TITANIC DISASTER CLAIMS OVER TEN MILLION DOLLARS

New York, Jan. 15.—A flood of petitions for damages in connection with the loss of the Titanic was filed today. Mrs. Harris, widow of Mr. H. B. Harris, the well known theatrical manager who was among the victims, asks for damages of \$1,000,000, this being the heaviest of the 279 claims yet filed. The total claims amount to over \$10,000,000.

PATTULLO'S FINAL RALLY AT THE WESTHOLME LAST NIGHT

Sane and Business-Like Addresses Delivered by Mr. Pattullo, Aldermanic Candidates Supporting Him and Ex-Mayor Stork ---O. H. Nelson, Chairman of the School Board, Gave an Account of the Work Done by That Body

The large audience that completely filled the Westholme Opera House last night was representative of practically every interest in the City of Prince Rupert and was a positive assurance of the election today of T. D. Pattullo to the mayoralty chair for 1913. The meeting was absolutely devoid of distasteful personal references and slanderous statements concerning the opponents of those in whose interests it was held. It was a meeting of intelligent electors for the purpose of listening to a discussion of issues of vital importance to a city which is to prepare for the rapid influx of people which is bound to come in the very near future.

Ex-Mayor Fred Stork occupied the chair and with him on the platform were T. D. Pattullo, A. H. Allison, William Sibbald, George Leek and G. R. Naden. Mr. Stork said that it afforded him much pleasure to take the chair at a meeting for Mr. Pattullo, the coming mayor for 1913. A municipality is like a joint stock company and its affairs should be conducted on similar principles. A joint stock company holds an annual meeting for the election of directors and managing director for the ensuing year and this was what would be done today. Prince Rupert is a joint stock company, capitalized at \$12,000,000. Are you, he asked, as electors willing to place S. M. Newton in charge of such an organization for another year. (Cries of No, no.) Mr. Pattullo, in seeking election for mayor, was asking no favors. It was a compliment to the electors to have the opportunity of voting for so able a candidate as Mr. Pattullo. It was up to the electors to elect men to the Council who would be able to establish a better reputation for the city at outside points.

When the applause had subsided after Mr. Pattullo was called on to address the audience, he said that this was his first opportunity of addressing the electors since he had known that he had an opponent in the field. He had no desire to appeal to their sentiments or their prejudices in the contest. Some had thought he had been rather severe in his denunciation of Mr. Newton, but this had been necessary to impress upon some people his utter incapacity for the position and his absolute insincerity.

Mayor Newton had accused him of having no platform. What kind of a platform did Mayor Newton offer the electors—nothing but a farce from beginning to end. One thing that would be done by the incoming Council would be to evolve a sewer system that would answer present requirements and that would repay the city for the cost.

Mr. Pattullo devoted a few minutes to the manifesto circulated by Mayor Newton. In this the latter stated that his reason for withdrawing from the mayoralty contest was that he thought some one else could be induced to take his place. Only a few nights ago he had given as his reason that he could not successfully finance and manage the city's affairs. At

BALKAN ALLIES ARE FIRM TURKEY MUST ACCEPT TERMS

IN DEFERENCE TO WISH OF POWERS MAY WITHHOLD RESUMPTION OF HOSTILITIES A FEW DAYS LONGER—THE BALKANS FOR THE BALKAN PEOPLE.

London, Jan. 15.—The Balkan nations wish the world to know that they have not weakened in their determination to resume hostilities unless Turkey accepts quickly the terms they have submitted to her. In deference, however, to the wishes of the powers, they may withhold execution of their resolve a few days longer than seemed likely yesterday. They will adhere to their doctrine of the Balkans for the Balkan people.

HOME RULE BILL IS NOW UP FOR FINAL HEARING

REJECTION IN HOUSE OF LORDS IS ALMOST A CERTAINTY—BALFOUR CLAIMS EVERYONE IS BEING DUPED.

(Special to Daily News.)
London, Jan. 15.—The home rule bill entered its final stages in the House of Commons this afternoon. The debate must be concluded by tomorrow night. The measure will then go before the House of Lords, where rejection is a foregone conclusion. Lord A. J. Balfour, in moving for rejection of the bill, made an appeal to the country to realize the risk that would be run in permitting the bill to become law. He claimed that everyone was being duped in connection with the matter. The Nationalists thought that the bill made Ireland a nation, while English citizens thought it would be the means of obtaining political peace.

LOCAL UNDERWRITERS' ASSN. HOLD ANNUAL MEETING

PRINCE RUPERT COMMITTEE OF MAINLAND FIRE UNDERWRITERS' ASSN. CONFIDENT OF SECURING REDUCTION OF RATES WHEN LAKE IS CONNECTED WITH CITY.

The first annual meeting of the Prince Rupert committee of the Mainland Fire Underwriters' Association of B. C. was held at the offices of the Continental Trust Co. yesterday morning at 11 o'clock. The bylaws and constitution of the local committee were accepted by the board of directors of the British Columbia mainland board. The object of the association is to take the place of intermediary between the public and the board fire companies. The local board, who are directing all their energies toward endeavoring to get the insurance rates lowered, feel confident that their efforts will meet with success by the time the Shawatlans Lake water is connected with the city. In this connection the fire protection committee want to warn the public against the danger that is incurred by the waste of water through letting taps run continually during this frosty weather. Prince Rupert occupies the place of honor with her sister cities of Victoria, Vancouver and New Westminster of being among the only four cities in the province which have committees at present. Each local committee is under the direct jurisdiction of the mainland board, whose head office is in Vancouver. The following officers for the ensuing year were elected: Chairman, C. W. Peck; vice chairman, T. D. Pattullo; secretary-treasurer, M. J. Hobin; investigating committee, E. H. Mortimer, E. C. Gibbons, W. S. Fisher; fire protection committee, J. C. Halsey, J. Lorne McLaren and Lee Baker; rate schedule and commission committee, M. M. Stephens, A. G. Forster and T. Brown. This local board is composed of men representing tariff or board companies in the province. Tariff companies are the only ones that banks will recognize when ensuring collateral in respect of loans. All rates are made by the main board. Every three months a sworn statement is furnished by each firm represented on the board, stating that they have figured rates correctly and have conducted their insurance business in a straightforward and businesslike manner.

SPLENDID PICTURES AT THE WESTHOLME

Prince Rupert Will Be First Canadian City to See Alaska-Siberia Pictures, Shown This Week.

Prince Rupert is the first city in Canada to have the opportunity of seeing the most marvellous moving pictures ever taken, those of the Carnegie Museum Alaska, Siberia and Arctic expedition. Mr. Herman J. Brown, the owner of the Canadian rights in these remarkable films, has just arrived in B. C. direct from Kansas City, Mo. Not being able to arrange his bookings to open immediately in Vancouver, he looked around for the next best show town, and Prince Rupert's name was mentioned first. It is gratifying to find that this city occupies such an enviable position in the eyes of the theatrical world.

Polar bears in stellar roles, monstrous walrus in uncouth gambols, seals in herds of hundreds, birds in flocks that darken the sky, moose, mountain sheep and other denizens of the northern wilds constitute the unique programme offered to the patrons of the Westholme Opera House tomorrow night. Extravagant advertising of motion picture films is prevalent everywhere, but in this extraordinary set of educational and hunting pictures the advertising claims of its sponsors are more than made good. The closing picture, showing a battle between a mother polar bear and a ship load of hunters, in which the life of the bear's cub is at stake, is the most exciting and unusual film ever made. The life and habits of the Eskimo, his queer houses and sports are shown vividly. The expedition which secured these films was sent out by the Carnegie Museum of Pittsburgh, Pa., last spring. It covered the coast of Alaska and Siberia, eventually penetrating to a point within eighteen degrees of the North Pole.

A CANADIAN PARCELS POST MAY SOON BE ESTABLISHED

THE QUESTION WAS DISCUSSED IN THE HOUSE OF COMMONS YESTERDAY—DEFINITE ANNOUNCEMENT WILL BE MADE DURING PRESENT SESSION

AMUSING VAUDEVILLE SHOW AT THE EMPRESS LAST NIGHT

MAYOR NEWTON HAS AT LAST SHOWN ABILITY—PROVES HIMSELF A VAUDEVILLE MANAGER OF NO MEAN ORDER—MINISTER OF FINANCE DANCED A HORNSPIPE.

Mayor Newton's vaudeville show at the Empress Theatre last evening proved him to be a showman of no small ability. Comforting warmth, free cigars, crashing music, with chances of possibly a rough house, caused every habitue of the saloons and pool rooms in the city to forsake their usual haunts and roll up and shout for Newton. Opening with the bagpipes, to which the venerable finance minister danced a hornpipe to thunders of applause, Mayor Newton, himself the top liner of the evening's bill, followed and performed his well known special turn with all his accustomed nerve and histrionic ability. An amusing moving picture film followed. Alderman Montgomery, the idol of the Gods, was never seen to better advantage than in an original monologue, entitled "Class Against Class." The audience was in ecstasies and Showman Newton waved his arms and spurred the ushers on to pass the cigars around faster. (Deafening cheers.) The band again burst forth with redoubled vigor and another picture was cast upon the screen. Alderman Dybhavn, in the character of an honest real estate man, next entertained the audience. A song by Mr. Fletcher, which was loudly applauded, was followed by the star turn by Alderman Douglas, the financial wizard. Never before was the veteran in such great form. He was a revelation, fairly capturing the house. As an encore he gave a domestic sketch entitled "I am the man who can turn out the stuff." Mr. McClellan again came forward and trod a measure to the sweet strains of the bagpipes, which was vociferously applauded.

F. M. Lannie, the noted linguist, passing as an aldermanic candidate, was next seen in a short but brilliant entre acte. For straight entertainment Mark Harby's ventriloquial turn was as good as could be seen in any vaudeville house on the Pacific Coast. The well known character actor, Alderman Maitland, in an impersonation of Sir Wilfrid Laurier, brought down the house. Peter McLachlan, in the character of the other honest real estate dealer, gave an acceptable rendering of the part, which was received with loud applause. An original act by Alderman Bullock-Webster, entitled "Brains and Ability in Overalls," made a big hit. Mayor Newton, who appeared again at the foot of the bill in a heavy tragedian act, proved very entertaining, bringing to a close one of the best variety shows ever pulled off in Prince Rupert.

DETECTIVES USE BANK MESSENGER AS BAIT

Pitched Battle Followed, One Robber and One Detective Being Shot—Messenger Beaten.

New York, Jan. 14.—A squad of detectives baited a trap for highwaymen today with a 60-year-old bank messenger and a satchel containing \$3,400. The highwaymen took the bait. One was shot and may die. The messenger was beaten senseless and probably has a fractured skull and a pitched battle with bullets peppering houses like hail was fought on the East Side. One of the highwaymen escaped; the other was captured.

The messenger, Peter E. Plunkett, left the Union Exchange National Bank, where he had been employed for ten years, with his satchel in his hand and a crowd of detectives trailing him. Within the satchel were currency and silver for the weekly pay rolls of two factories. The detectives were disguised as laborers to avoid suspicion.

As Plunkett stepped into the darkened hallway of one of the factories two men sprang up from nowhere beside him. One of them crumpled him up senseless on the flagging before he could cry out. The assailant used a blackjack. The other highwayman grabbed the satchel and both darted away.

The factory had not been apprised of the plan and detained one of the detectives, who had gone ahead of the messenger. While he was explaining the highwaymen were making off. The detective started in pursuit, caught one of the assailants and rolled to the cobblestones with him.

Meanwhile, the detectives in the rear of Plunkett, not expecting a denouement, began blazing away with their pistols at the other fleeing highwayman. The thief fired as he fled and keeping the pack at his heels darted down a side street, through the traffic into a hallway, out a back door, over fences back into the street and disappeared, leaving behind a bullet pierced overcoat. The satchel, dropped in his flight, was found intact ten feet from the factory doorway. One of the fugitive's bullets found a mark in James A. Watson, a detective, entered his back and passed nearly through his body. It is said he cannot recover.

The man who was tripped to the cobblestones said he was Frank Moran, 19 years old, a packer. He was held without bail. Plunkett was taken to a hospital.

C. E. Mineard, who was amongst the pioneer boys of this city, arriving when it was little more than a camp, four years ago, returned yesterday morning on the Prince Rupert, after an absence of nearly three years. Mr. Mineard, who at one time was in the photography business here, went to Stewart upon the start of the boom, later going to Vancouver, in which city he has resided ever since.

GOOD MEN ARE NEEDED.

Within a few hours the personnel of the 1913 city council will be made public. It is to be hoped the choice will be acceptable to a very large proportion of the citizens, and that the men who receive the honors will not only appreciate the duties of the office in a general way, but realize the particularly heavy responsibilities of the city administration during the present year. May they be able to work in harmony to the general good of the city and to their personal credit. Their efforts can be advantageously turned towards weaving business principles into the financing and accounting, with the object of getting efficiency and full val-

ue for the public expenditure. In the public works department this is of particular import, for while the public realize labor has been used extravagantly and wastefully, they have no method of checking it up. The financing is probably the heaviest problem to face and upon that depends very materially the commercial prosperity of the year. If the electors select men who can hold the confidence of the property holders and gain the confidence of the money market much may be accomplished this year in development work. But whoever they are it is to be sincerely hoped that they will have no grievances to air or sores to heal, but will immediately set to work for the betterment of Prince Rupert.

PORT EDWARD NEW INDUSTRIAL CENTRE

Splendid Location of Townsite Which Will Form Commercial Annex to Prince Rupert, B. C. —G. T. P. Pacific Terminus.

Every day brings us nearer the completion of the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway. This is emphasized by the fact that passengers can now leave Edmonton at 10 p. m. in Pullman sleeping cars and arrive at Fitzhugh, Alberta, in the heart of the Rockies, at 9:20 a. m. next day and at Tete Jaune Cache, B. C., on the Fraser River, at 2 p. m. the same day, thus making the journey, which formerly occupied 37 days of continuous travel by pack train, in 16 hours.

With the near approach of the completion of the line—which the officials promise before the end of 1913—the eyes of the world are turned more than ever to the wonderful northern city, Prince Rupert, the terminus of this great transcontinental line, and destined to play a strong part in the history of commerce and industry on Canada's Pacific Coast.

Criticism has in the past been directed at Prince Rupert, to the effect that she lacks sufficient wharf accommodation. This is, to a great extent, true, the fact being that wharf space there is pretty well utilized now. But Prince Rupert loses nothing by that, owing to the fact that she is now to have an industrial annex eight miles to the south (but really next door, so to speak, owing to an impenetrable wall of rock), which provides ample wharf space and which also provides one of the finest sites for an industrial centre on the entire coast.

Port Edward, industrial annex of Prince Rupert, possesses an almost land locked harbor where modern wharves may be built at an angle of 45 degrees from the shore, there being a good bottom at a depth not too great to preclude the driving of piles to a considerable distance out. Excellent progress has been made with the work of clearing the townsite.

What Port Edward will mean to Prince Rupert cannot be accurately gauged now, but in many ways it will assist the coming great northern port to a position of importance it could not have reached without Port Edward. Prince Rupert and Port Edward, taken together, contain every natural advantage found in the best equipped harbor cities of the world and in addition offers facilities for the development of large and prosperous industries beyond the facilities offered by any other city on the entire Pacific Coast.

Geographically, Port Edward is located on the coast of British Columbia, fronting on Porpoise Harbor, eight miles south of Prince Rupert and approximately five hundred and forty miles north of the City of Vancouver, and fifty miles south of the Alaskan boundary.

There are two entrances to the splendid natural harbor of Port Edward, one on a straight line from Green Top Island to the mouth of the harbor, thence directly into the inside harbor, this range having a minimum depth of 3 and three-fourths fathoms (22 feet) at low water. The second entrance has two turns and a minimum depth of seven fathoms, or 42 feet, sufficient to accommodate the draught of any type of vessel afloat. At the head of the harbor there is a turning basin 1,800 to 2,000 feet wide, in which the largest vessel afloat might turn with ease and safety. In no place does the tidal current in this harbor exceed two knots per hour. When the proposed lock is put in at Zanardi Rapids, Port Edward will be the only harbor on the Pacific Coast with practically no tidal current whatsoever.

The Grand Trunk Pacific trains run through Port Edward, traversing its waterfront. By reason of its geographic location this port permits the shipment of cargoes west with a saving of many miles over shipments sent from ports farther south. It offers unusual facilities for shipment east to the Atlantic Coast over a railway built on easier grades and with fewer summits than any other transcontinental railway system on the continent. HOOLEY HAS LEFT PRISON Spent 9 Months in Wormwood Scrubs

London, Jan. 15.—Ernest Terah Hooley, the financier, has been released from Wormwood Scrubs prison. He was met by a friend in a motor car, and the release was effected so quietly that nothing was known of it till the next day. Hooley was sentenced to 12 months' imprisonment in the second division on February 10th last for fraud, and secured the usual three months' remission of his sentence for good conduct. Hooley's health was not good in prison, and a great part of his time was spent in the hospital. This did not mean necessarily confinement to bed, but it relieved him of hard tasks. He was chief alto in the chapel choir.

Hooley was indicted for obtaining from George Leech Tweedle, a young mechanical engineer, who had inherited a fortune of £45,000—six cheques for the payment of £2,000, with intent to defraud.

NATIONAL COMMISSION Annual Meeting of Baseball Governing Body Set for This Week.

Cincinnati, O., Jan. 15.—The National Baseball Commission will hold its annual meeting in Chicago January 16th, according to an announcement by President Thomas J. Lynch of the National League. The date is subject to change, however, in accordance with the length of President Ban B. Johnson's illness.

At this meeting officers will be elected, annual reports read, and it is said, a decision will be announced on two matters important to all minor league clubs.

At a meeting of the commission recently, at which Chairman August Herrman held the proxy of President Johnson, all the evidence in the requests of the National Association of Minor Leagues for a uniform players' contract was taken. Likewise, the evidence on individual salary limit of minor leagues was heard and taken under consideration. Chairman Herrman announced the evidence would be submitted to President Johnson, and that it was almost a certainty the commission would decide both questions at the Chicago meeting.

UNIONISTS ABANDON PART OF PLATFORM

London, Jan. 13.—Hon. J. Austen Chamberlain tonight expresses regret at the decision of the Unionists to abandon the plank in their platform regarding the imposition of taxes on food entering Britain. He states positively that he will adhere to it himself.
