## TURKEY HAS ACCEPTED PEACE PLAN OF POWERS

### BALKAN ALLIES BOMBARDING SCUTARI—DISASTROUS FLOODS AT AND NEAR MONTREAL

#### HUNDREDS OF HORSES AND CATTLE DROWNED AT LONGUEIL

TERROR STRICKEN RESIDENTS OF MONTREAL SUBURB ARE PERCHED ON ROOFS—HEAVY DAMAGE.

(Special to The Daily News.)  
Montreal, April 2.—Four feet of raging waters are rushing over the streets of Longueil, a suburb of the city, across the river. Terror stricken residents have taken refuge on the roofs of houses.

Hundreds of horses and cattle in the district have been drowned, many houses were swept into the water. Lawrence by the rush of water. The damage will run well over a hundred thousand dollars. The recent disasters in the United States from the floods have had the effect of further inflaming the fears of the residents with regard to the situation.

Part of Point St. Charles is under water, and in Verdun, on the shores of the St. Lawrence, the water by noon had risen to level with the first windows of the suburban homes and families began to rush pell mell out of the houses, carrying all possible furniture to higher ground. So flooded is the town of St. Lambert, across the Victoria bridge, that a wedding procession of boats headed to the Catholic church through the submerged

streets this morning. When Omer Camerlain, the bridegroom, awoke he found six inches of water on his bedroom floor. He hailed a boat and reached the church just in time for the ceremony. The bride, Miss Anna Boissey, was late because boats are scarce in St. Lambert. However, the marriage was finally performed and the happy couple were rowed to the St. Lambert station.

About \$15,000 damage was caused in St. Lambert by the flood. Telephone wires are still down after the storm and the suburban street cars discontinued service in most cases this morning owing to the water rising over the tracks.

#### Floods Near Brandon.

Brandon, April 2.—The district north of the Canadian Pacific Railway tracks, known here as the flats, which forms the surrounding country to the Assiniboine, is inundated today and the inhabitants, who are mostly foreigners, are moving out quickly. The ice in the river gives no sign of breaking, but the water on top is several feet deep in places and rising rapidly.

TWO THOUSAND DOLLARS TO BE AWARDED IN PRIZES FOR EXHIBITS—OUTLYING DISTRICTS ENTHUSIASTIC.

In a day or two everyone will be called upon for a subscription to the agricultural and industrial exhibition to be held here in September. It is hoped the collectors appointed will be treated liberally and the success of Prince Rupert's first annual fair assured.

A meeting of the fair directors, held last night in the office of J. McMullin, the city was divided into four districts for the purpose of collecting subscriptions, under four committees, as follows: J. H. McMullin and Dr. Berman, Frank A. Ellis and A. Prudhomme, A. H. Allison and Crippen and J. L. McLaren and Berman Naden.

The list of prizes to be offered is again carefully gone over and finally adopted. The prizes for agricultural and industrial exhibits foot up to \$2,000. This does not include prizes for competitions such as horse racing, duck drilling, athletic contests and so on, which are to be decided upon later.

The drill hall will not be available for the fair, in fact it seems doubtful if its erection will have been begun by that time, so the skating rink will be made available with the addition of a large tent alongside for the live stock and other agricultural exhibits.

Alderman Bullock-Webster reported last night that the outlying districts are taking a very keen interest in the project and are promising all kinds of assistance.

A communication was read Messrs. Hitt Bros., pyrotechnic artists of Seattle, offering to put on a series of good firework displays at a more modest sum than was at first asked. This will be further considered when the fair's bank balance seems to warrant it.

The Indian band contest will be a feature of the exhibition. J. S. Gray reported that the Indians are quite agreeable and it was proposed that each of the bands should be engaged to play during the fair at a satisfactory figure. It was also proposed to strike off a number of souvenir medals, to be presented to each musician who competes.

#### NEW ZEALAND IS CRITIC OF SCHEME

Calls Churchill's Patrol Another Sentry at the Gate of Europe.

London, March 31.—While New Zealand approves on the whole the formation of the Imperial naval squadron, with headquarters at Gibraltar, in which the overseas larger ships are to be incorporated, the Post, according to a cable, expresses regret that it should be based so near home. "Churchill's imperial patrol," it says, "has become another sentry at the gates of Europe." It goes on to ask whether the Pacific has been omitted from the admiralty map of the world, and emphasizes the anomaly of including New Zealand's battle cruiser both in the squadron and in British naval superiority in the North Sea.

London, April 2.—A true bill has been returned against Mrs. Pankhurst, the suffragette leader, by the grand jury at the Old Bailey, on a charge of incitement to commit damage and destruction to the residence of Rt. Hon. Lloyd-George on February 24.

The suffragettes are collecting the instruments used in forcible feeding of those committed to jail. These will be exhibited in American cities in the hope of exciting sympathy.

#### PART OF RAILWAY TO BE DOUBLE TRACKED

Grand Trunk Pacific Enters Into Track Scheme with Canadian Northern.

The Grand Trunk Pacific Railway has entered into an agreement with the Canadian Northern to build a double track line on the same grade along the shore of Moose Lake, twenty miles west of Yellowhead Pass. One of the tracks will be used by the C.N.R. This arrangement was made when it was discovered that engineering difficulties were involved in the building of a C. N. R. line through the same section but on a higher elevation. Construction work will be started shortly by Foley, Welch & Stewart on behalf of the G. T. P., but the cost will be borne by the other railway company. The proposed double-track section will be twelve miles long.

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#### OHIO'S FLOOD SITUATION IS BEING RAPIDLY COPEDE WITH

DAYTON'S LOSS OF LIFE ABOUT TWO HUNDRED—RELIEF FUNDS FROM ALL PARTS.

(Special to The Daily News.)  
Columbus, April 2.—Human effort has so far failed to penetrate the pile of debris on the west side of the city, where it is believed the bodies of many persons missing since the flood will be found. Up to now seventy-one bodies have been found in that section. Good news is received from Dayton. The waters are receding and it is not believed the loss of life will be much over two hundred. The property loss from fire will not exceed \$1,500,000. The damage caused by the floods to mercantile houses, factories will run anywhere from one to twenty millions. Residents of portions of the city still inundated are being rapidly removed to sections not affected by the floods. Bountiful relief is being distributed by the federal government, in addition to which liberal subscriptions to relief funds are being received from all parts.

#### Floods in Illinois.

Shawneetown, Ill., April 1.—The entire city is under water, ranging from ten to thirty feet deep. In order to relieve the floods the south levee was dynamited yesterday afternoon by military engineers.

Ohio River Still Rising. Louisville, April 2.—The Ohio river showed a stage of forty-five feet at 7 o'clock this morning, and is still rising slowly.

PRINCE GEORGE ARRIVED ON TIME THIS MORNING WITH SEVENTY-FIVE SALOON PASSENGERS AND LARGE CARGO OF FREIGHT.

Notwithstanding that Prince Rupert is now served with practically a daily boat service from the south, every ship brings a large contingent of passengers, many of whom are becoming permanent residents of the city or the district immediately surrounding. The Prince George of the G. T. P. coast service arrived this morning sharp on time with about seventy-five saloon passengers as well as a large number of third class passengers and a heavy cargo of freight.

The landing made by Captain Donald this morning was one of the best ever witnessed at the G. T. P. wharf and was second to none ever made by the popular Captain "Barney," who established a reputation in this respect. The big steamer glided up alongside the wharf at a lively pace as though she were just going to give onlookers a glimpse of her graceful form, but in an instant her engines were reversed and her speed was checked within a few feet of the wharf. Within a very few moments the passengers were cheerfully hurrying down the gangway.

**WHAT THE DEADLOCK MEANS TO CANADA.**

Never has Ottawa held the attention of the country as it holds it at this writing. Seldom has the political news in the papers been as faithfully read. For there has at length entered the arena of federal politics an issue worthy of a quarrel, worthy of the best that is in the country. We do not at all sympathize with the people who try to make out that the tactics of the Liberals are unworthy. Their viewpoint apparently is that the Conservatives should be al-

lowed to go through with their proposals without any opposition whatever. They see no room for debate. They would like the country to think that the Conservative party at Ottawa had discovered the one and only proper course for Canada to pursue. But they are mistaken. Canada faces a crisis, and we trust every Canadian will be given an opportunity to express his feelings on the subject, says the non-political Canadian Collier's.

We have long been in doubt whether sufficient interest could be roused in the question of Empire defence to justify an election, but the interest the country seems to have taken in the deadlock which exists at the time of writing shows that they are indeed ready and will vote earnestly and with much thought. Had Premier Borden demonstrated clearly that there was an emergency, it might then have been desirable to pass the proposed money grant without

making it a party issue; but the emergency has not been proved, and indeed does not seem to have had the slightest foundation in fact. Under the circumstances there is no need for the hurried policy of the Hon. R. L. Borden, but, on the contrary, the country should be allowed to choose between that and a real policy of a Canadian built navy.

The Laurier government made a big mistake when it did not propose a big Canadian naval program a few years ago. Undoubtedly Sir Wilfrid was influenced in choosing that policy by his belief that the whole question of Empire defence was prematurely brought up, and that the best he could do would be to obtain a small navy which would provide temporary satisfaction for the jingoes. He was mistaken. The jingoes were not satisfied and the way was left open for the Conservatives to bring in their present policy.

The Liberals have been forced now to bring forth a real naval policy, and we think, despite their earlier mistake, it is the true Canadian policy. We hope and trust that the Liberals will succeed in forcing the government to the country, not so much because we think the country likely to support the Liberal proposals, but because the Canadian voter will have the first chance he has had in many years to decide on a real matter of principle. Reciprocity was not decided on its merits. The people of Canada were deliberately stampeded by a flag flapping or confused by the juggling of statistics and economic arguments. In this question of contribution or a Canadian navy the issue is clear.

**Will Fly to Victoria**

If an enterprising aviator carries out his present plans, visitors to the coast next summer may travel from Vancouver to Victoria by aeroplane. There will be a charge of \$25 for the trip. No extra charge, we presume, for sea bathing en route.—Edmonton Journal.

**Courthouse for Quesnel**

After some considerable delay for the prosecution of necessary enquiries into the cost of labor and materials, etc., the Government has awarded the contract for the erection of the new court house at Quesnel to Mr. Henry Joyce of Quesnel, whose tender was at a price of \$22,000. Work on the contract will be initiated almost immediately.

**BEGINNING MINING ON SILVER CREEK STRIKE**

Several Holes Going Down but No Reports of Rich Pay.

Vancouver, B. C., March 29.—A despatch from Silver Creek, scene of the new gold strike, in Northern British Columbia, via Nahlin, was received today as follows:

"There have been a few arrivals here each day for the past week and all the newcomers are well equipped. Most of them have come from the north, but a few are from Vancouver and Seattle. From Vancouver, two prospectors, Wood and Dean, have arrived, and a man named Buche, partner of Seattle prospectors already in, is also here. At fraction of claim No. 30, above the discovery on Silver Creek, the owners have sunk a shaft fourteen feet, but have been stopped by water. They are now sinking on the first south fork of Silver Creek and expect tangible results shortly from the nature of the gravel deposits.

**Traders Sinking Holes.**

"Smith and Geddes, traders from the Pelly district, are sinking holes. They expect to erect a store at Teslin and have two steamers on the route from Whitehorse to Teslin district.

"Pete Gabriel, formerly a blacksmith at Atlin, is bringing in a small sawmill. McLean, Miller, Copeland and Forbes, from Pelly district, who have been prospecting there for several years, have staked a number of claims here and will spend the summer in this district.

"There are several hand sleighs making easy stages from Atlin, taking ten days to the trip, and they can carry 250 pounds each.

**Severe Cold Weather.**

"Fuller and McCullough are sinking holes on Johnson Creek and its tributaries, but have not reached bedrock to date.

"There has been some severe cold weather during the last week, and the thermometer has been 30 below zero. With this temperature the work of thawing out the ground is slow. All the trails are in excellent condition and there are said to be sixty men now on the way in from Atlin."

**BEAVER AGAIN UNDER OFFICIAL PROTECTION**

Trapping Will Not Be Permitted Until Close Season Closes on November 14.

Chief Game Warden A. Bryan-Williams has reported to the Attorney General's department that, owing to the season for beaver being open last year and the number of pelts placed on the market very large, it was deemed advisable to declare another close season until November 15. An exception was, however, made in favor of the Indians on the Stikine, Liard and Peace Rivers. While it was as well to be on the safe side, it appears that the number of beaver trapped last season was by no means larger than the supply warranted. Numerous complaints have been received of damage done by beaver to farm lands. In some cases these have been found upon investigation to have been simply excuses of those who wished to trap, but in the majority of instances the complaints were found well founded and trapping permits accordingly issued, the invariable condition being that one-third of the price realized from the sale of the pelts should go to the government.

As the provincial stock of beaver is now larger than necessary, it is intended that trapping shall be again allowed when the present order-in-council expires on November 15. Licenses for the trapping of beaver last year produced a revenue to the province of but \$201.25.

**Moving Pictures in Ontario**

London, Ont., March 29.—The owners of moving picture houses in this city will protest against the proposed amendments to the act governing picture houses which is being considered by the Provincial Legislature. It is proposed to impose a license fee of \$500, with no license to be granted to any picture theatre not on a corner with a 15-foot driveway at the side. 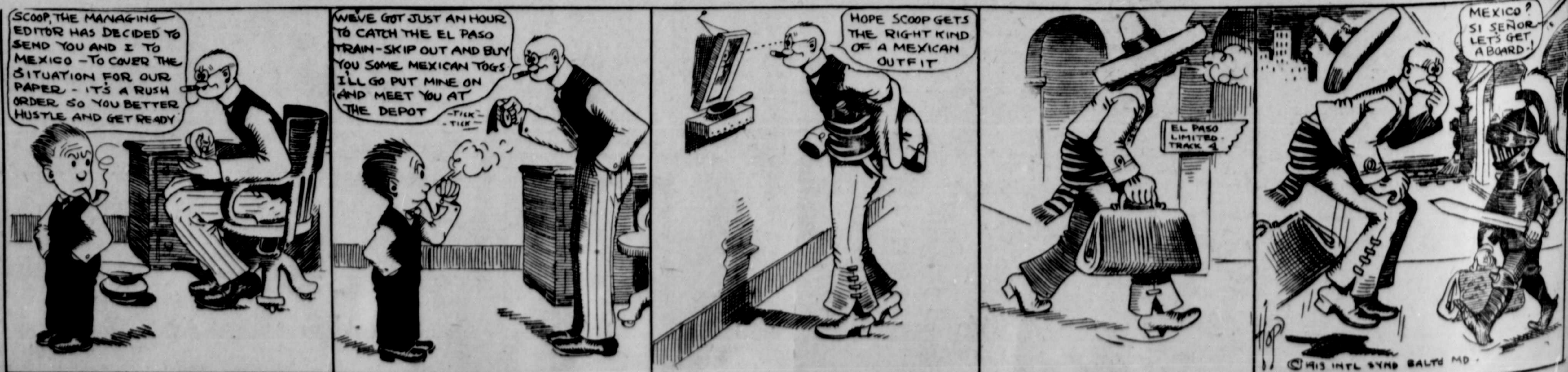

The death of Captain Walbran removes one of the oldest mariners in British Columbia and his passing will be a great loss to Canada's shipping. There is no question but that Captain Walbran was the best informed navigator in regard to the coast line of this western province. It is almost certain that had not death overtaken Captain Walbran the Dominion government would have seen fit to appoint him wreck commissioner for British Columbia, which position was made vacant by the death of Captain James Gaudin. He was highly qualified for that position owing to his associations here.

### TELEPHONE SYSTEM TO WORK THE G. T. P.
