Trying to Defend the Juggled Figures

At a public meeting and in a letter to this paper published today, Alderman Dybhavn endeavors to discredit The News' exposure of how the figures are juggled by stating that in reference to the sewer excavation in Block 22 no allowance was made for property connections. He admits The News' figures of 360 yards for the sewer excavation were approximately correct and intimated that the balance of the 622 yards was for connections. He neglected to say, however, that four of the connections are in earth, making about forty yards of excavation, and six in rock, figuring about 84 yards. There is still a discrepency of 136 yards, and a member of the engineering department admits that overbreak was figured in spite of Alderman Dybhavn's denial. The published letter also practically admits that the backfill and the hauling away of the surplus rock belonging to this piece of work is going to be charged to the waterworks department just as The News intimated that it might be, thus compelling the ratepayers to pay the several hundred dollars which the work will run over the appropriation, and which the property abutting the sewer ought to pay for. Isn't that juggling.

Alderman Dybhavn also defends the charge for the lane excavation on the ground that overhaul is counted from 500 and not 1,000 feet. Overhaul can be fixed at any distance, usually 500 or 1,000 feet. The News took 1,000 while Alderman Dybhavn says the city uses 500. Take either one and the fact remains that an overcharge on this item was made. A comparison which is easier to grasp can be made with the McMordie contract, which took rock out of the same hill. Contractor McMordie got 6 and 7 cents for his longest overhaul. The city took their rock from a half block to a block farther and charged 15 cents a yard, or the length of nearly three blocks farther. In support of his statement Alderman Dybhavn says the distance from Fifth street to McBride is 2,000 feet. You can check that up on your city map. It is just 1,648 feet. This is only a discrepency of 350 feet, but it means 3½ cents a yard on the cost of rock. Is that juggling? Did the alderman making the defence tell you how much plant and incidental items were figured in these costs? No, and you can depend on it you never will be told. He did say The News was attacking an official who cannot defend himself. This engineer says the 60 cent retaining walls were measured cube yards and the aldermen themselves, when driven into a corner, say they were not cube yards. Is that putting it up to the man who cannot defend himself? In concluding his defence at the meeting, Alderman Dybhavn asked the audience to accept his word for the figures. He asked you to accept his word for something he ought to have been able to prove, while the Newton followers object to accepting the new aldermanic candidates on their word of honor to follow a policy of honesty and efficiency, on business and issues which have not yet made their appearance.
