GERMAN INTERESTS IN ASIA MINOR ARE BOUND UP WITH THOSE OF TURKEY.

Constantinople, Jan. 29.—

Hands off all the Turkish possessions in Asia," was Germany's pointed notification today to every one concerned. It was given by the German ambassador to Turkey in a speech at the Teutonia Club's annual dinner in honor of Emperor William's birthday anniversary.

"The future of Turkey lies in Asia Minor," Baron Hans von Langenhein told an enthusiastic gathering of his compatriots.

The German interests in Asia Minor are very great and bound up with those of Turkey. The present note of the powers promised that Turkey would be aided in her future development. Germany will lend powerful assistance in this cause.

In any case, however, to all Turkish possessions in Asia Germany will attach the label "hands off."

BOARD OF TRADE HELD VERY ENTHUSIASTIC MEETING LAST NIGHT

President's Report Gave an Encouraging Review of Progress Made During the Past Year---F. G. Dawson Elected President for 1913---Monthly Luncheons Discussed

The annual meeting of the Prince Rupert Board of Trade held last evening at the city hall was fairly well attended. Mr. F. H. Mobley, the president, occupied the chair. After the reading of the minutes by the secretary, Mr. J. Lorne MacLaren, a communication was read from the Northern Steamship Co. in regard to what they deemed the excessive dockage charges they were forced to pay here both by the G.T.P. and the Provincial Government.

Mr. W. E. Williams moved the letter be received and filed. In seconding the motion Mr. A. J. Morris drew attention to the fact that the company in question had no grievance whatsoever and that they had not apparently awakened to the fact that Prince Rupert is a city which as regards wharfage accommodation is in every respect upon a par with Vancouver and Victoria. It was time they ceased rating us with little places like Bella Golla and Swanson Bay.

The financial report was next presented by the secretary-treasurer and showed that there was a balance on hand of \$55.88, with an excess of assets over liabilities of \$187.85.

President F. H. Mobley, in presenting his report, remarked that he was pleased to see such a number of members present. He urged the importance of every business man in the city taking a live and active interest in the work of the board, which was first and foremost in importance in the building up and development of the city. Possibly the City Council could come to their aid in the matter of providing one or two rooms in the city hall, if they could be spared, where the board could meet more or less informally and where literature, etc., could be kept on hand.

President's Report.

The president's report was presented by Mr. Mobley. It was as follows:

To the Board of Trade of the City of Prince Rupert:

Gentlemen: It is gratifying to note during the past year that Prince Rupert has made greater advancement in the way of developing the permanent resources of the city and the adjacent district than has been shown during any preceding twelve months. The increased facilities afforded us by further extension of the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway construction into the interior added materially to our possibilities in the way of development. In reviewing the situation we will not endeavor to enumerate all, but we wish to present herewith a few of the most noteworthy ones.

Railways.

Along the line of the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway as far east as New Hazelton we find that the company has placed their roadbed, stations, water tanks, etc., in a completed condition for all classes of trains, and in shape for any speed. Steel is now laid from New Hazelton to Porphyry Creek, at which point a steel bridge is being constructed and will be completed not later than March 1st. After this crossing is effected only minor obstructions in the way of heavy work will be encountered for a distance of about two hundred miles to the eastward, where, judging from present indications, the east-

will link up with the west about the end of the year 1913, and early in the year 1914 the roadbed will be put in suitable condition to accommodate through traffic.

Some idea as to local conditions in connection with the small

portion of this road that is already completed may be had from the following: During the year 1912 there was carried over the first one hundred and eighty mile section no less than 25,000 passengers and over 10,000 tons of merchandise. With the railroad completed into the heart of the Bulkley Valley this summer the year 1913 gives great promise of a banner year.

Shipping.

We have now twelve passenger steamers and ten freighters making scheduled calls at this port. These are owned as follows:

Grand Trunk Pacific Steamship Company, four passenger and two freighters.

Canadian Pacific Railway Company, three passenger and one freighter.

Union Steamship Company, two passenger and three freighters.

Northern Steamship Company, one passenger and one freighter.

Pacific Coast Steamship Company, two passenger and one freighter.

In addition to this we have two steamers owned by private companies and two ocean going tugs and barges.

The greater number of these vessels have a weekly schedule. We feel that our mail service is very fair, but might be improved upon if the arrival of these boats were more evenly distributed through the week.

We understand that in the near future the Grand Trunk Pacific Steamship Company will inaugurate a service to Queen Charlotte Islands which will ensure us a weekly mail to and from these islands, which will greatly facilitate conditions in this quarter.

Mining.

We are pleased to record the very much improved conditions in mining interests in the district. Ten carloads of ore are now en route from the Silver Standard mine to the Tacoma smelter and several hundred

tons more are ready on the dump.

The Granby Mining & Smelting Company of Goose Bay will, no doubt, have completed by the end of the year their \$1,200,000 smelter with a daily capacity of 2,000 tons. In addition to smelting their own products the company will no doubt be in a position to handle ore from outside points, thus overcoming the delay and additional expense of shipping ore to our southern cousins.

Fishing.

The Canadian Fish and Cold Storage Company are now operating and will place in cold storage this season 2,000 tons of herring to be used as halibut bait, and will in the near future be shipping large quantities of fish to all points on the American continent.

Four companies have been organized and are now engaged in the herring industry and are all meeting with a great degree of success.

The records of 1912 show an increase of over 5,000 cases of salmon packed in the Skeena and Naas rivers over the 1911 pack. The total pack of these two streams for the past season was 325,420 cases. Two new salmon canneries have been added to our industries and a fertilizing plant is well under way; a half dozen or more large trawlers have been added to our fishing fleet and many more are to arrive in the near future.

In passing I would advise that the Board of Trade render every assistance possible to facilitate and promote this industry.

Customs.

The customs receipts from January 1st to December 31st, 1912, were \$435,046.57.

Vessels clearing inward, foreign, 281; outward, foreign, 283; inward, coastwise, 1,041; outward, coastwise, 1,082.

Marks of Progress.

Our municipality is making steady progress in the way of permanent improvements.

Two new church buildings have been erected during the year. Much progress has been shown in our schools, necessitating adding of three teachers to the staff and a high school has been opened in our city also.

A handsome wing has been added to our hospital at a cost of \$20,000.

Our \$3,000,000 dry dock and ship yard is well under way.

Extensive development is being made by the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway Company in the way of preparing for the construction of their terminal yards, stations, etc.

Coming to the election of officers, Mr. G. R. Naden, the vice president, was nominated for president. Dawson was elected president unanimously for the year 1913. Despite Mr. Naden's reiterated protestations to be excused, he was unanimously elected to the vice president's chair.

CIVIL SERVICE EMPLOYEES GET INCREASED SALARY

TEACHERS AND THOSE WHO NEED INCREASES MOST ARE NOT BENEFITTED—NEEDS OF LABOR IGNORED.

Victoria, Jan. 29.—Yesterday

was another day of comparative rest in the local Parliament, the orders for the day being to a considerable extent monopolized by measures standing in the name of the Attorney General, and this minister, with his Vancouver colleagues, having left for the mainland to be present at an annual party convention. It, therefore, became the Provincial Secretary's field day and his second readings of the Civil Service Act amendment bill and the bill to establishing the natural history and anthropological branches of the Provincial Museum and to define the duties of its director being approved by the House upon their principle and set for committee consideration today.

In connection with the former measure the minister explained its intent as being to advance the salaries of civil service employees (exclusive of school teachers, who are perhaps the worst paid of all workers in British Columbia, and the police) in recognition of the advancing cost of living. The increase covered is a substantial one, being in the

case of stenographers and junior clerks no less than \$15 a month. Thus a clerk or stenographer who formerly entered the service at \$35 will hereafter have \$60 a month at the outset, increasing by annual monthly advances of \$5 until a maximum of \$80 is reached.

The outside service, by which is meant the teachers, police, etc., are to be contented with a ministerial promise that their claims for proportionate increases will be considered in some future year. The motion for second reading of this bill produced a sharp exchange between the Socialistic opposition leader and the Prime Minister, the former, while taking no exception to the proposed increases for the civil servants, contrasting their happy lot with that of labor generally in this Conservatively ruled province. The Premier retorted with a somewhat stereotyped eulogy upon the general prosperity and a denial that labor is unhappily situated, wandering so far from his theme in the bill under discussion as to be called to order by Speaker Eberts.

Nelson, J. A. Kirkpatrick, C. V. Bennett and Dr. W. B. Clayton. The City Council are represented by Aldermen Naden and Kerr and the Provincial government by Messrs. P. L. Palmer and H. Douglas. The two latter were the appointees for last year. It is expected the appointments for 1913 will be made by the government in a few weeks' time.

REGENERATION OF RURAL LIFE LIBERALISM'S GREAT TASK

COUNTRY DISTRICTS IN ENGLAND MUST BE RELEASED FROM PARALYZING GRIP OF UNPROFITABLE SYSTEM OF LAND TENURE.

London, Jan. 31.—The foremost task that Liberalism will have to perform in the future is the regeneration of rural life and the emancipation of the country districts from the paralyzing grip of the rusty, effete and unprofitable system that is crushing the life out of rural residents. Lloyd-George made the momentous declaration tonight at the annual meeting of the National Liberal Club that when the commission investigating the relation between landlords and tenants makes its report it will prove conclusively that there are hundreds of thousands, if not millions, of men, women and children living under conditions in regard to wages, housing, food and labor which ought to make the Empire hang its head with shame. The report will prove that this rich country does not provide decent homes for the laborers engaged in occupations that are vital to our very existence.

PEACE DELEGATES LEAVE FOR HOME

SKIRMISHING HAS ALREADY COMMENCED OUTSIDE ADRIANOPLE—DIPLOMATS GIVE UP ALL HOPE FOR PEACE.

London, Jan. 31.—"When the next armistice peace preliminaries are signed it will be on the drum head on the battlefield," declared the Balkan allies' delegates, who are departing to their respective countries. Diplomats have given up all hope of preventing the resumption of hostilities. Each side now accuses the other of bluffing. It is reported that skirmishing has already commenced outside Adrianople. The Turkish delegates have not yet been recalled.

Editorial Notes and Clippings

MR. YOUNG'S MEMOIRS.

We are glad that the public men of Canada are falling into the habit of publishing reminiscences. A man who has been behind the scenes, who has been in Parliament and who has had close personal relations with political leaders, sometimes has access to information which is denied to the ordinary historian, and which he can disclose at the proper time without any breach of confidence. He has a different point of view from that of the outsider. He knows the real causes and motives of actions as well as those assigned.

The Hon. James Young is an excellent writer of memoirs. He had an intimate acquaintance with many of the public men of Canada on both sides of politics, and he has the faculty of describing them so as to make them live again. But he is not a mere gossip. He has a full appreciation of the serious side of politics, and a firm grasp of public questions. Hence he has given in the two volumes now published by William Briggs a valuable history

of Canada for more than sixty years. We read of the passing of the stage coach and the coming of the railway. We read of the infancy of responsible government, and the difficulties of the old legislative union, and the forces which led up to confederation. We are told the story of the organization of the new system, and of the gradual development of the Canada that we see today.

As we read these pages we wonder at the shortsightedness of those who say that Canada has no history. It is true that it is not a history written in blood. But it is all the more unique and instructive because its battles have been fought on the parliamentary stage, or with the forces of nature. It is history made by pioneers, farmers, mechanics, merchants, builders of railways, parliamentarians. It is inspiring because it shows by the force of example what may be done by the men and women of our own generation. It is an incentive to the patriotism that consists, not in fear or hatred of other nations, but in building up our own.—Toronto Star.

A CANADIAN NAVY IS BEST FOR DEFENCE

As a Unit Co-operating with Other Imperial Pacific Forces.

London, Jan. 30.—The Sydney Morning Herald, says the London Times' correspondent, regards the Vancouver conference as most probable, and cites the letter from Admiral King Hall, showing the Australian Pacific policy has the full support of the Imperial authorities.

The article adds: "We have no wish to intervene in the political controversies of the sister dominions, but feel that Canada's only satisfactory manner of joining in the Pacific defence is the establishment of a local navy as a unit co-operating with the other Imperial Pacific forces."

"The question of control is a most important contingency, but is not difficult of solution, since their general disposition is to accept the British Admiralty's advice in the utilizing of available ships to the best advantage and with the least delay in times of stress."

ROCKEFELLER PROMISES BIG CONTRIBUTION

Chicago, Jan. 30.—Announcement was made recent that J. D. Rockefeller has pledged \$50,000 to the Northern Baptist convention provided the convention raise \$125,000 more than last year when \$1,568,000 was obtained. Mr. Rockefeller has promised to give an additional \$50,000 if the convention can get a second \$125,000. The total of \$100,000 would be for the use of six auxiliary societies of the convention and be devoted principally to home and foreign missions and publication work. The amount must be raised by April 1st. The Northern Baptist convention is a central body of Baptist churches of the north. It has a constituency of 1,200,000.

BECKWITH DECLARED MAYOR OF VICTORIA

Victoria, Jan. 29.—Judge Lampman this morning declared J. L. Beckwith elected mayor of Victoria and will swear him in this afternoon. Counsel for A. J. Morley announced that he would appeal for a new election.

Will Protect Consumers.

Washington, Jan. 30.—In order to protect consumers and to prevent the flooding of the markets with oranges and lemons declared to be unfit for food, the Federal Board of Food and Drug Inspection has issued an order forbidding the sale in interstate commerce of fruits which have been damaged in the recent freeze in California.

HOT FIGHT OVER THE IMMIGRATION BILL

United States May Impose Literary Test on Prospective Citizens

Washington, Jan. 31.—Bitter warfare in the house is expected in the consideration of the new immigration bill, which was brought up today by Congressman Burnett, of New York. The measure as amended in conference, provides for a literary test and also that all immigrants must furnish a certificate of character from their respective governments before being granted admission to the United States.

The bill has caused more letters of protest to congressmen than any measure of recent years. All Jewish organizations are pledged to fight to the last gasp against the enactment of the certificate clause. They warmly subscribe to the views of Senator La Follette, who bitterly denounced that feature of the bill as effectively closing forever the doors of America to political refugees.

Particular objection is made to the operation of the proposed bill in the cause of Russian immigrants. It is declared that to pass it would render absolutely abortive the efforts of Jewish immigrants from the Czar's country to obtain asylum in America, and that the measure would effectively destroy the traditional "open door" of the United States to the oppressed in Europe.

Los Angeles, Jan. 31.—Jim Jeffries is mounted high on the water wagon today, while Barney Oldfield is keeping pace with that vehicle, to be present at any fatal loss of equilibrium by its once pugilistic passenger. Upon Jeffries' ability to cling to the seat for one year, during which time he also must forego cigarettes, depends the ownership of a \$2,800 pot which reached its size in small pieces, Jeffries and Oldfield raising each other's bet, while a party of friends applauded. The former champion denied his abstinence decision was made with a view to another "come back" attempt.

SAYS EARTH IS HALF AS LARGE AGAIN

San Francisco, Jan. 31.—That the universe is half again as large as the world has supposed; that the sun is still youthful, and keeps travelling northerly 20 miles a second; that the north star is not really a single star, but consists of three suns revolving about a common centre, are some of the latest scientific discoveries announced by W. W. Campbell, director of Lick Observatory, of the University of California. What is considered one of the greatest contributions to cosmology the Lick Observatory has made is Campbell's proof by spectrographic observations that stars in the earlier stages of their existence are travelling slowly through space and that their speed increases with their development. This had not been suspected. Campbell has also proved that nebulae have spiral form, which shows their rotation, and that most stars are double, triple or quadruple.

THOSE SPRING HATS WILL SURE BE GAY

Paris, Jan. 31.—Drawing their inspiration from the new and freakish Futurist cult of art, the milliners of Paris today are preparing for the spring market the wierdest confections in feminine headgear that have ever been attempted. The Futurist hat is without any particular shape or form, but the color combinations are a bit noisy. For instance, one exceptionally modest creation, displayed in the Rue de La Paix, shows four colors in the trimming—red, violet, green and yellow. Another favorite ensemble is mandarin blue, emerald green, Spanish yellow and bishop's purple, with a dash of cerise. Orchard effects give evidence of renewed popularity, with apples in all shades of green, red and yellow predominating. One especially chic top piece is decorated with two peaches, half a dozen plums and a handful of cherries.

Beattie Nesbitt Dead.

Toronto, Jan. 31.—Dr. Beattie Nesbitt, charged with conspiracy in the famous Farmers' Bank failure, died at his home here this afternoon. One hour before his death application was made before the judge to quash the conviction. The judge said he would give the matter consideration.

SOUL WINNING CHAIN IS STARTED BY TORONTO MEN

Toronto, Jan. 31.—To start an endless chain of soul winning men fifty members of St. Paul's Methodist Church, Avenue road, pledged themselves to bring at least one man to Christ this year. The action was taken at a meeting held under the auspices of the Men's Association of the church. Following an address by W. Goodwin of Montreal, the chairman said the action was not prearranged, but was the result of inspiration from heaven. During the course of his address Mr. Goodwin said it would take less than 40 years to win the world for Christ if the chain was continued unbroken. At the end of 30 years it comes to one billion people, starting with one person the first year and doubling the number every year.
