## NEW LOCATION SELECTED FOR ISOLATION HOSPITAL

### City Engineer's Report Recommending Site Opposite Green St Referred to Board of Works With Instructions to Proceed

The city engineer reported to the council last night that a new site had been found for the isolation hospital, which was on the city reserve, near Green Street. He had prepared the plans and the committee recommended that the work be at once proceeded with.

Ald. Kerr said the city badly needed an isolation hospital and the sooner we had one the better, whether calls for tenders were made or not. He moved the city engineer be instructed to go ahead with the work.

Ald. McCaffery said the matter had been left to the Board of Works and he did not see why it should be taken out of their hands.

Ald. Kerr had no thought of reflecting on the Board of Works but did wish to see the work proceeded with forthwith. He would move that the engineer's report be referred to the Board of Works with instructions to start the work at once.

This was carried unanimously.

## OVER \$100,000 IN LOCAL IMPROVEMENTS WERE PASSED

### Council Last Night Adopted Reports of Board of Works and City Engineer Covering Local Improvements on Fulton, McBride and Sixth Avenue

Everyone will be relieved to know that the city is once more on a sound financial basis and that local improvements and other public works can now be proceeded with without delay and without any misgiving whatever. In other words, outside confidence in the city's financial prospects have been fully restored. The city has now the wherewithal and there will be plenty of work for everybody.

To carry on this work three important money bylaws were passed at the council meeting last night, this following as a result of a report by the mayor to the council, dated yesterday, stating how this happy condition of things had been brought about and recommendations as to the policy to be pursued by the city. This report, which was received and filed without a single dissentient remark, read as follows:

To the Council of the City of Prince Rupert:

Gentlemen,—As you are aware I last week visited Vancouver with the object of consulting the city's bankers in connection with the financial affairs of the city. My desire was especially to fully acquaint the bank with the plans of the city for the coming year, and also to get from the bank all information possible as might assist us in our deliberations in connection with the finances of the city.

Incidentally I requested an advance from the bank of \$115,000 to complete grading in Section 1. The bank has already advanced \$25,000 to start the work, and the superintendent of branches has strongly recommended to the head office that the balance of the money be placed at the disposal of the city.

As the members of the council are no doubt aware, previous to my visit to the south we had received two or three offers for the balance of our treasury certificates, but they were not such that the finance committee could recommend and were refused. I think it much more important to maintain the credit of the city than to sacrifice treasury certificates which must be taken care of almost immediately by a sale of debentures, with the consequent loss through discount and exchange charges.

One offer which we received was through the Bank of Montreal, and you will be pleased to know that the superintendent of branches, when the situation was explained to him, highly recommended the course pursued by your finance committee.

I am also glad to advise you that we have the assurance of the superintendent of branches that the bank will render us every possible assistance in successfully handling our flotations for the year. I represented that we would require, approximately,

\$700,000 for new work, that is, for work entirely apart from the hydro-electric scheme, and section one improvements.

I urge upon you, therefore, the necessity of your immediately passing the necessary bylaws for the various works proposed, and the submission of them to the ratepayers of the city where required, so that we may go to the money markets as early as possible, not only for the purpose of selling the debentures in connection with new work, but also for the purpose of taking care of outstanding treasury certificates.

Personally, I think that treasury certificates are an iniquitous form of financing, and, if possible, I would like to see the balance of the hydro-electric completed through the sale of debentures, rather than the sale of the balance of the treasury certificates, which we are authorized to issue.

The report of the Board of Works, together with the report of the City Engineer, was read relative to the proposed works of local improvement planned for Fulton Street, McBride Street and Sixth Avenue. The plans for the payment of these works had to be based on the regulations of the amendments recently made to the Municipal Clauses Act, under which only a certain proportion of the cost is paid by the adjacent property

holders and the remainder by the city, such payments to be made annually in instalments covering forty years.

For instance, for the improvement of Fulton Street from the boundary of Section One to 8th Avenue, the estimated cost is \$25,000, of which the amount assessed against the city will be \$14,190, the balance to be assessed on the property owners directly benefitted.

In the brief discussion following the reading of the report on this improvement, Ald. Bullock-Webster asked if there would be a bridge or viaduct where Fulton Street crosses Fifth Ave., or would Fifth Avenue come out flush with it.

The mayor remarked that the plans were on the table and that they were drawn in accordance with those of the original town-site.

Ald. McCaffery, chairman of the Board of Works, said the people of Fifth Ave. could apply to have their grade changed to that of the Fulton Street crossing, otherwise there would have to be an overhead crossing.

Ald. Kerr expressed surprise that such questions should be put at this time as the matter had been long under discussion. There would shortly be prepared a petition from the people of 5th Avenue and Fulton St., to obtain the lowering of the grade to a level with the Fulton St. crossing. If nothing was done on that petition the bridge was going to stand. Whether it would be a benefit or not he was not prepared to state. That was for the property owners to find out.

Ald. Bullock-Webster asked whether the work was to be done by day labor or contract.

The mayor replied that that point had not yet been considered.

City Solicitor Peters pointed out that under the new amendments all money bylaws might be passed by a three-fourths vote, and when this was done no petition could be received.

The mayor thought that under these circumstances the bylaw should pass without a record vote, so that as to leave an opportunity for property owners to petition for an alteration of grade if they so desired.

This was carried and it was also deemed best to follow the same course in regard to the grading of McBride Street to 9th Avenue, which is to be done at a cost of \$69,042, of which the city bears \$40,196 of the cost; on 6th Ave. between Taylor and Fulton Streets the estimated cost is \$35,810, of which the city bears \$1,692 and the property owners \$34,110.

## ELECTION CHARGES CAUSE SENSATION IN HOUSE

### AFFIDAVITS READ CHARGING IMPERSONATION AND OTHER IRREGULARITIES—MINISTER OF JUSTICE CAUSES SENSATION

Ottawa, March 17.—L. J. Gaudet, St. Hyacinthe, today produced affidavits in connection with the Hochelaga bye-election frauds involving Louis Coderre. One affidavit signed by Emil Bourassa under date of Feb. 15th, sets forth an allegation to the effect that Bourassa together with his brother and certain other men were engaged by Coderre, Secretary of State to work together on an impersonation scheme, which was carried out in election day. It is alleged that they were to be rewarded in

a monetary way and by patronage. According to another affidavit Mercil is alleged to have observed certain irregularities at the time of the election and made certain discoveries. Coderre made denial charges. Hon. Chas. Doherty, Minister of Justice, addressed the house and created quite a sensation by reading another affidavit by Bourassa, the principal witness in establishing the charges, that he (Bourassa) had signed the former affidavit in Mercil's office without knowing the contents of same.

A CURE FOR  
SUFFRAGETTES

We are not totally opposed to the idea of woman's suffrage with limitations, but for the sake of good things the movement stands for, we would suggest for a possible solution to the problem of the British authorities that the convicted militants be secretly exiled to some sort of special female convict farm located possibly in the Canadian north west. Let them there be cut off from letter writing and speech making, and kept hidden from the press. Let it be a penalty for any newspaper to publish accounts of suffragette depredations or movements on the ground that it is promoting a nuisance. Finally, empty the contents of a good sized orphan's home into the laps of the convicted gentlewomen, and put the responsibility for the care of the infants upon these ladies of violent convictions. We have an idea that the fresh air of this country, the lack of newspaper publicity, and the responsibility for the babies would work marvels. Meantime the real campaign for woman's suffrage could be carried on unhampered by the loss of public sympathy which the present methods insure.—Canadian Collier's.

AN ICE PATROL  
SHIP

Man's struggles with the forces of nature never cease. His latest effort is in the direction of overcoming one of the greatest perils that beset the ocean traveller. Until the terrible fate of the Titanic was made known, with all its grim realities, there was a general ignorance regarding the dangers that beset ships at sea. Although no enemy of the mariner is more dreaded than the iceberg, it does not appear from the evidence of those on board the ill-fated White Star liner as if those responsible for the safety of the ship were seriously perturbed by wireless messages that large icebergs

were in their vicinity. After the disaster all the Atlantic liners took a more southerly course, and other suggestions were made for securing greater safety at sea. One of the most practical steps taken, on the advice of the British Merchant Shipping Advisory Committee, has been the stationing of an ice patrol vessel in the North Atlantic to observe and report upon the movements of ice.

The Scotia is now on her way from Dundee to take up her duties. This stout old whaler, built about forty years ago, and formerly employed by the Scottish Antarctic expedition, has auxiliary steam power. She is also fitted with a powerful Marconi wireless installation which will keep her in constant touch with Newfoundland and Labrador, and also with passing vessels. Three scientific observers will be on board, whose business it will be to watch ice conditions. The dangerous period is during the late spring and early summer months. With the approach of warmer weather ice in the Polar regions begins to break up into ice fields or more dangerous bergs, which are carried southward by currents and winds, often drifting into tropical regions before they melt away.

There are other uses to which the Scotia may be put. The scientific observers on board will doubtless devote some portion of their time to oceanography and meteorology. The North Atlantic currents, an important factor in the southward movement of Polar ice, are as yet very little known and charted. The science of meteorology would derive much benefit from regular reports on weather conditions in the Atlantic. But the main duty of the Scotia will be in connection with the safety of shipping at sea, by reporting the presence of ice. The cost of the enterprise will be shared between the British Government and the principal Atlantic steamship lines.

MEXICAN DEPUTIES  
ACCUSE ROOSEVELT

Declare He Had Plan to Divide  
Mexico into Independent  
States

Mexico City, March 17—Deputy Escudero confirmed today charges against Colonel Theodore Roosevelt made in the Chamber of Deputies yesterday by Deputy Moheno, to the effect that Mr. Roosevelt had given a promise for the partition of Mexico. Senor Escudero not only corroborated all that Senor Moheno had said but added that he himself would make a sensational announcement shortly. The statements by the two members of the chamber caused many expressions of indignation among foreigners in the city.

Deputy Moheno, who is the leader of the government party in the chamber, charges that Col. Roosevelt promised his supporters that he would divide the Mexican Republic into several small republics, thus leaving the entire country in its divided form at the mercy of the United States. Senor Moheno added that the secession movement in the state of Sonora, where the acting governor had issued a public defiance to General Huerta's government, was a preliminary step towards attainment of the partition of the Republic, to which he asserted Col. Roosevelt had pledged himself.

The government leader made the specific charge that the state revolt in Sonora was being financed by a syndicate of "Yankee bankers."

New York, March 17—When Col. Roosevelt read the despatch setting forth the charge made by Deputy Moheno that he promised a division of the Mexican Republic into several small Republics, he had no comment to make. At his quarters in the Outlook office it was said that the Colonel considered the material of the despatch too obviously preposterous to deserve any comment.

RECORD SEIZURE  
OF OPIUM MADE

Arrest of Japanese Steward Reveals 248 Tins Valued at \$10,000

Tacoma, Wash., March 17—What was declared by customs officials to be the largest seizure of opium on Puget Sound in a number of years, and the first ever made on a Japanese steamer, took place here when Deputy Customs Inspector N. C. Adams arrested K. Takaki, chief steward of the Mexico Maru, now in port.

Takaki, who was entering an automobile to go up town, was found to have eighteen tins of opium under his raincoat, and later, when his room on the Mexico Maru was searched, 230 more tins were found, making 248 in all, valued at \$10,000.

GERMAN DEPUTATION  
TO VISIT DOMINION

Machinery Committee From Britain Coming During the Summer

London, March 17—Two deputations will visit the Dominion this summer. In July about one hundred German manufacturers and merchants, led by Herr Webber, will make an extended tour examining water power and local circumstances governing the establishment of manufactures. The party, which will start from Leipzig, will travel through the eastern provinces and possibly will go west as well.

A second party of visitors will consist of a deputation of the Machinery Users' Association of Great Britain, the president of which is Sir Francis Cawley and the vice-presidents Lord Rotham and Sir William Houldsworth. The association has decided to send to Canada a small committee of inquiry, which will probably consist of three or four including Sir Humphreys Davies, the association's consulting engineer.

Fifty-eight head of horses arrived on the train Wednesday night. Of the bunch, thirty-six were for the mail service branch of the White Pass Company and the remaining twenty-two are for private parties who are freighting eggs and other supplies to Dawson.—Whitehorse Star.

Imagine if you can a world peopled with spirits, flying hither and thither in apparent disorder when suddenly the millions of flying immortals form themselves into a letter, break again and then form a new letter, and soon, each letter perfect in design, and finally ending the mystic word of warning by forming into the shape of a gigantic eagle.

At midnight when the film had run its full course, the censor remarked, 'It is the most beautiful film I ever saw.' There were several local ministers in attendance and they were delighted with the scenes portrayed.

AUSTRALIA'S CAPITAL

## MUST WEIGH COAL ON CITY SCALES

Dealers Subject to Penalties if Ordinance is Not Complied With—Effective April 1

Under a bylaw passed by the Council last night all coal must be weighed on the city scales and anyone selling coal without such being weighed on the city scales is subject to penalties. The ordinance goes into effect April 1. The charge is 10c for the first ton and 5c for each succeeding ton. The present weighmaster, Mr. Davis, is retained at a salary of \$75 per month.

There was no discussion upon the bylaw itself but there was in regard to a weighmaster. Alderman Bullock-Webster declaring that the finance committee had no right to bring in such a report.

The mayor and members of the committee pointed out that Mr. Davis was already in the position and they had not treated it as a new appointment.

Ald. Kerr would like to have a vote on it anyway, as he thought Finlay Munro, an old prospector and pioneer, who was a charge on the city, might be an applicant.

Ald. Bullock-Webster moved that the committee call for applicants for the position but the motion was lost by the casting vote of the Mayor. Ald. Kerr, Bullock-Webster, Maitland and Dybbavn voting for, and Ald. Leek, Sutherland, Naden and McCaffery and the Mayor voting against.
