NO CONFIDENCE IN THE MAYOR.

An instance of the lack of confidence the citizens have in the mayor and his management might be recited in referring to the petition for a plank roadway which came from the property holders of a small part of Fifth avenue, near McBride street. After the Council had prepared an estimate of the cost of the plank road the petition was withdrawn on account of the owners' belief that the present management could not put the road in without an extravagant waste of money. It is claimed that the portion of the street mentioned in the petition could have been permanently graded for about the same amount as the Council's estimate for the plank road.

NEWTON MEANS NO WORK.

All business is conducted on a spirit of optimism and a feeling of confidence. Without these there would be no progress, no development. Prince Rupert's municipal works have been tied up because of the lack of public confidence in the present Mayor and his mismanagement. Probably the first man to feel the effect of this municipal stagnation is the workingman. Yet Mayor Newton has appointed himself champion of the workingman. Is this another of the political fakir's arts, or is he too stupid to see his own failure?

CIVIL SERVICE REFORM.

Sir George Murray, a member of the British civil service, who was brought out to this country by Premier Borden to investigate civil service conditions here and suggest improvements, has made his report. He recommends that the entire service be lifted beyond the reach of the blighting influence of party politics; that it be placed under the control of the Civil Service Commission; that the merit system be extended to all branches, so that appointments and promotions may be made on account of fitness, and that each department be placed under a


