

GOVERNMENT HAS WITHDRAWN FRANCHISE BILL

SUFFRAGETTES UP IN ARMS—"WAR TO DEATH" THEIR SLOGAN—CRIME AT VICTORIA

TWO THOUSAND POLICE RESTRAIN SUFFRAGETTES

DISAPPOINTED OVER FRANCHISE BILL, THEIR SLOGAN IS "WAR TO DEATH"—NEITHER PERSONS NOR PROPERTY WILL BE RESPECTED.

London, Jan. 27.—"War to death" is the slogan of the English suffragettes. Mrs. Pankhurst, in an impassioned speech, declared that women had been tricked by the government when the franchise bill was withdrawn. Calls for volunteers are being made to lead an onslaught against the government in which neither heads nor property are to be respected. Over 2,000 police are patrolling the streets in

the vicinity of the Parliament buildings.
London, Jan. 27.—The government appears to have dropped the question of franchise reform for the present session. The whole question will likely come up again next March, when the friends of woman suffrage will be invited by the government to frame a bill in such a manner as will secure the support of all sections.

PUMP FOR SHAWATLANS AUTHORIZED BY COUNCIL

ESTIMATED COST IS \$8,000—MONEY BYLAW FOR CURRENT EXPENDITURE PASSED FINAL STAGE.

Although the City Council was in session only a little over 30 minutes last evening, a considerable amount of business was transacted. The money bylaw authorizing the raising of the sum of \$173,630 for current expenditure the coming year passed its final reading and became operative.
A report of the Board of Works recommending the purchasing of a pump to be installed at Shawatlans Lake for use until such time as connection is made with Goodworth Lake, when gravitation will be the means naturally provided for conducting the water to the city, was adopted. A motion to this effect was passed, the pump being estimated to cost \$3,000. Alderman Bullock-Webster wanted a little more light on the subject. In the first place, was the pump at Morse Creek to be removed to Shawatlans also? "Was it, in the event of its being removed, to be used as an auxiliary to the new one that

was to be purchased?" "Could not the Morse Creek pump be made to do service without purchasing another one?" The Mayor replied that at the present time it was not deemed advisable to remove the Morse Creek pump, moreover, it might be found the best course to allow it to remain at its present location, in the event of the water from Morse Creek being needed if something should happen to go wrong temporarily with the Shawatlans Lake source of supply.

SUNDAY POOL ROOMS UP BEFORE COUNCIL

Ald. Dybhavn Introduced Bylaw for Better Regulation and Sunday Closing.

It came somewhat in the nature of a surprise both to the public and most of the members of the Council last evening when Alderman Dybhavn introduced a bylaw for the better regulation of the billiard and pool rooms of the city. Alderman Bullock-Webster at once arose and said that he was completely in the dark in the matter and that he would like to have all the previous bylaws and amendments read for his elucidation. As the matter stood he would most strenuously oppose every clause in the present bylaw proposed by his good friend Alderman Dybhavn. Alderman Dybhavn came out flat-footed and stated that the substance of the bylaw in question was that the billiard and pool rooms should be closed on Sundays. Alderman Naden said that although he was not the introducer of the bylaw he did not wish it thought that there was any intention of rushing it through without giving all interested a chance to be heard on the subject. He suggested that the committee report progress, and that the matter be laid over for a week. The Mayor and Alderman Dybhavn were fully in accord with Alderman Naden's recommendation and a motion to that effect was carried.

COUNCIL APPOINTED NEW CITY ASSESSOR

J. M. Carmichael Was the Unanimous Choice of the Council—City Treasurer's Salary Increased

Upon the recommendation of the finance committee, J. M. Carmichael, assistant assessor in the city hall since 1910, has been appointed assessor in the place of J. C. McEwen resigned. Mr. Carmichael is an able and efficient official and the motion to adopt the report of the finance committee was carried unanimously and the appointment made.
In regard to the salary it was decided that it should be \$170 a month. This was rather more than the specified sum in the salary by-law as the starting salary for the assessor, but on account of the length of Mr. Carmichael's service it was not deemed fair to have him start at the lowest salary.

Ald. Bullock-Webster was in favor of the salary remaining in strict accordance with that laid down in the by-law, and made a motion to that effect. There being no seconder the motion that the salary be fixed at the advanced sum was put and carried. Ald. Bullock-Webster being the only dissident.
It was further agreed that the salary of the city accountant and treasurer should be raised to \$170 per month. According to the schedule of last year in a few months time Mr. Vance's salary for that position would be raised to that amount anyhow. The report to fix the salary at \$170 a month carried. In future the salaries of the two officials filling these positions will remain the same.

BAPTISTS DECIDE FOR WOMAN SUFFRAGE

Interesting Debate Held by Baptist Brotherhood Last Night—Refreshments Served.

Last evening that popular organization, the Baptist Brotherhood, spent a very enjoyable time in their club rooms in the McIntyre Block. Business was first transacted, closely followed by refreshments which one and all did ample justice to, then followed the first of the season's debates, entitled "Would Woman Suffrage Be Beneficial to the World at Large?" Several excellent arguments were advanced both for and against. This interesting topic was at last decided upon by the judges in favor of the affirmative by one point. Several interesting events are under way and will be announced later.

The Brotherhood will in future meet on Tuesday evening at 8 o'clock instead of Monday evening, this being unanimously decided upon last night.

WILL GET EXPERT ON WATER SYSTEM

Council Decide to Engage an Expert in Connection with Laying of Mains Across Shawatlans Passage.

It has been finally decided that the best course to pursue with regard to the completion of the work of laying the pipe line across Shawatlans is to procure the services of the best expert engineer possible before making another attempt, which might prove as unsuccessful as the two previous ones. No criticism whatsoever was made of anyone in connection with the way the work had been carried on so far.

WAR IS LIKELY TO BE RESUMED

Balkan Envoys Draft Brief Note to Turks—Not Likely That Demands Will Be Granted.

London, Jan. 27.—A special committee appointed by the Balkan envoys drafted a note today notifying the Turks of their proposal to break off peace negotiations at once if their demands are not complied with. The note is very brief and reminds the Turks that the sittings of the conference have been suspended since January 16th. The recent events in Constantinople are the best indication of what Turkey's answer to the demands of the allies will be.

BABY DELIVERED BY PARCELS POST

Rural Carrier Found Interesting Package in His Mail

Batavia, Ohio, Jan. 27.—Ver-non C. Little, mail carrier on a rural route out of this place, is the first man to accept and deliver, under parcel post conditions, a live baby. The baby, a boy, weighing ten and three-quarter pounds, just within the 11-pound limit, is the child of Mr. and Mrs. Jessie Beagle, of near Glen Este.

"The package" was well wrapped and ready for "mailing" when the carrier got it today. Its measurements reached 71 inches also just within the law, which makes 72 inches the limit.
Mr. Little delivered the "parcel" safely to the address on the card attached, that of its grandmother, Mrs. Louis Beagle, who lives about a mile from its home. The postage was 15 cents and the parcel was insured for \$50.

FOUR MEN KILLED AT STEWART BROS.

Two Others Seriously Injured and One Slightly—Worst Accident For Over Two Years

The Omineca Herald just to hand reports one of the worst accidents that has occurred on the line of the G.T.P. in British Columbia for over two years. On Tuesday morning, 21st inst. two station men and one day laborer were instantly killed and two more laborers were seriously injured and one slightly injured. The men were employed at Stewart Bros.' camp at Burns Lake. It is presumed the accident was due to frozen dynamite exploding prematurely. In the very severe weather there is much more danger with dynamite. All along the line the most sincere regret is felt for the contractors and the men, and especially so as there have been so few accidents on the western end of the construction work.

WORK RESUMED ON THE BULKLEY BRIDGE

Work on the high level bridge across the Bulkley River at Hazelton has been resumed under the direction of engineer W. R. Hunter. It is expected that the steel, which has been shipped from England, will arrive about the end of February.

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COLD SNAP ON THE FRASER A BENEFIT TO CONTRACTORS

RIVER IS FROZEN OVER AND FREIGHTING HAS BEGUN—TEMPERATURE RANGED AS LOW AS FIFTY-TWO BELOW ZERO

Fort George, Jan. 27.—The same cold snap that passed up the Pacific coast from California to Alaska last week visited Fort George from the 8th to the 12th of this month. The temperature for five nights running were respectively 31 below, 48 below, 47 below, 52 below, and 42 below. With Monday of last week the weather moderated and now the normal winter climate, snappy frost with daily sunshine, prevails. Throughout the cold snap the weather was very still.

Important results have followed the annual dip of the mercury. Most important of all is the fact that the Fraser river in its upper reaches is now solidly frozen over, and already the contractors have begun to freight supplies over the ice from the end of steel to the various camps along the Fraser above this point.

A wire was received the other day from Ramsay, of Smith & Ramsay, who have a contract

just this side of the Grand Canyon, at Mile 132, B.C., stating that freighting operations have been started by this firm. Ramsay is at the end of steel, Mile 53 B.C., superintending the work. Provisions, hay and oats and powder will be shipped down the river in large quantities.

Owing to the late freezing of the river, the operations of the contractors have been badly crippled since winter set in. Provisions have been very scarce at all the camps and some of these have had to shut down completely as a result.

The frigidity at this point during the five cold days may be imagined from the fact that the skating rink was forced to close its doors for a day or so. The rink was so cold that the skaters froze their feet while on the ice. A scheduled hockey match in the Central Interior League was also postponed owing to the cold.

No accidents of consequence have been reported as a result of the cold wave.

SECOND READING FOR THE HOME RULE BILL

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BORDEN'S NAVAL POLICY

REMARKABLE DIVERGENCE OF OPINION AMONG PROMINENT CONSERVATIVES.

In the House of Commons ten days ago Mr. Morphy (North Perth) reiterated the conviction of Mr. Cocksbutt and other fellow Conservatives that the Borden policy is an inauguration of permanent contributions. Later he said: "Without knowledge of what is to come in this respect, we know there will be a Canadian policy, and if Britain rules the seas what is the use of a Canadian navy? The British navy can look after us."

Such expressions of opinion from prominent Conservatives must arouse splendid sentiments of patriotism and imperialism in the hearts of true Canadians. That Conservatives throughout Canada are far from being united on the naval question is evident when these convictions are considered with the following assertion of the Premier of British Columbia:

"No policy will be satisfactory to the people of British Columbia which does not include a substantial and prompt contribution and THE ESTABLISHMENT OF A FLEET UNIT ON THE PACIFIC COAST."

BOURASSA AND THE NAVAL QUESTION

Mr. Henri Bourassa must talk to somebody. It is the law of his nature which he is compelled to obey. Since he can secure no audience in Canada, then, neither in his native province of Quebec, where he is now altogether discredited nor in the other provinces either of the east or the west, where he is a mere object of derision he goes to the United States; and we now find him unfolding his peculiar views, and actually having the good luck to have them printed, to the press correspondents in Boston.

His theme in Boston is the same as that on which he wrote columns of matter, more or less readable, while his ideas were still novel, in the Quebec papers, and on which he based his fiery utterances from the platform. He foresees the eventual separation of Canada from the mother country and he puts his vision in words somewhat worn by use. He cannot conceal his hostility to Britain and everything British. He hisses at perfidious Albion all the venom which the Frenchman of the Empire was accustomed to display when speaking of Napoleon's great enemy. Mr. Bourassa is a mediaevalist and a rather prejudiced one at that.

But he will hardly succeed in convincing either the people of New England or the Americans generally, who are a wide-awake people and know what their neighbors are saying and doing, that feeling in Canada towards the mother country is similar to that which existed in the thirteen colonies immediately prior to the War of Independence. There is no occasion for such a feeling in Canada as there

was at that time in those colonies. In Canada we enjoy all the independence of a sovereign state; we are subject to no tax by Great Britain, and we, so far, have not even contributed one dollar towards the imperial defence which in common with all British countries guarantees our security. If we have any cause of complaint it is against ourselves that we have accepted for so long the protection of the motherland without giving anything in return.

Mr. Bourassa tells his Boston audience that many supporters of Mr. Borden have deserted him because of his offer of \$35,000,000 for dreadnoughts for the navy. The cause of desertions from Mr. Borden's ranks is that his programme is not large enough to satisfy the dignity of Canada nor to indicate the gratitude and affection felt towards the mother country in this dominion. Canada wants to give men as well as ships; she wants to build a navy of her own and man it, that she may take a real share in the battles of the Empire.

Mr. Bourassa evidently knows even less about the feeling in this country on reciprocity than he does of the feeling on the naval issue. He thinks it is a question of transportation, which is absurd; it is a question of quicker and easier and larger markets. Mr. Bourassa would do well to cease dreaming of a republic on the banks of the St. Lawrence, which never can, and never could have been accomplished, and learn something of the country of which he is a citizen, and of the spirit which animates the great progressive modern world.

NEWS NOTES FROM HAZELTON

ITEMS OF INTEREST FROM THE INTERIOR CLIPPED FROM THE OMINECA HERALD

E. Cashman has developed into one of the big freighters. He will have at least one if not two four-horse-teams on the road freighting to Decker Lake.

The amount of traffic from the New Hazelton station is increasing every day. The freighters and local carters are all busy.

John Albi arrived in town on Saturday night, after spending the holidays at his home in Spokane. He has twenty head of fine horses on the way up, which will be used to freight supplies to his construction camps.

Last week Frank Carel purchased Tom Ryan's blacksmith shop and business, and he will conduct it in future in connection with his livery and stage business.

Gaston & Carillon are now in the freighting business, and on Wednesday of this week sent their first swing out to the valley, going as far as Decker Lake. As soon as they can get them up, they will have another four-horse team on the road.

A. L. McHugh has secured a tent near the Foley, Welch & Stewart warehouses where he will make his headquarters in future. On Wednesday of this week he went out to his camp in the valley and cleaned up the work there and in future he will be a resident of New Hazelton.

Angus Stewart and C. W. Peck were in town several days this week on business.

A. L. McHugh returned Saturday from Minneapolis after spending a month at his home in that city. He will now devote considerable attention to Silver Standard and hauling down the ore.

Major Leslie is leaving town in a few days for Vancouver, where he will be associated with Col. Davis, formerly city engineer of Prince Rupert. He has resigned his position in connection with the engineering work on the G.T.P., and with Mr. Davis will open offices in Vancouver and in Victoria as consulting engineers.

Constable Fairburn brought in two vags who had been making themselves a public nuisance in New Hazelton for some time and were given six months in New Westminster.

Foley, Welch & Stewart are now freighting across all lakes between here and Stella, on the Fraser Lake. Hundreds of teams are on the road.

The steel is now across Porphy Creek, and the big end of the freighting for the contractors is being done from Dan Stewart's camp. This outfit will, of course, be moved along as fast as steel can be laid.

Paget and Dan Stewart have their steam shovels working on the new contracts, and Rankin & Co.'s shovel will be working this week. Another shovel is on the way in for Stewart's camp at Burn's Lake.

Gus Dahr has opened a blacksmith shop at Decker Lake and has already seven tons of steel and other supplies on hand. This week he sent out several tons more and also a lighting system so that he can run his shop night and day.

Decker Lake will be one of the busy spots along the line of construction this coming spring, summer and fall, and in fact until the Burn's Lake contracts are completed. All supplies will be freighted from Decker Lake by sleigh, and after the lakes open up boats will be used.

The plans have arrived for the Trout Creek bridge and this week the contractors started hauling the cement for the foundations and piers. It will be only a few days until work is started on that structure. They will also haul cement this week for the Telkwa River crossing, although it will be some time yet before that bridge is started.

The wagon road from Burns Lake to Stella, on Fraser Lake, is now completed, and the first load that went over it was railway supplies weighing eleven thousand pounds. The road is twenty-eight miles long and is in first-class shape. From now on there will be great activity along that piece of road until spring opens up and Burns Lake cannot be crossed.

Supt. Shepherd's new home at Decker Lake is now completed and ready for use. It is a very comfortable cabin and Mr. Shepherd will make it his headquarters about the first of March or about the same time that the engineers move their headquarters to Hound Lake, just across the summit.

OVER A HUNDRED MILLIONS SPENT FOR AUTOMOBILES

ENORMOUS AMOUNT OF MONEY SPENT BY CANADIANS IN TEN YEARS IN THEIR CRAZE FOR SPEED

Canada's ten year tribute to the god of speed, through the automobile alone, is officially estimated at \$118,000,000.

In less than a decade, despite the high cost of living, the increase of mortgages and the unprecedented activity in real estate and other forms of speculation, Canadians have paid out this enormous sum for the most modern achievement of the pleasure loving age of "get there."

According to the official calculation of the United States governmental Bureau of Statistics at Washington, issued for the year just ended, "approximately 25 per cent. of the automobiles exported from the United States were shipped to Canada." Up till the end of April last the statement shows that 4,424 machines were exported to Canada.

The Canadian government has furnished no similar statistics, but, according to the estimate of Mr. G. G. McGarry, editor of Motoring, the national automobile magazine in Canada, there are in operation in Canada by Can-

British machines and on those from France and other foreign countries, the purchase price would reach \$10,000,000.

It is not anticipated that this enormous import of foreign products will continue, however. Canadian manufacturers are awake to the situation and are already making preparations to largely augment their output during the coming season.

What Canadians have paid for automobiles during the past decade would have more than built, manned, maintained and operated for a generation yet to come the two Canadian fleet units with-in the Imperial navy, as at present proposed by Sir Wilfrid Laurier, or would have enabled Premier Borden to man and maintain his three superdread-noughts for nearly forty years.

For a year and a half Jack Redmond, the St. Paul lightweight, now a resident of Milwaukee, has been after the writer to try and arrange a trip for him to Australia, so that he could gather in some of the shekels down under and at the same time add to his reputation, but the chance did not come until a week ago, when a cablegram from Snowy Baker, who has bought out Hugh D. McIntosh's interest in the Stadium, contained an offer to the American lightweight to make a hurried trip to the Antipodes. Jack was sought and was delighted with the chance, as he saw visions of coin and numerous French lightweights in the land of the kangaroo whom he could easily defeat.

Jack Sees the Missus. After accepting the terms Jack hied himself to his little flat while a cable was sent to Snowy telling him that Redmond would sail by the next boat.

Four hours later Jack appeared on the scene again with the announcement that he would have to cancel the trip. Asked what the trouble was, Jack replied:

"Gee, I want to go bad enough, but my wife won't stand for it. Why, I offered to take her with me on the trip, but she said there was nothing doing, and that it was either her or good-bye. And I need the money, too, but what can a fellow do up against a game of that kind? If I go I lose my wife and she's too good a fellow to lose, so I guess I will have to remain here and pass it up. It's rather tough, but then the fighting game is tough, and I guess I will have to stand for it."

Caponi in Same Boat. This brings to mind the time that Tony Caponi signed to go to Australia, nearly two years ago. Tony had a splendid offer and would have had more money than he ever got before for fighting, but after signing articles and preparing to go he was surprised to get an awful kick from his wife. She would not listen to the proposition at all and put her foot down so hard that Tony threw up hands and called off all deals with Australia.

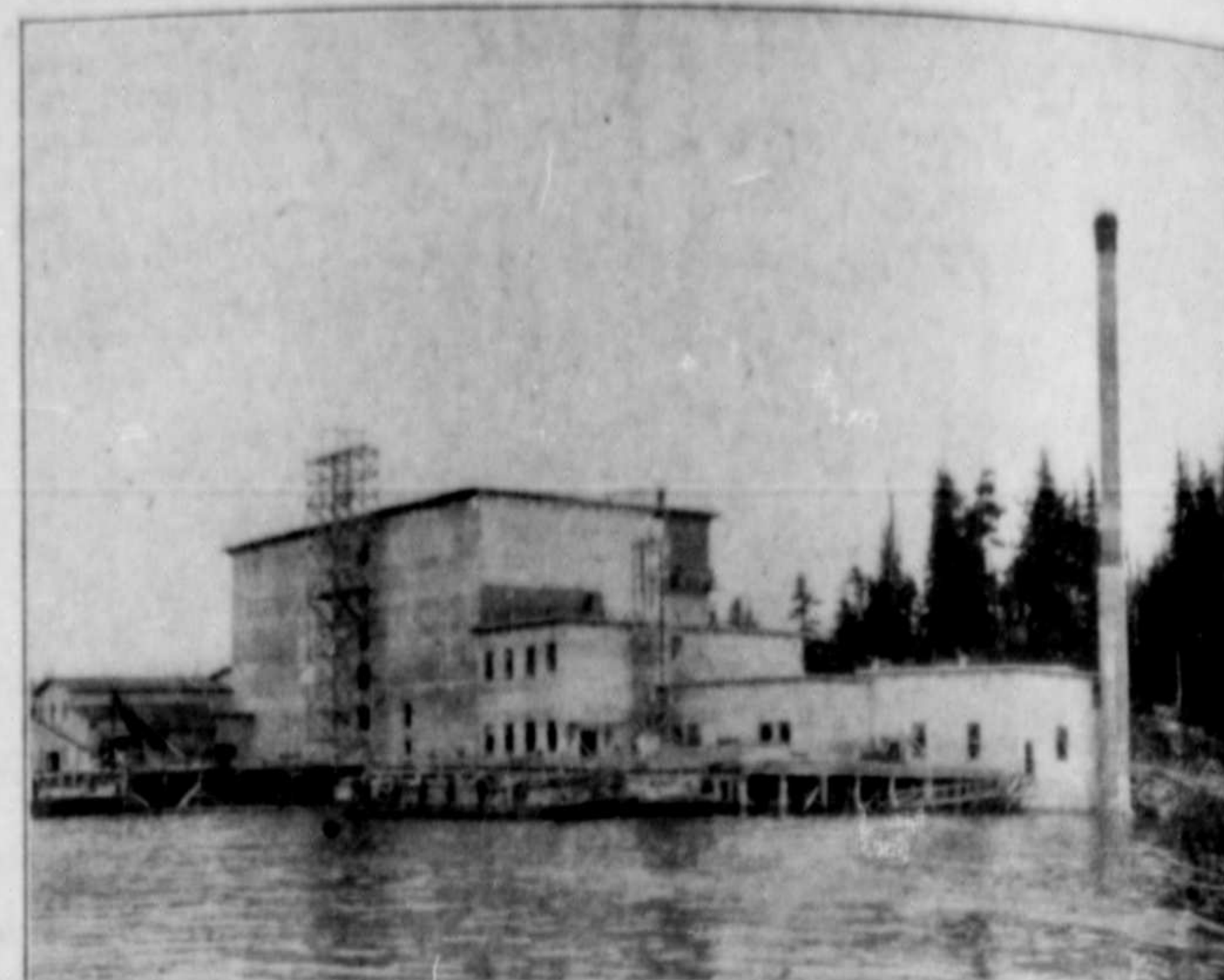

NEW MATERIAL DISCOVERED FOR AEROPLANE CONSTRUCTION

IS LIGHTER AND TOUGHER THAN CANVAS AND WILL MAKE THE AEROPLANE INVISIBLE.

Washington, Jan. 27.—The invisible aeroplane is now a possibility, owing to a new material discovered by government aviation officers. This material is like transparent celluloid and much like the backing now used for photographic films. It is non-inflammable, flexible and tough. One of the features of the material is that it can be bought by the gallon rather than the square foot, and can be molded into any form of plane covering without stretching the frame. It has been tested for strength and weight, and is both lighter and stronger per square foot than canvas. It is smooth as glass, so that the element of friction, which is considerable in an aeroplane, is reduced to a negligible factor. The engine, the aviator and the frame of the machine are still opaque as usual, but it has been found by experiment that when five hundred square feet of surface are made invisible the aeroplane when stood on edge practically is invisible at five hundred feet. This is much closer than an aeroplane will ever operate under war conditions, and with a muffled motor the aeroplane will not only be unseen but unheard.

COMPASS WILL SAVE COAL

New Invention Will Enable Ships to Maintain Steadier Course

Washington, Jan. 27.—Tests with the new "gyroscopic" or "battle" compass, reports to the navy department say, have demonstrated that it not only is an improvement over the magnetic compass, but that it will pay for its cost within two years in the amount of coal saved. That saving would be accomplished because a steadier course can be maintained by the new compass and changes in speed to regain headway would be reduced.

Tender for City Coal.

Rogers & Black's tender for the supply of some 300 tons of coal to the city was opened at last evening's meeting of the City Council. The price submitted was \$8.75 a ton, and an assurance was given that although the coal situation was in very straightened state just at the present time they would do their utmost to comply with all the conditions but would not care to absolutely bind themselves. On the suggestion of the Mayor the matter was referred to the Fire and Water committee with power to act.
