LITTLE INTEREST IS SHOWN IN THE VANCOUVER ELECTIONS

ALDERMAN BAXTER ELECTED MAYOR BY ACCLAMATION—ALL LAST YEAR'S ALDERMEN ARE RETURNED BUT TWO

Vancouver, Jan. 9.—The civic elections held here today were the quietest that have taken place for several years. Very little public interest was shown owing to the fact that there was no mayoralty contest. Ald. T. S. Baxter being elected Mayor for 1913 by acclamation. There are only two changes on the aldermanic board for this year. Edward B. McMaster replaces Jas. White in Ward Six and Thomas Evans replaces George King in Ward Four.

BEWARE OF FIGURES

Tonight you have been promised an accounting of their stewardship by the city council of 1912. You will probably be handed an oratorical bunch of figures, the purpose of which will be to convince you that the 1912 council did better work at less money than any that has yet been. They will probably attempt to show you that in spite of the "pud-in' jobs" and the systematic loafing of the city employees, that you have been getting work at a lower price than ever. They may even tell you that they were building retaining walls at 60 cents a yard, and give you figures to prove it, whereas the actual cost of the work may be six dollars a yard. This is how it is done. A piece of retaining wall costs \$60.00 in labor to build. There are probably ten cubic yards of actual wall in the work, but if the engineer or superintendent measure up ten or twenty feet of the rock fill behind the wall as being a part of the wall itself he can show 100 cubic yards in that piece of work, at an apparent cost of 60 cents per yard instead of \$6 a yard. This is only an illustration of how figures can be made to convey falsehood. Juggling costs is an old game; as old as municipal politics itself, and Prince Rupert is playing it in professional form just now. As a matter of fact this paper has no hesitation in claiming that neither the mayor, the aldermen or any of the city officials can give the actual cost of any piece of work, big or little, that was done in 1912. It is impossible without a cost system, a plan that will give the true measurement and an accurate account of every item of expenditure, and one that will prevent juggling figures to prove that one system of civic labor is cheaper than another. Let us have a business council who can show us where the money goes to.

CERTIFICATE RETURNED TO VADSO'S CAPTAIN

Commissions Exonerate Him in Connection With Grounding of the Steamer Last October

Victoria, Jan. 9.—Capt. Noel of the steamer Vadso has been completely exonerated by the commissioners who have been conducting the investigation in connection with the grounding of the steamer in October last. The big freighter went ashore at high water in a dense fog just inside Buoy No. 1 in Barnes Sound. The commissioners found that Capt. Noel was guilty of an error in judgment, but in consideration of his previous good record his certificate was returned to him.

FALL OF ADRIANOPE IS HOURLY EXPECTED

Citizens Are Existing on a Half Meal Per Day—Peace Conference Likely to Resume

London, Jan. 9.—According to reports that have been received here conditions in the besieged city of Adrianople are in a most hopeless and pitiable condition. The soldiers and citizens are compelled to exist on half a meal per day. News of its capitulation is hourly expected. If Turkey presents definite concessions the peace conference is likely to be resumed.

The snowfall is pretty heavy there this winter, being over eight feet on the level. Jackson, manager of Harry Smith's Big Store, who is on his way to Victoria and Vancouver.

WEATHER CONDITIONS ARE AGAIN NORMAL

Along British Columbia and the Washington Coast—Very Few Disasters.

(Special to Daily News.)
Seattle, Jan. 9.—Normal weather conditions again prevail along the British Columbia and Washington coast. The only disasters reported here are the foundering of the steamer Cheslakee at Vananda, in which four lives were lost, and the grounding of the oil tank steamer Rosecrans in the mouth of the Columbia river, in which over thirty lives were lost. No wrecks have been reported north of the Columbia river, only a few minor mishaps. A severe gale is reported to be raging off the Alaskan coast.

WORLD'S PRODUCTION OF GOLD \$465,000,000

An Increase of More Than \$5,000,000 Over Previous Year. Canada Increased Over Three Million.

Washington, Jan. 1.—The world's production of gold during 1912 was \$5,500,000 greater than in 1911, the total having been \$465,000,000, according to a preliminary estimate announced today by George E. Roberts, director of the mint.

Gold production in the United States amounted to \$91,685,168, compared with \$96,890,000 in 1911. California led with \$19,988,186; Colorado was second with \$18,791,710; Alaska third with \$17,398,946; Nevada fourth with \$13,331,680; and South Dakota fifth with \$7,795,680.

Canada Gains.

Of the world's production, the Transvaal and Rhodesia made a gain of about \$20,000,000, and Canada gained almost \$3,000,000. The United States, Mexico and Australasia lost \$16,000,000, and in the rest of the world the production was about what it was last year. Since 1908, when the production of the world was \$442,450,000, the annual increase has been small.

The mint service of the United States during the year sold \$38,000,000 worth of gold bars for consumption in the arts in this country and Canada, as against \$35,000,000 in 1911.

Consumption of Gold.

The net consumption of new gold, including coin for such uses, in the United States and Canada was about \$35,000,000, and in the world, excluding Asia, probably between \$100,000,000 and \$115,000,000.

The absorption of gold by India again attracted attention. The net imports of India in 1909 were \$50,000,000, in 1910 \$90,000,000, in 1911 \$116,500,000, and in 1912 approximately \$140,000,000. The movement of silver in India also continues heavy. Imports of silver in ounces during 1912 have been exceeded only once in the history of India.

Monetary Stock

The increase of gold in the monetary stock of the United States in 1912 was approximately \$90,000,000. The gold holdings of the United States treasury increased about \$70,000,000, chiefly in bullion, represented in the circulation by certificates.

AN ADVISORY BOARD OF PROMINENT CITIZENS HAS BEEN FORMED WITH J. J. SLOAN AS MANAGER

Another evidence of the confidence the financial world places in Prince Rupert is the opening of a local branch of the Bankers' Trust Corporation. This corporation has as its Board of Directors a number of the strongest financial men in British Columbia, and will be under the direct management of Mr. Goodfrey Booth, who has for a great many years been the manager of the Northern Crown Bank in Victoria. Their head office will be at the corner of Yates and Langley streets, Victoria, B.C.

The branch in Prince Rupert will be under the auspices of a local advisory board composed of Messrs. T. D. Pattullo, J. A. Kirkpatrick, F. G. Dawson, F. H. Mobley, A. J. Morris, A. M. Man-

ALD MAITLAND'S
MUD CROSSINGS

Ald. Maitland, of the Public Works committee, seems very proud of his crossings. At least one would judge so from the elaborate explanation he offered as to why they were made mud basins instead of cross walks. It seems they are but temporary affairs which could not be crowned or raised above the level of the road surface because the street grading will sometime be changed and because there are no street gutters. The lack of street gutters may be a big handicap to city traffic in the eyes of Ald. Maitland, but still there is no good reason for giving the people gutters where they wanted crossings. The citizens wanted something to keep them out of the mud but not traps to coax them in deeper. There are 22 of these wooden gutters, called crossings by the excellent city managers of 1912. They cost \$58.10 each, according to the engineer's figures, or \$1207 for the bunch. Any jack knife carpenter could build a more serviceable one for \$10. Do you think you got value for that money?

EVERYBODY HAS SEEN
THE WASTE

It is hard for an incompetent to see his own failings. That is probably why the de-

partment chairman of the 1912 council want to know wherein their management was at fault. The average man on the street can tell them in an instant, for he has often seen two men and a boss working on a one man job or five men taking five days to do a bit of sidewalk that two men could do in two days. He has seen the men with the "pud-din' jobs" loafing over his time check. He can probably recite a few instances of personal observation that have convinced him beyond the reach of any collection of manipulated figures, that the city funds have been dissipated on favoritism and criminal waste. In brief the average man will tell the 1912 council that he did not get value for his money, nor anything near value.

ROBBING THE WEST.

Every parliamentary day that is passed before a proper measure of redistribution receives the royal assent is a day of legislation in which the Canadian west is robbed of its due voice. We have now the information which shows us just what additional representation the west would have under a redistribution bill. In all, the western provinces would gain 22 seats, giving them about one-fourth of the representation in Parliament. —Montreal Herald.

THE CAPTAIN AND CREW
SETTLE THEIR DIFFERENCES

ENTERTAINING CASE BETWEEN CAPTAIN AND THE CREW
OF THE "CANADA" HEARD BEFORE MAGISTRATE CARSS

Magistrate Carss presided yesterday over what might be termed an Admiralty Court to adjudicate between the captain and the crew of the trawler Canada, in their little differences arising out of the Xmas and New Year's celebrations.

The first act was played to an appreciative audience the day before when the charge of assault against Capt. Quinn made by Tommy White, the chief engineer, was dismissed. Yesterday the parts were transposed, Tommy White being the defendant in a charge of assault upon the "Doughty" Skipper. All hands were on deck, the mate, the midshipmite, the bos'un tight and the crew of the captain's gig. From the evidence adduced it was pretty clear that two distinct blows were struck. It is probable that the first one was by the engineer, who took objection to the captain's remarks anent Scotsmen, he being himself a son of the country of the thistle and bergew. The captain plainly came back, as the swollen ear of the engineer testified. They both rolled in the mud in the vicinity of the Central Hotel, where the fracas occurred. Immediately upon recovering their feet, the engineer returned to the ship, whilst the captain hid himself to the police station, where he asked for protection from the crew. Constable Cargill was detailed to accompany him on board his ship.

Upon going on board and calling down the hatchway, announcing his arrival, Tommy White, who had arrived ahead of him, came on deck and rushing at the skipper, seized him by the throat, making a pretty good attempt at throttling. Apparently after this nothing further happened and the constable left the ship, no charge being preferred.

Capt. Quinn in giving his evidence, remarked that "he was a sort of foreigner aboard his ship, all the rest of the crew being Scotsmen." On board ship he said "I am the supreme being." He is a bluff and hearty looking old sea dog, who hails from Grimbsy, Yorkshire, England but has a distinct Irish streak as his name would proclaim.

The assertion by the crew that he was gradually starving them to death was somewhat ludicrous in the light of the fat and healthy appearance of the men who made the assertion.

Finally, after magistrate and counsel had sifted the matter to the bottom it resolved itself into more or less of a drunken brawl, the defendant, Tommy White being fined five dollars and costs. The Magistrate lectured the members of the crew upon the seriousness of not subjecting themselves to discipline on board a ship, and showed them how they laid themselves open to a serious charge, punishable with imprisonment for assault upon a superior officer.

TUBERCULOSIS CASES ARE
OFTEN DUE TO IGNORANCE

STATISTICS SHOW FIFTY THOUSAND NEW CASES A YEAR
IN THE BRITISH ISLES.

London, Jan. 8.—The January number of the medical organ, the Practitioner, contains a remarkable series of articles devoted entirely to the diagnosis, prevention and treatment of tuberculosis.

They are contributed by 36 specialists, recognized the world over as authorities in their line. Among them are Sir Clifton Allbutt, regius professor of medicine in Cambridge university; Sir Richard Douglas Pell and Sir John Moore, physicians to the king; Sir Alfred Pearce Gould, Sir St. Clair Thompson, Dr. T. J. Horder, Dr. Austin Latham and Prof. W. E. Dixon.

Every year, according to Sir Richard Powell, from thirty to fifty thousand new cases of tuberculosis develop in Great Britain. In addition there is a current population of two or three hundred thousand afflicted with chronic and advanced tuberculosis of the lungs. That this terrible "white death" continues year after year to claim tens of thousands of victims is due largely to the ignorance of the general public as to how to avoid the disease and shake it off in its early stages.

Sir Clifford Allbutt, in an introductory chapter, describes how some years ago he was impressed with the probability that persons might pass through an attack of pulmonary tuberculosis without knowing it. Whether by virtue of resistance or by the

mildness of the invasion such persons suffer comparatively little, and their peril may not be recognized. At the same time, however, they must act as carriers, spreading the disease among others. That the heavy death roll from tuberculosis is preventable is proved again and again in different articles. Sir

John Moore, in the Moore Chapter on Tuberculosis in Ireland, gives a table showing that the lower the social scale the higher is the mortality from tuberculosis. The death rate among professional and independent classes is 1.15 per 100 as against 3.56 in the general service classes, including servants, porters, etc.

Dr. J. W. Carr makes clear the essential point that, with the rarest exceptions, an infant born to tuberculosis parents is at birth entirely free from the taint of the disease. If he falls a victim it is due to the ignorance and carelessness of those about him. One way in which tubercular bacilli often affects children is a gathering of dirt on the hands of the little ones, who are constantly crawling over carpets and floors and thus get their hands begrimed with dust which they promptly transfer to their mouths.

PROSPECTS BRIGHT FOR PORTLAND CANAL

Steamer Prince John Left for Stewart Yesterday with a Good Passenger List.

The G. T. P. steamer Prince John left for Stewart yesterday afternoon at 3 o'clock with several passengers for the little mining metropolis. This is the first regular passenger boat that has made the trip there for the last three weeks. EDISON PRODUCES ANOTHER INVENTION

Kinetophone Is New Amusement Device—Combination Moving Picture and Phonograph Machine.

New York, Jan. 8.—Thomas A. Edison gave the first demonstration of his most recent invention, the kinetophone yesterday in his laboratory at West Orange, N. J. The kinetophone is a combination of moving picture machine and phonograph, with a synchronizing device that is a marvel of mechanical ingenuity. The machine will be put on the market in about 30 days.

Seven films were shown, some of them dramatic and some comic, and the auditors were impressed with the perfect illusions. When actors walked down the stage their voices increased in volume as their figures came nearer the beholders.

"This will put the finest operas and best dramas within reach of the poorest man," said Mr. Edison. "For a nickel he will be able to see just as good performances as are now reserved for the rich man only. It will be a big agency for the uplift of the poor."

ANOTHER AEROPLANE

DESIGNER IN RUPERT
