Melbourne, March 3.—That Australia is in earnest over her naval policy now being carried out, is the opinion of Lord Denman, Governor General of Australia, who opened the naval college at Geelong. In declaring the institute properly opened the Governor General said the occasion afforded further proof that the Australian people intended to own and man their own warships in their effort to carry out the programme laid down for them by the British Admiralty at the recent conference.

#### MAN INSTANTLY KILLED IN AUTOMOBILE ACCIDENT

VANCOUVER MAN WAS INSTANTLY KILLED WHEN STEVESTON TRAM CAR CRASHED INTO HIS TOURING CAR—BODY HURLED SEVENTY-FIVE FEET.

(Special to The Daily News.) Vancouver, March 3.—Crashing into a big touring car at a house crossing of Lulu land, a hundred yards from Inara park, early yesterday afternoon a Steveston tram car city and carried the machine a distance of 100 feet. The car was utterly demolished and the only occupant, W. E. Davidson, manager of Royal Transfer Company, was thrown to the ground, fully seventy five feet away. The unfortunate man's body was lying in pool of blood when he was picked up. His skull was fractured and death was apparently instantaneous.

#### PREACHER DEPLORES LACK OF CO-OPERATION

REV. F. W. KERR STERNLY REPROACHED MEN AND WOMEN FOR NOT CO-OPERATING WITH MINISTRY IN ERADICATING THE SOCIAL EVIL.

Taking for the subject of his address last evening that great American Classic "The Scarlet Letter" by Nathaniel Hawthorne, Rev. F. W. Kerr, Presbyterian minister, drew therefrom an eloquent lesson, upholding the church's unrooted belief that one standard of morality and one standard should exist for men and women alike. Referring to the led author, the preacher remarked that it often happened that a novelist was able to appeal to the heart of a human being in a way that the Church was unable to do. Hawthorne, more than any other great novelist, was imbued with the earnest and earnest spirit of the early Puritan Fathers, had the gift of endless analysis which was minutely brought out, in dealing with the three great primary sins of our life caused by going into sin, retribution, pain and remorse. No novel ever written, brought such a conviction of the retributive justice of God. Every thought and word of the author leads to but one conclusion, that man and woman should stand upon an equal footing in the matter of the Lord's and the Church's judgment, and where the man has sinned in the same regard as the woman the two should be punished and given identically the same punishment.

The Reverend gentlemen following the trend of his subject usually turned with sympathetic and laudatory words of commendation to the great suffragist movement, that exists in the world today. Sternly and only the preacher reproached men and women of the churches of today for not cooperating or lifting a hand so to speak towards aiding the minister to absolutely and irrevocably separate from our midst that and horrible blot upon civilization known as the restricted rights of our towns and cities. The course of his address, Kerr caused somewhat of a sensation amongst the congregation by making a personal reference to a man, who he said, in the hall that very evening

#### BANK CLERK ARRESTED IS THOUGHT INSANE

Was Short in Cash, Went to Customer Whom He Had Paid Day Before, Counted Off the Amount Short and Puts It in His Pocket.

Saskatoon, March 4.—Oliver Small, teller of the Northern Crown bank at Viscount, is in jail today awaiting trial on a peculiar charge.

Small, while teller in the bank, was found by the manager of the branch to be \$135 short in his cash. The manager looked up the previous day's business and discovered that a large amount had been paid out to Louis A. Trembley, and thinking that this man might have been paid by the teller, he instructed Small to go and see him and ask him if he had not received \$135 too much. Small, after a search, discovered the man and asked him if he might count over the money that he had given him the previous day. Trembley consented, handing over a large roll. Small counted the money and when he reached the amount of \$135 he immediately put it in his pocket, according to the story told in court, handing Trembley back the balance, at the same time telling him to go and see the manager of the bank, and he would be told all about it.

#### LIFE OF LIVINGSTONE REVIEWED LAST NIGHT

Rev. W. H. McLeod Preached an Interesting Sermon on the Life of the Great Missionary Explorer.

On the 19th day of this month will be celebrated the centennial of the birth of that great pioneer Christian missionary David Livingstone. Taking cognizance of this fact, the Rev. W. H. McLeod of the Baptist Church took the occasion last evening to deliver a sermon, based on the wonderful life story of this remarkable man. Mr. McLeod who besides being a particularly fascinating and brilliant speaker, is as well a deeply read and well informed man, makes a point of studying most carefully and minutely any subject with which he proposes to deal. Starting with the early boyhood days of Livingstone when, in the little Lanarkshire village in Scotland, the thoughtful and studious child of ten, employed at that early age at the spinning looms, got the first call to the work of ministry the speaker gave a short and graphic resume of Livingstone's life and final death. After first thinking of entering the mission field in China, his course was finally directed to Central Africa, following in the steps of the first Christian missionary to ever set foot in the interior of the Darkest continent, Robert Moffat. #### WAITER ON THE MAY DROWNED AT SKAGWAY

A Waiter Named Black Employed on the Princess May Met His Death by Drowning on Thursday Last.

A sad accident occurred at Skagway on Thursday shortly before the Princess May was due to leave on her southbound trip. According to information received from passengers who were on board a waiter named Black, employed on the May, met his death under sad and peculiar circumstances. It appears that while on his way to the boat he stumbled and fell on the tide flats, being badly stunned. Being unaccompanied, he remained where he fell and was drowned by the incoming tide. As a result of the fatal accident the May was held up for several hours while an inquest was held. The body was left at Skagway for interment.

#### ATLIN FISHERIES' FIRST SHIPMENT

Borealis Arrived in Port Saturday with Fourteen Tons of Halibut Which Was Immediately Shipped to Vancouver.

The Borealis arrived in port Saturday afternoon with 28,000 pounds of halibut for the Atlin Fisheries, Ltd. The catch was unloaded, boxed and left on the Princess May for Vancouver about one o'clock on Sunday morning. This is the first shipment from this port made by the Atlin Fisheries, Ltd.

#### AWAITING ADVICE FROM RELATIVES

Body of Wm. Cameron Drowned in the Harbor on Saturday Is at Hayner Bros.' Undertaking Rooms.

There is scarcely any doubt but that the unfortunate man, William Cameron, found lying dead upon the rocks, on Saturday afternoon last, between the Rupert Marine Ironworks and the Standard Fisheries Co.'s wharf, met his death by misadventure. In some way he must have fallen off the wharf and been drowned. The body was discovered just below high water mark by a man of the name of James Batt, who drew Ald. J. Dybbavn's attention to it, the latter immediately notifying the police authorities.

#### UNITED STATES CAVALRY FIGHTS WITH MEXICANS

RUNNING FIGHT ON BORDER BETWEEN MEXICO AND TEXAS—FOUR MEXICANS WERE KILLED—NO LOSSES FOR AMERICANS.

El Paso, Texas, March 3.—In a running fight on the border near Douglas, Arizona, early yesterday between Mexican soldiers and troopers of the ninth United States Cavalry four Mexicans were killed. None of the Americans were either killed or wounded, according to advices received here.

#### POLICE AND BANDIT FIGHT ON VANCOUVER STREETS

REVOLVER FIGHT EXTENDED OVER THREE BLOCKS AND MORE THAN THIRTY SHOTS WERE FIRED—BANDIT WAS CAPTURED.

(Special to The Daily News.) Vancouver, March 3.—Following a revolver battle which extended along three city blocks and culminated in the rear of an unoccupied shack when the bullet in the mauser used by the bandit became jammed, an Italian whom the authorities believe to be the travelling Captain of the cadent black hand society was arrested at 3:30 yesterday morning by Sergeant Hood and police Constables Knox and Cameron. More than thirty shots were exchanged by the robber and police officers and although no wounds were received, doubtless due to the intense darkness then prevailing, four holes were found in the prisoner's coat.

#### HANDSOME EDIFICE TO BE ERECTED FOR BAPTISTS

CONTRACTS HAVE BEEN SIGNED FOR CONSTRUCTION OF A \$6500 BUILDING AT THE CORNER OF YOUNG ST. AND FIFTH AVENUE.

That the year 1913 is going to be an auspicious one for Prince Rupert, there can be no denying. This is apparent on every side. In nothing will this be more noticeable than in the erection of public buildings. The year 1913 being that one, which is confidently expected to be the last, before the completion of the G. T. P., the latest great trans-continental railroad, is evidently regarded by public bodies and citizens generally as an opportune and fitting time to get ready for the great honors that will then be heaped upon us.

As was announced in the columns of the Daily News on Saturday last the plans have all been prepared and the contract let, for the immediate erection of a handsome edifice for the members of the Baptist denomination in Prince Rupert. Up to the present that body have no regular place of worship, their services being held in the McIntyre Hall on 3rd Avenue. Being fortunate enough to secure two excellent lots, on 5th Avenue close to the hospital, some little while back, for what seems today the absurdly low figure of \$4500, it is the intention of the management of the Church to erect there in the immediate future a handsome and substantial building that will serve the purpose of both a house of worship, Sunday school, and Brotherhood quarters, for the next few years, until the natural expansion of the city warrants a larger and more ambitious edifice. The exact location of the lots is, lots 13 and 14 Block 3, Section 6, at the corner of Young Street and 5th Avenue. The plans for the building which have been prepared by Mr. H. W. Rogers, architect of Vancouver, who is a son of our worthy townsman, Mr. J. H. Rogers, the manager of the Church, are most complete. Occupying a ground space approximately fifty feet square, excavation will be made for a basement and furnace room, and foundations of a solid and substantial character laid down. The main entrance to the building on the ground floor will be from Young Street. Here passing up concrete steps a large and spacious vestibule will be entered, with the pastor's study to the right, and hat and cloak rooms to the left. From the lobby or vestibule, one next enters, the large and airy quarters of the Brotherhood room, off from which will be found the primary and other class rooms, lavatories, wash rooms, etc., together with an up-to-date and fully equipped modern kitchen. In connection with the Brotherhood room it should be mentioned that lockers and shower bath room, are provided for the youthful athletes, members of the congregation. Coming to the second floor by a handsome staircase the Church proper or House of Worship will be reached. This is calculated to seat 250 persons, and the erection of a gallery if required later would bring the seating capacity up to nearly 400. Arrangements of pulpit, choir and baptistry have been most carefully thought out, especially in regard to the latter which is such a prominent feature in the tenets of the Baptist denomination. The whole scheme or plan of the structure has been devised, with the idea, of eventually, when the time becomes ripe, building a permanent church as an addition to the present proposed building, when the latter can be used for the several offices such as school and guild rooms and the manifold uses to which a Church House can be put. Messrs. Mitchell and Currie the building contractors who have secured the contract are a wellknown local firm, who have already given evidences of their skill and ability in the erection of many of the principal family residences in the city, amongst which may be numbered the homes of Mr. Frank Mobley and Assistant Superintendent G. A. McNieloh of the G. T. P. The total cost of the building contemplated will be about \$8000, including excavating and heating plant.

DYNAMITE AND POWDER WRECK A SMALL STORE

QUEBEC IS KEEN ON SERIES WITH COAST

Willing to Forego Right of Play-in on Home Ice to Get Crack at the West.

Ottawa, Feb. 28.—The Quebec Hockey Club having cinched the championship of the National Association, is now keen on having a series of games with the Victoria team, champions of the Pacific Coast League for the Stanley Cup and world's title. Manager Mike Quinn, of the champions, announces that the Victoria team need have no fear of a civil action against Goldie Producers in the event of their coming east. In fact he says that Producers will not be molested should he re-enter the province of Quebec with Lester Patrick's club, because they have decided to drop their action for damages, arising out of the alleged breach of contract. They will probably take similar action in connection with the suits against Jack McDonald and Eddie Oatman.

The Quebec club has got in touch with the trustees with a view to the effect that they will play only at Quebec, but the members of the board believe that the prospects of large gate receipts and a great series might induce the cup holders to change their opinion and consent to the transfer of the games to Toronto. They are sure of at least one series for the silverware as the New Glasgow club has cinched the championship of the Maritime Leagues and will play the Quebec club at the ancient capital.

Washington, March 1.—The Supreme Court today deprived the Northern Pacific Railroad and many settlers occupying it, of their title to 293,000 acres of land adjoining the Yakima Indian reservation in the State of Washington when it sustained the decision of the Ninth Circuit Court of Appeals in cancelling the railroad's patents and awarding the land to the government.

LONDON'S OPIUM DENS ATTRACTIVE

Chinese Conduct Palatial Resorts for Use of Aristocratic Patrons. London, March 1.—Opium smoking is becoming so popular in London that several of the dens in the Whitechapel district are said to be catering exclusively to aristocratic patrons of the pipe. Two of these were visited lately by an investigator, who found them furnished in the most luxurious manner. The victims of the habit can indulge their dreams in surroundings which should appeal to the most fastidious devotees of the drug. Shortly after dark the patrons began to arrive, stealing in furtively after leaving their motor cars and carriages some distance away. A nearby tradesman declares that in the daytime no one approaches the places, which do not encourage visits at such times because of the danger of police interference. Both of these palatial dens are run by Chinese. Low divans stand on carpets so thick and soft that no sounds of footsteps can be heard; soft silken cushions are placed for head rests, and rich curtains hang over the doorways. No smoker need move from his couch, as numerous attendants, moving at the motion of a hand, cook the opium and prepare the pipe for each customer. According to the investigation the patrons of the place are business, young men about town, and even members of noble families. Some of the visitors are merely looking for a new sensation, but most of them are hopeless victims of the habit. It is said that the dens are enormously profitable, for each smoker pays from \$7 to \$25 nightly for his entertainment.

(Continued from Page 1.) his life's work in, and in which he performed such an immeasurable and undying work for both modern civilization as well the Christian religion by carrying the word of Christ to the hordes of human beings of the black race that swarm in such thousands in the interior of the African continent. This latter was the guiding spirit and motive power of course of this great and unselfish man's life. Nevertheless in going into Central Africa close on to a century ago, Livingstone performed with his wonderful personality the greatest work that has ever been accomplished in the matter of modern civilization. His dramatic and fitting end, found kneeling in prayer at his little cot in his tent by his faithful and devoted native converts, together with the great funeral ceremony accorded him by the British nation when the last mortal remains were interred in Westminster Abbey amongst the great men of England, brought the reverend gentlemen's interesting and enthralling sermon to a close.
