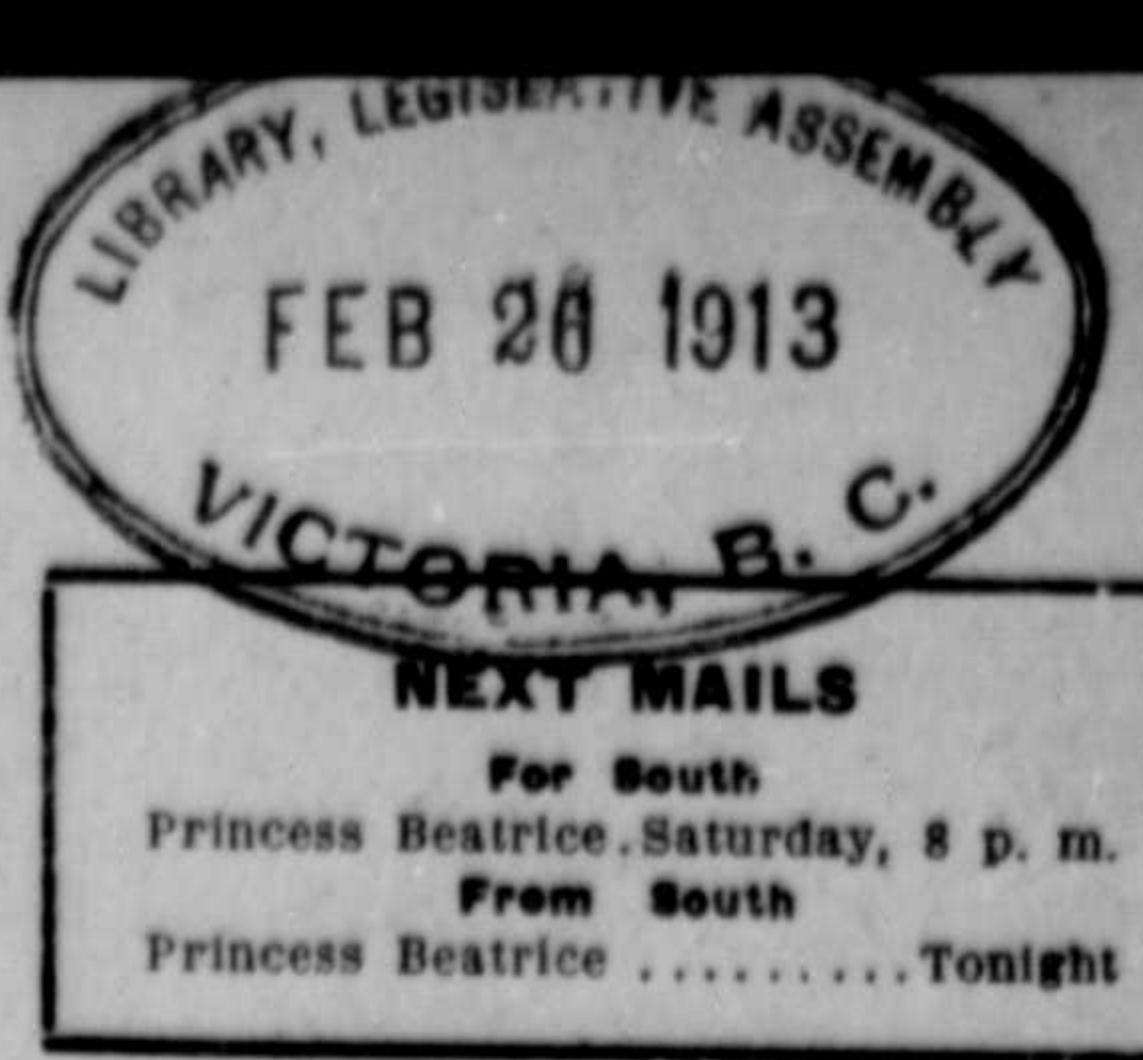

COMMITTED TO JAIL FOR CONTEMPT OF HOUSE

NEW TIMBER ROYALTIES WILL NOT BECOME OPERATIVE IN PROVINCE FOR THREE YEARS

TIMBER ROYALTIES NOT IMMEDIATELY EFFECTIVE

AGREEMENT REACHED BETWEEN TIMBER MEN AND MINISTER THAT NEW SCALE WILL NOT BE EFFECTIVE FOR THREE YEARS.

(Special to The Daily News.) Victoria, Feb. 20.—With respect to the new Forestry Act, Hon. W. R. Ross, chief commissioner of lands and forests, and leading men representing the lumber industry of British Columbia have reached an amicable agreement under which the new C. scale will not become operative until three years hence.

While in the meantime interior lumbermen will have the advantage of the Doyle scale, after 1915 for a complete decade there will be a general royalty of \$1 per thousand on the coast and 75 cents in the interior. From 1926 to 1931 each will pay an additional 25 cents royalty, bringing them up to \$1.25 and \$1 per thousand, respectively.

WRIT HAS BEEN ISSUED AGAINST FISH COMPANY

Civil Suit Instituted by H. A. Philpott Against Prince Rupert Fish & Cold Storage Co.

As a sequel to the late exciting events in connection with the business affairs of the Prince Rupert Fish & Cold Storage Co., Ltd., this morning a writ was issued against the latter company by Hugh A. Philpott, the secretary-treasurer, in whose interests his solicitors, Messrs. Williams & Manson, lately have used such energy and zeal. The plaintiff's claim sets forth that he was induced to subscribe for shares in the company by fraudulent misrepresentations, fraud and non-disclosure of material facts. He further demands a rescission of the contract to take shares of the company and for his name to be taken off the register as a member of the company. Together with this there are several other claims, including financial loss through fraudulent misrepresentations as well as a demand for wages due from the defendant company to the plaintiff. Messrs. Frank S. Evans and Frank A. Ellis are named with the defendant company as defendants in the suit.

St. Petersburg, Feb. 20.—The Troitsky Cathedral was destroyed by fire today. The great collection of pictures, engravings and precious relics which had been gathered in the building since its erection in 1703 by Peter the Great was saved.

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UNCONFIRMED RUMORS SAY THAT 3,500 WERE KILLED

SITUATION AT ADRIANOPLE REMAINS UNCHANGED—BULGARIA AND ROUMANIA AGREE ON MEDIATION OF POWERS.

(Special to The Daily News.) London, Feb. 20.—The story of a three days' battle at Bulair, in which 3,500 were killed on both sides, received in a despatch today is believed to be a revival of the old report of fighting in that district. The rumors that Enver Bey landed a large force at Rodosto, current February 16th, have since been denied. The situation at Adrianople remains unchanged. The Serbians have brought up heavy guns to assist the Montenegrins in a renewed attack on Scutari. A statement issued tonight at St. Petersburg says that Bulgaria and Roumania have agreed to accept mediation by the powers.

JUDGMENT IS REVERSED IN THE ASSAULT CASE

HIS HONOR JUDGE YOUNG SUSTAINS APPEAL OF W. E. WILLIAMS IN RECENT ASSAULT CASE ON A MORE COMPLETE PRESENTATION OF EVIDENCE

The last scene in the pretty little comedy that has been occupying the attention of the courts for the last few days was enacted in Judge Young's court yesterday afternoon, when the appeal in the police court case against the finding of Magistrate McMullin, in the charge of assault brought by Mr. Frank A. Ellis against Mr. W. E. Williams was sustained by His Honor Judge Young. The case which arose out of the now famous Prince Rupert Fish and Cold Storage Co., Ltd., dispute as to the possession of the company's minute book and records has been pretty well aired in the local press. Mr. Williams, who was adjudged guilty of assault upon the evidence taken by Magistrate McMullin yesterday morning and fined the nominal sum of \$5.00 and costs, immediately appealed from the decision of the magistrate. This was granted, security of \$50.00 being put up for his appearance in the higher court.

Upon coming up for hearing before His Honor Judge Young in the afternoon, Messrs. Ellis and Bacon as complainants, again told their story of the alleged assault, being subjected to a lengthy and searching cross-examination by Mr. A. M. Manson.

Mr. Williams, the defendant, in a concise and straightforward fashion gave his version of the affair, absolutely denying any attempt at assault. He merely, he said resisted an attempt made by the complainants to forcibly take the minute book from his possession. Mr. A. M. Manson, who was acting as counsel for his partner, threw off his legal gown and took the stand in the witness box, corroborating his partner's evidence as to the attempt made by the complainants to get possession again of the elusive book that has occasioned so much perturbation. Following Mr. Manson, Mr. H. A. Philpott, the secretary-treasurer of the company, was called and gave evidence along practically the same lines as that of the two previous witnesses. Before the close of the latter's cross-examination by Mr. W. E. Fisher, His Honor pointed out to the prosecuting counsel the exact status of the case. Without calling upon counsel for either side for argument, His Honor announced that from the case presented before him he had no choice but to reverse the decision of Magistrate McMullin. In doing this he wished to state that had the case been presented as fully and clearly as it was, he would have reached a different conclusion.

COMMITTED TO JAIL FOR CONTEMPT OF HOUSE

CLAIMS HE PAID LARGE SUM TO GET BUSINESS FROM THE GOVERNMENT, BUT REFUSES TO TELL TO WHOM IT WAS PAID.

Ottawa, Feb. 20.—R. C. Miller, one of the heads of the Diamond Light and Power Company of Montreal, whose business with the late government was probed in the closing days of last session, was today ordered by the Speaker incarcerated in Carleton county jail until the end of the present session for again refusing to answer a question put to him in the public accounts committee.

At the last session several witnesses gave evidence, but Miller could not be located before prosecution. The case arose out of a statement made by Miller in the course of the late session.

COAL SITUATION SERIOUS; NO RELIEF IN SIGHT

ONE DEALER HAS NOT A POUND; ANOTHER ORDERS FOR 75 TONS MORE THAN HE CAN FILL—NO INFORMATION AS TO FURTHER SUPPLY.

The average householder in Prince Rupert probably does not fully realize the seriousness of the present coal situation. That is, indeed, serious was the statement made to The News today by Mr. J. H. Rogers, of the firm of Rogers & Black, local agents for the popular Wellington coal. In fact, Mr. Rogers said that it was even more serious than during the cold spell a few weeks ago. The moderate weather that has been prevailing for some time of course reduces the consumption of coal to a certain extent but has a tendency to minimize the real seriousness of the situation.

Mr. Rogers stated today that he has orders entered for over 75 tons that it is absolutely impossible to fill out of the supply now on hand. Mr. Rogers is in constant communication with the Western Fuel Company at Nanaimo, from whom he gets his domestic coal, but can get no information as to when they will be able to furnish him with a shipment.

Mr. Rogers has ordered from the latter a shipment of 900 tons of steam coal, 500 tons of which are for the Canadian Fish Cold Storage Co., Ltd. This he expects will not arrive before February 26th or 27th.

He holds out absolutely no hope of being able to get a supply of domestic coal before the end of next week. Just as soon as he has any definite word as to its arrival he will notify the public through the press and will be prepared to accept local orders.

People who have not a sufficient supply to tide them over for at least ten days will be acting judiciously in laying in a supply of wood. There seems to be little doubt that the present shortage of coal will cause much inconvenience if not some suffering before the situation is relieved.

Mr. Rogers also informed The News that Vancouver is in even a worse plight than Prince Rupert, which has been receiving much more coal per capita than the larger city.

As an evidence of the seriousness of the situation here, the captain of the William Jolliffe, which went over to Lockport this week to get the injured miners absolutely refused to make the trip until Mr. Rogers had given him a written guarantee to supply him with twenty tons of coal on his return.

The Union Transfer Co., on being communicated with, said they haven't a pound of coal on hand and do not expect any for ten days or two weeks.

SHALL IT BE EIGHT TO FIVE?

If there is any basis of fact for the despatches from Berlin indicating that the German Budget Committee is disposed to consider the limitation of armaments the whole world will rejoice. The competition in the building of Dreadnoughts that has made bad blood between Germany and Great Britain has lasted for about eight years, and has grown steadily more dangerous to the world's peace. The German programme was admittedly designed to make any attack on Germany an extremely hazardous matter even for "the greatest naval power." In Britain not a few men of influence in the press and in parliament declared that the German navy was not intended for defensive purposes merely, but was being built to protect and convey an invading force that would some day be launched at the heart of the British Empire from the fog-shielded waters of the North Sea.

It may be that the German war party desired a navy strong enough to take the offensive but Germany has not now, and will not have for many years, a fleet powerful enough to hold the North Sea open for the passage of an invading army. If the statesmen of Germany are content to make an arrangement with Britain by which Germany is to build five Dreadnoughts against Britain's eight there can no longer be reasonable ground for believing that Germany contemplates the conquest of the British Isles. If British seamanship and naval science mean anything at all, an attempt at invasion with fleets of equal size attacking and defending would be evidence of recklessness such as the Germans have never yet shown. With a superiority of sixty per cent. on the side of the defence the British Isles would

be as safe as they were after Trafalgar.

An agreement for the limitation of British and German naval programmes along the line indicated in the despatches of Saturday would be a long step forward in the direction of universal peace, for the chief danger of civilization today is the rivalry of the two great trading nations of Europe. A firm friendship between Britain and Germany would leave both peoples free to continue the marvellous industrial development and the remarkable social reform programmes that differentiate them from the other nations of Europe. In the rivalries of peaceful expansion the Briton and German have scope enough for the exercise of the genius of the Teutonic race. Let us have peace!—Toronto Globe.

PUNISHING THE INNOCENT.

Warden Gilmour, of the Central Prison at Toronto, made a strong protest, in the course of a recent address against the all too familiar practice of punishing the mother and children for the offences of the husbands and fathers. Of course it is not the avowed purpose of the law to do this; but such is the effect of carrying out the law in many cases. The man is sent to jail for an offence. He is deprived of his liberty while there, which may or may not be regarded by him as a very serious punishment, but while in jail he is clothed, fed and housed. His wife and children, meanwhile deprived of his earnings, are left to their own resources. They may have food and clothing and lodging, or they may not have. Surely it is not beyond the resources of modern civilization to devise some means by which the earnings of an offending husband and father would still be available for his wife and family while he is in prison.

DAYS OF THE FOUR PER CENT LOAN GONE

London Observers Comment on Canadian Municipal Finance

London, Feb. 19.—"The action of leading Canadian banks and others doing business for Canada in curtailing accommodation and forcing big borrowers into the market has undoubtedly cleared the air as regards the financial affairs of the Dominion," says the Observer's financial editor. Continuing he says: "It is natural in a big country with responsibilities and a disposition to go ahead that inflated ideas of its value and importance should be current. It became evident that the country was becoming over financed and warnings, though at first falling on deaf ears, were clearly noted by the banks which steadily brought pressure to bear. Had their advice been taken earlier, neither Toronto or Montreal would have been faced with the recent difficulty in placing money on easy terms. The banks saw the difficulties coming and see now the difficulties occasioned by a new issue rush after the war. Partly for their own sake and to set the balance free and partly for the sake of important borrowers they have urged these issues to be made, but Montreal apparently still delays.

"The days of the 4 per cent. issue near par are over, for the time being, and we can well understand that great cities like Montreal and Toronto may not like the fact, but that is probably because their civic rulers fail to grasp the position of the European money markets."

LATEST BANK MERGER

Government Notified That Home Bank Wishes to Absorb Internationale.

Ottawa, Feb. 19.—The Dominion government has been formally notified by the Home Bank of Canada, with headquarters at Toronto, that it has entered into an agreement for the purchase of the entire assets of the Banque Internationale du Canada. The Minister of Finance is requested to give his assent to the measure. The bank which the Home Bank proposes to take over is the enterprise of Sir Rodolphe Forget, which was recently under discussion in the House of Commons on the motion of Hon. Rodolphe Lemieux, who claimed that the French shareholders were not fairly dealt with.

It is said to be altogether probable that in view of the proposed merger of the two banks there will be a renewal of the demand for an enquiry into the affairs of the Montreal institution before assent is given to the merger.

TO AVERT STRIKE

One Last Attempt to Arbitrate Railroad Men's Difficulties

New York, Feb. 19.—Judge M. A. Knapp, of the United States Commerce Court arrived in New York from Washington this morning for a final conference with officers of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Firemen and Engineers in the hope of averting a strike against fifty-four eastern railroads.

If no means of arbitration is then arrived at a strike will be called, effective within forty-eight hours.

GIVES UNCLE SAM POINTERS ON BANKS

Sir Edmund Walker a Witness Before the Currency Reform Committee at Washington.

Washington, Feb. 19.—Sir Edmund Walker, president of the Canadian Bank of Commerce, before the currency reform committee of the House, declared the defects of the United States banking system to be a lack of flexible currency, fixed reserves which dissipated needed cash in times of stress and the absence of a rediscount bank. Sir Edmund declared that the banks of the United States had not grown in relation to the great industries of the country and that they were now "behind the times." He recommended a system of regional banking organizations to strengthen the individual banks but said that he "was not in favor of the A. W. Rich plan without qualifications."

In these regional divisions, he said, the banks should be allowed to issue asset currency in bank note form which would appear as it was needed and disappear when the need for it had passed. The national bank note system, he said, should be continued and perfected.

The witness thought that in addition to maintaining the national banking system, the "individual banking system" should be aided by the government. He recommended that permission be granted to private bankers to establish large banks in the large cities of the country with branches in foreign countries.

He said bad banking would be prevented by government guarantee of deposits.

JAIL FOR TRUST MAGNATE

Head of Cash Register Company Sentenced to One Year

Cincinnati, Feb. 19.—John B. Peterson, president of the National Cash Register Company, who with twenty-eight other officials or former officials of the company, were convicted of criminal violation of the Sherman anti-trust law, has been sentenced to pay a fine of \$5000 and to serve one year in jail.

witness, Miller, appeared before
the public accounts committee
and in examination by Mr.
Meighen reiterated that the
amount in question had been paid
to get the contracts.

When asked to whom it had
been paid, the witness refused to
answer on the ground that it
would prejudice pending legisla-
tion. Mr. Meighen at once moved
that the refusal be reported to
the House. After some discus-
sion, Mr. Miller was allowed to
make a statement.

"In addition to the fact that
my answer would prejudice the
case now in the courts," he said,
"my refusal is due to the fact that
I never paid a dollar to any sena-
tor or any member of Parliament
or official of the government. I
think it is a private affair."

sitting of the House from 3 p. m.
until midnight.
