CRISIS REACHED IN EASTERN WAR SITUATION

PROVINCIAL GOVERNMENT ADOPTS POLICY OF LIBERAL PARTY—UNIONISTS INSULT CANADA

TURKS DECLARE FOR WAR; CRISIS REACHED YESTERDAY

CABINET WHICH PRONOUNCED IN FAVOR OF PEACE IS FORCED TO RESIGN—FORMER MINISTER OF WAR ASSASSINATED.

Constantinople, Jan. 23.—Nizam Pasha, former minister of war and commander of the Turkish army, was assassinated here today. There is a tremendous demonstration tonight among the citizens opposed to granting the demands of the Balkans.

Constantinople, Jan. 23.—A crisis in Turkish affairs came today with dramatic suddenness when the Grand Vizier of the Ottoman cabinet resigned and Sheefket Pasha, formerly minister of war and commander of the constitutional army which enthroned Mohammed the Fourth as Sultan, was appointed Grand Vizier. Yesterday the Grand Council of the Empire pronounced in favor of peace at any price. Today a vast crowd, drawn from all classes, declared for war rather than peace if Adrianople had to be sacrificed. As a result of the demonstration today the government, backed by general public opinion, surrendered and relinquished office, making way for the same men whom popular movement brought to the top after the revolution in 1909.

London, Jan. 23.—To the ambassadors and premiers, who have been congratulating themselves that the concerted action of the European powers had virtually settled the war in the Balkans, and to the delegates from the Balkan states, as well as to all London, excepting the Turkish plenipotentiaries, the news of the resignation of the Grand Vizier and the appointment in his place of Sheefket Pasha came as a bolt from the blue. Whether this means war to a finish with young Turks in the saddle none yet can say.

WELL KNOWN CONSTABLE DIED AT GRAND FORKS

Provincial Constable Dinsmore, formerly in Portland Canal District, Died After Very Short Illness.

Grand Forks, B. C., Jan. 24.—Isaac Dinsmore, chief of Provincial Police of the Boundary district, died here this morning after a few hours' illness. Kidney trouble is stated as the immediate cause of death. The deceased, who had been a member of the Provincial Police force for a number of years, dating back to the late 90's, was a most trustworthy and efficient officer, and had served in many parts of the province. Before being promoted to the position of chief in the Boundary country he was in charge of the Portland Canal district during the palmy days of the Stewart boom. He was a great sufferer from rheumatism, and it was partly on that account the department gave him the post

in the interior, where the climate was thought to suit his complaint better. His sudden death at but little past the prime of life will be the subject of sincere regret to his numerous friends in British Columbia.

BURNS' ANNIVERSARY BANQUET TONIGHT

All the arrangements are completed for the holding of the great Burns banquet by the Scotsmen of Prince Rupert at the Central Hotel this evening. Nothing has been overlooked and a banner time is predicted. It may rain or blow or snow or freeze, but no matter what comes mirth and laughter, speech and song will hold the fort at the Central Hotel tonight. There will be a great turnout of the sons of the land of the Scots, as the affair has been talked of and looked forward to for weeks past. May all have the very best of times and sing, rejoice and make merry, for, as the old saying goes, "when we die we'll be a long time dead."

AUTOCRATIC METHODS AT VICTORIA EFFECT REVIVAL OF LIBERALISM

Largest and Most Enthusiastic Meeting of Liberals Ever Seen in Prince Rupert, Except During a Campaign, Was Held Last Night—Audience Sat Until After Midnight Discussing Issues and Necessity for Action

That Liberalism in Prince Rupert has taken a new lease of life was well demonstrated last night when a gathering that almost completely filled the K. of P. Hall in the Helgeson Block assembled for the annual meeting of the Prince Rupert Liberal Association. Old time Liberals of the city commented on the fact that never before had they seen such a large and representative gathering on a similar occasion, and those who are in close touch with the work of the Liberal party in British Columbia said that the meeting was but one of hundreds of equally successful meetings being held throughout the province. Not only in numbers but in the enthusiasm of those present was the meeting an indication of the utmost dissatisfaction with the policies of both the McBride and Borden governments and of strong determination to leave no stone unturned in the election of local representatives to oppose such governments.

In the absence of the president, Dr. W. T. Kergin, who has been away from the city for some months, the chair was ably filled by Mr. A. M. Manson. The latter expressed his regrets at the absence of the president, who had been a most efficient officer and also congratulated the association on having a competent and businesslike executive.

The secretary, P. W. Anderson, read the minutes of the last annual meeting, which were adopted. The financial report for the year was most satisfactory.

A. M. Manson.

Mr. A. M. Manson, the late vice president of the association, who put up such a brilliant and plucky fight as the Liberal standard bearer in the last provincial election, addressed the meeting at some length upon the subject of the phenomenal progress Liberalism was making in the province and the Dominion at the present time. Despite the fact that at the moment the party was in opposition, its prospects were never brighter, as instanced by the magnificent gathering of staunch supporters he saw before him. It was without a doubt the largest meeting of Liberals ever held in Prince Rupert and certainly augured well for the future. At the last Liberal convention, held in Nanaimo, the Skeena riding had 16 representatives, all of whom were given places upon the floor, an altogether exceptional circumstance when one compared the relative populations of the several constituencies. Had it not been for the subtleties of their opponents and the almost criminal methods which the McBride government resorted to to foist an election on the province at a moment's notice they would have had an opportunity to put a platform before the people that would undoubtedly have met with the approbation of the majority. The Liberals, although defeated, were by no means downcast, and he believed that good would come out of evil and that it had been the means of awakening Liberalism and that everything tended to the belief that in their reverse

they had much to be thankful for. He thanked those who supported him and the Liberal cause at the last election most heartily, making especial mention of the outlying districts, and Hazelton in particular, which he described as the brightest spot in the constituency from their party's standpoint. The chances were excellent for a Liberal representative

from Skeena sitting in both the Provincial and Dominion Houses after the next general election. Truly the party had awakened and were grappling with the situation in a most earnest and businesslike fashion that was bound to be crowned with success. The provincial secretary for the association at the Vancouver headquarters received unstinted praise and commendation for the wonderfully effective work he was putting in in the matter of organization. The party was better off financially at the present moment than it ever was before. Liberalism today depended upon the rank and file of the party, not on a few representatives of the privileged class. After referring to their great leader Sir Wilfrid Laurier's great triumphs whilst touring the Dominion last summer subsequent to his defeat at the polls, the speaker touched on the Liberal press of the province. The Vancouver Sun, he said, was the first real Liberal organ that ever existed in the West. He asked the Liberals of Skeena to do

everything in their power to support the Daily News, the party organ for Northern B.C., and they would see within the space of five years the Daily News displacing the Sun in this whole northern district. Several Liberal organizations were already operative and others in process of formation. This was all that was needed, proper organization, absence of internal strife, and all work together for the great cause, and he had every hope that not only in their own particular riding, but in the whole Dominion, the Liberal party would rise again triumphant.

Mr. Fred Stork

Mr. Fred Stork, who was referred to by the chairman as "one of the old fighting war horses of the Liberal party," was accorded a rousing reception upon taking the platform. Stating that if he was at home anywhere it was at a meeting of Liberals, he touched on the unlooked for defeat of the great Liberal party at the last general election. It cost them dear in the matter of legitimate expenditure, but the Liberals were never known not to pay their bills and they faced the music to a man. Any man who is known to be a Liberal in the province at the present time was practically disfranchised. It was impossible for them to hold anything, either a job, land, a license, or anything else. But never mind, there was a better time coming. McBride and Bower might have their heels upon the necks of a loyal and free people for a short while longer, but the great Liberal party was coming up and would shortly throw off the hated yoke, and no power on earth could stop it. In speaking of reciprocity he remarked that subsequent events had proved an absolute vindication of their grand old leader's policy. Let the Tories fight them on a fair and free basis and they would lick them to a finish. He wanted to see lots of new blood infused into the new executive. He concluded by congratulating Mr. Manson upon the wonderful fight he put up last March which was simply phenomenal considering the conditions he was up against.

Mr. H. F. McRae.

Mr. H. F. McRae, in a thoughtful and temperate speech began by saying he was not so much a party man as one who was first and foremost for progress and the carrying out of principles that should be held dear by all of them. He was glad to know that Liberalism was not at present run by a few, but rather by the rank and file of the party. Emphasizing the necessity of unity, he outlined a plan he had thought out for the formation of the annual executive. In order to have new blood perpetually flowing in, he proposed that of the fifteen members of the Executive Committee, five should abstain from seeking office each year. By splitting the committee up annually into three groups of five this would ensure a third being new blood every year. The suggestion met with favor from the gathering generally, and af-

M'BRIDE GOVERNMENT ADOPTS LIBERAL POLICY

PUBLIC SENTIMENT IS TELLING ON THE AUTOCRATIC METHODS OF THE GOVERNMENT AT VICTORIA—INDEPENDENT AUDITOR-GENERAL TO BE APPOINTED.

Victoria, Jan. 23.—The debate on the address in reply to the speech from the throne was continued today by W. R. MacLean of Nelson and J. Place of Nanaimo.

Practically adopting one of the important planks in the platform of the Liberal party in British Columbia, a bill was introduced to authorize the appointment of an independent auditor general. Liberals and Conservatives throughout the province will rejoice at such a move, as it is well known that the public monies have been wasted in a most shameful manner. With-out an independent auditor general there has been practically no real check on the public accounts. Another bill was introduced for the creation of a treasury board, or a general financial committee, made up from members of the House.

ADVOCATE TAKES ACTION AGAINST QUEBEC LOAN

Quebec, Jan. 22.—Alleyne Taschereau, advocate of Quebec, has entered an action in the Superior Court here to have declared null and void the resolution passed at the last meeting of the City Council authorizing the Bank of Montreal as the financial agent of the city, to borrow for it the sum of \$1,950,000, declaring that with the bank's commission the rate of interest would be more than 4 1/2 per cent., which is the limit set by the Legislature for Quebec's civic loans.

SUGGESTS A COMMISSION IN PANAMA CANAL QUESTION

BRITISH UNIONISTS INSULTING CANADA

Liberal Member for Halifax Attacks Travelling Unionists, Who Declare Reciprocity Meant Separation.

Ottawa, Jan. 23.—The West Indies trade agreement had its second reading in the House of Commons today.

Hon. Alexander MacLean, Liberal member for Halifax, made an attack upon the travelling British Unionists, who, after merely peeping into Canada, return to England and declare that had reciprocity gone through Canada would have severed its relations with the Motherland and would have been lost as a part of the great Empire.

He claimed that as a result too many of the leading men in England are accepting this view and Canada is being grossly insulted.

DOMINION NAVIES ON THE PACIFIC.

Premier Fisher of Australia has publicly, on behalf of that Commonwealth, expressed the sympathy of his government with the idea of holding a conference with this Dominion, subsidiary to the next Imperial conference in London, and offered to send representatives to a meeting if one could be arranged in Canada. There is no good reason why such a conference should not be held, and should not be the first of a long series of such meetings for the discussion of defence and other problems interesting to both countries.

Among these problems is one specified by Mr. Fisher in his address: "Unity of purpose for naval defence in the North and South Pacific." The mere mention of such a subject of discussion is sufficient to show the untenableness of the position into which the Borden government has drifted on the question of Canada's part in the defence of the Empire. The Borden policy is to make Great Britain a present of three gigantic battleships—floating fortresses specially adapted for coast defence and to be used only in the German Ocean against a possible but improbable attack by a similarly ponderous but numerically inferior German fleet. That policy makes absolutely no provision for the protection of Dominion or Imperial interests in the Pacific Ocean: the very feature that is most outstanding in the Australian government's policy. In the speech above cited Premier Fisher affirms that the co-operation of Canada with Australia for defence in the Pacific Ocean is "most desirable." In view of his position, and of the definitely adopted policy of an "Australian navy for Australia," there can be nothing worthy of the name of co-operation until we adopt in this country the policy of a "Canadian navy for Canadians."—Toronto Globe.

THOMAS LAWSON AND THE STOCK EXCHANGE.

Thomas Lawson, the well known American authority on high finance, thinks that if the stock exchange could be curbed the people of the United States would be freed from many of the evils that now afflict them. And he believes that the stock exchange can be curbed, and in a very simple way. He proposes an amendment to the lottery law, which, he says, might be passed at a single session of Congress, de-

claring that the stock exchange must do business in a certain way, and ordering the post office authorities to bar the mail from stock exchanges which do not transact their business according to the rules. Gambling is against public policy; but the gambling end of the stock exchange, he contends, is bigger than all other forms of gambling in the country. It should be wiped out by law, and it may be wiped out, he says, as easily as the old Louisiana lottery was wiped out. With the stock exchange under the complete control of the Federal government all things necessary to be done to destroy the high cost of living could, he contends, be done. Whatever else may be said of Mr. Thomas Lawson, he is a fascinating writer, and he is certainly not lacking in courage. Apparently, too, he is not without personal knowledge of his subject when he discusses stock exchange gambling. He confesses that ever since he began to play the "game" on a large scale he has made not less than a million a year out of the Wall Street gamble. Whether such a confession will help to re-establish him in the confidence of the people, in view of past experiences, is, however, another question.

WESTMINSTER IS NOW THE CITY OF THE GOOD

Fruit Stores and Candy Stores Must Close on Sundays—Drug Stores Closely Watched

New Westminster, Jan. 22—Sunday closing among fruit stands, candy stores and cigar selling stands in the city became effective yesterday and the police are keeping a watchful eye on all establishments. For some time these places have kept open under the guise of a restaurant license, but the new trades license by-law eliminated the possibility of running on Sunday under that subterfuge.

Effort will also be made to prohibit drug stores selling anything but actual drugs and medicines on the Sabbath hereafter. Should they attempt to do so a lively fight is expected with the drug store proprietors.

HOME RULE BILL IS LIKELY TO BECOME LAW

IN VIEW OF THE MAJORITY OBTAINED IN THE HOUSE OF COMMONS A WAY WILL BE FOUND TO CIRCUMVENT THE LORDS.

(Special to The Daily News.) London, Jan. 22.—The Asquith government has got the home rule bill through its last stages of the House of Commons by an overwhelming majority, a majority, it must be remarked, that would still have reached fifty or more had every Irish, Tory and Nationalist member abstained from voting and allowed Great Britain alone to decide the fate of the bill.

With so clear a mandate on the measure and in the present disorganized condition of the Unionist party, there is no visible reason why it should not become law during the life of the present Parliament. Of course the bill will be thrown out in the House of Lords. Equally, of course, if the present state of affairs continues, it will be passed, and re-passed as many times as necessary by the House of Commons, between now and the end of the present Parliament, something more than a year hence. There is time to spare for the working by Parliament of an act by which the home rule bill can be made into law, despite the objections of the Lords.

Three months ago this did not seem possible, indeed. It hardly seemed possible last October that the home rule bill would reach its final stage in the House of Commons before the country was thrown into a general election by the defeat of the government, but in the last three months the Unionist party has contributed invaluable support to the home rule cause by the needless discussions to which it allowed itself to fall a prey.

At present Lord Lansdowne and, particularly, Bonar Law are among the greatest of the coalition's assets, both through the fact of their relinquishment of principles which they so earnestly and vehemently declared would never be dropped, and by the manner of their relinquishment. It would be hard to conceive anything better calculated to chill the ardor of the political protagonists than the manner of acceptance by Lord Lansdowne and Bonar Law, by the condition laid down that they should drop food taxes from the Unionist programme and their frigid and unenthusiastic consent to continue in the position as alleged leaders. This situation among the Unionists seems to be a vital point of success for home rule.

Much is made in a spectacular way of the opposition to the bill. There is considerable talk of armed rebellion in the north of Ireland, but for all the flamboyant speeches now being made this is not yet, at any rate, a problem to be taken seriously.

The great question is whether the government will be able to hold together the many considerably divergent sections of its majority now that the great crisis has been successfully passed.

Walter Runciman, president of the Board of Agriculture, has made quite a stride in this direction this week in the development of the government's policy for the distribution of land among the small holders.

One of the most important features of the work, one in fact without which success could not be hoped for, has been that of

providing small farmers and other small holders of land with money with which to carry on their business, and also to provide means by which prospective purchasers of tenements could get the necessary capital to take up their allotments.

This has now been accomplished through a scheme by which a number of large banks, with branches in all parts of the country, will virtually enter into partnership with co-operative societies. By this scheme the farmer, instead of going to the bank and undertaking to persuade the manager that a certain loan is a proper one, will get the money from a co-operative society, the bank making only one loan to the society in a sum large enough to cover the small needs of the members of the society. The whole community thus becomes responsible for the debts of each of its members, while the banks take an active part in the management of the affairs of the co-operative society, and have a most important place on the advisory council of each. Thus, although Lloyd-George's land campaign has again been abandoned, the government has taken another step forward in its general scheme for advancing the interests of small holders and non-capitalists.

OPERATOR MURDERED AT HIS TELEGRAPH KEY

San Bernardino, Cal., Jan. 23.—Huddled over his desk, a lifeless hand gripping his key, the body of night telegraph operator George Cox, a bullet hole through his head, was found Saturday at Santa Fe station at Summit, 28 miles northeast of San Bernardino. A shattered window pane indicated that the bullet which ended his life had been fired

from outside the station. Notification of the supposed murder was brought here by Conductor Golden, of a freight train which stopped at Summit for orders. Golden did not wait to find whether the station safe had been rifled.

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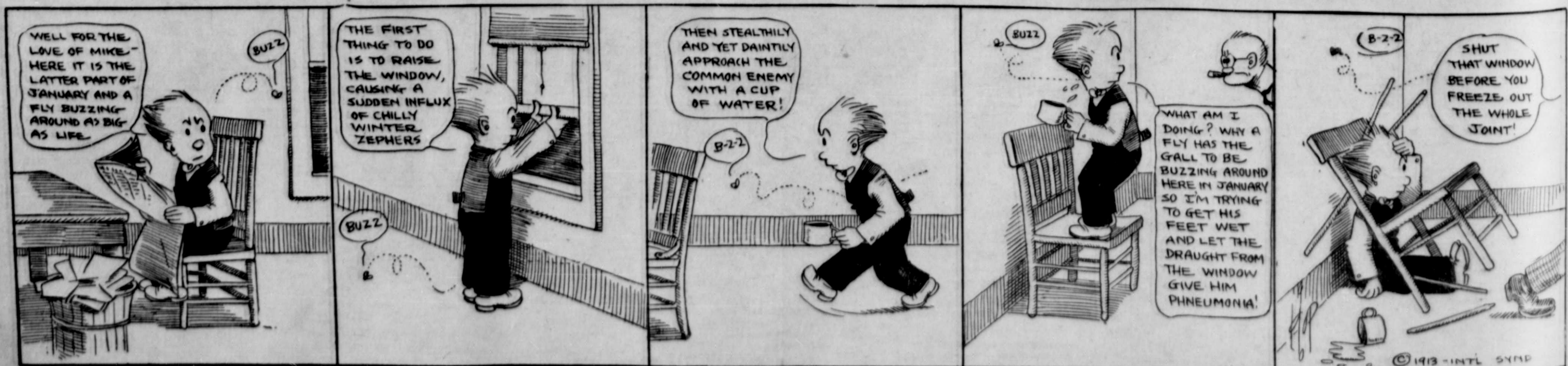

Coroner's Inquest

An Indian of the name of Peter Wesley who came over from Port Simpson with the deceased, stated that he saw nothing of the unfortunate man upon the night of the tragedy.

The Coroner, through Indian Agent Perry, had the Indians informed that there was no suspicion of foul play by Wesley and that they were not to suspect such a thing.

The remains were taken to Port Simpson for interment.

RADICAL CHANGE FOR BRITISH NAVY

Latest Plan of Alteration for Dreadnoughts Arouses Criticism.

London, Jan. 22.—It has been decided to introduce some armed protection for the smaller or anti-torpedo guns of the British dreadnoughts. In the designs of the latest battleships to take the water, those of the Iron Duke group, as well as the latest to be completed, the King George group, armor for their small guns was provided for. The battery for defence against torpedo attack was disposed in an entirely different manner to that of previous vessels of the dreadnought type. But the admiralty has gone a step further by giving orders that the Orion, which was completed in December, 1911, and whose first annual refit has become due, is to be fitted at Devonport with armored casemates to her four-inch guns, and the same process will be carried out aboard other warships of this class.

Naval opinion seems to be in some doubt as to the exact motive for this alteration. On the one hand, there are disbelievers in the dreadnought policy, who regard it as a step toward the revival of a secondary battery of guns of intermediary calibre. The four inch guns of the Orion have not hitherto been recognized as an intermediary battery. On the other hand it is affirmed that the increase in size of these anti-torpedo defense guns, since it results in a larger target being presented to an enemy, has called for armour protection.

ter some discussion it was decided to act along these lines the matter to be taken up at the next general meeting which would be held shortly. In conclusion the speaker remarked that if the Liberal party could convince the masses of the people of the Dominion that they would be able to perform one great public service, as say the doing away with patronage in the civil service, they would sweep the country at the next general election.

Mr. T. D. Pattullo

Mr. T. D. Pattullo said it was a great day for Liberalism. Never were the prospects brighter. It was not a question with them as to whether they were in or out of power. There were great issues at stake, for instance at the present moment the Naval question. He believed in the great principles of Liberalism; government by the people for the people, as against the rule of the class interests. They must hew to the line and act in accord with the interests and desires of the masses of the people. The idea that Liberalism meant a drawing away from the Empire must be eradicated, a more erroneous idea could not possibly exist. All immigrants no matter what their nationality, must first and foremost be made true and loyal citizens. It devolved upon the Liberals to fight for their principles and make themselves properly understood by the masses, ensuring them a government by the people for the people, as against that of the vested interests.

Mr. G. W. Nickerson

Mr. G. W. Nickerson made an excellent speech, addressing the party as a young business man, a Liberal by birth and conviction, who coming to this province three years ago from the east, had started out with the determination of keeping in the background politically and attending to his business affairs. After the last general election, when reciprocity with the United States was defeated, he saw the error of his ways. Realizing what an injury the Dominion generally and the Province in particular were suffering from the defeat of that measure, he had determined to come out into the front rank with the fighters and do his utmost to put the great party to which he was proud to swear allegiance into power again. Canadians were not so small and pusillanimous that the establishment of trade relations with a foreign country should bring their loyalty into question for one single moment.

D. C. McRae.

D. C. McRae, in a few words, referred to the roseate future in store for the Liberal party. Education of the people was all that was needed to carry them triumphant to the head of the polls. The McBride government practically had the Province subsidized. He advocated holding frequent general meetings as the surest way of keeping the party interested and united.
