

"The present year will see

momentous naval changes in the Commonwealth. On Jan. 1 the imperial flagship Drake left for England. The Commonwealth first class dread-· nought cruiser Australia will replace her as soon as possible. The Sydney station will not be transferred by the Admiralty to the Commonwealth authorities till July 1 next. but in the meantime important preliminary changes will be made. Admiral Sir George King-Hall will remain in charge of the station till the end of June, when his successor will assume control of what will be the basis of a purely Australian fleet unit. In addition to the Australia, the Commonwealth fleet will include the second class cruisers Sydney and Melbourne. Until the third Australian second class cruiser Brisbane is built the Commonwealth will have the use of H. M. S. Encounter, which is to be lent by the Admiralty. In addition to these four cruisers, three destroyers of the same type are to built. Then there are a number of submarines due from England. The whole will form the nucleus of the Australian fleet of the future. It is hoped that by July the Australian station may be complete, with the exception of the

AS BIG AN ARMY AS THE LITTLE BALKAN STATES HAVE DONE.

Just now the eyes of all thinking men in the British Empire are fixed on the heroic but withal pathetic figure of Lord Roberts. who, while he might be taking his well-merited ease in the evening of life, is going up and down the Old Country seeking to awaken the nation to a sense of its danger in case of war coming upon unawares, or at least while its preparations for self-defence are miserably inadequate. All men may not see eye to eye with the hero of Kandahar as to the best measures to be adopted for selfdefence, but, at any rate, recent events in the Balkans show that each one of the "small states" involved has been able to put a larger army into the field than England could mobilize tomorrow if war struck her in the shape of an invading foe. And England is supposed so be a great power! The much-talked-of Territorial Army is. on the showing of its own officers, a gigantic failure if not imposture. The question is: Is it the best machine we can devise? Of course, if it represents our best effort, then we must stand or fall! with it—it is the best we can do, and that is all there is to be said. But is it the best we can do? Everybody knows it is not only a makeshift, but a make believe force-i. e., everybody on the continent whose war trained scent is not going to be led aside by a red herring like that.

Canadians are not indifferent nor apathetic in this matter. guess they all know that if the British fleet were crippled in home waters Canada would have to do more than sing "The Maple Leaf Forever." Why, there is no country in the world easier to take than British Columbia-given the destruction of the British fleet.

Definite organization seems to hang fire, but there is the field free and open for every man TO LEARN HOW TO SHOOT. That at any rate is the chief thing for British Columbians to do; not a few of them here and there, but, as we say, "every man Jack of 'em." am not one of those who believe that God is on the side of the heaviest artillery; but I do believe that from a national point of view every man should know how to put his "props" up.


