GREAT TURMOIL UPON INTRODUCTION OF CLOSURE

MONTENEGRO STILL IGNORING THE DEMANDS OF POWERS—NATIONALS PLAY OPENING GAME

CLOSURE RESOLUTION MOVED IN HOUSE BY BORDEN HIMSELF

INTRODUCTION CREATED GREAT TURMOIL OWING TO MINISTER HAZEN MOVING PREVIOUS QUESTION TO PREVENT LAURIER SPEAKING.

(Special to The Daily News.)
Ottawa, April 10.—The introduction of the closure resolution in the House last night caused one of the most remarkable scenes of the session, and the uproar it occasioned lasted for some time. The resolution was moved by Premier Borden himself and the crux of the fight which it occasioned was whether or not Hon. Mr. Hazen, minister of marine, should or should not be allowed to speak before Sir Alfred Laurier as, by moving a "previous question," the House could prevent the Liberals from moving any amendments. Both men rose to speak at the same time and the speaker of the House decided that the leader of the opposition had the floor. This occasioned a fresh uproar and a fierce demand for a vote on the point. A vote was taken and the House declared that Minister Hazen was entitled to be heard by 83 to 67.

When Mr. Hazen started to speak a fearful din was raised, cries of "Shame," "Sit down," "Name on New Brunswick," "Babblers," and so on were con-

tinuously yelled. The minister was unable to make himself heard at any point, but he managed to make the motion excluding amendments. The Liberals kept up the interruption by singing as a doleful dirge, "O Canada," and Mr. Speaker had a hard time in restoring order.

The debate on the resolution, it is expected, may take several days.

AID FOR FLOOD VICTIMS

BORDEN POLICY VIGOROUSLY OPPOSED BY ALL AUSTRALIANS

PREMIER SCADDEN DECLARES MONEY CONTRIBUTIONS FROM DOMINIONS TO IMPERIAL NAVY CAN NEVER BE POPULAR.

Vancouver, April 7.—"I do not intend to discuss the naval question as it affects Canada, nor the memoranda of the admiralty and Mr. Winston Churchill, for the reason that if I did I might be accused of meddling in your politics, a thing which I have no right to do. But," said Premier Scadden, "so far as our own country is concerned, you can be sure that the whole Commonwealth of Australia is united in support of the policy of a local fleet working in co-operation with the British admiralty, but still Australian in its inception, its organization and in all its work. We are following out the

agreement reached with the British government at the defence conference of five years ago, a policy which was confirmed by the imperial conference of 1911, with the single exception of New Zealand, and which we confidently expected that Canada would have followed, as we have done. "It is a matter of regret to us," he continued, "that there is a tendency now to alter that policy, but you can take it from me that Australia will never consent to any alteration of the policy upon which she has embarked. We have our Australian navy; we are proud of it, as proud as Britain is of the British navy; and we have no difficulty in securing all the men we require."

IS SELECTING SITE FOR LUMBER MILLS

Company Owning Large Timber Limits Will Erect Lumber Mills Near Prince Rupert.

Percy D. Hillis of Victoria, organizer of the Western Timber Holding Company, which controls large timber limits in the vicinity of Prince Rupert, is in the city this week on business in connection with his company. One matter that is being looked into is a site for lumber mills which they intend erecting in the near future. Mr. Hillis says that the mills will not be far from Prince Rupert. The matter of a site at Port Edward is being considered.

COLORED MAN WAS COMMITTED FOR TRIAL

B. K. Williams Charged With Assault Will be Tried before Judge Young

The preliminary hearing in the case of B. K. Williams, colored, charged with assault, was continued before Magistrate Carss this morning. Long, the man who alleges that he was struck over the head with a bottle by Williams in a room in the Empress Hotel was cross-examined by counsel for the accused, Mr. Williams, of Williams & Manson, but no new evidence of importance was furnished. A Gottstein, a musician, who was a witness of part of the affair, testified that his attention was first attracted by the wrangling of the two men, which was followed almost instantly by the sound of breaking glass. He saw the two men in a tussle in the hall on the floor. Williams ran down the stairs followed by Long, whose head was bleeding profusely. After hearing the evidence Williams was committed for trial. He elected for speedy trial and will come up before Judge Young at 11 o'clock on Friday morning.

ANOTHER LEVEE BREAKS

SUFFRAGETTES MAKE DESCENT ON CONGRESS

Five Hundred of Them Bombard Congressmen with Petitions for Equal Suffrage.

Washington, April 7.—Women suffragists descended on Congress again today with petitions for a constitutional amendment for equal suffrage. After a mass meeting in a downtown theatre, the petition bearers, more than 500 in number, marched to the capital. At the foot of the capital steps the marchers divided, one party going to the senate side and the other to the house. Both eventually joined in the rotundas, where members of both branches were bombarded with the petitions. The bearers represented every congressional district in the country.

While galleries in the senate were specially reserved for the marchers and their adherents, no bands or banners were admitted to the capital.

KITSILANO RESERVE

Indians Vacate Lands to Province and Will Go to Squamish Reserve.

Vancouver, April 10.—The Kitsilano Indian reserve has passed out of the hands of the Indians. The heads of families were paid a little over \$11,000 each to vacate and hand over the land to the Provincial government. They will go to a reserve at Squamish.

IN MEMORY OF THE VICTIMS OF TITANIC

Widows of Victims Will Sprinkle Flowers at Point of Great Disaster.

New York, April 7.—Flowers will be tossed upon the waters where the Titanic went down by three women, widowed by the disaster. This tribute will be paid at 2:15 o'clock on the morning of April 15—the anniversary of the foundering of the ship—by Mrs. Jacques Futrelle, Mrs. Henry B. Harris and Mrs. George Thorne. The three women plan to sail for Europe from Boston on April 13.

When the ship passes the approximate position where the liner dived first to the bottom they will sing "Nearer My God to Thee," the Titanic dirge, as their flowers fall upon the waves. Several other women survivors may join the pilgrimage, it was said tonight.

MONTENEGRINS STILL IGNORE THE DEMANDS OF THE POWERS

GENERAL ASSAULT ON SCUTARI PLANNED—BALKAN ALLIES REPLY TO PEACE PROTOCOL OF POWERS BY COUNTER PROPOSITIONS.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, April 10.—The Balkan allies have submitted their formal reply to the suggested peace negotiations with Turkey. The reply purports to be an acceptance of the mediation conditions of the powers, but the acceptance is subject to reservations which virtually repudiate the proposed terms. These are the counter propositions of the allies:

1. Indefinite determination of the frontier of the province of Thrace, the line indicated in the conditions formulated by the powers shall be taken as a basis and not as a definitive line.
2. The islands in the Aegean Sea shall go to the Balkan allies.
3. The allies consider they should know beforehand the frontiers proposed for the future state of Albania, trusting they will be in conformity with those they proposed in London.
4. The allies' demand for a war indemnity must be accepted in principle, the task of fixing the amount being left to a commission which is to study the financial question, and on which

the Balkan allies will be represented.

5. The allies agree that the operations of the war shall cease as soon as the above conditions have been favorably received.

In defiance to the mandate of the powers, the Montenegrins and Servians are planning a general assault on Scutari. Fresh Serbian artillery has been brought up to the beleaguered Turkish fortress and the instant this is placed a general cannonade is to open, under cover of which the Montenegrins and Servians will advance to storm the city. Montenegrins generally are expressing delight at the defiance handed to a British admiral, who, speaking for the powers, demanded that the siege of Scutari should be abandoned.

The concert of Europe is in dire danger of discord here today as a result of the open defiance of its wishes by Montenegro in refusing to abandon its attack upon or its claims for Scutari. Ambassadors of the powers are in almost constant informal conference and the future action of the great powers is problematical.

FOURTEEN MILLIONS FOR RAIL TUNNEL THROUGH THE ROCKIES

CANADIAN PACIFIC TO HAVE THE LARGEST BORE IN THE WORLD, CONNECTING ALBERTA WITH BRITISH COLUMBIA

Winnipeg, April 7.—The Canadian Pacific Railway has decided on another tunnel in the western mountains. This tunnel will be sixteen miles long, the longest in the world, being nearly four miles longer than the famous Simplon Pass in the Alps, and nearly twice as long as the Lotschberg tunnel opened last year.

The new tunnel will be through the famous Kicking Horse Pass of the Rocky Mountains. The eastern portal will be in Alberta and the western portal in British Columbia.

Careful computations indicate that the work will cost \$14,000,000 and will occupy seven years in completing. This is based on the data secured from construction records of the five large Alpine tunnels. The tunnel like that of the Selkirk Range through Rogers' Pass will reduce the trackage by five miles and will do away with many miles of snow sheds. Grades will be reduced from 2½ per cent to less than 1 per cent.

The Canadian Pacific has an even greater plan afoot than this, and that is to almost eliminate the Rocky Mountains as far as rail commerce is concerned. The company proposes to have three and possibly four distinct lines from Winnipeg to the coast.

The first will be the present main line, the second will be the new cutoff via Souris, the third will be through Saskatoon and Edmonton, through one of the northern passes into the competitive territory of the northland and on to a Northern Pacific Coast port.

Pope's Condition Improved

Rome, April 10.—An official bulletin placed at the entrance of the Vatican gates this morning states that His Holiness passed a good night and that his condition is much improved this morning.

HOLDS BATTLES OF EMPIRE WILL BE FOUGHT ON PACIFIC

ATTORNEY GENERAL OF AUSTRALIA SAYS CANADA AND NEW ZEALAND MUST ABSOLUTELY PARTICIPATE IN PATROLLING THE PACIFIC.

Melbourne, April 7.—During the course of a banquet given tonight to the officers of the dreadnought New Zealand, now in this port, the Governor General of Australia, Lord Denman, made a splendid speech on the naval policy. "The belief that Australia intends to use her warships only in the Pacific is entirely erroneous," he said, "and judging from the utterances of the public men of Australia this will not be the case.

"Should there arise any serious crisis our ships will co-operate with the mother country wherever and whenever the danger is most formidable."

The attorney general, Hon. William Hughes, declared that preparations for war were necessary, although it was a tragic reflection on civilization when Christian nations were preparing to destroy each other. Nevertheless, he continued, the position was not Australia's making, and she would be doubly stupid if she did not realize her position by failing to make all preparations for trouble.

Continuing, Hon. Hughes declared that the active part that Australia, New Zealand and Can-

ARE AUSTRALIANS SUPERIOR TO US?

It is continually evident that the Australian idea of imperial defence runs on lines parallel to those pursued by Sir Wilfrid Laurier. The Australians are determined that their own waters shall be protected and have the idea that other portions of the Empire should follow their example.

Speaking at the Royal Colonial Institute at London on March 11th, Sir George Reid, Australian high commissioner, expressed the opinion that the time was not far distant when Canada would have to undertake the defence of the North Pacific and North Atlantic, while New Zealand and Australia guarded the Southern Pacific, thus leaving England free to concentrate on the North Sea and guard her trade routes. He declared that the Australian policy of having its own navy operating in conjunction with the British admiralty must eventually be followed by all self-governing Dominions.

That is the policy of the Liberal party of Canada. As soon as they return to power that is the self-respecting policy to be pursued by the self-governing Dominion. But as long as Canada remains under the retrogressive rule of the combination Tory-Nationalist government nothing can be looked for but a policy of tribute, to send ships paid for by Canada, manned and maintained by Great Britain to be stationed in the North Sea, leaving Canada bare of defence, and young Canadian manhood denied the opportunity of training for naval service which it is compelled to pay for.

WHAT SHIPBUILDING PLANT WOULD COST.

Some interesting figures regarding the cost of plants for building warships are contained in the Berlin correspondence to the London Times of March 10th last, which makes it apparent that Mr. Winston Churchill in his famous secret memorandum to Premier Borden used a good deal of imagination in his effort to help the Canadian government's programme. The British first lord of the admiralty not only said that Canada could not build or man battle-ships, but that "the cost of laying down the plant alone would at a rough estimate be \$15,000,000."

The Berlin correspondent of the London Times gives a report of the Vulcan Shipbuilding Company of Stettin and Hamburg, one of the largest battleship building firms of Germany. This shows that the total share capital of this company, which employs 12,000 workmen, is \$750,000, and that this capital was only increased to such an amount in 1909 when the company installed additional shipbuilding yards at Hamburg. There seems to be a big gap between \$750,000 which has equipped one of the largest warship building firms of Germany and Mr. Churchill's figure of \$15,000,000.

BORDEN MAY YET CHANGE HIS MIND.

Why should not Mr. Borden accept Mr. Churchill's invitation and instead of insisting upon his determination to construct three capital ships for the Imperial Navy, build properly balanced fleet units for the protection of our own waters as originally suggested by the British Admiralty and as proposed by Sir Wilfrid Laurier?

THE OCEAN FALLS PULP AND PAPER COMPANY TO REORGANIZE

**CREDITORS AND SHAREHOLDERS APPLY TO COURT TO WIND
UP AFFAIRS OF BIG CONCERN.**

Vancouver, April 7.—Steps to consider the winding up and reorganization of the Ocean Falls Pulp Co., Limited, the big lumber and pulp company which was floated in 1909 with an authorized capital of \$6,000,000, are being taken today at a meeting of creditors and shareholders, which is being held in the company's offices here.

The meeting follows an application by the Crane Co., of Vancouver and Chicago, wholesale steamfitting supply merchants, for a compulsory winding up order. Against this a scheme of reconstruction has been put forward by the directors of the company, to reorganize under the name of the Ocean Falls Mills Co., with a capital of \$3,000,000. They are asking the creditors to consent to accept 20 per cent. of their claims in stock in the new company and the balance in notes at 6 per cent., due in one, two and three years. The meeting this afternoon will consider the proposal, and also a proposal by some of the creditors that the Supreme Court of the province be petitioned under the Provincial Companies Act for an order to compel the minority to abide by the decision of the majority.

Has Large Mills.

The Ocean Falls Company has a pulp mill with a capacity of 150 tons of dry pulp per day, and a lumber mill with a capacity of 350,000 feet of lumber per ten hours, the mills being valued at \$2,800,000 on the company's balance sheet. The concern has 80,000 acres of timber leases with 3,000,000,000 feet of standing timber, 250 acres of water frontage; water powers measuring 15,000 h.p., of which 12,000 h.p. is in use, a large hotel, store and houses at Ocean Falls, which are said to have cost \$150,000 to build, and other assets. The principal movable assets are said to be a fleet of boats and a logging plant and equipment valued at \$240,000, with a stock of logs, lumber and pulp at the mill valued at \$300,000, as well as \$50,000 of bills receivable.

The capital of the company is given at 10,000 preference and 50,000 ordinary shares of the value of \$100 each. There are \$2,000,000 worth of first debentures out and \$1,000,000 of second debentures. The company is said to have been in financial difficulties since last October, when Mr. I. Hamilton Benn of London, England, got control on behalf of the English shareholders by paying \$150,000, which was applied to a portion of the claims. More recently—on March 19 of this year—the debenture holders came into possession.

Unsecured Creditors' Claims.

The unsecured creditors have total claims for \$320,000, the largest unsecured creditor being the Molsons Bank with a claim for \$84,000. Other principal creditors are: Lester W. David, \$35,000; Crane Company, \$21,000; Swift Canadian Co., \$13,000; R. W. Winch Co., \$14,500; Empire Manufacturing Co., \$9,600; McLennan, McFeely Co., \$9,000; Wood, Vallance Co., \$9,000; Clarke Bros. & Co., \$9,000; Burns & Co., \$8,100; W. H. Malkin Co., \$8,000; H. M. Mills, \$6,600.

A committee of creditors, composed of Mr. W. H. Malkin, Mr. W. G. Mackenzie, of Wood, Vallance & Co., and Mr. W. Thompson of R. V. Winch & Co., have made a report on the company for the creditors. The Molsons Bank and many of the other creditors are understood to be in favor of accepting the company's offer of reorganization, but this is opposed by Mr. W. G. Mackenzie, K. C., and Mr. C. S. Arnold, the company's solicitor here. They claimed this morning in argument before Mr. Justice Murphy that the application under the Companies Act to compel the minority to abide by the decision of the majority is ultra vires, being concerned with matters pertaining to bankruptcy and insolvency which are only to be dealt with under the Dominion statutes.

The provincial directors of the company are Mr. A. B. Martin, resident managing director at Ocean Falls, and Mr. A. E. Millington, managing director of the Vancouver office. Mr. J. W. Bellwell of this city is the representative of Mr. J. Hamilton Benn.

PUBLISHER OF FORTY MILLIONS OF BIBLES

Skins of Hundred Thousand Animals Used Each Year for Covers.

One of the most remarkable men connected with the publishing business in England is about to retire in the person of Henry Frowde, who for thirty-nine years has been London manager of the Oxford University Press, the oldest printing concern with an unbroken history in England. The activities of this venerable organization are world-wide, and it is well known in the trade that its retiring manager practically made the Oxford University Press as it exists today.

When Frowde joined the press in 1874, its output of Bibles was less than a million a year; since that time it has published and distributed over 40,000,000 of them, besides thousands of other works. The skins of 100,000 animals are used every year for the covers of Oxford Bibles alone, and 400,000 sheets of gold are needed for gilt lettering.

NEWS NOTES FROM GRAHAM ISLAND

Provincial Constable Petrie S. Jack, of Queen Charlotte, has been appointed a deputy mining recorder for the Queen Charlotte Islands.

The grant from the Provincial Government to the Queen Charlotte City Hospital has been increased from \$300 to \$500 per annum.

The B. C. Fisheries trawler Triumph left on Thursday morning for Vancouver and Victoria with a large consignment of salmon and 100 barrels of oil. After discharging cargo the Triumph will be fitted out at Victoria as a hand line boat for halibut fishing.

Large forces of men at Aliford Bay are busy laying sidewalks, improving the water supply, overhauling the cannery and engine house, and generally getting things in shape for the approaching fishing season.

A dyke will be constructed at Delkatla which will open up for cultivation five hundred acres of good land. The dyke will be placed on what is known as Delkatla Slough and will be quite an undertaking. Mr. Dollemeyer, the owner of the Massett town-site, will construct the dyke.

A new set of instruments for the Massett brass band arrived recently. The Indians have a number of good musicians, and under the leadership of Alfred Adams, will at once take up the formation of a band.

The steamer Thomas Carruthers, with a representative of one of the large cold storage plants, called at Massett recently, where the Indians were interviewed with regard to fishing during the coming spring.

Rev. Father McDonald of Woden River, held the first mass in the Massett schoolhouse, where a number of members of the Catholic congregation were in attendance. It is the intention to construct several chapels on the island for places of worship.

Mr. R. R. Hedley, M.E., of Vancouver, is expected shortly on a visit to Moresby Island, where he will examine several mining properties. Mr. Hedley visited Tassoo several months ago, but owing to bad weather was not able to accomplish very much work.

A jolly birthday party was held on Wednesday afternoon, when Miss Lilly Seawroft had the pleasure of entertaining her schoolmates at her mother's residence. The youngsters enjoyed themselves thoroughly and in the evening the grown-ups got a look in.—Queen Charlotte Islander.

HYLAND AND SCALER TO MEET ONCE MORE

ATLIN TAKING ON A NEW LEASE OF LIFE

Local Merchants Busy Outfitting Stampers for the New Placer Diggings

Atlin, April 4—Interest in the new discovery still continues unabated. Although nothing definite has as yet been determined as to values, stampers are still leaving here daily for the new district. The local merchants are going in full swing outfitting the new arrivals. Freight is moving more rapidly now and there has so far been no shortage of anything required to complete outfits.

The visit of Dr. Young has had the effect of reassuring the public that this will no doubt remain the pivotal point and that from Atlin to the new discovery is the only feasible route to the new district. Dr. Young stated that he has had included in the estimates of expenditures for public works a vote of \$50,000, the largest in the history of the camp. A party is now exploring the trail and if the discovery proves as rich as is anticipated, work on its construction will be recommended and pushed to completion without delay. The winter trail is now in excellent condition and several with outfits have made record time in getting to their destination.

Mr. C. H. Murie, representing the Vancouver World, left here a few days ago and will remain in the new district ample time to thoroughly write up the camp for publication through the columns of the publication he represents.

Many of those arriving bound for the new discovery are not by any means strangers to this camp nor to the north country, most of them having been here during the early years and latterly in other mining camps of Yukon and Alaska.

Altogether there are some 350 claims recorded on Moose Horn, Trout, Johnson and Silver Creeks and their tributaries. Most of the recording is now being done at Nahlin telegraph station, where the B.C. Government has stationed a deputy mining recorder. This station is a day's journey from the new discovery and the appointment has so far given entire satisfaction, obviating the necessity of a long trip to Atlin for recording purposes.

George Redmond whose partner—Sandberg—was frozen to death on the trail has gone in search of the remains.

COMMITTEES NAMED TO RUSTLE EXHIBITS

Graham Islanders Take Up Rupert Fair Project with Enthusiasm.

That the east coast of Graham and Moresby Islands and Skidegate Inlet will be to the front with exhibits at the Prince Rupert exhibition next September was determined at an enthusiastic meeting held in the school room at Skidegate last Saturday night. Good live committees were appointed and judging from the tone of the meeting every effort will be made to have splendid exhibits of the various resources of the islands at the fair.

After an informal talk the meeting got down to business and Mr. J. L. Barge was appointed chairman. Mr. A. Richardson, secretary of the Lawn Hill exhibition, gave an outline of the committees that should be appointed, also stating that his society had appointed him to act on the advisory board of the Prince Rupert exhibition from this district, which he trusted would meet with their approval. Mr. Richardson was adopted unanimously by the meeting to act on the board.

Remarks were made by the chairman, A. J. Gordon, C. P. Johnston, H. W. Fairbairn, N. Fraser, E. N. Valentine and others, and all agreed that the Prince Rupert exhibition would be an excellent opportunity to advertise the islands by sending a first class exhibit of their resources that would make the outside public open their eyes.

CANADA'S PROGRESS DURING EACH DECADE

Statistics Gathered from Blue Books Sometimes Make Interesting Reading.

Government "blue books" do not constitute thrilling reading, but they contain romance within their cerulean covers. The growth of Canada, in material wealth and otherwise, reads like romance, as much as a statement of facts demonstrating it. In the records contained in the monthly statements of Trade and Commerce, there is a department of statistics, "Progress of Canada." Taking ten year periods as a convenient way of showing how we are growing.

In 1872, only forty years ago, the customs revenue of Canada—the measure of her commercial activity—totalled \$528,750. In 1912 it had grown to \$2,433,846, a twenty-fold increase. The growth has been gradual, but decided. At the several ten year periods intervening the customs revenue stood at these figures:

In 1882 it was \$723,914; in 1892 it was \$904,801; in 1902 it was \$1,176,024, and in 1912, as stated, it was \$2,433,846.

In the matter of post offices another index of commercial activity, and increasing popular prosperity, there is similar growth. In 1872 there were 4,135 post offices in Canada. In 1912 the number had grown to 13,859, and the yearly revenue had grown from \$1,193,662 in 1872 to \$13,771,000 in 1912. In 1872 Canada had 2,899 miles of railway in operation.

In 1912 the Canadian railway mileage in operation was 26,727 miles. In 1872 the total trade of Canada was only 194 millions, today it amounts to 1,000 millions. A similar story of improvement could be told of every department of the national interest, and we are stronger in the way of development and equipment for still greater and more rapid progress.

NEW CREEK ON SILVER SHOWING UP WELL

Thirty-Seven and a Half Ounces Taken from O'Donnell Creek

A letter received in the last mail from the north from "Millionaire" Kelly by a well-known citizen of Juneau conveys the information that good pay has been discovered on O'Donnell Creek, thirty-five miles from Silver Creek, and that much nearer Atlin. According to the letter it has been learned that a man took thirty-seven and a half ounces of gold out of it in an incredibly short time last fall. The creek is all staked.

"Millionaire" Kelly, who is well known about Juneau and regarded as reliable, is at Silver Creek. He says all is staked as is Moose Horn creek near it. At present no one is doing any work there, but everybody is waiting for spring to come.

Kelly says provisions are not high in Atlin and the demand does not exceed the supply. However, dogs cannot be bought to transfer goods from Atlin to the diggings for love or money. Atlin prices are, flour, \$7.50 sack; bacon, 30 cents a pound; beans, 11 cents and all other things in proportion—Juneau Empire.

LARGEST BATTLESHIP

To be Launched at Wilhelms-haven Shortly—First of a New Type

Berlin, April 7.—The new battleship to be launched at Wilhelms-haven will be the largest in the German navy, being the first of a new type, with a tonnage of two thousand in excess of the Kaiser class. The new vessel will correspond to the British Queen Elizabeth class. Her heavy artillery will consist of the new Krupp 14-inch gun, while her middle armaments will be the 10-inch guns.

Telegraph Line to Bella Coola

Bella Coola is now in telegraphic communication with the outside world. An extension of the Dominion Government Yukon telegraph line from 150-Mile House, Cariboo Road, has been working for some months, and many people interested in the Bella Coola section are using the wire. The line is 320 miles long and is a duplicate system, which may be used as a telegraph and telephone wire at the same time. It runs through the Chilcotin valley, and the farmers in that district find the telephone section a great boon.

IS THIS A TWIN OR NOT A TWIN?

Delicate Problem for British Insurance Commission to Solve.

London, April 7.—The commissioners who are carrying out the provisions of the National Insurance Act have a delicate problem to solve. The wife of a Lancashire workman gave birth to a son on February 24 and obtained the maternity benefit of 30s under the law. On April 4 she gave birth to a girl. The question is: Can the mother demand another 30s? She can if the new baby is regarded as another child, but if it is held that the second baby is a twin it will have to be thrown into the first bargain, as twins count as one for insurance purposes.

The doctors say there is no doubt that the second baby is a twin, although the lapse of six weeks in such cases is extremely rare.
