It was decided at last evening's meeting of the city council to call for tenders for station gangs to do the work of back filling on the city water pipe line. The report of the board of works favoring this course was brought in and Alderman McCaffery moved its adoption. An amendment was moved by Alderman Bullock-Webster that the city engineer fix the price for doing the work and then award it to local men. In support of his amendment Alderman Maitland stated that this was not really station work. The system

#### COUNCIL ACCEPTS OFFER FOR CITY DEBENTURES

Offer of 97 Cents from Toledo Firm of Bankers Was Accepted Last Night.

Last evening at the meeting of the city council the finance committee reported in favor of accepting the offer of Messrs. Perry, Bingham and Slater of Toledo, Ohio, private bankers, to purchase certain city debentures. There are two sets of these debentures, one for \$19,500 and the other for \$70,994.66. They are both local improvement debentures extending over a period of four years, bearing interest at the rate of 6 per cent. The price offered for the debentures was 97 cents, and accrued interest from the date of the last unexpired coupons to date of delivery. The report was adopted without discussion, the acting mayor remarking that the sale of these debentures was not the same as selling treasury certificates, being an outright transaction, obviating the necessity of later on having to seek a fresh market for them.

#### ISOLATION HOSPITAL IS RECOMMENDED

Estimated Cost Is Less Than One Thousand Dollars—Council Adopts Recommendation.

A report of the city medical officer was read at last evening's meeting of the city council recommending that a temporary isolation hospital building be erected on Lot 14 of the hospital block. The estimated cost is to be \$980, the building to contain three or four rooms for the taking care of patients suffering from measles, scarlet fever or diphtheria. The report was adopted. The hospital board is to be asked for permission to erect the building in question and if granted the work will be immediately proceeded with.

#### TERRACE RESIDENCE BURNED LOSS IS OVER \$1,600.00

RESIDENCE OF JOHN KIRKCALDY WAS TOTALLY DESTROYED BY FIRE LAST NIGHT—NOTHING WAS SAVED

(Special to The Daily News.) Terrace, March 11.—The residence of Mr. John Kirkaldy was totally destroyed by fire last night, the loss being estimated at \$1,600. The fire originated from a defective stovepipe and was first noticed about 9 o'clock by Mrs. Kirkaldy, who was alone at the time. As the house is a considerable distance from town, everything was hopelessly aflame before assistance arrived. Practically all the household effects, wearing apparel and a considerable amount of money were destroyed, leaving the family with nothing but the clothes they wore at the time.

This is the second occasion that Mr. Kirkaldy has been the victim of fire since coming to Canada and much sympathy is felt for him. Mr. T. H. Scott has extended hospitality to the homeless family.

Mr. George Little, who owned the building, intends rebuilding at once. Mr. Kirkaldy, who is well known in Prince Rupert, having officiated with the bagpipes at a number of Scottish celebrations here.

### IMPROVED SUMMER SERVICE BY GRAND TRUNK PACIFIC BOATS

#### Prince Albert and Prince John Will Alternate on Weekly Trips From South Via Skidegate to Prince Rupert, Thence to Port Simpson and Masset

The new summer schedule of the Grand Trunk Pacific coast service has just been announced, some very important changes in the service having been made. The new schedule is effective from Seattle March 30th. Starting on that date the two big steamers, Prince Rupert and Prince George, will each make their weekly trips from Seattle via Victoria and Vancouver to Prince Rupert, arriving here on Wednesdays and Saturdays at 9 a. m., the same as last summer. Stewart and Granby will each have a weekly service from Prince Rupert. The steamer Prince Rupert will leave here at 8 a. m. on Thursday for Stewart, and the Prince George at 8 a. m. Sunday for Granby. Returning the steamers will leave Stewart at 8

p. m. Thursday and Granby at 8 p. m. Sunday. The steamers Prince John and Prince Albert will alternate on weekly trips from Victoria and Vancouver, calling at way ports, via Skidegate and Porcher Island to Prince Rupert, arriving at Skidegate on Tuesday morning and Prince Rupert Tuesday afternoon. The various ports of call will be Alert Bay, Hardy Bay, Rivers Inlet, Namu, Ocean Falls, Ikeda, Jedway, Loekeport, Paeofi, Cumshewo (every other week) Skidegate and Porcher Island. After the arrival of the large steamer from the south on Wednesday, the John or the Albert will leave at 8 p. m. for Port Simpson, Masset and Naden Harbor, returning from these points in time to connect with the Fri-

day morning steamer southbound from Prince Rupert. Continuing their trips the Albert or the John will leave here at 8 p. m. Saturday southbound via Porcher Island, Skidegate and points mentioned in northbound trip with Union Bay added, arriving at Vancouver Wednesday afternoon and Victoria Thursday morning. According to the schedule the John and the Albert take two weeks to make their round trip, thus giving way ports a weekly service both north and south. Skidegate will in reality have a twice-a-week service southbound either direct on the John or Albert Sunday morning or leaving there Tuesday morning to connect with the southbound steamer from here on Friday morning.

#### PROMINENT ENGINEER IN THE CITY TODAY

Mr. R. H. Thompson, the well known consulting civil engineer, arrived from Seattle this morning on the Venture. #### CITY MUST BEAR SEVENTY PER CENT.

Plank Walk Will Be Constructed on Young St. Between 4th and 5th Avenues.

The small matter of the building of a four foot plank walk on Young street between Fourth and Fifth avenues was finally settled last evening by the city council after having been before two previous councils as stated by Acting Mayor Naden. Under a new act just passed at Victoria a city must itself bear 70 per cent. of the expense of work of this character, which up to the present time has always been borne by the private property owners. The cost of the work will be about \$100, repayable in one year.

#### JOHNSON-FLYNN FIGHT PICTURES

Special Feature Film of This Fight to Be Shown at the Majestic Theatre.

Fight fans are to be given another treat in the near future. A special feature film, said to be one of the clearest pictures ever taken, of the Johnson-Flynn fight, which took place last August at Las Vegas, New Mexico, is to be shown at the Majestic Theatre on Wednesday and Thursday evening of this week. This fight, which was a tough one as long as it lasted, being stopped in the ninth round by the Mexican Rangers, was probably the hardest nut that the colored heavyweight champion ever had to crack. #### GOVERNMENT GRANT IS ACKNOWLEDGED

Council Extends Thanks to Local Representative for His Zeal in Securing Grant.

Contrary to expectation, last evening's meeting of the city council proved anything but tame, despite the fact that Mayor Pattullo was absent from its deliberations. Considerable business was disposed of in the expeditious manner that has marked the 1913 regime of the city fathers of Prince Rupert. As had been decided upon at the special meeting of the council, held on Saturday afternoon, Alderman Naden filled the position of acting mayor during Mr. Pattullo's absence. A letter of thanks was received from the Prince Rupert General Hospital for the generous grant by the city council of \$10,000 toward the expenses of the current year.

Mr. William Manson, M. P. P., wrote the council that the sum of \$35,000 appeared amongst the estimates as set aside toward the cost of the Section 2 bridge. It was qualified by the statement that the money was granted on the understanding that the cost of the bridge would not exceed \$100,000 and that the work would be carried out under the supervision of the provincial government engineer. The government's contribution is the 35 per cent. agreed upon as their share of the cost of the proposed bridge. A vote of thanks was accorded Mr. Manson for his energy and zeal in the city's behalf in obtaining the grant.

#### Morse Creek Bridge.

A report of the board of works was handed in last evening to the effect that it recommended the immediate construction of a temporary bridge over Morse Creek, the estimated cost of which would be \$2,870. The report was adopted and left with the board of works with power to act.

#### Weigh Scales Bylaw.

Alderman McCaffery introduced a bylaw at last evening's meeting of the city council to amend the city weigh scales bylaw. Its first reading was set for Monday evening next.

#### FIVE THOUSAND DOLLARS LOSS FROM FROZEN PIPES

Ald. Bullock-Webster Wanted to Probe the Matter to the Bottom.

The city has suffered a loss of \$5,000 through the freezing and bursting of certain water pipes on Sixth avenue during the winter. The cause of this was through the newly laid mains, not being covered up and the fault lay with last year's council if with anyone. This was the substance of a report brought in by the Board of Works at last evening's meeting of the city council.

Alderman Bullock-Webster was exceedingly anxious to have the matter cleared up so as to know who was to blame and thought a small committee might be appointed to investigate. Aldermen Kerr and Maitland, members of last year's council, arose in their might and declared that they were prepared to stand for any blame in the matter that was justifiable but could not see that any was coming to them.

Alderman Sutherland, in a businesslike and sensible fashion, remarked that he did not see how any good could be effected by raking up the matter, which, though obviously a mistake, was past and done with, and moved the adoption of the report, which was that the loss of pipe amounted to \$3,370, expense of taking it up and putting new pipe in its place, \$2,700; rebate upon sale of broken pipe for scrap iron, \$790; making a total loss to the city of a little over \$5,000.

#### Health Officer's Report.

Dr. Cade, city medical health officer, presented his report for the month of February at last evening's meeting of the city council. There were ten births, five boys and five girls; two deaths and four cases of infectious diseases. The general health of the city was excellent.

**CANADA AND THE ORIENT.**

Two items of current interest should be considered jointly: one in the light of the other. The first is that China will soon become an enormous market for domestic and industrial equipment of all kinds. When her present political problems have been solved and peace prevails, it will be found that her demands from other countries will be enormous. We are told that, for one thing, the standard of living is and will continue improving; for another, machinery and raw materials will be required for her industrial expansion. The second fact relates to Japan. That country is fast equipping herself to take care of the Chinese market. Already the demand for flour and for paper from other nations is lessening. She is gradually becoming self-contained. When this day comes she will have a peculiarly good standing in the markets of China and Korea, and we may look to see her dominating or seeking to dominate them to her own ends. Now take a third consideration: suppose British Columbia should become a great exporting province, suppose she should develop great industries—as in reason she must some day—she must then be deeply interested in that great Chinese market and the other markets which Japan will be interested in. What chance will British Columbia have to gain and hold privileges in those markets unless diplomatists of today begin to watch and guide affairs in the Pacific with regard to this inevitable position of British Columbia? Suppose forty years hence British Columbia required—merely for peaceful demonstration, of course—a fleet to back up Canadian claims in Chinese or other markets, would the fleet in the North Sea be of much service? Suppose British Columbia's interests and the interests of, say, the Lancashire

manufacturer in Oriental diplomatic affairs were not identical, or should happen to be inimical, how is one Imperial diplomatic corps going to serve two masters? Whose interests will be sacrificed, Canada's British Columbia interests or the Lancashire manufacturer's?—Canadian Collier's.

**DARROW JURY FAILS TO REACH VERDICT**

Dismissed by Judge—Date for New Trial Fixed.

Los Angeles, Cal., March 8.—After having been out for thirty-eight and one-half hours, the jury in the case of Clarence S. Darrow, on trial for alleged jury bribery, reported at 11:35 o'clock this forenoon that they were unable to agree, and Judge Conley discharged them. Former Judge O. W. Powers, counsel for the defence asked for an immediate retrial. After further parley Judge Conley, on his own motion, fixed March 31 as the date for a new trial, which will be the third on charges almost identical. Darrow thanked the court and added: "I'll fight it out; I should have been acquitted on the evidence, and I shall surely fare better next time." The jury, it was learned, stood eight for conviction and four for acquittal. The jury first reported at 10:13 that they were unable to reach an agreement, standing 11 to 1. The judge gave them instructions on points of law and sent them back. The final report of a disagreement came a little more than an hour later.

**RAILWAY MEN MAKE TRIP HAZELTON TO FORT GEORGE**

CONSTRUCTION WORK BEYOND BURNS LAKE IS LIGHT—STEAM SHOVEL AT WORK NEAR FRASER LAKE.

Supt. J. C. Sheppard and D. A. Rankin arrived in town on Tuesday night, after a trip to Fort George in company with J. W. Stewart and John L. Retallick. These four railroad men made the first trip from New Hazelton to Fort George, driving the entire distance, that has ever been made. The distance is three hundred miles and they made it in just six days. Mr. Rankin and Mr. Retallick arrived first and the other two were immediately behind them. An average of 50 miles a day is some travelling with a team, but the distance was covered in spite of a runaway which occurred the second day out. The weather was fine all the time and the sleighing was the best. Two or three days were a little cold but no one suffered any discomfort. Mr. Stewart was particularly interested in the work being done along the grade, as this was his first trip over the country lying between the east and the west ends of the contract. On the other side of Burns Lake there is not much work being done and there will not be a great

many men employed until the rails are extended at least a hundred miles beyond this town. For the most part the work beyond Burns Lake is light and will be finished as soon as the heavy rock work and the big fills at Burns Lake. Just this side of Fort Fraser John Bostrom has a camp and he now has his steam shovel working there. The rest of the contractors will get busy in the summer after navigation opens and the rails carry the supplies up to the summit or beyond. Speaking of Fort George, Mr. Rankin stated that there was already a good sized town there and everything was looking fine. Business was good in all lines and there was a great country around which he believed would make a fine town. Mr. Stewart and Mr. Retallick continued their drive through to Tete Jaune Cache, at which point they met the train which took them on to Edmonton. This was the first time that Mr. Stewart had covered the entire country lying between the contracts which his firm have on the Grand Trunk Pacific.

**WANTS ALASKANS IN ALASKAN JOBS**

Territorial Senate Appeals to President Wilson—Adopt Railroad Memorial

Juneau, Alaska, March 8.—The first territorial legislature held only a short session today.

Senator Millard introduced resolutions 1 and 2. The first requests President Woodrow Wilson to make the construction of railroads and the development of Alaska conform to the recommendations in the report of the Alaska railroad commission. The second resolution asks that all the president's appointees for Alaska posts be bona fide Alaska citizens. Both were passed unanimously, and the Senate adjourned.

The only business transacted by the House of Representatives was the appointment of the usual parliamentary committees.

**New Railway Town.**

Wm. Lynch arrived in town on Tuesday afternoon, after a very successful trip to Decker Lake, and also to the various points intervening. While in Telkwa he heard a great deal of talk about the location of the new railway town, and says that it is generally stated that the divisional point will be eight miles this side of Telkwa, or just the other side of what is known as Chicken Lake. The railway company's townsite boosters have bought up all the land within miles of the proposed site.—Omineca Herald.

HANGED HIMSELF WHILE ASLEEP

Strange Suicide of a Somnambulist in England

London, March 8.—A fine muscular young fellow, 'fond of life,' as his grieving mother describes him, committed suicide in his sleep. The remarkable case has been reported from Doncaster. The lad's name was Thrustle. He was 18 years old, more than six feet tall, and had been jolly and vivacious. But he was a somnambulist. Alone in his bedroom, perhaps tortured by some terrifying dream, he arose in his sleep and hanged himself to the bedrail, making a noose of his necktie.

Perhaps he awoke too late to release himself from the twisted cloth that choked off his life. If he struggled, his mother, sleeping nearby, was not awakened. When she went to arouse him in the morning she found him dead. She told the authorities that one night, in his sleep, her son carried all the furniture from the bedroom into the garden. When she awoke him he was amazed to find what he had done.

Medical evidence at the inquest showed that a sleeper may unknowingly to himself commit a crime against another than himself. The case was cited of a lifelong somnambulist in Washington, D.C. One night in 1908 he dreamed a burglar was in his room. He arose in his sleep, got his pistol and shot and instantly killed his wife as she lay asleep in bed. When awakened he knew absolutely nothing of what he had done.

INCREASES PAY OF HIS WORK GIRLS

Chicago Merchant Acts Quickly Following Vice Commission Hearing.

Chicago, March 10.—The work of the Illinois Senate vice commission bore fruit today when a letter was received by Chairman Barratt O'Hara from E. F. Mandel, president of Mandel Brothers, who was a witness yesterday, stating that he had raised the minimum wage of juveniles to \$4 a week. The juveniles are girls between the ages of thirteen and fifteen years who are employed on small errands. Wherever possible, by reason of the girl's or general fitness of the girl, the wage will be over four dollars. In addition Mandel stated that following a suggestion of the commission he will employ an investigator to look into the statements made by applicants to ascertain if they can live on the wages they are to receive.

Edward Hillman, of Hillman's, a big department store, was a jovial and frank witness of the forenoon, who greeted the proposition of an investigator with enthusiasm and promised to hire one or more at once.

BENNETT MAY GET CABINET POSITION

Dr. Roche Not Likely to Return to Active Politics.

Rochester, Minn., March 8.—Dr. M. J. Roche, minister of the interior was operated on at Mayo's Hospital today for gall stones. Miss Roche, his daughter, is with the patient. While no fears are expressed for his ultimate recovery, it is said he may never return to his post in the cabinet.

WORK COMPLETED ON LOWER RIVER

Bates and Rogers are Now Working on Contracts East of Hazelton

Messrs. Bates and Rogers, contractors for the concreting of all the tunnels on this end of the G.T.P., have completed their work on the lower river and are now moving their plants and men to the Duncan Ross contract, just east of New Hazelton. In the six miles of that work there are three tunnels; the long tunnel, which is the longest on the entire line, and two others. These are through gumbo, and will require a big force of men for several months or even a year to complete. The work will be slow on account of having to take out all the timbers at the rate of two or three at a time.

AUSTRALIANS DON'T LIKE COAST RUGBY

Team Which Played in California Much Peevish Over Treatment on Tour

San Francisco, March 8.—Australians do not seem to care for the way rugby football is played on the Pacific coast. Extracts have been received here of a report made by Dr. Otto Bohrsman, manager of the Australian Waratah team, covering the team's tour of the coast.

"Rules regarding the replacing of players are entirely ignored," the report says. "The contestants are so imbued with the fact that their side must win that they prepare most assiduously. Training with them is a religion. It has been stated on reliable authority that the record number which has represented one side in a match is ninety-one; that is, over six different teams have participated as one combination.

"This irregular substitution caused much embarrassment to us. In one game we were beaten by one point, the opposing half-back and wing three quarters were replaced within twenty minutes of 'no side,' after other substitutes had been furnished at half time. Naturally, the well-trained, fresh players at such a critical period turned the scale in favor of the home team."

VENEZUELO TOO BUSY FOR A REVOLUTION

Country Booming and Castro Has No Followers, Returning Traveller Asserts.

New York, March 8.—Lemuel C. Butler, president of the Caribbean Coal Company, Wall street, back from Venezuela, said that there was no foundation for the statements published in the New York newspapers that Castro was organizing a revolution to overthrow the Gomez government.

"Venezuela is developing an era of prosperity," said Mr. Butler, "and the people are all making money. They are too busy to waste time on a revolution which would disturb the present peace and prosperity of the land. Castro no longer figures in Venezuelan politics and in the time I was in Caracas I never heard his name mentioned. The revolutions of the South American republics are magnified in newspapers. I witnessed three of the so-called revolutions in Venezuela sixteen and twenty years ago and they did not make as much trouble rolled into one as the strike in Lawrence, Mass., did.

"Caracas is quiet and business is booming. The people have got a good government and are satisfied. I speak Spanish fluently and I made it my business to visit the hotels, cafes and clubs before departing to see if there was any truth in the reports in the New York newspapers.

"I did not hear any allusion to expected trouble in any way. The Gomez government will be changed in another year, and I believe it will be succeeded by an administration that will carry out the plans for developing the commerce and prosperity of the country inaugurated by the present regime.

P. Burns and Co. have shipped in the last carload of beef which will come to Mission Point, unless the policy of the company is changed. In future, all the beef will be shipped to Porphyry Creek alive and driven from there on to the different camps. This will continue until summer when the cattle can be driven overland from the south. The local supply will have to come from Prince Rupert or Vancouver.—Omineca Herald.

**COAST DEFENCE GUNS OUT OF COMMISSION**  
**Foundations Cracked by Dynamite Explosion at Baltimore.**

Baltimore, Md., March 10.—The explosion of dynamite in Baltimore harbor yesterday which caused the death of forty or fifty men and the injury of as many others, seriously crippled the coast defences of the harbor, it was learned. In many instances the concrete foundations of the heavy guns themselves were damaged by falling pieces of steel from the wrecked steamer. At Fort Armistead the damage will reach several thousand dollars and at Fort Carroll \$2,500.

Investigations of the explosion will be under way today. The coroner will impanel a jury to investigate the cause at once. The navy department at Washington, apprised of the serious damage to the collier Jason, about to be accepted by the department, will enquire into the disaster, and at the same time it is probable an investigation will be undertaken by the interstate commerce commission which has jurisdiction over the shipment of explosives in American waters. Because most of the crew of the destroyed steamer Alum Chine were subjects of Great Britain, the British consul at Baltimore, Gilbert Fraser, also will investigate. Authorities, however, say the real cause of the disaster never will be definitely learned because those who could give first hand information are dead.

Early reports of the extent of the loss of life aboard the destroyed steamer and the other vessels lying in her immediate vicinity materially differed. It is accepted, however, that the list will total between forty and fifty dead and almost as many more who were either dangerously or seriously injured. The financial loss was about \$250,000. In all the Catholic churches tomorrow prayers will be offered for the repose of the souls of those killed in the disaster and the recovery of the injured.

**BORDEN ST. SCHOOL TO COST \$20,000**  
**School Board Will Ask Council to Put Through Bylaw for That Amount.**

At a meeting of the school board, held yesterday afternoon, the matter of a new school building to be erected on Borden street was taken up. It was decided to request the city council to submit a bylaw at the earliest possible opportunity for the building of a school on the site that had been assured them. A six roomed frame building, to cost approximately \$20,000, was figured on as necessary to do service for the next ten years. If the board are successful in getting the council to put the bylaw through, they expect to have the school ready for occupation by the beginning of the fall term.

Messrs. C. V. Bennett, H. Douglas and Alderman Kerr have been appointed by the hospital directors as a committee to attend at once to the clearing away of the unsightly refuse in front of the hospital and the making of a lawn there.

**THEY HAVE NOTHING ON PRINCE RUPERT**  
**Scenes Shown in Moving Pictures Can Be Overshadowed in Prince Rupert.**

While Prince Rupert is still a young city, it has many big undertakings and many things are done here on a scale sufficiently large to interest the whole world. This fact was rather forcefully impressed upon those who attended the moving picture show at the Westholme Theatre last night. One of the pictures included in the program showed a big blast in which tons of rock were crumbled to pieces. While this picture would indeed be a revelation to people in most places it fell rather flat on a Prince Rupert gathering. Several blasts that have been put off in this city made it appear most insignificant by comparison. The moving picture people would do well to come to Prince Rupert if they want something really worth while in that line.

**URGED FIRING ON AMERICAN MARINES**  
**Huerta May Publish Orders of Madero Inciting Against Americans.**

Mexico City, March 10.—It was announced today that Provisional President Huerta is considering the advisability of making public the official correspondence of of the closing days of the Madero administration, with the object of showing that the late president made strenuous efforts to incite anti-American sentiment through out the republic.

Among the alleged orders given by Madero during the last week of his rule is one which directs the officers of the Mexican gunboats lying in the port of Vera Cruz to fire immediately on the American marines, if an attempt were made to land forces from the United States war vessels, "paying no regard to the expressed purpose of the American naval commanders merely to protect foreigners."

The government may also publish the orders given by Francisco Madero to General Huerta, then commander of the federal forces. These orders are said to include instructions to dynamite all the public and private buildings between the capital and the arsenal.

Three columns of the regular army and 2,000 adherents of Pascual Orozco are closing in on Venustiano Carranza, according to official despatches today.

The reported arrival of Alfonso Madero at Washington, where it is said the details of the former Madero conspiracy were developed, has been called to the attention of the Mexican cabinet. It is said that the Washington government will be asked to exercise extraordinary precautions in order to prevent professional revolution makers in the United States from participating in the plans of the fugitives who are declared to be anxious for revenge.
