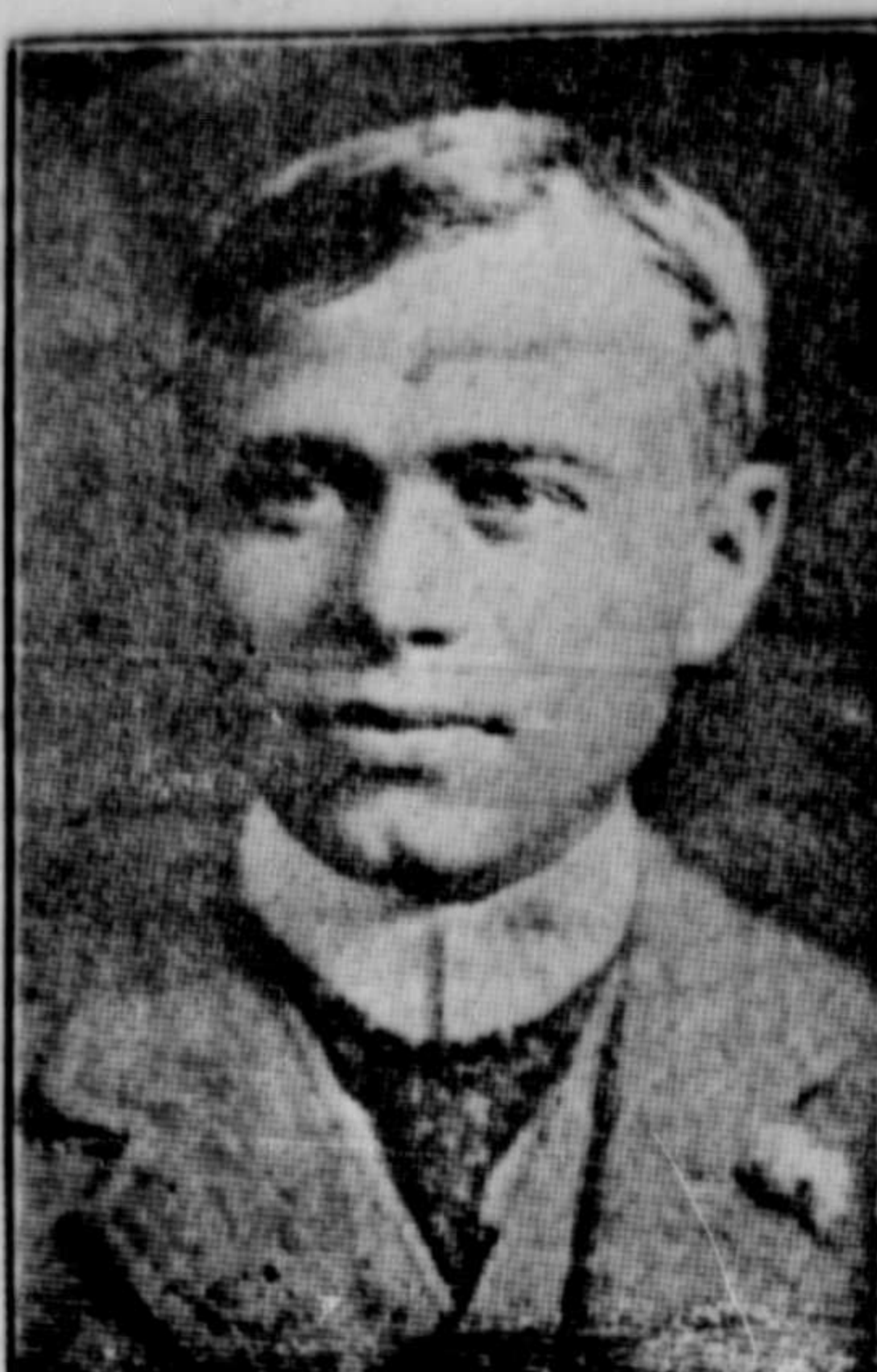

Mrs. Caine was born a Quaker in 1828 and lost her official connection with the Society of Friends through her marriage outside of the sect. She never wore any gems or jewelry except her wedding ring.

Native silver has been discovered at Stewart Lake, northwest of Fort George, and Edmonton capitalists are having it worked.

The Department of Public Works have authorized a survey of Seymour Narrows to ascertain the feasibility of constructing a bridge from the Mainland to Vancouver Island.

A herd of elk are now being secured in Wyoming for Strathcona Park, the new British Columbia wonderland on Vancouver Island.
