

REBELS DRIVEN BACK AFTER TEN HOURS FIGHT

TONG FIGHT AMONG CHINESE IN PORTLAND—MEXICAN GOVERNMENT SAID TO BE BANKRUPT

PIPE LINE IS COMPLETE ACROSS SHAWATLANS

All That Remains to be Done is the Re-Calking of the Joints---This Will be Done By a Diver

With his usual energy and hustling proclivities Mayor Pattullo, although only returning from a flying visit to Vancouver on Friday evening last, found time on Saturday afternoon to pay a visit, together with several of the city aldermen and representatives of the press, to the scene of the laying of the city water pipe line across the Shawatlans Passage.

Nothing deterred by the blustiness of the afternoon, the little party which besides the mayor included, Ald. McCaffery, Leek, Bullock-Webster, Sutherland and Naden and representatives of the Journal and Daily News, left the government wharf at 2.15 p.m. on the comfortable little power boat "Dixie."

The visit was most opportune, as giving the party the chance of witnessing the whole of the procedure of the laying of the pipe on the bottom of the passage. Work has been proceeding most satisfactorily for the last day or two and the visitors were assured that barring accidents, the last pipe would be laid Sunday evening, and the difficult task finally accomplished. Without actually visiting the works and seeing with one's own eyes exactly how the pipe is strung out and finally reaches its last resting place on the bottom of the oft time turbulent narrow passage it would be impossible to understand how the work was accomplished. The distance across the passage is only 800 feet and the greatest depth about 50 feet. Ninety-six pipes of an equal length of nine feet, each weighing 1800 pounds are being used for the conveying of water across the passage. The

system of laying the pipe as originally planned by city engineer Mason is being practically adhered to without any divergence with the exception that some 4000 feet of wire cable has been added to the plant and used for guying purposes, holding the scows securely in position. The lack of sufficient cable to ensure this being done seems to have been the whole cause of the mishaps that occurred during the attempted laying of the pipe in the past. The fact that the shore on either side of the passage is peculiarly precipitous right up from the water's edge, precluded the possibility of laying the pipe out in a string on the shore, jointing it together and then hauling it straight across the passage into its permanent position. This method was able to be adopted in Vancouver.

The method of laying the pipe is a comparatively simple one, the principal feature of which to the ordinary onlooker is what the engineers call a "gantry." This is nothing more or less than a runway held in position between two scows. It is about 160 feet in length and six feet wide. One end rests on the bottom of the passage and the other projects out of the water at an angle of about nineteen degrees. The pipes are laid on this gantry one at a time and jointed to the last one laid. As soon as the joint is made the scows are moved slowly towards the opposite shore from which the start was made. The gantry, of course, moves with the scows, the pipes being left behind and slowly

WILL CAUSE SENSATION IN ROYAL CIRCLES

Wife of Mr. Zanardi, a Former Resident of Prince Rupert, Comes Into Prominence Through Extraordinary Life Story

Many pioneer residents of Prince Rupert will recall Carlo Zanardi-Landi, a member of the engineering staff of the G. T. P. during the early stages of the opening up of the townsite and after whom the narrow passage separating Kaien Island from the mainland was named. Mr. Zanardi upon leaving the employ of the G.T.P. engaged for a while in logging and timber operations at Alice Arm, subsequently removing to Vancouver, where it was understood he entered the real estate business.

The name of Count Zanardi-Landi, to give him his correct title, has come into prominence lately through an announcement in the London "Daily Mirror" that an extraordinary life story is about to be published simultaneously in London, New York, Florence, Paris and Berlin. This remarkable book is said to have been written by the wife of Count Zanardi, and is called "The Secret of an Empress. Revealed by Her Daughter." The authoress is said to be a strikingly beautiful woman, residing in London with her husband. She makes the startling claim that her mother was the Empress Elizabeth of Austria, the unhappy victim of an assassin's dagger at Territet, on the Lake of Geneva, in 1898.

The publication of this remarkable life-story by the Countess Zanardi-Landi, is confidently expected to make a tremendous stir in royal and aristocratic circles in Europe. It is stated the Countess has petitioned the Viennese authorities for recognition of her claims. She offers no documentary corroboration,

but points to certain remarkable resemblances between portraits of herself, and her two children by her first marriage, on the one hand, and portraits of the Emperor Francis Joseph, the Empress, and the mad King Louis of Bavaria, the Empress's first cousin on the other, which she declares are "incontestable proof."

In speaking of herself the Countess describes her first marriage to Dr. Richard Kuhnelt, from whom she was later divorced, and how she subsequently went to Vancouver, B.C., where she met the Count Zanardi-Landi her present husband.

Cosmopolitan as the Pacific Northwest is known to be, where it is no unusual thing to meet men of all nationalities, sprung from almost every branch of the social life of the older European countries, it is doubtful if there was ever come across a more interesting and attractive personality than Zanardi-Landi. A brilliant conversationalist, speaking perfect English, though with a slight foreign accent, he was extremely popular among his conferees on the G.T.P. staff, as well as with all the early residents on the island who made up the little family of pioneers, who camped in the woods practically, during the preliminary laying out of the townsite. From his conversation, and other evidences, it was generally believed that Mr. Zanardi, as he was known to all here, had had intimate acquaintance with most of the European courts.

A particularly valued treasure of Mr. Zanardi's was an autograph photograph of Pope Leo XIII.

BALLOONIST BIDDING
FAREWELL TO FRIENDS

Will Make an Attempt Next Week
to Cross Atlantic in an
Airship

Berlin, March 15—Joseph
Brucker, the German-American
aeronaut who plans to cross the
Atlantic in the balloon Suchard
II., is in Berlin saying good-bye
to his friends prior to starting
for the Canary Islands where he
expects to begin his voyage be-
tween April 12 and 14.

Brucker, with the balloon, will
leave Trieste for Las Palmas by
steamship on March 27. The
Suchard II. is the largest balloon
in existence. Its diameter is 80
feet. Mr. Brucker will be ac-
companied by two assistants.
They are taking three weeks'
provisions, but if they have the
luck they expect, they will land
either in the West Indies or on
the northern coast of South Am-
erica in five or ten days.

MINISTER'S EARS
BOXED BY ADMIRAL

separated by bystanders, and Ad-
miral Gozzo was arrested.

Gozzo's grievance, it is said,
was the minister's act in plac-
ing him on the retired list.

"CIVIS RUPERTI" ANSWERS
OBJECTIONS TO BOOSTING

GROWTH OF PRINCE RUPERT NEED NOT WAIT FOR DEVEL-
OPMENT OF HINTERLAND—THE "BOOSTER MAN"
PREACHES GREATER OPTIMISM.

Editor Daily News.

Sir: Referring to my recent
letter in your columns I wish to
say that I have endeavored to
find out in an indirect way the
attitude of our business men to-
ward a publicity campaign as
outlined in that letter. The re-
sults of this investigation are
somewhat startling as I shall
show you.

There are of course a large
number of business men who have
never given the matter a mo-
ment's thought. Such men will
invariably tell you that to adver-
tise the town just now would be
to produce an unwarranted boom
that it would unduly inflate the
value of real estate and that
whatever benefit would result
therefrom would be snapped up
by the real estate men. When
those men are induced to give
the subject some thought they
are not hard to convince that
whatever helps the real estate
man helps the town. It is a mat-
ter of common knowledge that
whenever there is an active mar-
ket for real estate business in
general is good. It is of course
true that sometimes new towns
are over boomed, but in general
in a new country the develop-
ment of trade and industry goes
on at such a pace that any in-
flated spots with real advantages
are soon corrected.

Another view of the question
that we find is that instead of
trying to build up a city here we
should turn our energies toward
developing the interior; that we
never can have a city here till the
hinterland is flooded with people.
This view is not in accordance
with the experiences of other
coast towns. It is far from the
mind of the writer to disparage
the ambition to colonize our in-
land territory. It is also his firm
conviction that viewing the mat-
ter from a purely economic
standpoint and in the light of our
descendants of ten generations
hence it might be better to let
this matter take care of itself.

But without being so short sight-
ed as the man who protested by
"What has posterity done for
me?" most of us are agreed that
we would like to see a little of
this coming prosperity in our own
time. It is also the ambition of
our statesmen to hasten the time
when all our "Deserts shall blo-
som as the rose" and when the
happy hum of prosperous fam-
ilies shall replace the forest pri-
meval.

In order to correct the state-
ment that this city cannot be
built until the interior is devel-
oped we have only to look at what
has taken place in Vancouver
and Seattle. Anybody who has
looked into the subject knows

that Vancouver's growth has not
resulted from their interior devel-
opment. Everybody knows
that five or six years ago the in-
terior land in the southern part
of the province could be had for
a mere song, and that it had very
little value and received small
cultivation until a large city
suddenly sprang up at its doors.
Transcontinental termini are al-
most wholly determined by the
large trade that passes through
their gates, and it is folly for us
in Prince Rupert to relegate our
ambitions for our city to the dim
and distant future, or until a
hundred thousand more Ameri-
can farmers have discovered the
mecca of their enterprise. With
the wonderful development of the
fishing industry that is taking
place and the large amount of
freight that is waiting the outlet
of the new railroad, there is no
reason why a large and flourish-
ing city should not spring up
here immediately. At the same
time of course we should do all
in our power to colonize our va-
cant lands, from which in the
last analysis comes the real
wealth of the nation.

Perhaps, however, the most
absurd objection to advertising
the town is that held by a few
business men who say that the
object we have in view is the one
thing least to be desired. They
tell us that there are enough
business houses in town today
and that a publicity campaign
would only add to the keen com-
petition that now exists. Many
of our citizens will know that
this was a policy followed by the
city of Victoria for many years.
Some of the old timers didn't
want a commercial city and others
insisted on keeping what they had
to themselves. It is an old story
now how the new blood came in
and overthrew those old notions
with the result that Victoria is
now ranked as one of our most
progressive and prosperous cities.

The Malthusian Theory has
lost its place in modern political
economy. We believe today that
not only does wealth keep pace
with the growth of population,
but that it far exceeds it. We
also know from concrete ex-
amples that the faster a city
grows the more prosperous are
its people. The real explanation
lies in the fact that the increase
of population greatly enhances
the value of real estate and at
the same time adds enormously
to the volume of business. We
thus have produced automatic-
ally an immense sum of capital
with which to develop our re-
sources. In this development
everybody concerned receives
their due proportion, and the
present business men who think

they have a good thing would
soon find that their possibilities
were unlimited.

I want right here to preach a
little of the Gospel of Optimism.
Have you ever noticed how we
are encouraged and inspired by
the breezy optimistic talk of the
outsider who beholds our mag-
nificent opportunities for the first
time? How often under such in-
fluences have we chided ourselves
for our short sightedness and
our lack of faith? With our un-
bounded resources there is nothing
that can prevent a great city
from growing up here except an
act of God. Stop that grouching.
Stay with the game and before
many years are past you will be
rewarded in proportion to your
faithfulness.

Before closing let me ask you
to offer up a little intercession
that the good Prophet of Public-
ity may soon appear whether he
be in the person of the president
of the Board of Trade or some
other enterprising citizen.

NAPOLEON'S GRANDSON FOUND PILING LUMBER

**Crittenden Memorial Society of
San Francisco Traces
William Gordon**

Los Angeles, March 15—A
search by the Crittenden Mem-
orial Society of San Francisco for
a reputed grandson of Napoleon
Bonaparte ended yesterday in a
Los Angeles lumber yard. Wil-
liam Gordon, a workman, is
the person sought.

William Gordon was a son of
the late John Gordon, a San
Francisco jeweller, who, accord-
ing to the Crittenden Society, un-
questionably was a son of the
"Little Corporal." The remains
of John Gordon rest in a cem-
etery near the Golden Gate.

William Gordon is 68 years of
age. He says his father was not
born on the Island of St. Helena,
as has been asserted, but near
Edinburgh, Scotland, on Novem-
ber 11, 1818. John Gordon's mother
was a Scotch woman, mar-
ried the Hospital at St. Helena
when Napoleon arrived there and
he was given his mother's fam-
ily name.

John Gordon married Amelia
Jones, a Welsh woman, in Lon-
don, in 1845, and then came to
America, settling in New London,
Conn., where William was born
in 1847.

"Having the blood of the great
emperor in my veins has never
excited me," William Gordon
said as he turned to his task of
piling lumber.
