In his sermon last night on the social e vil. Rev. Mr. Kerr created an unusual flutter of excitement among the congregation by his distasteful reference to a certain individual who, he said, had created a heinous sin and who was sitting at that very moment in the congregation. No doubt the reverened gentleman thought he was adopting the strongest and best method of accomplishing a certain object, but it is not likely to meet with the approval of most of those who were present. It is at least difficult to understand why such personal references were necessary or what good will result. The church is understood generally to stretch forth a welcoming hand to sinners, but when sinners find that they are to be made the object of a personal attack when they attend divine service it will not be long before they will give the churches a wide berth. 




