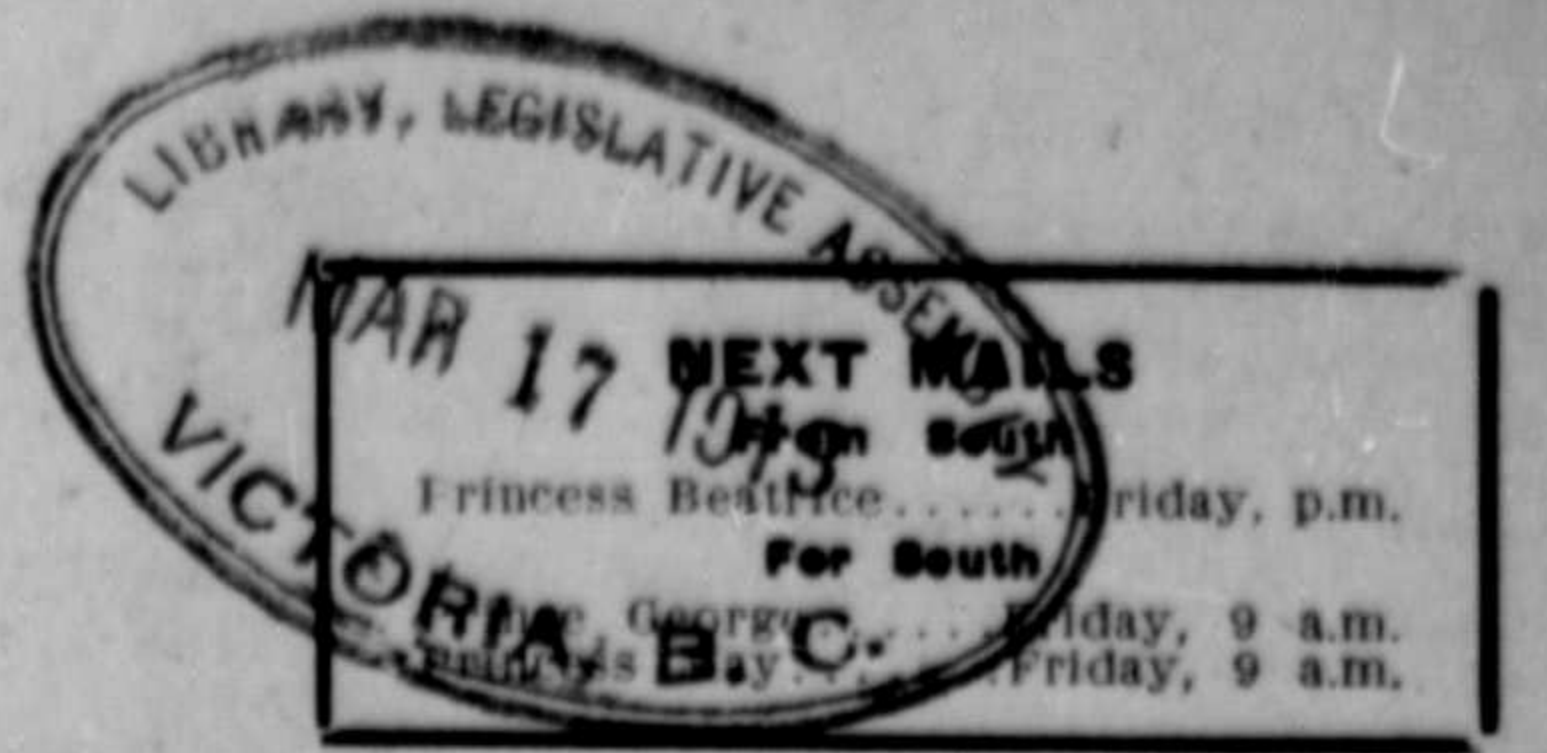

RICHER THAN THE KLONDIKE IS THE REPORT FROM ATLIN

SEATTLE DESPATCH ANNOUNCES THAT THERE IS A LARGE UNSTAKED AREA IN THE ATLIN ELDERADO—SIX DOLLARS TO THE PAN.

Seattle, March 12.—Gold runs \$6 to the pan and a large area of unstacked ground on one of the creeks in the new Eldorado reported by Skookum Jim, of the Klondike fame, was the gist of a telegram received yesterday by J. J. Glover, a United States secret service operative of this city, from his partner in Atlin, C. J. Glover, grubstaked this area, who has been working all winter. It is the first news from one who had done more than superficial prospecting. The telegram says that there are only claims now staked on the creek referred to, and while it is the locality of the strike reported by Skookum Jim, it is evidently not one of the creeks he has staked, but another rich one nearby. Skookum reported forty claims and two white men on the creek discovered by him.

Others in the District.
Moleneux, superintendent of road construction in the Atlin district, who was in the city a few days ago, told of four hundred claims in that district have been recorded in Atlin. Sam Frey, of Woodchopper Creek, in Circle City, who is wintering at the Frye, has word from Guy Sharkey, an old partner of his who stamped into the new claims from Atlin last fall and returned on Kelly Creek. Sharkey had \$39 on the stamped, returned to Atlin to record and tried back to his claim. He tried to Harvey, at Circle City, but he had struck it rich and to the in. Harvey's partner, Jack Frey, received the letter and sent word to his brother, Charley Boyle, at Fairbanks. The latter immediately outfitted and started for the new diggings by dog team. This tends to confirm the story told by a miner at the Northern a few days ago to the effect that a number of men had stamped clear from Circle City to the new Atlin strike during the winter.

WIRELESS MESSAGE TELLS OF BAD STORMS

Person Reports Antarctic Climate Veritable Frozen Horror.

Melbourne, March 12.—According to a message received from the Mawson Antarctic expedition, the climate near the South Pole is the severest of any place on earth.
Dr. Percy Hunt, government geologist, received a wireless message from Dr. Mawson, in which he graphically describes the rigors of the Antarctic climate, and considers the weather here more than any ever experienced. BRYAN INVESTIGATING MEXICAN SITUATION

"The secretary of state has not had time to make any thorough investigation of Mexican affairs, and the department consequently has absolutely no comment to make today on any phase of that situation."

LIPTON'S CHALLENGE IS TURNED DOWN

New York Yacht Club Declines to Accept Sir Thos. Lipton's Challenge

(Special to The Daily News.)
New York, March 12.—The New York Yacht club tonight declined to accept Sir Thomas Lipton's challenge for a race next year for the America cup. The principal objection was to the limitation to 75 feet on the water line.

The deed of gift provides that the challenger, if a sloop, may be anywhere from 65 to 90 feet on the water line. The challenger can elect to sail on any water line length within the designated limits of 65 and 90 feet. The defender has the same right and the larger craft incurs a penalty of time allowance. By the deed of gift, Sir Thomas can challenge with a 65 foot boat if he desires and the New York Yacht club can meet him off Sandy Hook with a 90 footer, though, of course, the defender would be compelled to give a heavy time allowance.

SLIGHT MISTAKE IN FIGURES OF CENSUS

Canada Had 1,805 More Than Given Out Officially After Compilation.

Ottawa, March 12.—A census bulletin issued by the chief census commissioner makes a correction in the total population of the Dominion and deals with the religions of Canada as enumerated when the census was taken. The bulletin states that a correction for the city of Quebec and reports received from posts of the Hudson's Bay Company in the interior of the Northwest Territories since the publication of volume 1 make the total population of Canada 7,206,643 instead of 7,204,838.

The province of Quebec should read 2,003,232 instead of 2,002,724, and the Northwest Territories 18,481 instead of 17,196.

The religions of the people as given in this bulletin are for the corrected population of 7,206,643. The specific religions are seventy-nine in number in 1911, for a population of 7,173,513, as compared with fifty-seven in 1901 for a population of 5,237,224. The number of persons without specified religion in 1911 was 32,490, as compared with 43,222 in 1901, counting in each case those who are specified as of "no religion."

DARROW MAY NOT BE TRIED AGAIN

Not Unlikely that Prosecution Will Dismiss the Indictment Against Great Labor Lawyer

Los Angeles, March 12.—Whether a second trial of Clarence Darrow on a bribery charge will proceed March 31, the day set by Judge Conley, remains an open question today, the final decision resting with District Attorney Fredericks.

"I haven't decided whether I shall go ahead with the case or move for the dismissal of the indictment," Fredericks said, "and I won't think about it for some time."
Commenting on his statement that Darrow's admission on the stand that he gave Detective Guy Biddinger \$700 for information regarding alleged spies in union labor ranks constitutes sufficient evidence for his disbarment by the Bar Association, Fredericks said:
"Members of the grievance committee of the Bar Association have come to me asking for information, and my opinion relative to filing charges against Darrow. I know such procedure is being considered."

GRANBY MAN IS MOST OPTIMISTIC

Says Large Force of Men Will Be Employed This Summer—Diamond Drill Showing Good Ore.

Mr. F. B. Richardson, who is a large stockholder in the Granby Bay Mining, Smelting and Development Co., Ltd., will leave for Princeton, Ill., on the Prince George tomorrow, having received news recently of the death of his father necessitating his immediate return to the United States.

Mr. Richardson is most enthusiastic as to the future of the mining industry at Granby Bay. The company is employing 400 men at the present time, who are distributed over the mining operations at the Hidden Creek camp, the clearing of the townsite and the work connected with the concrete foundations for the smelter and the railway from the wharf to the mine. Together with this work there is also being constructed the Falls Creek dam, which will back up sufficient water for smelting and mining, as well as operating the railway. Mr. Richardson further states that the diamond drill at work on the Bonanza group, three miles from Hidden Creek, has shown a very satisfactory amount of ore of good quality. In conversation with the Daily News Mr. Richardson stated that he will return to Northern B. C. at the earliest possible opportunity and is confident that he will be instrumental in diverting considerable American capital in this direction.

FORMAL MEETING OF LICENSE BOARD

Ald. Bullock-Webster, Absorbed in Agricultural Society Affairs, Missed the Meeting.

The meeting of the license commissioners, held yesterday afternoon, was of a purely formal character, there being no business of any importance to transact. Acting Mayor Naden and Mr. Peter McLachlan gathered together in the council chamber awaiting the arrival of the third member of the commission, Alderman Bullock-Webster, who, unconscious that his conferees were waiting for him, was placidly talking over the affairs of the Prince Rupert Agricultural and Industrial Association with another leading citizen on the floor below. However, as there was nothing of any moment to deliberate upon, the worthy Alderman, upon hearing that the meeting had met and adjourned, smiled benignly and gathered up his impedimenta connected with the affairs of the agricultural society and proceeded on his way rejoicing.

TENNIS COURTS ON ACROPOLIS HILL

Endeavor Will Be Made to Form a Company to Construct the Courts—\$25 Shares Will Be Sold.

At a meeting of lawn tennis enthusiasts held yesterday afternoon in the offices of Messrs. Patmore and Fulton a determined effort was made toward getting the local club on a firm financial and businesslike basis. Realizing that the present courts adjacent to the school house are entirely inadequate, the club proposes fitting up two courts on Acropolis Hill. With this end in view it is proposed to incorporate a company and offer shares of a par value of \$25 to raise the sum of \$4,500. This sum of money will be sufficient to fit up two board courts on Acropolis Hill. It will be necessary to obtain the consent of the city council before the building of the courts on the proposed site can be proceeded with. This is understood to be a mere matter of form, the council being agreeable to make any concessions of this nature tending toward the upbuilding of the city. There is every reason to suppose that the plans of the tennis club will fructuate and that the coming season will be a highly successful one. It is to be hoped that the club will be put on a firm basis and become one of the permanent institutions of the city.

EXPLORER FINISHES OUTFITTING WORK

Stefansson Expedition Left San Francisco Yesterday for Polar Regions—Leader to Join in British Columbia.

San Francisco, March 13.—With its outfitting completed the expedition of Dr. Viljalmar Stefansson, the Danish explorer, left here yesterday in an endeavor to find a new Polar continent to add to the British possessions. The expedition is using the whaling vessel Karluck and is being financed by the Canadian government.
Dr. Stefansson will be taken aboard in British Columbia, from whence the expedition will make its official start. It will remain in the Arctic three years.

RESOURCES AND GROWTH OF QUEEN CHARLOTTE ISLANDS

AGRICULTURE WILL BE A GREAT INDUSTRY, AS ALSO FISHING—SCENERY AND CLIMATE ARE ATTRACTIVE

Speaking of the favorable progress made on the south end of Graham Island since his first visit here three years ago, Thos. Deasy, Indian Agent, notes with satisfaction the development going on.

"There has been no rush or boom," he said, "and no large increase in population, but every thing indicated permanency and a desire of those interested to move ahead in advance of the tide of immigration that will follow the completion of the G.T.P. railway. There is no doubt that Prince Rupert will become the market for the produce of the islands, and there is no place to compare with the islands as a tourist resort. The grandeur of mountain scenery, with a climate both bracing and mild, must attract the thousands who are seeking health, rest and recreation. Along the inlets and sea-coast are places which will provide homes for many thousands. The long summer days and the mildness of the winters form a combination hard to beat anywhere."

"Springing up in all directions are towns, and three of them are located on Skidegate Inlet. In a short time the north and south ends of Graham Island will be linked by roads and telegraph lines; a better mail and passenger service will be inaugurated; fishing villages will follow the completion of the large fishing plants; truck gardening and poultry raising are now in their infancy, and an area of prosperity must follow the trend of immigration westward. With the absence of summer frosts, and a place to spend the winter months free from the rigors of the eastern climate, the Queen Charlotte Islands will become better known in the next three years than ever before.

"If no other asset than the wealth of fish were known, our islands must attract attention. Within a month over five hundred small boats will be out fishing for the "king" of salmon. The cold storage plants will require a large quantity of fish. Our local plants intend "mild curing" the spring salmon, and our halibut banks may be safely called the most prolific in the world.

"We are aware of the wealth of the sea, but who can gauge the potentialities of the hundreds of thousands of acres of land on our islands? The few residents are now an isolated band of pioneers, but the day is not far distant when lines of steamers will be bringing to our shores the thousands who are seeking homes far removed from the extremes of the eastern weather.

"If the people now on the Queen Charlotte group will only have the determination to remain with their heritage, they will reap a thousand fold the benefits to be derived from pioneering in the Last Great West."

Such language from a man who has served an apprenticeship of over half a century in British Columbia is worthy of consideration.

Mr. F. Barkshire, representing Vancouver and Victoria capital, who arrived in the city on the last trip of the Prince George, left this morning for Port Edward in order to view the possibilities for the future townsite.

TO STOP JOKES ON NEWLYWEDS

Pennsylvania Legislature Has Bill to Prevent Pranks at Marriage Ceremonies.

Harrisburg, Pa., March 12.—Calithumpian serenades, the parading of newly married couples through the streets or other pranks practiced on the newlywed will be a misdemeanor in this state if a bill introduced in the lower house of the Pennsylvania legislature tonight becomes a law. Should the measure be enacted, it will be unlawful for any person "to disturb or in any way molest any marriage ceremony, the contracting parties thereto or their friends or guests during the performance of the ceremony, or either before or after the same."

The proposed penalty for violation is a fine of \$25 or thirty days' imprisonment.
Hospital Meeting Tomorrow.
A special meeting of the hospital board of directors is to be held in the city hall tomorrow afternoon to consider granting permission to the city to erect an isolation hospital on the hospital grounds.

ALASKANS ACT IN COAL PROBLEMS

Joint Legislative Committee to Frame Bill to Be Presented to Congress.

Juneau, Alaska, March 12.—The first bill introduced in the Legislature today, by Senator Henry Roden, regulates the employment about mines and allied works. It prohibits mine laborers from working more than eight hours of twenty-four.

Senator B. F. Millard presented a joint memorial asking congress to repeal the statute extending the time in which to institute adverse suits against mineral entry.
Senator Millard introduced a resolution asking the house to join in a bill to be presented to congress that will embrace Alaska's ideas on the coal land problem. The resolution was unanimously adopted. It asks for a joint committee of three from each branch to draft a bill covering all matters concerning coal, railroads and transportation in Alaska.

NORTHERN B. C. DISFRANCHISED.

One effect of the Bowser disfranchising act will be to deprive half or more than half of the electors of the northern interior of the islands of their votes. The applications for registration must be in the hands of the registrars by April 3, and it will be a physical impossibility to take the forms into the remote districts, get them filled and bring them back to the registrar's office within the specified time. The electors on the Queen Charlotte Islands, for example, have to file their applications at Prince Rupert. Some of them may be able to do so, but it is safe to say that by far the greater number, no matter how expeditiously the forms may be taken in, will fail to get on the lists. In Cariboo and Atlin people will not be in a much better position, and those who know the difficulty of travel in those districts assert that at least half of the voting population will be deprived of the franchise should an election take place this year.

It has been pointed out that even with the forty days' notice of an election, the contests in those districts have been deferred until after the general elections, because of their inaccessibility. What chance, then, is there for anything like a fair registration in the brief period between now and April 3? Even if special messengers were sent in with the forms, it would be impossible to collect more than a tithe of the applications at this time of the year, when travelling among the mountains is more difficult and more dangerous than at almost any other season. But, in addition to this, it is not

even certain that the forms will be ready to send in. Liberal commissioners were told a few days ago, when they asked for them at Victoria, that none were available. It was promised that they would be issued as fast as possible, but what reliance can be placed on the promise of a government which only too apparently has deliberately planned to trick as many as possible of its opponents out of their votes?

Everything in the new elections act is of a piece. Every clause is designed with the purpose of preventing Liberals, as far as is in the power of the government, from exercising the franchise this year. The plot has been carefully laid, and no one can doubt that it will be highly successful. Every facility in the meantime will be given for the registration of friends of the government. The aid of officials in every part of the province will be at their disposal. The government will see to it that every supporter it has in the province will be registered and ready to cast his vote should either a Dominion or Provincial election be sprung on the people this year.

Such tactics as these would never be employed by a strong and safe government. They are the last desperate throw of the discredited political gambler, and they show that the McBride administration recognizes well that the feeling of the great majority of the people of the province has turned against it.—Vancouver Sun.

HIGH-HANDED METHODS OF BOWSER-M'BRIDE AUTOCRACY

"CITIZEN" CONDEMNS GOVERNMENT FOR UNDUE HASTE IN REGARD TO NEW VOTERS' LISTS—OTHER FEATURES SEVERELY CRITICIZED.

Prince Rupert, March 12th, 1913.

Dear Mr. Editor:

The vital question of the moment is: "Have you registered?" I say vital question because it seems to me that if democratic government of the people by the people is to be again established in British Columbia it is very high time that every freedom loving citizen made it his personal business to see that he is registered as a Provincial voter in order that at the earliest opportunity he may register a vote against the Bowser-McBride autocracy.

I wager that no other self governing or supposedly self governing portion of the Empire has such a limited form of democratic government as has this fair province. No better illustration of the autocracy of our government can be instanced than the new Provincial Elections Act. Granted that the old voters' lists were in a deplorable mess, why should a bill purporting to remedy the situation be brought down without notice almost at the close of the sitting of the House. Surely it could have been introduced a month earlier and passed and our people afforded a decent opportunity of being registered. It reminds one of the election farce of a year ago when a Legislature was prorogued and an election held within three weeks—before the winter's snows had vanished in this northland and under conditions which put it beyond the bounds of human possibility that hundreds of the electors should know what the issues were. But it is not the unseemly haste of the business alone that deserves condemnation. Can any one devise a reasonable explanation as to why the pending applications were cancelled—surely they were bona fide and not being already on the list it was not necessary to annihilate them in the same

fell swoop? But it is in a later section of the act that the characteristically high-handed Bowserian method appears. The Provincial Secretary may print the lists when and how he pleases. If one wants a copy instead of obtaining one for 25c as heretofore it is now necessary to pay for it at the rate of 25c per hundred words. Rest assured it is only Liberals or opposition parties that will have to pay that fancy figure. Formerly the King's printer was compelled to print the lists, but not now. It is not even that favorite Bowserian machine—the lieutenant governor in council—but the Provincial Secretary who has the discretion and power under the new act. Again when names are objected to, they can be struck off without publication in a local paper as heretofore—centralizing power again in the hands of the government or its servants.

Mr. Editor, if you ever believed that partyism was taking on a higher moral tone—that business and sanity was gaining sway over party pettiness you certainly can find no basis for such belief in the methods of the ruling party in this province. The rottenest of the closing days of thirty-three years of Liberal Government in Ontario were never a patch on this. The British born must feel woefully far from home as far as political institutions are concerned when they find themselves in British Columbia. The Lieut.-Governor in Council may do this and may do that. The Legislature is a joke—its only duty seems to be to give more of its functions each day it sits to the Lieutenant-Governor in Council. Yes, it's high time we registered and it is high time we made an end of this autocracy and go back to the democracy of our fathers. It's time for a change.

HUERTA SOLDIERS BEATEN IN BATTLE

Driven Out of Nacozari After a Fight Lasting Two Days.

Douglas, Ariz., March 10.—After a battle lasting from Saturday morning until yesterday afternoon, 800 state troops today hold Nacozari. The 250 Huerta soldiers defending the town are retreating to Agua Prieta. This news was received here today when communication was restored below this point. The capture of Nacozari opens the road, it is believed, to Agua Prieta, and if the latter town is taken the insurgent state troops can march westward along the border, encountering only small garrisons at Nogales, Naco and other small towns.

At none of the ports on the Sonora-Arizona border are there more than three hundred federal troops. The Huerta forces in Northern Sonora do not exceed 1,000 men, it was said today on sound authority, while the state government within a few days has raised an army of nearly 10,000 men, according to the reports of the various state troop leaders.

At Nacozari are 800 men under Prefect Bracamonte of Montezuma. There were only 250 federal troops defending Nacozari when the attack was made Saturday.

Similarly small garrisons defend Agua Prieta, Nogales and Naco, while another strong rebel group from Magdalena, below Nogales, is reported as moving to the border to assist in attacking the ports of entry.

British Shipping Magnate Declares Use of "Dope" Generally Credited to Militant Women. MAY FORTIFY ALBERNI CANAL

Cruiser Rainbow Has Left Victoria for West Coast Points. Victoria, March 12.—For the first time in eight months the Canadian cruiser Rainbow, Commander Hose, steamed out of Esquimalt this morning. At eight o'clock she cast off her mooring ropes from the coaling wharf and proceeded slowly out of the harbor, bound for Bamfield, the cable station on the west coast. The war vessel is making a special trip with a number of engineers from Ottawa, who, it is understood, will conduct a thorough investigation into the advisability of fortifying Barclay Sound and Alberni Canal.

CONDUCTORS OF C. N. R. SEND ULTIMATUM

Give Company Twenty-four Hours to Accede to Their Demands. Winnipeg, March 10.—Canadian Northern Railway conductors, who have been meeting here the past two weeks, delegates being present from all parts of the system, sent an ultimatum to Sir Donald Mann in Toronto Sunday, giving the company only twenty-four hours to meet their demands. CANADIAN PACIFIC STEAMER SERVICE

Princess Mary is Expected to Take Run of Beatrice This Week—Princess May is Now on Ten Day Schedule.

Although the local offices of the C. P. R. have received no official notification, it is expected that the Princess Mary will arrive here tomorrow evening in place of the Princess Beatrice. It is also expected that advice will be received at that time in regard to the new summer schedule.

The Princess May, on the Vancouver-Prince Rupert-Skagway run, is now on a ten day schedule instead of two weeks. This week she will arrive here southbound on Friday instead of Saturday and will return again northbound on Thursday, March 20th, keeping up the ten day schedule until about June 1st, when the weekly schedule will go into effect.

GOES SUDDENLY INSANE; MURDERS HIS WIFE

Terrible Deed of Seattle Man—Wife Dying in Hospital—Tried to Kill Himself.

Seattle, March 12.—Going suddenly insane, Thomas Ward, a machinist, living at 5364 Rainier avenue, beat his wife's brains out with a claw hammer and then tried to kill himself with the same weapon.

Mrs. Ward is dying in the city hospital. Ward, seriously injured, is also in the hospital.

Ward, who was first to arise this morning, started to build a fire in the kitchen stove. Without warning he dropped the paper and kindling with which he was about to start the fire and taking up a claw hammer, fractured his wife's skull in several places. Then he began to beat himself over the head. Neighbors, attracted by the woman's screams, found her lying on the floor in a dying condition, and the husband with the blood pouring over his face, raving and shouting unintelligible cries.

PRINCE ALBERT TO HAVE STEEL PLANT

Prince Albert, Sask., March 12.—A number of Chicago financiers and Pittsburg steel magnates have formed a structural steel company to be known as the Imperial Iron and Steel Company, which will locate in Prince Albert. They have secured a thirty acre tract in the west end of the city, gratis on the understanding that they are in operation by next October, and employing 400 men at a monthly pay roll of over \$25,000. The men have had engineers through this country, and it is understood beds of iron ore have been located. They will first manufacture bar iron, horse shoes and structural steel.

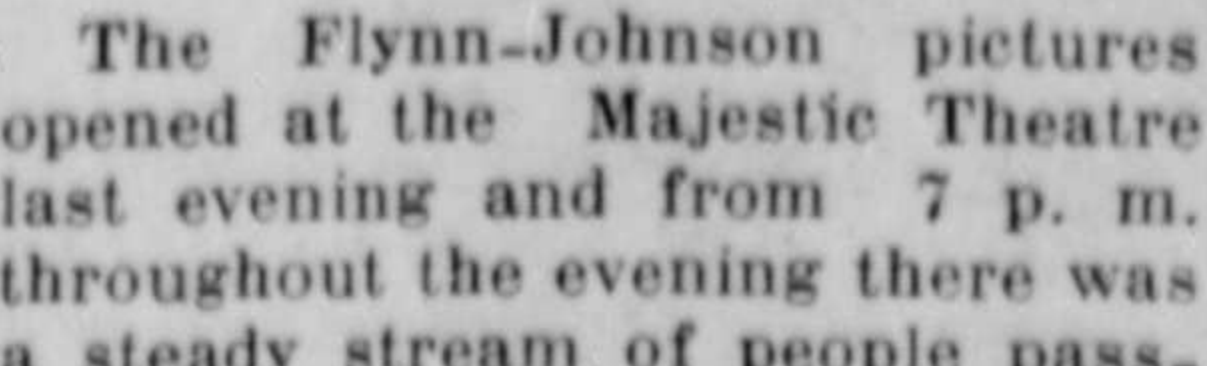

The eighth round alone is worth the price of admission, as it shows Flynn goaded into a fury by the holding tactics of the big cinder, butting with all the frenzy of a goat. The Pueblo fireman once leaves the floor and throws himself about two feet into the air, striving to connect with the point of Johnson's jaw, his head being used as a battering ram. In the ninth round a lanky limb of the law enters the ring amid a dramatic silence, throws back his coat, revealing the dire tidings that he is the sheriff of this here county and after a few well chosen remarks with Referee Eddie Smith orders the fight to cease. Flynn can be noticed expostulating with the referee and the police official, while Mistah Johnson seems mighty pleased at the sudden ending and does not waste any time getting into his bathrobe and making for his dressing room. Samuels expects to make the journey, which usually requires thirty-five days, in twenty-five days. Much interest is already being taken in the famous 412 mile Alaskan sweepstake dog team race, which will be run next month.
