The Liberals, he said, welcome the issue and would rejoice if the government would advise the Governor General to dissolve Parliament and go to the country. H. B. SENDING WARSHIP TO MEXICAN PORT

United States Government Has
Despatched Cruiser to
Acapulco.

(Special to Daily News.)
Washington, Jan. 17.—The cruiser Denver has been ordered from San Diego, Cal., to Acapulco, Mexico, where a desperate situation is reported with Americans in danger. She will sail tomorrow and should arrive at the Mexican port in about four days. Commander Washington has about 270 sailors aboard and a company of marines.

The decision to send a warship to protect Americans was reached early today after alarming reports of the activity of rebels under Julio Radillo had been received through Ambassador Wilson at Mexico City.

Consul Edwards at Acapulco had suggested that, inasmuch as the Mexican commander of the town had admitted his inability to reinforce the garrison, a warship should be sent.

POWDER BOAT AT NANAIMO BLOWS UP

Shatters Windows Fronting on
the Harbor, and Injures
Many

Nanaimo, Jan. 15.—When leaving Nanaimo harbor today at 2 o'clock with a cargo of powder the steamer Oscar took fire and getting beyond control was beached on Protection Island. The powder exploded with disastrous results to Nanaimo, several thousands dollars' worth of damage being done. Every plate glass window facing the water was broken and a number of persons were seriously cut. Every member of the crew of the Oscar escaped before the explosion occurred.

PLUMBERS ARE BUSIEST PEOPLE IN THE CITY

Thermometer Dropped Last Night
to Four Degrees Above—Coldest
for Past Two Years.

It is only the genuine old timer who is able to say that he has ever experienced in Prince Rupert as prolonged a period of extreme cold as the one which is now filling the pockets of the plumber and the coal man. The present cold snap started in on Wednesday, January 8th, the minimum temperature for the twenty-four hours ending at 5 a. m. on that day being 31 degrees. Since that time the weather has been clear and cold, with the thermometer steadily and gradually falling. Last night it reached the lowest point that has been recorded during the present winter, 4 degrees above zero. This record also beats the winter of 1911 and 1912. During the winter previous to that a temperature of 2 degrees below was recorded.

While a temperature of 4 degrees is not regarded as extremely cold weather, nevertheless it is sufficient to cause much discomfort and inconvenience under present conditions existing in Prince Rupert. There are practically no buildings in the city that are built to withstand such weather with any degree of comfort to the occupants. Plumbing arrangements are not such as to cope with present weather conditions. "Send a plumber, quick, the pipes have burst," is the most frequent telephone message during the past few days.

The weather man holds out little encouragement for immediate improvement. Tonight zero weather may be expected. Following is the official report for the twenty-four hours ending at 5 o'clock this morning: Barometer, 29.868; maximum temperature, 16; minimum temperature, 4.

"KNIGHT" WAS ARRESTED

Rode Through London in Armor
and Disturbed Traffic.

London, Jan. 17.—A novel but disastrous advertising "stunt" caused the downfall of Henry Buckingham, who was hired by a moving picture theatre to advertise the performance by riding through the streets of London as a knight of old.

Clad in a full suit of armor, the bold knight rode forth, according to contract, ready to conquer not the hearts of winsome ladies of the day, but the three-penny bits of the pleasure loving populace. So great was his conquest becoming that he had to seek police protection in order to escape from the aroused people. Nevertheless, although Henry did succeed in securing protection, he himself was secured by a London bobby, who arrested him for disturbing the traffic.

TURKEY'S ANSWER TO POWERS IS MOMENTARILY EXPECTED

GENERAL OPINION IS THAT SHE WILL NOT YIELD ADRIAN-
OPLE IN WHICH CASE WAR WILL BE RESUMED

London, Jan. 17.—The next move in the long drawn out game of diplomacy in connection with the settlement of the war in southeastern Europe must be made by Turkey who must give her answer to the collective note of the Powers advising concessions in favor of the allies. It is believed that a prompt reply will be forthcoming although it is scarcely expected that the Turks will yield on the question of delivering over Adrianople to the Balkans. The Turks are hopeful of arriving at a settlement without making too great a sacrifice.

A FLEET ON THE PACIFIC IS THE GREATEST NEED

NEW ZEALAND MERCHANT VISITING IN OTTAWA SAYS THAT
ANTIPODES WISH TO UNITE WITH OTHER BRITISH POS-
SESSIONS IN ESTABLISHING FLEET ON PACIFIC.

Ottawa, Jan. 17.—Henry Jol-sen, a prominent merchant of New Zealand, who is in the city on business, says that it is the prevailing opinion in New Zealand that British India, Australia, New Zealand and Canada should unite in the establishment of a fleet on the Pacific, as that is where the greatest danger lies. There is a tendency in New Zealand to a downward revision of the tariff, which will undoubtedly result in increased business for Canada.

FEATURES OF THE BANK ACT.

The outstanding feature of the Bank Act, now printed for distribution, is the increased privilege of note circulation given to the banks. The right of note issue was formerly limited to the paid up capital. The first extension of this was the privilege of issuing emergency circulation for four months to the extent of 15 per cent. of paid up capital and reserve. The time for this issue was extended to six months, September to February, inclusive, and thus it remains. The government "may" tax this up to 5 per cent. No government should have an option in taxation. The new increase is allowed in the form of a right to make additional issue to the extent of any sum of gold and Dominion notes set apart or deposited with a bankers' and government board as "gold reserves." For example, a bank with \$12,000,000 capital, \$12,000,000 reserve, \$10,000,000 gold and \$10,000,000 Dominion notes was allowed, under the earlier law, to issue notes up to \$12,000,000. This could be increased, under the emergency law, which is continued, by 15 per cent. on \$24,000,000, or \$3,600,000. Under the new law the same bank, by setting apart, say, a quarter of its gold and Dominion notes as gold reserves, can further increase its note issue by \$5,000,000.

An important relaxation is made in the law requiring the banks to keep 40 per cent. of their reserves in Dominion notes. This of the nature of a forced loan without interest, is what the Dominion requires in return for the note issue and other valuable privileges ac-

corded banks. "It is made largely worthless to the Dominion by the law requiring the treasury to keep a dollar-for-dollar gold reserve. Millions are needlessly wasted on idle gold. The new law requires each bank to keep only 40 per cent. of the reserves "which it has in Canada" in Dominion notes. It is now so easy for a bank to hold these reserves abroad that the present means of keeping Dominion notes outstanding may be curtailed.

Banks are authorized to lend on grain and cattle, after the manner of current lending on manufactures and warehouse receipts. The objection to this in the past has been that as such loans are preferred claims, and are not, like chattel mortgages, announced in any way, the fear of unknown preferences might injure a farmer's credit with merchants. The benefits of the change will doubtless outweigh this objection.

Inspection and audit are still left virtually with the directors, but there is a semblance of independent audit established by the fact that appointment is nominally by the shareholders under explicit limitations. The establishing of a new bank is surrounded by more comprehensive safeguards. The new act continues the bank charters to July 1, 1923.

In connection with this legislation the Dominion government should provide a means of release from the wasteful necessity of keeping close on one hundred million dollars of idle gold in the treasury when, say, two-thirds the amount would be ample security.—Toronto Globe.

SIX NEW SENATORS TO BE APPOINTED

Two from Each of the Three Prairie Provinces—Some Probable Choices.

Ottawa, Jan. 17.—The government has now under consideration the naming of six new senators, two from each of the prairie provinces, Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta.

As was stated by Hon. Mr. Loughheed, government leader in the Senate and minister without portfolio, the statute now authorizes the government to name six men for the Upper House.

The autonomy bill contains authority for the appointment of two additional senators for Saskatchewan and two for Alberta, according to Hon. Mr. Loughheed, and the recent Manitoba boundaries bill, according to the same authority, provides for the appointment of two additional senators from Manitoba.

There is considerable interest manifested as to the men who will be selected. For Manitoba Dr. Schaffner, the member for Souris, and Mr. Daniel Sprague, lumber merchant, of Winnipeg, are regarded as first in the running, with Glen Campbell, ex-M. P., a close second choice.

For Saskatchewan R. S. Lake, ex-M. P. for Qu'Appelle, has claims which are based in both the Mother Country and in Canada, and as a result is not likely to be overlooked in making up the new six for the west. Dr. Munro of Saskatoon is a man from the north and a defeated Conservative candidate. He has been active in politics for some years. He stands a good chance of succeeding if H. W. Laird of Regina or Dr. W. D. Cowan of Regina are not too strong for him. It looks like a three cornered fight for the second place.

In Alberta Major John Herron, who for two parliaments represented MacLeod, is regarded as almost a certainty. For the second Alberta senatorship Mr. "Luggy" McCarthy, ex-M. P. for Calgary, and Mr. W. A. Griesbach, ex-mayor of Edmonton, are regarded as having an even chance. R. B. Bennett is also in the running.

The appointments will be made within the next few weeks.

The six new senators to be appointed for Western Canada and the filling of the two Ontario vacancies will make the standing in the Upper House: Liberals 58, Conservatives 35; a Liberal majority of 23.

Washington, Jan. 17.—On President Taft's appointment list was this brief entry: "Phyllis Wistrand, Lander, Wyo. (to be kissed)." When that item caught the President's eye as he sat down at his desk, he looked about his office and over in one corner saw a little girl with blonde curls looking eagerly at him. Beside her was a woman, evidently her mother.

"Well, Phyllis," he said, as he rose from his chair to shake hands, "so you want to be kissed by the President of the United States?"

"Yeth, thir," she lisped. "Well," said the President as he raised her high in his arms and kissed her fairly on the cheek, "I hope you will remember that."

Phyllis is four years old. She went through the White House recently with her mother and some friends and announced that she would never leave Washington until she had been kissed by the President. She was so insistent that her mother wrote to the White House and finally made an appointment.

ANTARCTIC EXPLORER DISCOVERS NEW LAND

Lieut. W. Filchenor Arrives at Buenos Ayres After Fifteen Months.

Berlin, Jan. 17.—Lieutenant Wilhelm Filchenor, the German Antarctic explorer, returned with his expedition today to Buenos Ayres after an absence of fifteen months in the southern seas.

Lieutenant Filchenor cables from Buenos Ayres that the expedition has been most successful. He discovered new land, which he named Prince Regent Luitpold Land, and also an ice barrier which he named Kaiser Wilhelm II.

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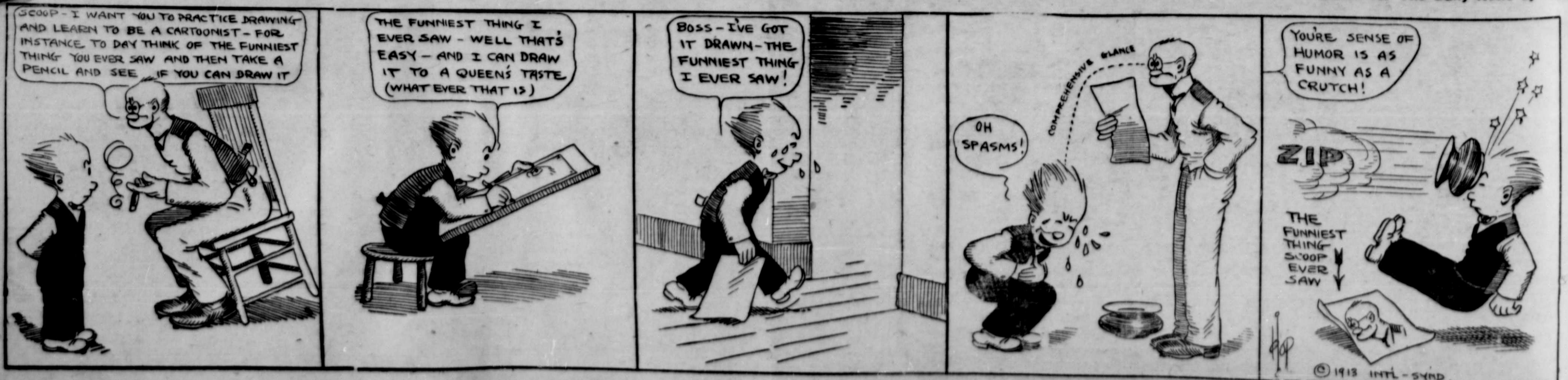

KITCHENER IS GIVING EGYPT GOOD ROADS

May Make the Nile Country a Mecca for Motorists.

London, Jan. 16.—Lord Kitchener is carrying out a great plan of road construction in Egypt which will make that country the Mecca for motorists. Already a road is nearing completion between Alexandria and Cairo, and Kitchener is now studying a plan for covering Egypt with a complete series of main roads.

These will be undertaken by the government itself, while the auxiliary ones will be laid by the provincial councils. Apart from the military and automobile standpoints, such a system of roads will be of immense commercial value, as it will open up districts that are latent through lack of communication, and it will develop others that are at present dependent solely either on the river or the railway for transport.

WOMAN MAKES CHARGE AGAINST MINISTER

Washington, Jan. 17.—Hot shot was directed toward Secretary of the Interior Walter L. Fisher and Senator Joseph M. Dixon of Montana today by Mrs. Helen Pierce Gray, who appeared before the Senate Indian affairs committee in support of a resolution to investigate alleged abuses at the Crow Indian reservation in Montana.

Mrs. Gray clashed repeatedly with Secretary Fisher, and the lie was frequently passed during her examination. At one point Mrs. Gray accused the secretary of being connected with "one of the biggest land steals in the history of the country."
Fisher angrily leaped to his feet, but Chairman Clark appealed to him to "consider the infirmities of the witness" and the secretary resumed his seat.
At another stage of the hearing Mrs. Gray accused Senator Dixon of "telling untruths" when he disputed her statement that two Indians had been murdered after they interfered with land speculations and contractors.

TALLEST WOMAN IN THE WORLD IS DEAD

Quincy, Ill., Jan. 17.—Mrs. Ella Ewing, 8 feet 4 inches, is dead here. Known as the tallest woman in the world, she traveled with a circus years ago, finally retiring to a magnificent country home with all the furniture built according to her size.

Mare Jail Room.

Victoria, Jan. 17.—To a deputation of clergymen Premier McBride said there was not sufficient jail accommodation for all offenders. He hoped that additional room would soon be provided, when all women prisoners would be received. The Attorney General's attitude respecting the Vancouver morality cases had the support of his colleagues.

G. H. Kohl, of the engineering staff of Ritchie & Agnew, left for the south yesterday morning on the Prince Rupert.

L. Crippen left yesterday morning on the Prince Rupert on an extended tour as far as Calgary and Edmonton on a mission of spreading the fame of "Boneless Herring" as put up in Prince Rupert. "Crip" expects to be away probably a couple of months.

A. E. McMaster, general agent of the G. T. P., left for Vancouver yesterday morning on the Prince Rupert to attend a conference of railway officials in that city.

NEW YORK GOVERNOR TO WATCH BOXING

Empire State Executive Wants to See Whether There is Demand for Boxing and Racing.

Albany, N. Y., Jan. 16.—If Governor Sulzer determines to follow the example of his predecessor and call upon the Legislature to repeal the Frawley boxing law, responsibility for such action will rest entirely with the boxing commission and the men who are interested, particularly in New York City.

While the Governor has made no public statement of his position, persons who have talked with him on the matter come away with the impression that he wants to follow out the working of the law during the next month or so before determining if it requires either amendment or repeal.

The words "show me" best express Mr. Sulzer's attitude regarding the continuance of exhibition fights. He intends to follow closely accounts of "mills" that take place in Madison Square Garden, and reach a conclusion as to whether they are brutal, in which event he will express his views without equivocation on the demands that have been made on him by religious societies for the revocation of the Frawley law.

Governor Sulzer's attitude on the question of permitting racing in New York State is yet undefined. The few persons who attempted to discuss with the Governor the revival of the sport of kings learned that it was a question that he would settle one way or another when put up to him in the form of a Legislative act.

ARNST TO TOUR THE WORLD

Former Champion Sculler Will Take Jaunt this Year

Sydney, N.S.W., Jan. 13.—Richard Arnst, former champion single sculler of the world, will probably make a tour of the world this year. He has received an offer of free passage for himself and wife for a tour, providing he competes in several match races, which his backers will arrange. He will probably accept.

Johnny Summers, welterweight champion of England and holder of the Lonsdale belt, has accepted the offer of Promoter Snowy Baker for five matches in Australia. His first bout will be staged in April.

In an exhibition series at Wellington, N.Z., yesterday, the British tennis players easily defeated New Zealand's representatives in both singles and doubles.

McNamara, winner of the six day bicycle race here, has accepted an offer to compete in America and will sail in April for San Francisco.

Victoria Policeman Wins.

Seattle, Jan. 15.—While the James Bay Athletic Club boxers dropped two of the three events to the Ballard Amateur Athletic Club in the inter-club smoker at Ballard last night, their entry in the heavyweight class, Gunner Ross, the Victoria policeman, furnished the surprise of the evening when he hung a sleep punch on to George Hansen, the Ballard heavyweight, in the second round, scoring a clean knockout. Hanson was touted as a corner, and it was expected that he would clean up with the Canadian cop.

In one of the best bouts on the card, Andy Duval, S. A. C., won the decision over Scott McKay, the Victoria crack, the scrap going the full four rounds.

Archie Wyard, the Ballard club's clever featherweight, won from Scott Crooper, the James Bay entry, in a fast session.

A GENUINE TREAT IN MOVING PICTURES

Alaska-Siberia Pictures at Westholme Last Night the Most Realistic Ever Shown in Prince Rupert.

As advertised extensively in the city, the wonderful and unique motion picture films of the Carnegie Museum Alaska-Siberia Arctic exploration expedition were shown for the first time in Canada last evening at the Westholme Opera House. To say that they more than fulfilled all the promises of the advance notices would not be doing them justice. Without a doubt the series of six films depicting life in all its phases, both human and animal, in the land of the frozen north were the most marvellously realistic pictures ever seen by an audience in this city. The expedition, which was headed by Mr. L. L. Lane and Captain Kleinschmidt, both well known big game hunters and explorers known to many old timers of Alaska and the Yukon now resident here, left Vancouver in the spring of 1911. The pictures start with the boat leaving Vancouver Harbor and winding its way amidst the many beauties of the justly celebrated inside passage enroute to Seward, Alaska. One sees passing them the G. T. P. steamer Prince Rupert and the Dominion government revenue cutter Kestral, Indian villages, giant totem poles, myriads of birds, seals innumerable, mountain sheep and the royal moose, seen in their mountain fastnesses, follow in quick succession, forming the most fascinating evening's entertainment that could possibly be imagined. Apart from this its value from an instructive and educational standpoint cannot be overestimated. The films devoted to the pictures of the stellar lions and the mighty walrus are a revelation, few people imagining that such animals exist in present times of such an enormous size and in such vast numbers.

The last film, showing the fight put up by a polar bear in the defence of her cub has to be seen to be appreciated. For nearly ten minutes one follows the old shebear and the little cub swimming abreast of the ship, endeavoring vainly to make a getaway. Finally the cub is lassoed with the intention of capturing it alive, but the hearts of the captors become softened by the game fight put up by the mother bear and it is released. The matinee this afternoon and the evening production will be the last opportunity of witnessing this remarkable series of pictures.

A pleasing feature of the evening's entertainment was the presentation to Mr. Nash by the members of his survey party of a handsome silver set suitably engraved. The presentation was made by Mr. Arnold, the head draftsman. The happy young bridal couple were also the recipients of an elegant silver butter dish, the gift of Mr. and Mrs. Peter Black.

BULKLEY PIONEER DIED IN NEW YORK

Mark Carr, Well Known in Northern British Columbia, Passed Away in Prime of Life.

Word has recently been received at Hazelton of the death at the residence of his brother-in-law in New York on the 8th inst. of Mark Carr, one of the most prosperous of the early pioneers of the Bulkley Valley. The news, which was received by telegram, gave no particulars of the cause of death.
