ADMIRALTY COURT CONFISCATES U.S. FISHING BOAT

PRESIDENT MADERO IS UNDER ARREST—PREMIER MOVES SECOND READING OF NAVAL BILL

CONSTITUTIONAL DUTY OF DOMINION GOVERNMENT

MUST INTRODUCE MEASURE FOR RE-ADJUSTMENT OF REPRESENTATION BEFORE PROCEEDING WITH THE NAVAL BILL

(Special to The Daily News.)
Ottawa, Feb. 18.—Premier Borden today moved the second reading of the Naval Bill without comment. J. G. Turriff, Liberal member for Assiniboia, in a lengthy speech, moved an amendment as follows: "That said bill be not now read a second time, but that it be resolved that it is the constitutional duty of the government according to the terms of the British North America Act to immediately introduce a measure for re-adjustment of representation of the provinces according to the population as established by the census of 1911, and that the House do not proceed further until re-adjustment has taken place and the people duly consulted."

MILITARY PAGEANT DETAILS FINISHED

Twenty-five Thousand Soldiers and Sailors to Be in Line at Inaugural.

Washington, Feb. 18.—The military feature of the inaugural parade practically has been completed, according to the announcement made by Major General Leonard Wood, grand marshal. Present figures indicate that there will be nearly 25,000 soldiers and sailors from the regular and state militia services in line.

Robert N. Harper, chairman of the civic organizations committee, told the inaugural committee that at least 15,000 marchers would be in his section of the parade. This will be composed of political clubs and other organizations of a semi-political nature.

In this section also will be the governors and their staffs from states that will not be represented by militia. Governors of at least twenty states are expected to be in the line of march.

YACHT SAILING ON LONG VOYAGE TO SEATTLE

Pleasure Craft Leaves Boston, Expecting to Reach Sound in 100 Days.

Boston, Feb. 18.—The schooner yacht *Adventures*, owned by John Borden, a Chicago millionaire, left Boston a few days ago on the first leg of its long voyage through the Straits of Magellan to Seattle.

Its immediate destination is Bermuda, and it is expected that the 700 mile trip will be made in about seven days. Mr. Borden and two friends, Everts Wren and Harold Wallace, both of Chicago, sailed on the *Adventures*. They will leave her at Bermuda, where she will be provisioned for the voyage around South America. The voyage to Seattle is expected to be made in about 100 days.

The *Adventures*, built at a cost of \$50,000, was recently launched at Booth Bay Harbor, Maine.

PRESIDENT MADERO ARRESTED BUT FIGHTING CONTINUES

GENERAL VICTORIANO, COMMANDER OF FEDERAL TROOPS, PROCLAIMED PRESIDENT—ANOTHER BATTLE IN THE STREETS.

Mexico City, Feb. 18.—President Francisco Madero was arrested today in the National Palace by General Blanquet, backed by his troops. General Victoriano, military commander of the Federal troops, has been proclaimed president. This followed a conference between Huerta and General Diaz. While Madero and other members of his family are under arrest in the palace, crowds are running about the streets crying "Vivas for Huerta and Diaz." Early this afternoon Huerta's attempt to communicate with Diaz precipitated a battle. The rebels opened up with a terrific fire of small arms. At 4 o'clock there was a cessation of firing and all was quiet.

PIRATES BEAT BROTHERHOOD IN FIRST GAME OF SEASON

LARGE CROWD WITNESSED OPENING GAME OF THE INDOOR BASEBALL LEAGUE—NOT A DULL MOMENT IN THE GAME.

Judging from the opening game of the Indoor Baseball League that was played last night at the Auditorium between the Pirates and the Baptist Brotherhood, the local fans will see some hot and furious games before the season is brought to a close. The game is popular in Prince Rupert was clearly evident from the very large attendance of spectators, the galleries being well filled with enthusiastic voters for both sides.

Before the players took the field, Rev. W. H. McLeod, president of the league, addressed a few remarks to the spectators concerning athletics generally, introducing Mayor Pattullo, who officially opened the season. Rev. Mr. McLeod said he was sure that the athletes of the city did a good friend in the present Mayor. It was evident, he said, that Mayor Pattullo is a man of action, not a man of mere promises. He referred to the fact that within a few weeks after election Mayor Pattullo had taken action in regard to a public library and tenders are to be asked immediately for the erection of a building that will be a credit to the city in its present stage of development. He had no doubt that similar action would be taken during the year in regard to a suitable athletic ground.

Mayor Pattullo said that he is pleased to see such an active interest in athletics among the young men of the city. It is a good sign to see a development of the physical side of a man as well as the mental. The athletes of the city would have his most hearty support in every movement that is in their interest in so far as conditions will permit. While making no promise in the matter, he hoped before the year is out to see established play grounds in different sections of the city for the children and a central athletic field for the more strenuous games for the boys and young men.

Following the Mayor's address, F. L. Landes, official umpire, blew the whistle and the Baptist Brotherhood went to bat. Although the teams have had but little practice yet, the game was exciting from start to finish. The Pirates seemed to be considerably stronger in the field than their opponents and were on the alert for every opportunity to steal a base. The umpires were called upon several times to make some very close decisions, but in these they gave splendid satisfaction. For the Brotherhood W. D. Vance did splendid work in the box, while Charlie Embleton for the Pirates put in some lively ones that kept the Brotherhood guessing. Fred Wallace and Frank Landes acted as official umpires.

NEW YORK GAMBLERS NOT "ON THE LEVEL"

Players "Up Against It" Says "Honest" Dan Costigan—Some Police Officers Not Straight

New York, Feb. 17.—No gambling house in this city is "on the level," and men who play the games are "up against it," because of crooked dealings. So testified Police Lieutenant "Honest Dan" Costigan, referred to in both the Rosenthal and present police investigations as an honest officer. Costigan was a witness before the aldermanic committee inquiring into local vice conditions.

Costigan, a strong arm squad-raider of gambling and other "underworld" resorts, told how he was assigned to spy work that he disliked, but considered necessary, on officers ranking from lieutenants upwards. He reported directly to Commissioner Waldo, he said, because there were some officers whom he "didn't believe to be too straight."

He reported that some captains and inspectors were grafting, in his opinion, but no inspector was demoted and captains merely were transferred, he said.

BLASTING ACCIDENT IN MINE NEAR LOCKEPORT

TWO MEN BELIEVED SERIOUSLY INJURED—WM. JOLLIFFE WITH DR. CADE AND CONSTABLE DOOLITTLE LEFT THIS MORNING FOR SCENE OF ACCIDENT.

Upon receipt of a wire of a serious accident at Lockeport, close to Jedway, Moresby Island, the Provincial authorities procured the services of the Dominion government cruiser *William Jolliffe* and despatched Constable Doolittle to the scene this morning at about 4 o'clock. Dr. J. P. Cade accompanied the constable, medical aid being urgently requested. Although the particulars are most meagre, it is believed that the accident was through blasting in a mine and that two men at least are seriously injured.

POISONED AT A PURE FOOD MEAL

Chicago, Feb. 17.—Of 200 University of Chicago women students, who attended a "pure food" dinner at the school last Thursday, all but six have been taken ill with ptomaine poisoning, it developed tonight. University authorities have started an investigation. The poison is believed to have been in the salad. The head of the Department of household economics had charge of the preparation of the dinner.

WOMAN SUFFRAGE

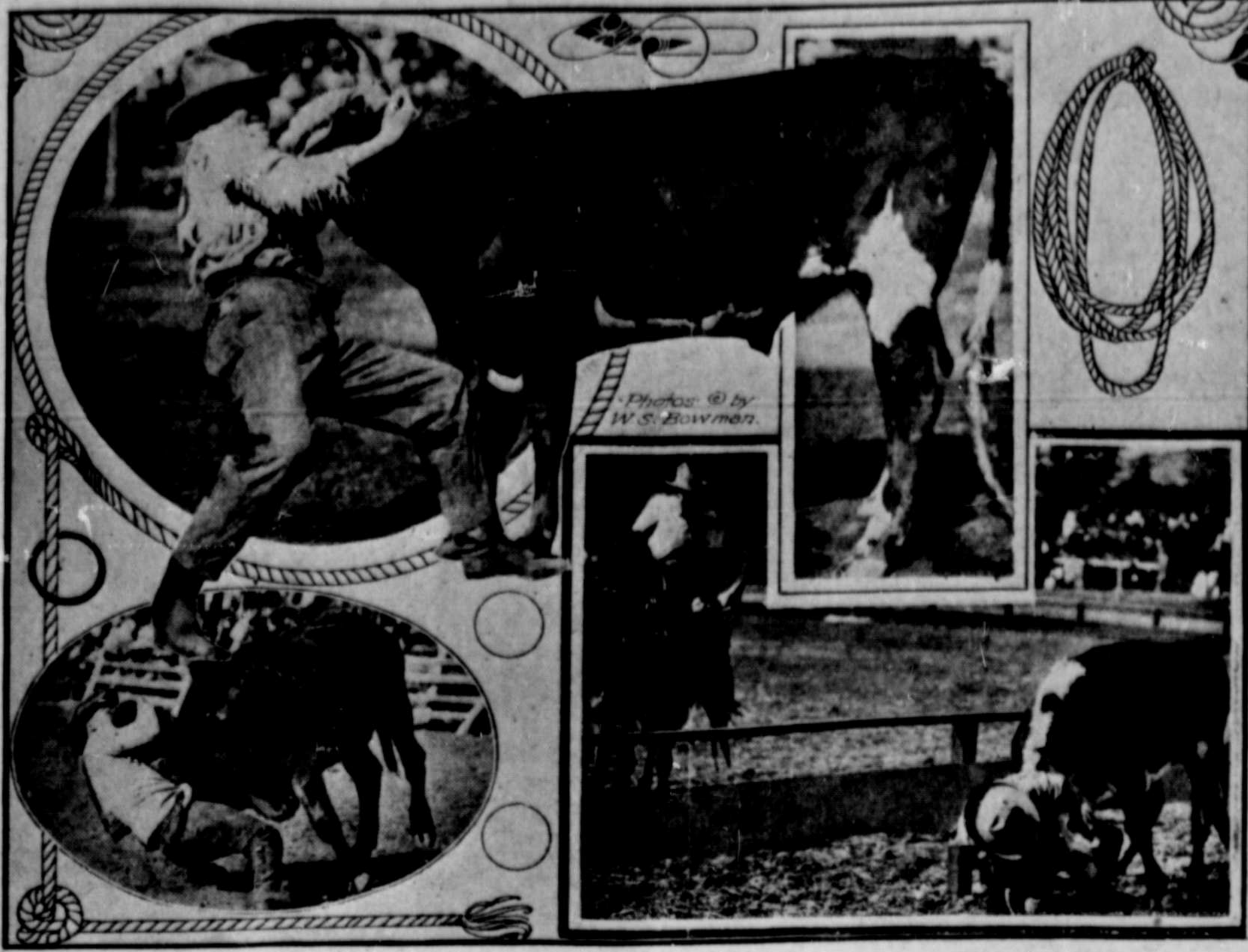
An Australian correspondent of the London Times takes a gloomy view of the progress of the political education of women in that country. Twelve years of enfranchisement, he says, has not increased the average woman's political education in Australia.

This may seem discouraging at first sight; but on closer inspection a hidden compliment to women reveals itself, which is none the less real because it is unintentional. It has taken generations and generations of enfranchisement to give man whatever measure of political education he is able to boast today; why should women have been expected to show much progress in the short space of twelve years, unless on the assumption that woman is much more capable of education than man?

Today, after all his exper-

ience with the franchise, man is still in the primary class, so far as real education is concerned. The traditions of the political arena are such, after all the years of man's attempt to educate himself, that a minister of the gospel is popularly held to be degrading himself when he enters it. Today, even in Canada, the great masses of the electors are so firmly fixed within the lines of their respective parties that their votes and views on any political question can be calculated in advance as accurately as the time of an eclipse. The element of uncertainty in an election is furnished by a very small minority, and of this small minority only a section of it is made up of men who stand upon their own independence and insist on doing their own thinking and acting on their own judgment.

There are some strong arguments for and against woman's suffrage; but some of the arguments that are used against it do not sound very well coming from man's side of the house.

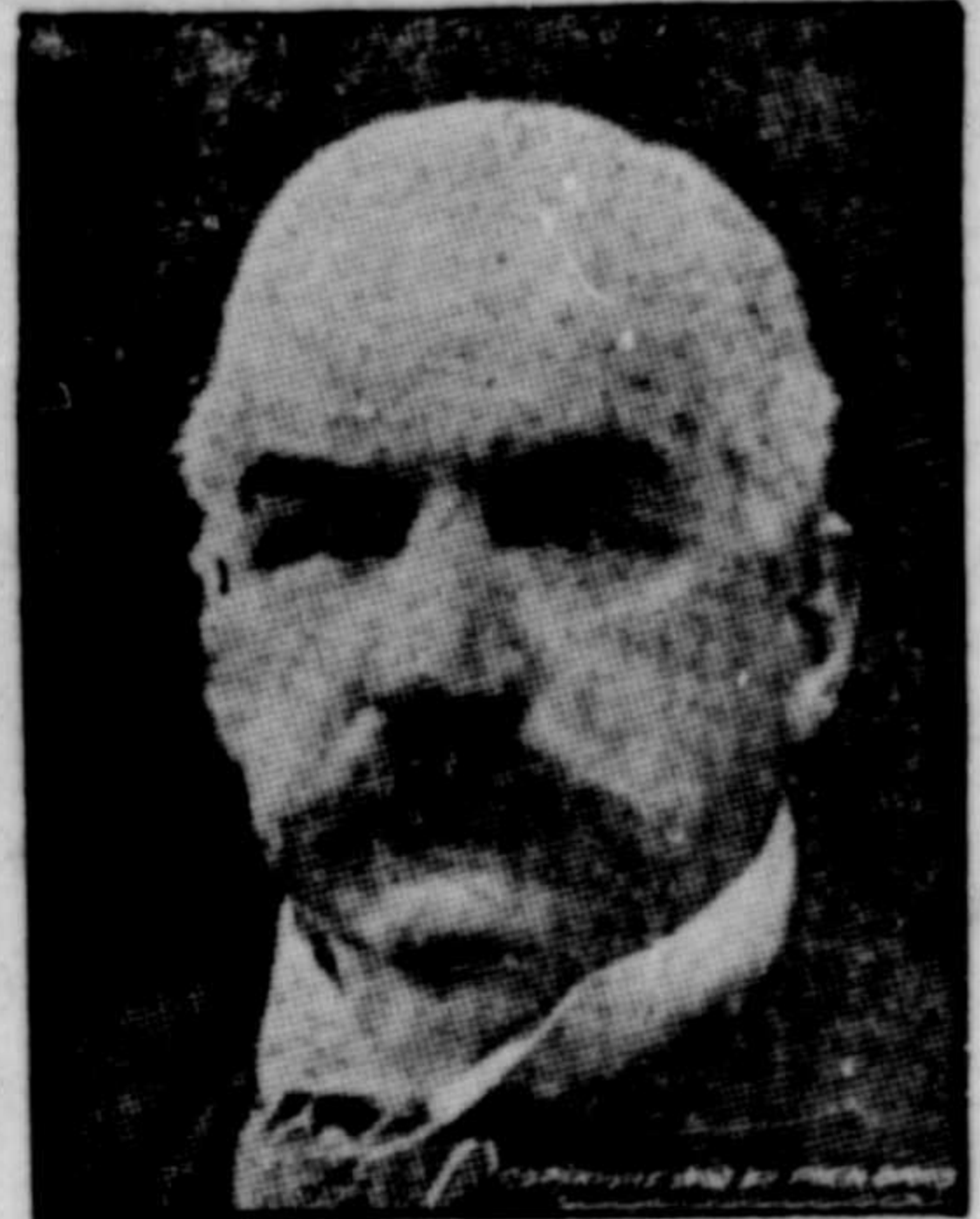


SCENES FROM THE PENDLETON ROUND-UP TO BE SHOWN AT THE WESTHOLME OPERA HOUSE TO-NIGHT

WORLD'S RECORD FOR POCKET BILLIARDS

Chicago Amateur Hangs Up Mark in Tournament Under New Rules.

Chicago, Feb. 18.—Morton Phillips set a new world's record at pocket billiards, under the new rules, when he counted seventy-four recently in a match with Edward Jones in the Chicago amateur championship tournament.

The new rules went into effect during the tournament at Philadelphia last year and the best previous mark was a run of fifty-nine, made by Champion Alfred De Oro in his match against Maturio of Denver.

Phillips defeated Jones 125 to 53.

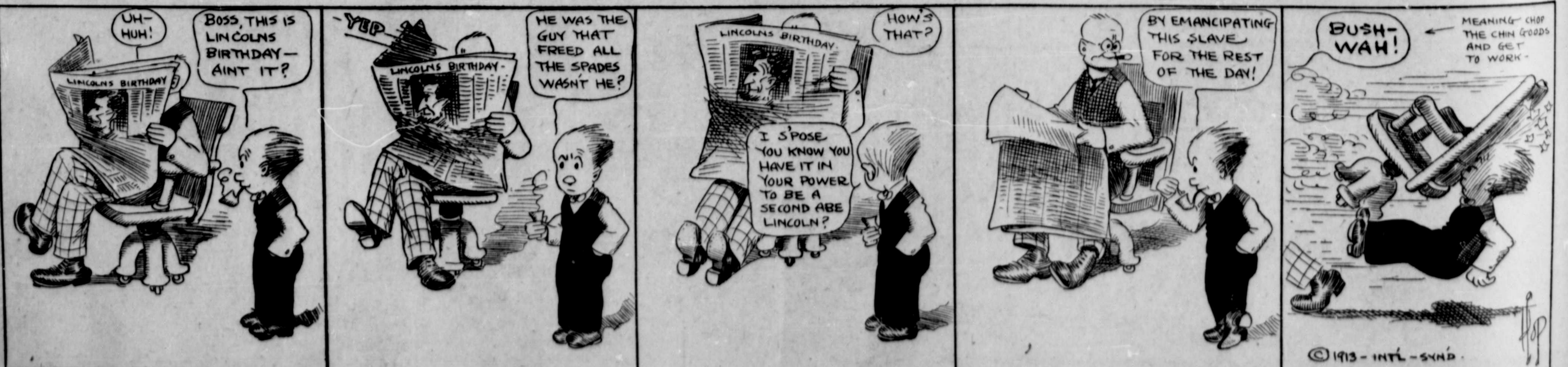

SCIENTIST REPORTS BIRTH OF ATOM

Scientific World is Greatly Excited Over Recent Reports Made by Eminent Professors

London, Feb. 17—The keenest interest has been aroused in the scientific world by the report of the birth of an atom, made by the chemical society by Professors Ramsay, Collie and Patterson. If further experiments confirm this, it is possible that the creation of matter spontaneous with the birth of an element like helium or neon will be fundamentally more important than the spontaneous birth of life.

Professor Smith Ellis' declaration that the papers of Ramsay, Collie and Patterson are momentous and that they possess greater interest than any hitherto brought before the chemical society, is agreed to be specially significant, because he is known as a cautious chemist and it was among chemists that the largest amount of scepticism over Ramsay's previous experiments was manifested.

DIDN'T MIND ONE KISS; OBJECTED TO THOUSAND

Montreal, Feb. 17—Dr. Angus Patten, mayor of the Indian settlement of Caughnawaga, was charged in the police court with having kissed Mrs. Angus Deer, also of Caughnawaga, one thousand times. Mrs. Deer said she did not object to the doctor kissing her once, but did object to the number of times he had done so. When asked if it was not customary for ladies in Caughnawaga to be kissed when visiting medical men around Christmas time, she said it might be customary, but it was not compulsory. The doctor was committed to stand trial.

REGULAR OMNIBUS SERVICE WILL BE INAUGURATED
